Mr. Ellis was born Sept. 7, 1900, near Chandler, Henderson Co., and moved to Hall County in 1915. He was united in marriage to Clara Maud Ragan March 18, 1923 in Waco. Mrs. Ellis preceded her husband in death on Nov. 15, 1968.

The family moved to Hall County in 1915 and Mr. Ellis had been engaged in farming.

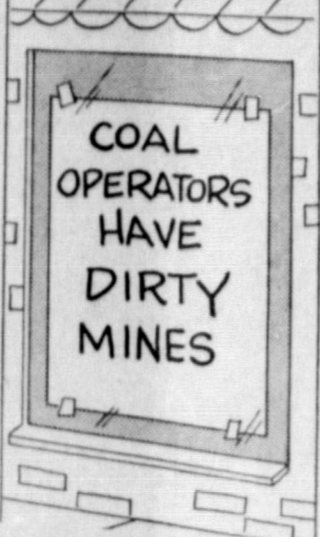

Based on the theme, "A new Spectrum in the 70's", the meeting drew over 1,200 nursing home owners, administrators, guests, and representatives from the health care field.

D., food and nutrition consultant to the United Nations, institutions, associations, and business; Guy E. Shuttleworth, Associate Professor, School of Social Work, University of Texas at Austin; Virginia Vollmer, Ph. D., consultant to the Institute of Behavioral Research at Texas Christian University; Reverend Philip S. Brown, administrator of health services, Moody House, Galveston; Jack Ledbetter, professor of business law, the University of Texas at Austin; Ed Baker, president of Baker Prescriptions and Medco Pharmacies; and Del Davis and Ben Harper, vice president of Whitten Pharmacies.

## No Tillage Farming Is Showing Steady Increase By U. S. Farmers

Reports from major farming areas in the U. S. show that no tillage farming really works, actually saves time and money, according to David Seitz, Soil Conservation Service.

As a result, this new technique is literally revolutionizing the business of farming. For example, in 1967, there were only a few thousand acres involved. A year later there were over 10,000 acres.

No tillage farming permits the planting of crops such as cotton, sorghum, and soybeans directly into undisturbed sod, cover crops, crop residues, or trash, without tillage. A narrow two to three-inch seedbed is opened with a notched or fluted coulters and seeded with a double disc opener.

Farmers not familiar with no tillage farming ask, "what makes no tillage work?" An efficient contact herbicide mixed with a residual herbicide to kill existing vegetation so that soil cover does not compete with a newly developing crop.

Equipment planning is relatively simple since no tillage requires less equipment than conventional planting. The only "special" equipment needed is a no tillage planter. Several equipment companies manufacture these planters. Conventional equipment can easily be adapted to no tillage.

Leaving a good cover crop all by eliminates wind and water erosion. Moisture is not worked out of the soil. Good covers can withstand sudden rainfall up to three inches without undue washing, and conserve moisture by preventing runoff.

Naturally, no tillage will also improve soil structure. The once-over operation eliminates seeded preparation trips normally made across the field. This reduces compaction, and increases penetration

Check Those Tax Records

Within a few days (if he hasn't already done so) Ellis Campbell, Jr., the District Director for Internal Revenue in North Texas, will offer his annual end-of-the-year advice. Mr. Campbell will recommend that you review your tax records for 1970 and get your papers in order to file your 1970 tax return. In checking over your tax records you should make sure that you have a cancelled check or a receipt on each tax deduction you plan to claim on your income tax return.

Since IRS will owe taxpayers (2 out of 3) in this area about 200 million dollars come January 1, it may pay you to be ready to file that tax return as early as possible.

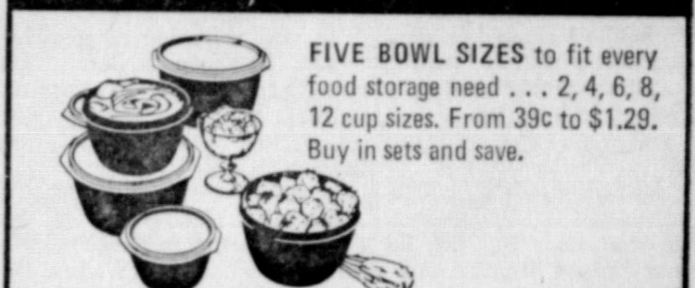

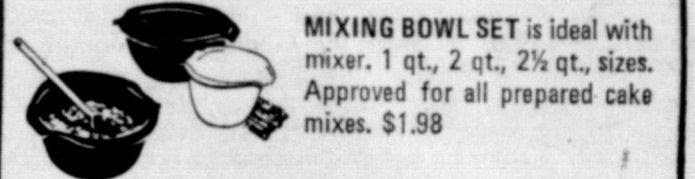

## New Instructions Are Given For Selective Service

AUSTIN — Colonel Charles M. Duncan, acting state Selective Service Director, said Tuesday that recent instructions issued to local board personnel by Dr. Curtis W. Tarr, National Director of Selective Service, alter the year-end policy announced last month by the Selective Service System.

Duncan said that registrants wishing to drop deferments and be reclassified into class I-A status to take advantage of the year-end policy, have been given until midnight, December 31, 1970, to file for the reclassification. Such requests may be received by local boards by that date or carry a postmark dated December 31, 1970 or earlier.

These instructions alter previous policy stated that the application had to be in the hands of local board personnel prior to a December meeting of the local board.

In particular, the instruction to local boards will be of interest to men who hold high numbers in the 1970 draft lottery. Should a young man hold a number that reached by his local board—and No. 195 has been set as the highest number which any local board can reach—it is to his advantage to voluntarily give up his

deferment for a I-A classification. In these cases, he will move to the Second Draft Priority Group on January 1, 1971, rather than to the First Priority Group upon termination of his deferment.

While recognizing that young men holding lottery numbers over their local board "high" could effectively limit their vulnerability to the draft by being classified into I-A by the year's end, Dr. Tarr stated that "the law allows young men to elect whether they will apply for a deferment and those young men granted deferments should be able to drop them if they desire."

Dr. Tarr said the new policy was issued because various boards throughout the country were scheduling their last meetings of the year at different times. By defining a specific cutoff date, the new policy allows all registrants an equal amount of time to take advantage of the reclassification offer.

Previous to changing this policy on dropping of deferments, registrants holding deferments were generally unable to voluntarily relinquish them as long as they continued to meet the criteria for deferment, except at the end of the deferment period when they could cancel them simply by not submitting the necessary documents for an extension.

The types of deferments affected by the memorandum are high school and college deferments, occupational deferments, agricultural deferments, paternity and

hardship deferments. The I-Y classification, unacceptable for military service except in national emergency, is not affected by this new policy. Men classified I-Y are not able to voluntarily drop this classification.

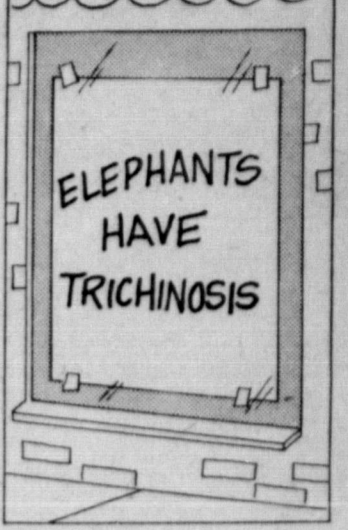
Dr. Tarr pointed out that all deferments are issued for limited periods of time, generally for one year, and that it is the responsibility of the registrant to submit documentation for an extension of his deferment. In the absence of documentation, the new local board memorandum instructs local boards to promptly classify registrants into I-A. This means that registrants wishing to continue their deferments should submit the supporting documentation to their local boards.

## New Legislation On Credit Cards Protect Consumer

COLLEGE STATION — Each year, up to a million credit cards are lost and three hundred thousand stolen. To protect a consumer plagued by disappearing credit cards, Congress has passed a new law that will be effective Jan. 23, reports Doris Myers, Extension specialist in home management.

The new law states that an individual will not be liable for any loss from unauthorized use of his card after he has reported its disappearance to the issuer. Notice may be by telephone or by letter. Most companies will cancel use of the card once they have been notified. If the notice is by letter,

cancellation is effective the day the letter is postmarked. For losses occurring before notification, liability is limited to \$50.

The \$50 liability applies separately to each card that is lost. So, if a billfold or purse containing five credit cards is misplaced, the potential maximum liability is a total of \$250. If a husband and wife lose their cards on a joint account, however, the total liability is limited to \$50.

The new law also prohibits banks and other firms from mailing out unrequested credit cards. Companies must inform the user of his rights and potential liabilities, plus they must assume the legal burden of paying for liabilities the card holder may suffer.
