The vehicle found snowdrifts too deep to penetrate in the canyons of the rangeland, so the two Memphis men walked to a farm house of Junior Welch and spent the night there Sunday night. ## EDITORIAL

#### What The 1970 Census Tells Us!

This newspaper now has a copy of the 1970 Census of Population for Texas, put out in January, 1971, and is entitled the advance report but is the final population counts of counties and cities in the State of Texas.

Hall County and the communities of Hall County followed the general trend of all rural oriented counties as a general rule, showing a decline in population.

All the southeastern counties in the Texas Panhandle showed a decline in population during the past decade. The decline averages approximately 20 percent in these counties.

During the past 10 years, Memphis and Hall County restdents have waged a war with this decline, as it was apparent to all leaders that it was taking fewer laborers to handle the machinery of agriculture. Work of another nature was desperately needed if the dwindling population curve was to be stopped, or even reversed.

The big hunt started to attract industry. This is no easy chore when examined in the light that all other rural areas were doing pretty much the same thing and have just about the same to offer in natural resources.

How successful were the efforts? The 1970 census figures may develop next year in Texas. town. In fact, the advantages familiar with the wheat crop than have the answer. Hall County declined in population from 7,322 in 1960 to 6,015 in 1970 for a decline of 17.9 percent in 10 years. This is certainly discouraging, but then, let us look at it another way. ## Specialist Gives Pruning Advice For Ornamentals

COLLEGE STATION-Now is the time to inspect woody ornamentals for needed pruning, but do not prune just because it is that time of theye ar or because you need the exercise.

"If you cannot justify the removal of a limb or branch, you better put up your equipment and go spade the garden for exercise," says Everett Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist at Texas A&M University.

Some of the reasons for pruning include removing dead or the winter-killed growth or balancing the top with the root system when setting out new plants. Diseased or insect-injured wood, as well as storm or accident-damaged limbs, should be removed as soon as

Older shrubs can be rejuvenated by pruring the older branches. Cutting can develop a desired shape or size; and sometimes can be used to produce better flowers

Janne cautions against severe pruning and says that it is better to prune lightly and more often to prevent sunscald to the sensitive inner branches. He also says not to leave stubs that invite insects and disease. 


