

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EDITORIAL

The Drouth In The Political Arena!

Texas Governor Preston Smith and Oklahoma Governor David Hall have requested President Nixon to declare portions of their states as national disaster areas due to the severe drouth. New Mexico Governor Bruce King is also expected to make the same request for portions of his state.

So far, the reaction, reflected by news media to the drouth has been baffling to us and especially it has been frustrating to the many farmers and ranchers as they see a lifetime of work and planning being jeopardized.

Washington could not completely ignore such requests, so Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin made a tour of the metropolitan areas, Oklahoma City, Altus, Okla., Amarillo, San Antonio, etc., to give the Perisdent his report on the situa-

The Secretary also said that the President would have to make the disaster declaration before any appreciable help could come. Sec. Hardin did admit, according to one news source, that the drouth was worse than he thought it was.

But so far, the best President Nixon has been able to concede was announced Monday that he was instigating efforts to expand farm credit that he hopes will be especially helpful to drouth-stricken farmers of the southwest.

Congressman Bob Price of the 18th District reports that Sec. Hardin has allocated \$2 million to Texas for cost sharing in emergency conservation assistance. This assistance is available to help repair damage caused by wind erosion and drouth. Funds will be available for deep plowing to bring clod forming subsoil to the surface and for chiseling. There are 21 Panhandle counties eligible for this including Hall County.

Cong. Price said, "I have recently toured portions of Oklahoma and Texas with Secretary of Agriculture, Clifford Hardin, and Director George Lincoln of the Office of Emergency Preparedness. The devasting drouth damage is very evident. The Congressman is requesting lower interest rates immediately on agricultural loans. "There is an urgent need in the Texas Panhandle and other drouth stricken areas of the state and nation for low interest, long term credit for people in agriculture to escape bankruptcy," Price said in his letter to the Sec. of Agriculture, Sec. of Treasury, and Director of the Office of Management and Budget.



Presently, most help is coming from the Agriculture Department which does not require a Presidential declaration. Help now available includes subsidy of transportation of hay. reduced feed grains from the Commodity Credit Corporation, grazing of conservation set-aside and emergency loans to farmers. Hall County has been participating in these programs since

Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California are hardest hit by the drouth, but Nevada, Arkansas and Louisiana are also included in a U. S. Department of Commerce map showing the drouth areas in the United States.

The reason the drouth is so economically crippling is the ircumstances in which agriculturists find themselves today, living in a highly inflationary period while receiving 41 per cent of parity prices on wheat.



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


