John Milligan Wins Salt Cedar Enduro

Sunday was the big day for motocyclists in Hall County as the first spring enduro classic attracted the largest field ever to ride over Hall, Childress and Colingsworth Counties.

There were 301 entries in the race, with 285 making the starting posts. The exact number who successfully finished the race without disqualification will be announced later after the official listing of the finishers can be tabulated.

The cyclists understood why the spring event is called the Salt Cedar Enduro, as some of the

river course went directly through salt cedars on Red River.

John Milligan of Fort Worth was the best overall rider posting a score of 998, losing only two points, and arriving at all check points on the minute, during the 125-mile enduro. This is the best time ever posted in an enduro here.

Rainfall Measures 1.5 Inches Or Better In County

Although the rainfall of the past week was far from being drought breaking in portion, Hall County came up with approximately an inch and a half, overall, of slow, gentle, soaking moisture which raised spirits.

The rainfall was so slow that little run-off was noted, which was the best break, weatherwise, farmers and ranchers have received in many months.

Here in Memphis, Rayford Hutcherson, official weather observer, reports the week's accumulative total as 1.45 inches of rainfall.

The Texas Panhandle is promised by weather forecasters to receive more rainfall this weekend.

Over the county, south of the river near the Turkey area, Lee Scrivner reported 2 inches. In the Lakeview area and west, 2.50 inches was reported, while Lakeview area and east, average reported is 1.50.

Generally, all of Hall County received one and a half inches or better in the rainfall which began here late Thursday afternoon.

Rains continued through Friday and Saturday with some light showers Sunday. No severe weather accompanied the rains, although it was reported that a funnel cloud was seen along the river south of Alaska.

Song services will be at 8 p. m. each evening during the week and at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. each Sunday.

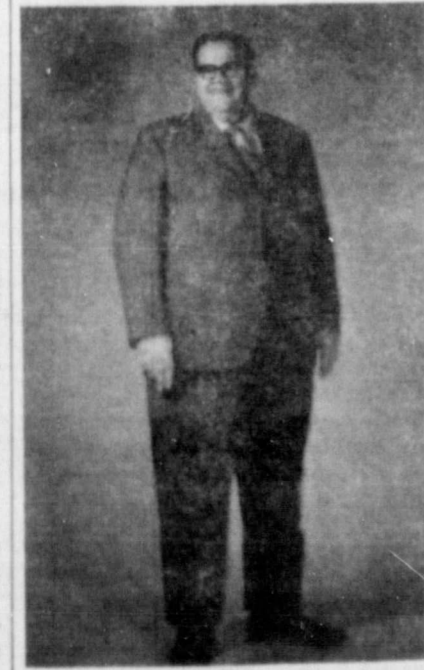
As a special feature, on Sunday evening, April 25, the 30-voice Chapel Choir from Quataque will sing during the special youth emphasis night.

Each Senior introduced himself and told of his or her plan for continuing education. Several told of plans for a career of marriage others for attending Technical School, Business School, etc.

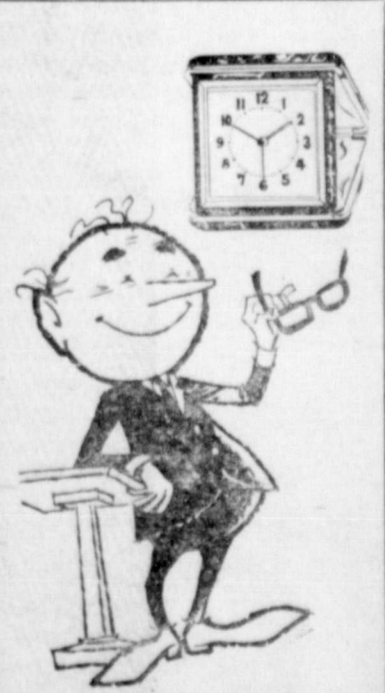

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EDITORIAL

Books Are To Be Read!

We live in an age when many would prefer to live in a state of being deliberately ignorant, or at the best being sketchily informed.

Oscar Levant, the eminent neurotic, once said he stopped book reading because "I find that it takes my mind off myself." The greatest penalty a busy person must pay for his activity is neglect of self which in reality is a sin against self.

The Bible suggests that man prefers darkness to light. So it is that a man is not only grossly ignorant but deliberately chooses to be ignorant.

National Library Week is being observed April 18-24, and this is the time to call attention once again to the wonderful world of books. The purpose of National Library Week is "to create a better read, better informed America by encouraging lifetime reading habits and stimulating greater library use."

Our society offers one of the greatest opportunities ever offered mankind. It offers, even to the lowest underprivileged waif in the streets of Harlem... or a Mississippi cotton field... the combined knowledge of the world's greatest minds, all contained in books.

These books are available at almost no charge at the public libraries in this area, waiting and begging to be read.

But, it seems, we, the people, young, middle aged, and senior, don't want or care to know.

So it is, television gives us a brief glimpse of what is going on in the world. We don't like what we see or hear so we reject it with the same apathy we reject books on the shelf.

So it is with the newspapers of our nation, written for the mind of a 14-year-old. Television programs are directed at the mind of a 10-year-old. The only magazines managing to stay solvent are those aimed at the intellectual level of children. Most popular are those which condense a 10-page article into a half page, edited carefully pre-digested.

Try to publish a magazine for perhaps a 20-year-old level... and go bankrupt. There just isn't any demand. There are hours of time for television soap operas, westerns, mysteries, comedians, teenage jive sessions barely removed from African jungle dances... but there is no time to sit down and spend an hour a day reading uplifting magazines and books, those which tell the story of man, thus giving the reader an insight into what makes man behave as he does... no time to read stories of great men and women in an effort to discover the source of greatness... no time to read great literature or to listen to great music... no cultivation of a thirst for knowledge.

Bad habits are cultivated in our youth. Good habits are also cultivated in our youth. Let us all strive diligently to teach our children to read good worthwhile books, magazines, newspapers.

The major source of true knowledge, good literature, worthwhile information is the printed page. The number one best seller is the Holy Bible.

We are what we are. We can be what we will but teach ourselves to be. The principle element of self teaching is reading. Otherwise we are but ignorant.

Labor Dept. To Supervise Wage Law!

Farmers can expect a stepped-up effort to bring about compliance with the federal minimum wage law for agricultural workers, according to the Wage and Hour Division of the U. S. Department of Labor. 1969 investigations by the Wage-Hour Division showed that 3 out of every 10 farms with covered employees, violated the minimum wage law.

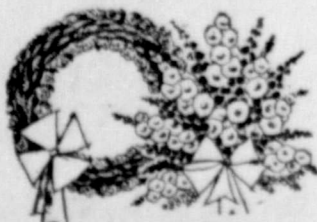
Farm work was brought under the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1966, and the current minimum wage of \$1.30 per hour must be paid if the employer used 500 or more man days of farm labor in any calendar quarter of the preceding calendar year. Farm workers exempt from wage coverage include members of the employers immediate family, local hand harvest laborers who work less than 13 weeks in the preceding calendar year, migrant hand harvest laborers 16 years or under employed on the same farm as their parents and paid the same rate as adult workers, and workers primarily engaged in the range production of livestock.

Department of labor records indicate many employers and workers lack knowledge of the laws' requirements and protective features.

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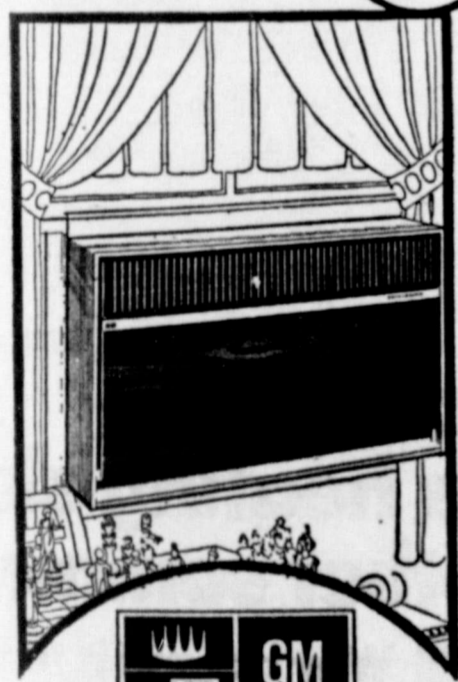

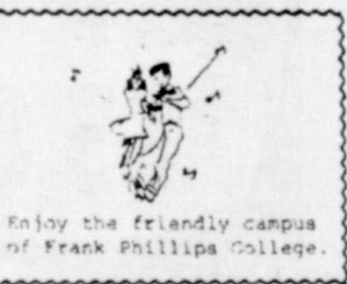

He received instruction in drill and ceremonies, weapons, map reading, combat tactics, military courtesy, military justice, first aid, and Army history and traditions.



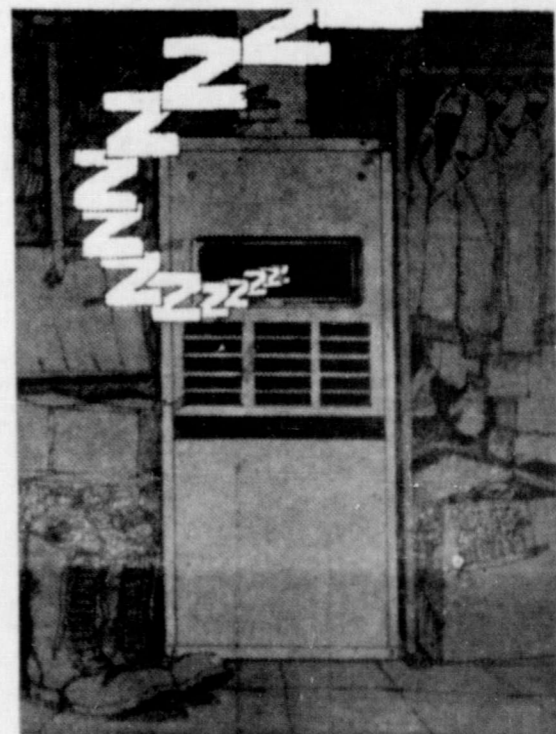

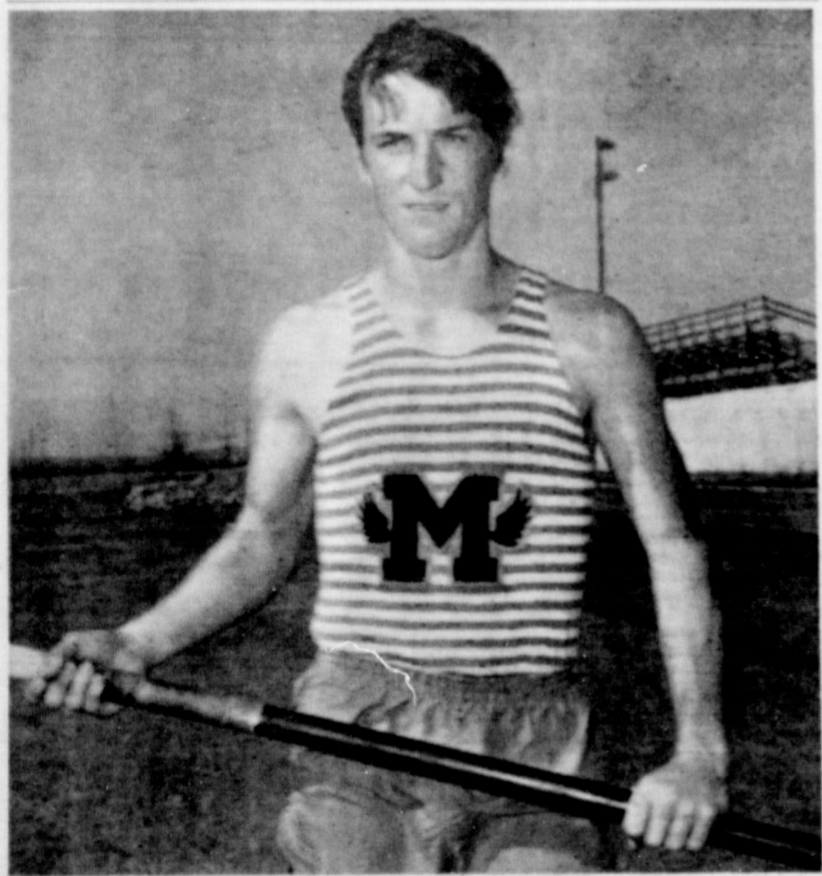
