### New Oldsmobiles Will Be Displayed Tuesday, Sept 29

The new 1971 Oldsmobiles, which go on display in dealer showrooms Tuesday, Sept. 29, are more extensively restyled and incorporate more important engineering advancements than any models in the division's history, it was announced this week.

"The sport appearance of Cutlass models has been enhanced, the full-size 88's and 98's are completely new, and the Toronado becomes a car of unique and unmistakable elegance," Dennis Ward of Ward Motor Co. explained.

"While retaining all the advantages of front wheel drive," Beltz continued, "The Toronado is also designed to be the most beautiful, the most striking automobile in America. I believe it will have great impact on the luxury, personal car market," he said.

Ward also revealed that Oldsmobile in 1971 will offer one of the widest selections of station wagons in the industry.

"For the first time since 1964," Ward added, "Oldsmobile will market a full-size wagon, the Custom Cruiser. With it addition, our fleet of wagons is expanded to five models. They include the Cutlass Cruiser, the highly popular Vista Cruiser, and the new Custom Cruiser. The latter two are available in 2- or 3-seat versions,

with the third seat forward facing," he said.

The 88's and 98's for 1971 are built with new bodies on a new chassis. Their sleek new shape is accentuated by increased curve of the body side surface. Flush mounted side glass further contributes to this sleek appearance. Front pillars are slimmer, offering less obstruction for better visibility.

The roof is of cantilever styling, strengthened by the addition of a new full inner panel construction. Increased body dimensions permit greater interior roominess—more leg room, head room and shoulder room, front and rear. The new 88 and 98 bodies include a very important advancement in instrument panel design.

Ward told of a new steering wheel design for the 88's and 98's in which the entire center pad area becomes the horn button. It may be pressed at any point on its broad surface to actuate the horn.

The interiors of all 1971 Oldsmobiles, from the Cutlass models on through the 88's, 98's and the Toronado, are flawless in detail, and are succeeding more luxurious and beautiful.

Suspension improvements in the 1971 Oldsmobiles will result in the most impressive ride in the industry. Fantastically smooth and quiet operation will combine with greater road stability, particularly in crosswinds.

Olds engineering objective in its 1971 cars was to stabilize these forces by isolating their harsh effects. Their goals were accomplished through the all-new

front suspension and rear suspension changes, plus changes in the stabilizer bars and shocks, and the computerized selection of springs based on the individual weight of each car.

In 1971 Oldsmobile will adapt all its engines for use with leaded or unleaded fuel. All premium fuel engines have been cancelled and compression ratios have been set at 8.5 to 1.

Ward explained that all 1971 Oldsmobiles will incorporate the evaporative emission control system developed by Oldsmobile engineers and introduced last year on California cars.

Also important to the reduction of emissions is the carburetor idle mixture adjustment. It is set precisely at the factory and provides better emission control if its setting is unchanged.

Oldsmobile will offer a total of 28 body styles compared to 29 in 1970. While several models have been deleted, new additions include a Delta 88 Royale Convertible, a 98 Luxury Hardtop Coupe and the Custom Cruiser.

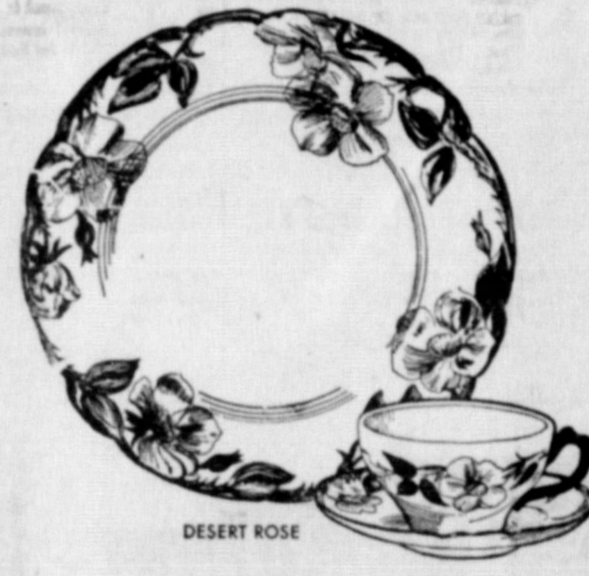

Mr. and Mrs. Carl Veteto were married here in 1922 and left here in 1949. They have five children, 21 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. This is a small world; said they were neighbors of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Hill who formerly lived here and they also showed up for the picnic Saturday. Mrs. Chas. Hill will be remembered as Ella Taylor, sister of Mrs. Forest McCreary. They still have many friends here.

One of these persons in particular I noticed was our old friend, Mrs. Cal Holland of Vega, where her two daughters now live, Mr. and Mrs. Gene Koeninger and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Wolf, who operate a super market. Gene and Sis said their daughter had married and their son is in college. Mr. and Mrs. Cal Holland operated a store at Brice several years. When I could see Mrs. Holland meet the many friends, it made me think of that old religious song, "Old Time Religion."

Makes me love everybody and it truly showed on Mrs. Holland's face as well as a lot more people.

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# Little Children

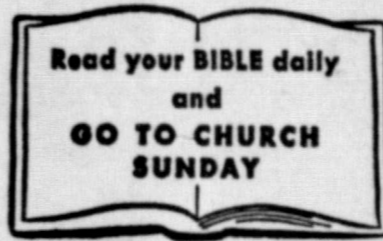
“Ye are of God, little children - 1 John 4:4

# Cyclone Slips By Eagles Friday For First Win

The Memphis Cyclone, the 9 victory over the Chillicothe Eagles was a landmark, as Memphis team in the 13th pulled off a victory breaking the 12-game losing streak. Memphis defeated Seymour in the 19th game of the 1968 season, but lost to Wellington in the season finale that year. The local squad then lost all 10 games in 1969 and the season was to White Deer this year. The victory was especially enhanced by the Cyclone players pulling the current season to one and one.

The game had its disappointments, especially early in the first quarter, as the Cyclone received opening kickoff and marched one first down with good carrying by TB Lewis Davis and FB Kehr to the Eagles 49. The Cyclone netted seven yards on third down as Davis lost the handle on the ball and Chillicothe received Memphis' 47-yard line.

However, Chillicothe had trouble and HB Ricky Bivins was stepped for a 16-yard loss. The Cyclone punted, a red flag was called, and as the result of the action Memphis took over the ball on the Chillicothe 44.

The good carry by Phillips for Lewis Davis stepped off to the Eagles 30. Here the Cyclone defense stopped the Cyclone for three downs, and the fourth, QB John Carmen and running room and made a 20-yard loss on the Eagles 20.

In the next series, Phillips was stepped for a five-yard loss by an lineman knifing through.

Then FB Kehr made the distance back with a good carry. TB Davis knifed for five more to the 15-yard line. On the fourth down, QB Carmen passed complete to End Donnie Carroll for a 10-yard gain, and a first down to the five-yard line.

On the next play, TB Davis made good yardage to the Chillicothe one. But misfortune struck on the next play as a Chillicothe linebacker crashed through and spoiled the handoff between Carmen and Davis, and Chillicothe recovered the fumble.

In the second quarter, the Eagles, without the services of HB Norice, who had an ankle injury and who saw limited action on offense, marched to the Cyclone one-yard line before losing the ball on a fumble as James Hansard pounced on the ball on the four. The Cyclone, on the next play, tried to pass but Carmen punted to the 40. Here, the drive seemed doomed but on a fourth down, Memphis was cited for a personal foul, and 15 yards was stepped off to the Cyclone 16.

HB Bivins carried the ball six consecutive times to take it across the goal line, with the scoring play coming on a fourth down from the seven-yard line. The point after touchdown kick was good, and Chillicothe led 9-6.

Following the kickoff, the Cyclone offense again got rolling as carries by Davis, QB Carmen and Hundley moved the ball to the Eagles 36-yard line. Here the drive fizzled as penalties were stepped off against the local squad. The two teams exchanged the

football in early minutes of the fourth quarter on fumbles and punts with Memphis coming into possession on the home 26.

Hundley got the drive going with a 5-yard carry to the 31, and Jimmy Phillips added 2 more and Davis made a first down to the home 41.

On the next play, QB Carmen passed into the waiting arms of Hundley who raced his way to the Eagles 5-yard line. On the next play, TB Phillips carried over but play was nullified by a 5-yard penalty.

The Memphis second TD came as TB Davis battled his way to the Eagles 1-yard line but fumbled the ball, and the Cyclone End Larry Jeffers pounced on it for the score in the end zone. Again the PAT try for points failed but Memphis led 12 to 9.

The Eagles got a drive going in the waiting minutes of the game but the clock ran out.

Lewis Davis with one 81-yard carry plus other good carries during the night had a net yardage total of 148 yards on 15 carries for almost a 10-yard per effort average. Mark Hundley had 58 passing yards, catching two tosses while he carried on 6 offensive downs from scrimmage for 14 yards.
