The Area and Community Development committee, Zack Fisher, chairman, in a meeting in the Community Building Monday night, decided to stage a "Memphis Slogan" contest. For the prize winning slogan, the Chamber of Commerce will give a \$25.00 merchandise certificate good at any member's firm. Rules for the contest include: Not more than five entries from one person; the slogan shall have not more than eight words including Memphis. In case the same slogan is entered by more than one person, the one having the earliest postmark will be entered for judging. Deadline for entering will be April 3. 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## EDITORIAL

### The Case For No-Fault!

The most promising thing that can be said about our chaotic insurance system is that the public may not have to put up with it much longer.

So shrill have the complaints become that more than 20 states, the federal government and the insurance companies themselves are seriously questioning the whole concept of guilt and innocence in auto accident cases.

One state — Massachusetts — already requires each driver to carry injury insurance of up to \$2,000 apiece for himself and his passengers, payable by his own company no matter who might have been at fault in the accident.

An even more liberal no-fault plan has been endorsed by the Consumer Federation of America, which claims 30 million members.

The U. S. Senate will begin hearings next month on a bill proposed by Sen. Philip A. Hart, D. Mich., to require insurance coverage which would compensate accident victims for all medical expenses, plus 85 percent of lost income up to \$1,000 a month for 30 months.

And a bill has been proposed in New York State requiring no-fault insurance for property damage as well as personal injury — a plan which would eliminate most of the legal bickering over guilt.

One study has shown that 23 cents of every dollar paid for auto insurance goes to lawyers and claims investigators.

Another study indicates that judges spend an average of one day out of six on accident suits — many of them trivial — when the courts are so clogged with cases they don't know which way to turn.

Meanwhile, the cost of auto liability insurance has risen radically in the last nine years — up 82 percent in Ohio and Pennsylvania, up 85 percent in Indiana and the District of Columbia, up 126 percent in Colorado.

Admittedly, no-fault insurance is only one approach to the problem. Some experts say, for example, that better bumpers on cars could save \$1 billion a year in insurance premiums.

But a system which ties up the courts, often denies coverage to those who need it, and in many instances fails to compensate adequately the victims it presumably protects is no system at all.

The case for no-fault, so far at least, is a strong case indeed.

The other day we stopped at a red light in downtown Perryton and the very instant the light turned amber, the car behind us began to blow his horn, insisting that we get out of the way because that driver was in a big rush to get somewhere. We have seen people cut in front of others in a line at the check-out counter in a grocery store as if their time were somehow more important than people's time. Most of us find ourselves hurrying when there isn't any reason to hurry at all. We have found ourselves walking briskly down the corridor at an airport, hurrying along when actually we had a couple of hours to kill before our plane departed. We rushed because others rushed and haste is infectious.

Haste is not always speed as anyone who hurried to get finished with a minor building chore around the house could testify. Too often, when we hurry to get something fixed, we wind up not fixing it at all.

#### Tuition Raise

While the debt-ridden public school system of New York City is now firing some 6,500 regular personnel—most of them teachers—the State of Texas is trying desperately to come up with a new source of revenue to keep its colleges from getting into the same shape.

New York Governor Nelson Rockefeller has informed officials of the New York City school system that they must go to Washington to help—that the State can no longer guarantee funds for education.

In Texas, the lawmakers are trying to solve the problem without running to Washington.

Although one situation involves elementary and high school education, and the other concerns colleges, the basic problem is the same—lack of funds. In Texas, the legislators are contemplating raising tuition fees from the \$50.00 per semester average cost to \$135.00 in an effort to take some of the pressure off the taxpayers and put the burden of education back where it should be—on the parents and the students. The additional tuition fee, although more than doubled if this legislation goes through, will make little difference in the overall cost of the student's education, yet it will raise college revenue several million dollars. It will not alleviate the need for additional taxes to support the state's colleges and universities, but it will certainly help, and we believe will be a step in the right direction.

It has always been our contention that we should do everything within our power to provide educational facilities for our youngsters through the high school level. But it has also been our feeling that beyond high school a more realistic approach must be taken. Otherwise, the schools will eventually bankrupt the nation.

The eventual solution to this problem is in the expansion of the Junior College System throughout the state, providing facilities close enough to home to assure those who seek a college degree, that their first two years at least, can be gotten without the need for the expense of room and board at a fall-off institution. Along with this should come the increase in tuition fee as the legislature is now contemplating and some tax relief for parents paying that tuition.

We realize that we are talking about federal legislation as well as state but it would seem in order for the government to allow tax deductions for tuition and books at the college level.

We received a package a few days ago that was mailed to Mrs. Burl Smith for Heritage Hall. This package of historical items was from Mrs. Vernon James, 4360 Walnut Hill Drive in Memphis, Tenn., 38109. She will be remembered by her friends as Bess Thaxton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rhea Thaxton. Her mother was the former Mary Reeder. The Thaxtons passed away in 1909 and 1910 and Claude at that time was 20 years old and the youngest child was four years old. Claude was left to be mama and papa of this family that he took care of for many years. This family first moved to the Panhandle in 1889 where the father worked as a cowboy on the Shoe Bar ranch and one of his cowboy friends was Murph Ferrell. Mrs. James visited with Mr. Ferrell on her last visit to the Panhandle. One other she remembered was Mr. Wylie Cope. Mrs. James says that Mrs. Morris who ran the store at Giles so many years told her that the first school in Giles had four Thaxton children, Ruby and Fred Watt made an enrollment of six kids in that first school. One of the grade teachers they had, Miss Mable Fritzler Ytterbach, is now living in Iowa and corresponds with Mrs. James. Claude Thaxton died in Denver, Colo., in 1965. Bessie (Thaxton) James lived in Giles and Memphis area until 1917 when she entered nurses training in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo. The articles that are given in Hall County Heritage Hall are given in memory of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Rhea Thaxton. Doctors Mickle and Ward were the doctors here when the parents died. Some of the articles sent in were a quilt by her mother and made up of small silk scraps about 1/2 inch wide making four inch squares; an organdy bedspread in rainbow colors embroidered in silk floss, was bought on the north side of the square 50 years ago. Included in this collection was a \$50 bill from the Republic of Texas dated Oct. 23, 1839, with serial number 5962. Still another interesting item included in this collection was a picture of the Shoe Bar headquarters house in a nice maple frame which will add a lot to our collection of pictures of early days.

Joe Torres placed second in the mile run with a time of 5:19.0.

Pole vaulter Mike Browning went over the bar at 11-ft. and

placed third, while Louis Davis cleared at 10'-6" for fifth place. Browning placed second at Vernon with a 11-ft. effort.

Chris Linder placed fifth in the 880-yd. run and Larry Don Johnson placed fifth in the 220-yd dash with a time of 26 flat.

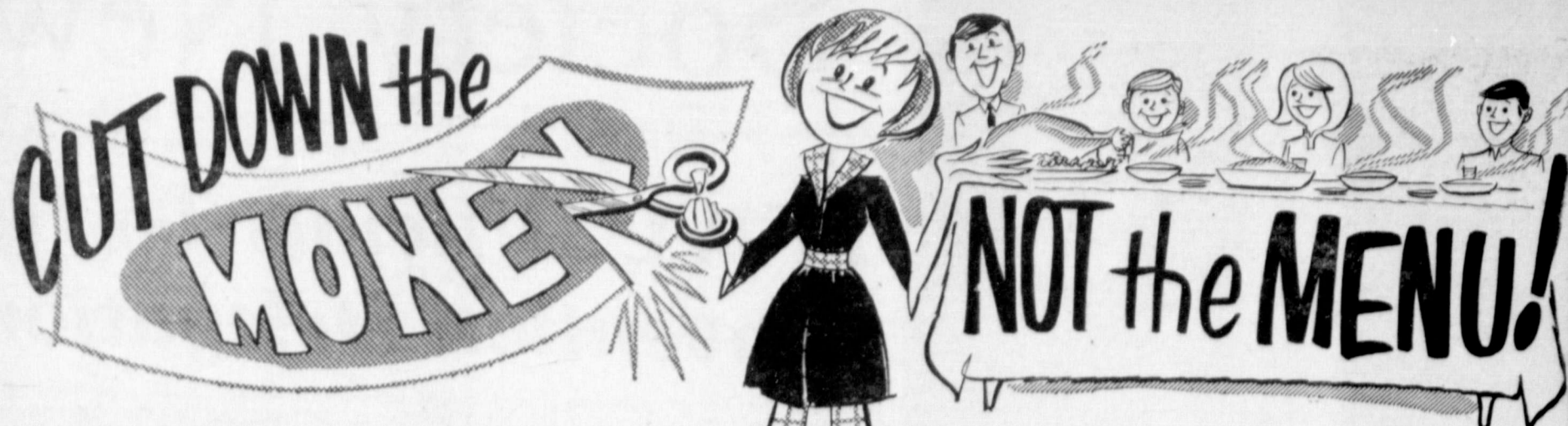

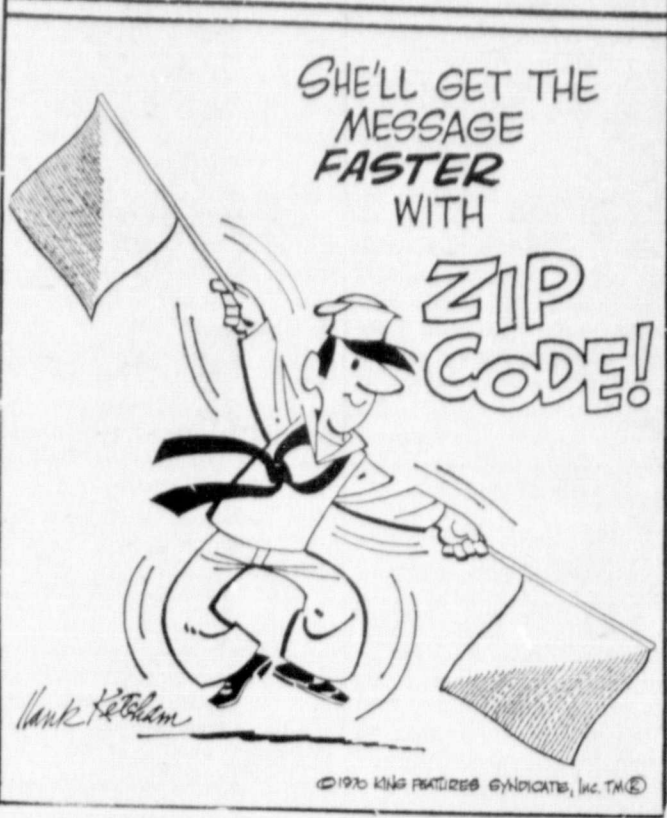

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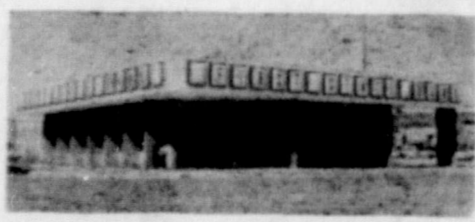
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
