

### EDITORIAL Synthetics and Substitutes Hurting Farmers!

As pointed out recently by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., all agriculture, cotton in particular, are facing more and more competition from synthetics, substitutes and imitations. According to information given by Agricultural Economics Pro-fessor Dr. Leo Poloplus of the University of Florida, the food and fiber supplied the nation by farmers and ranchers can now be derived from petroleum, algae, trash fish and many other sources. This means that agriculture can no longer assume it has a secure position as the supplier of human needs.

The professor cited certain "drinks" which contain no fruit solids; that dairy products was one of the first to be hit by substitutes; and oil seed products are competing with synthetic protein substitutes in livestock feeding rations, and synthetic meats are now aiming to replace markets for beef, pork and poultry products.

Dr. Polouolus points to the activities of the Florida Department of Citrus as an example of what can be done to "countervail" competition from synthetic substitutes. Supported by per-box taxes levied in Florida on citrus entering the market, the FDC has made an impressive start toward winning consumer support by improving existing products, introducing new products and providing package and serving conveniences. In 1969-70 the Florida citrus industry put \$16.5 million into advertising, research, reglatory work and administrative functions.

Dr. Polouolus recommends 10 avenues by which agriculture can meet the increased competition. Seven of the 10 are applicable to the cotton industry and in fact are to some degree being followed by the Cotton Producers Institute's dollar-abale program. The seven points:

1. Regularly monitor consumer attitudes and awareness of own thing. Greek teachers came down on him after jumping. After natural and substitute products.

3. Alter existing products in light of market and consumer research.



## **Local Delegates Attend State** Meeting Dec. 3-5

Featured speakers at the annual Texas Farmers Unions Convention in Amarillo Dec. 3-5 were Senator Ralph Yarborough; Tony Dechant of Denver, national president of Farmers Union; Jay Naman, president of Texas Farmers Union; and Paul Babey, president of Unifarm, the new Canadian farm organization.

Delegates from Hall County Farmers Union were J. J. McDaniel, president, and Mr. and Mrs. L. L. McKown.

Senator Yarborough said, "The Administration present had shown an incredible lack of concern for the small farmer. The Secretary, who was alleged to be an expert in agricultural matters, made several sweeping and callous decisions that struck at the very heart of the farm policy. Instead of trying to understand the problems that American farmers face as a result of high interest rates and runaway inflation, the Secretary:

(1) cut the wheat acreage allotment by 12 per cent;

(2) cancelled advance feed grain payments;

(3) refused to spend the funds appropriated by Congress for the Agriculture Conservation Program;

(4) refused to increase dairy price support to the authorized 90 per cent of parity; and (5) cut the price protection on

soybeans.'

It's time to begin thinking about ertilizer needs for 1971 and logially, reminds County Agent W. Hooser, a soil test should be ermination on what plant food or oods are needed.

An expression of the soil fertility level is not a simple single index since any combination of nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium levels can exist. Soil tests should be used to determine the level of major plant nutrients, and fertilization practices for the soil and crop should be adjusted in accordance with existing soil fertili-
