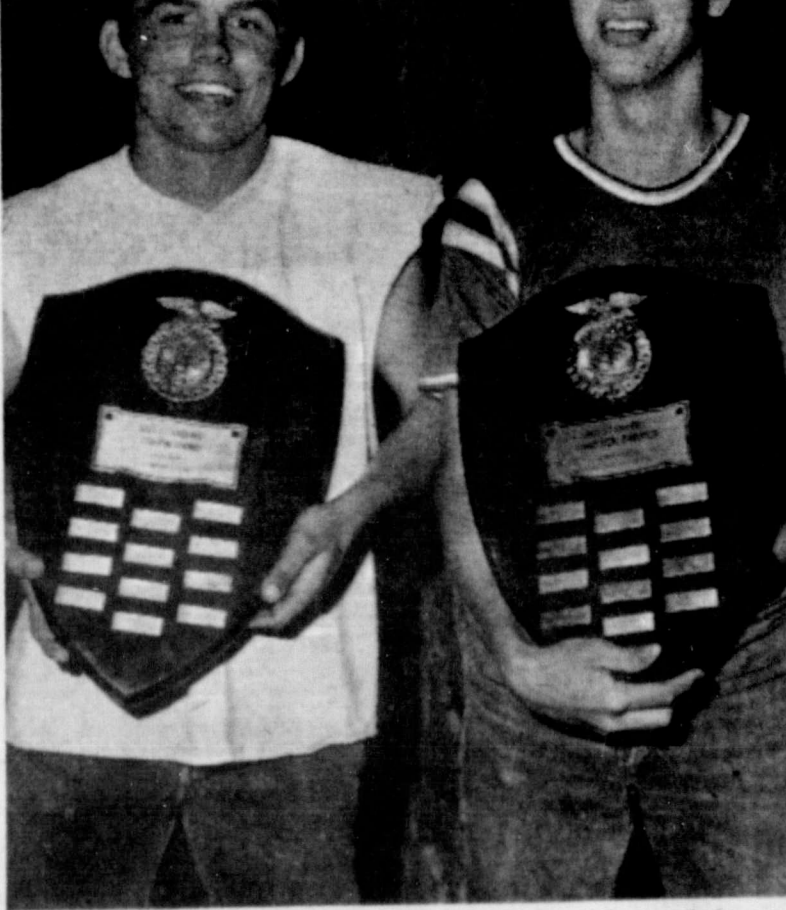

Graduation exercises for Estelline High School will be held Friday evening, May 21, at 8 p. m., Aubrey A. Spear, Jr., superintendent of schools, announced this week.

Hall County voters followed a state-wide trend and voted against all four constitutional amendments in the election Tuesday. Voting was light at all polling places, but especially in the combined Memphis box.

Total county tabulations showed:

- Amendment No. 1, Ethics-Legislature's Pay (SJR-75)—Approval 109, Against 165.
- Amendment No. 2, Proposal of Amendments (HJR-21)—Approval 109, Against 165.
- Amendment No. 3, Assistance to Needy (SJR-5)—Approval 122, Against 162.
- Amendment No. 4, Water Quality Bonds (SJR-17)—Approval 129, Against 148.

In the Memphis box: No. 1 received 40 for, 63 against; No. 2, 48 for, 55 against; No. 3, 38 for, 65 against; and No. 4, 48 for, 54 against.

In the Turkey box: No. 1 received 45 for, 33 against; No. 2, 45 for, 30 against; No. 3, 51 for, 30 against; and No. 4, 48 for, 27 against.

In the Lakeview box: No. 1 received 10 for, 41 against; No. 2, 8 for, 38 against; No. 3, 13 for, 35 against; and No. 4, 17 for, 32 against.

In the Estelline box: No. 1 received 14 for, 36 against; No. 2, 8 for, 42 against; No. 3, 20 for, 32 against; and No. 4, 17 for, 35 against.

In 297 votes were tabulated in the election. Two absentee ballots were requested by mail from the County Clerk's Office but neither ballot was returned within the specified time limit; so both were voided.

To the graduates of 1971, we extend our congratulations and wish for you a lifetime of continuing success on whatever pathway life may lead you in the coming years.

To our college graduates, we would encourage them to become worthwhile citizens in whatever area, community, or city they may choose to reside.

To our high school graduates, we would encourage continued efforts to round out their scholastic lives, either with continued formal education or in some specialized field of endeavor.

This is the first of two editorials of The Memphis Democrat which will deal with the subject of saluting the graduating classes of Lakeview, Estelline and Memphis. Lakeview seniors graduate tonight, and Estelline seniors have graduation exercises tomorrow night. Memphis seniors will graduate the evening of June 1.

Graduation night is always a special time in the life of an individual. It is like reaching a long sought after point in time and space, or opening a door to something different.

Life takes on a different meaning, with different responsibilities. As is so true in all aspects of human existence, some students, upon graduation, thrive in the new atmosphere, while others still need the guiding reins of home environment, discipline of strict teachers, or of society, in order to accomplish constructive endeavors.

Time Magazine Report

Marijuana is a generally harmless intoxicant that produces serious psychological effects only in users who are emotionally disturbed to begin with. So, at least, runs the prevailing view, held by pot-heads and professional researchers alike. Last week, a challenge to that idea came from two Philadelphia psychiatrists who believe that regular pot smoking can cause grave psychiatric ills, including psychosis, even in young people who previously were stable.

Writing in the Journal of the American Medical Association, Dr. Harold Kolansky and Dr. William T. Moore reported that all 28 patients in their study were adversely affected by smoking pot. Of eight who became psychotic, four tried to kill themselves, and 13 unmarried girls who became promiscuous (some with other girls and some with both sexes) seven became pregnant. Eighteen developed anxiety, depression, apathy or poor judgment, and many had trouble concentrating, remembering, speaking clearly, and distinguishing fact from fantasy. None of the patients, who were from 13 to 24 years old, used any drug but pot and none had history of serious mental illness.

Congress And War

No one could call Sen. John C. Stennis a dove. As chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, the conservative Mississippi Democrat has long been close to the nation's military leaders and sympathetic with their aims. He has supported the Vietnam War policies of Presidents Johnson and Nixon. Yet Senator Stennis obviously has sensed the futility of that abominable war and the shaky ground on which American participation in it is based. He is offering a bill in the Senate that would sharply restrict a President's prerogative to wage a future war without the clear consent of Congress.

The idea is not new; others, in the Senate have proposed similar bills. The influential Senator can be expected to attract widespread support for his bill because of his record on the war issue and his knowledge of military affairs. Basically, he wants to return to the Constitution dictum that the responsibility for declaring war lies with the Congress—"the peo-

ple's representatives"—and not the President.

To carry out that commendable goal, Senator Stennis would permit a President to send troops into battle on his own initiative under two conditions: to repeal an attack against the United States or to protect Americans in other countries. Even then, the President would have to pull them out in 30 days unless Congress voted to approve his action. Under all other conditions, a President would need prior approval from Congress before U. S. troops could start pulling triggers.

If such a provision had existed in 1964, at the time of the Gulf of Tonkin incident, the seven years since then might have been less bloody. If President Johnson had been required to ask for a formal declaration of war, the congressional debate might have brought out General MacArthur's warning against getting involved in an Asian land war. Perhaps someone in Congress would have spelled out the dismal French experience in trying to fight in Vietnam. Perhaps these practical considerations—not to mention the moral and humanistic ones—could have balanced off the domina theory that has led to the largely meaningless deaths of 45,000 American troops.

Perhaps even this—we might have butted out of the war then. "Perhaps" and "might have been"—easy words and often empty ones. Yet, in a backward look at Vietnam, they can be enormously significant to the chance for a peaceful future.

It is preferable to have the 535 members of Congress deciding a question of war or peace—howev-

er representative or unrepresentative they may be of national sentiment—than to have an harassed President making the decision.

In a world geared to accelerated communications, why do so many children fail at the most basic task—reading? A tutor and remedial reading teacher, Jeraldine Stoute of Lubbock analyzes the slow reader's background. "Let us look at the child of today. Soon after birth he is placed in a crib with an anticolor nurses while a mobile of colorful birds or objects hovers above to entertain him. From here he is moved to a playpen furnished with 'educational' toys. He cannot ask a question and receive an answer. His next move is to an area about 36 inches from the TV set which also feeds him information of questionable value. Still, he cannot question or voice an idea, or receive a response."

It's a grim picture for the observer and a grimmer life ahead for the child. But there is a solution—and you're part of it! Teacher Stoute continues, "I am convinced that if young parents would read to their children for just 20 minutes a day, there would be virtually no need for remedial reading classes."

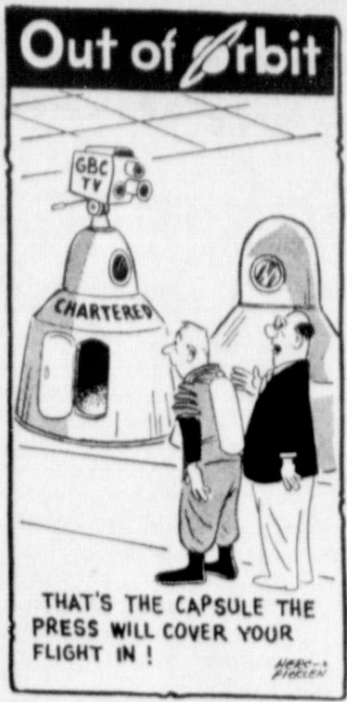

FFA Delegates From Memphis Attend Convention

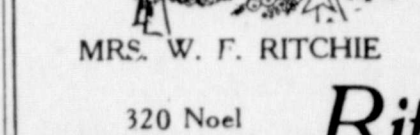
Delegates from the Memphis FFA Chapter attended the Area I Convention in Amarillo May 7 and 8.

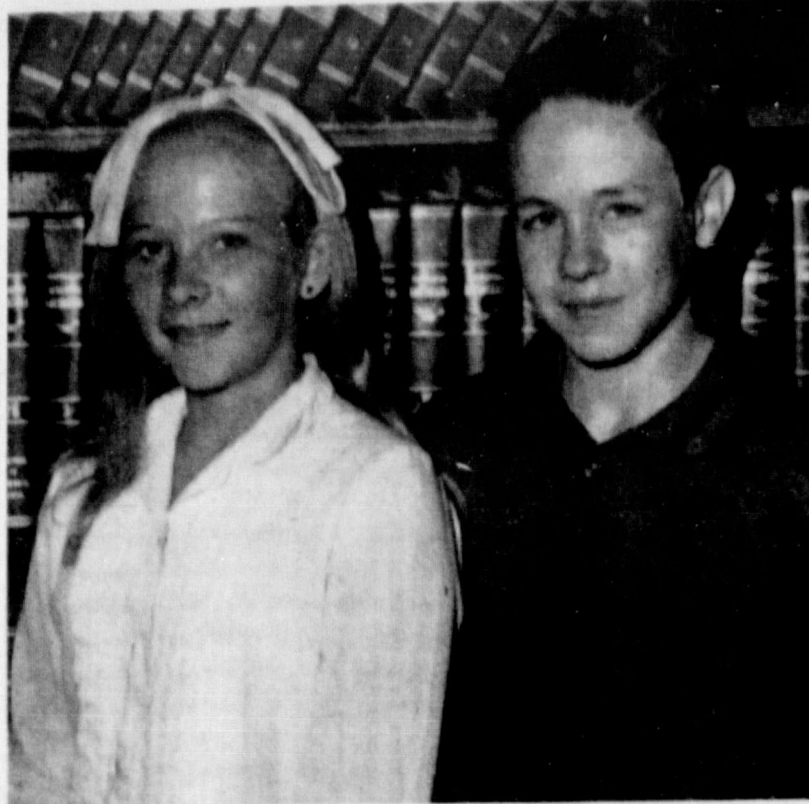

While in South Africa, Stanley also plans to visit Cape Town, Bloemfontein, Kimberley, Johannesburg, and Pretoria, in addition to Grahamstown, where he will visit with Dr. William Branford, director of the Institute for the Study of English in Africa, and professor of English Language at Rhodes University.

En route to South Africa, Stanley plans to spend about five days in Switzerland, visiting in Zurich, Bern, Lausanne, and Geneva.

Returning from South Africa,

Stanley plans to stop in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, and in Nairobi, Kenya, to visit with friends at the East African Academy.

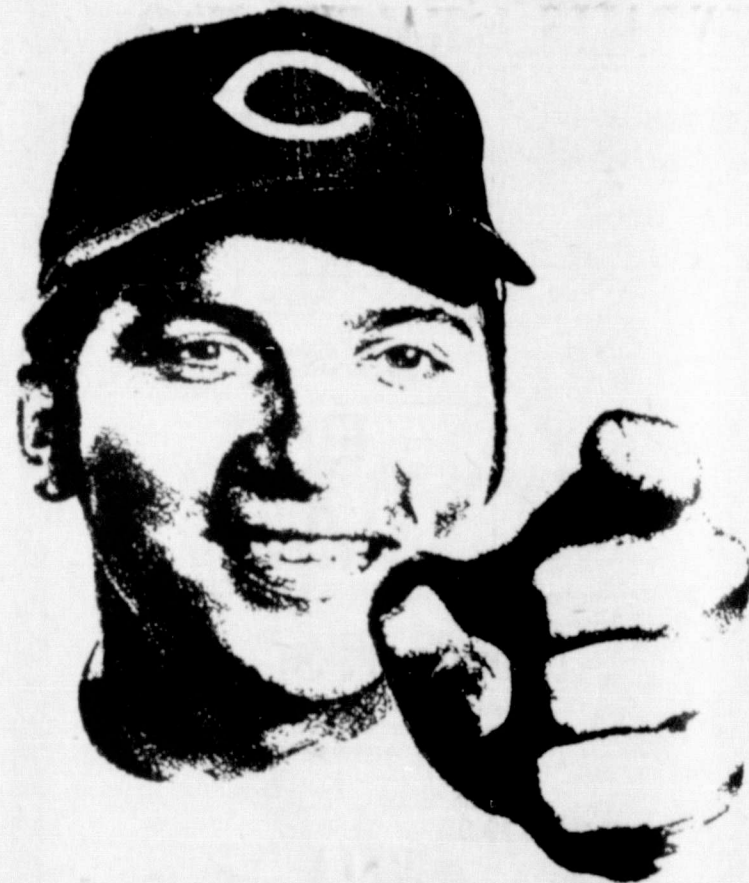

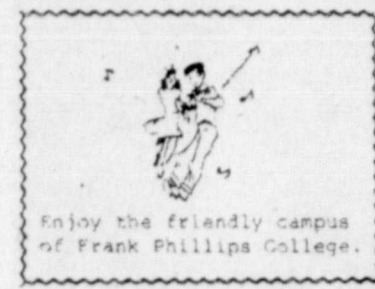

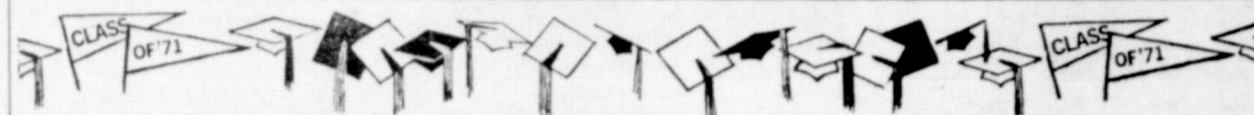

The counties are Andrews, Archer, Armstrong, Bailey, Baylor, Borden, Briscoe, Carson, Childress, Cochran, Coleman, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Donley, Eastland, Ector, Fisher, Floyd, Foard, Garza, Gaines, Glasscock, Gray, Hall, Hardeman, Hartley, Haskell, Howard, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Kent, and King.

Also, Knox, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Midland, Mitchell, Moore, Motley, Ochiltree, Potter, Randall, Roberts, San Saba, Scurry, Shackelford, Sherman, Stone-wall, Swisher, Terry, Throckmor-

ton, Wheeler, Wichita, Wilbarger, Yoakum and Young.

An allocation of \$2 million has been made to the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) State Committee for use in sharing with farmers the cost of deep plowing to bring clod forming subsoil to the surface, and measures to reduce soil loss from wind including listing and chiseling.

Emergency conservation assistance is designed to enable the Secretary of Agriculture to alleviate conditions resulting from a natural disaster and to restore agricultural lands to productive capacity.

Applications for assistance in Hall County should be filed by no later than May 25, 1971, according to Larry B. Rogers, executive director of the Hall County ASCS.

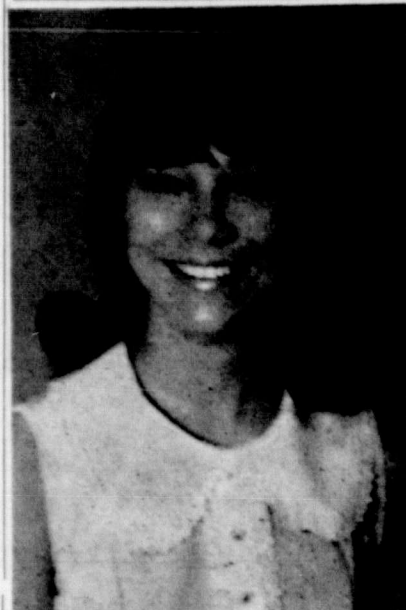

New Permanent Press For Cotton Available Now

COLLEGE STATION—A new permanent press has been developed for 100 per cent cotton fabrics, announces Miss Joanne Thurber, Extension clothing consumer marketing specialist at Texas A&M University.

Since the new treatment enables cotton fibers to retain good abrasion resistance, it will give all-cotton apparel an impressive boost, she reports.

Called "Ameriset," the process involves a vapor treatment applied to finished garments in a gas chamber. The treatment takes 20 minutes, Miss Thurber explains.

According to the specialist, the uniqueness of the process is that fabrics are not treated with chemicals or resins. Instead, garments are treated after the fabric has been cut, sewn, and pressed. As a result, all the findings—thread, pockets and trimmings—are treated at the same time, taking on all the permanent press characteristics of the fabric.

The new system can be used by homemakers as well as by industry. Necessary equipment can be installed in neighborhood laundries to service the vast, flourishing homesewer market, she says.

Another major advantage of the "Ameriset" process is that the vapor treatment can be applied by local retailers after a garment has been altered and pressed. Permanent press garments currently marketed are almost impossible to alter since shape and creases are already built into the garment before it reaches the store, the specialist says.

Extensive testing results have shown that garments treated with the process retain permanent press characteristics through a minimum of 20 machine washings and tumble dryings.

And, the process is equally applicable to wovens and knits, as shrinkage is virtually non-existent, Miss Thurber adds.

Defector To Russia Felled By Gunfire

AUSTIN—News of the death of a Texas defector to Russia has come from Moscow.

The victim was brought down by small arms fire and most likely became an ingredient in some Russian's borsch.

It was a female pintail duck. The bird was banded by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department on March 12, 1967, near Port Acres, and was shot near Ossora in Eastern Siberia on May 25, 1968, some 14 months and countless thousands of miles later.

It took almost three years for the band to return to Texas. It was returned by the USSR Academy of Sciences Zoological Institute, the Centra of Ringing and Marking of Birds and Terrestrial Mammals.

Biologists say pintails sometimes cross from Alaska to Siberia to nest, but they add that it is extremely rare for a bird to stray that far when tagged in the Central Flyway.

If you have a maid or domestic help you are required to pay Social Security taxes on your employee, provided you pay the employee at least \$50 for each calendar quarter or three-month period. Social Security taxes on household employees may be reported on either Form 941 or Form 942. The methods of reporting are described on the back of each form. This simply means that the law requires you as an employer to get your household employee's Social Security number and report their earnings and those withheld from the employee's wages and those due from employer. Neither the employer nor the employee has an opinion on whether they want to pay.
