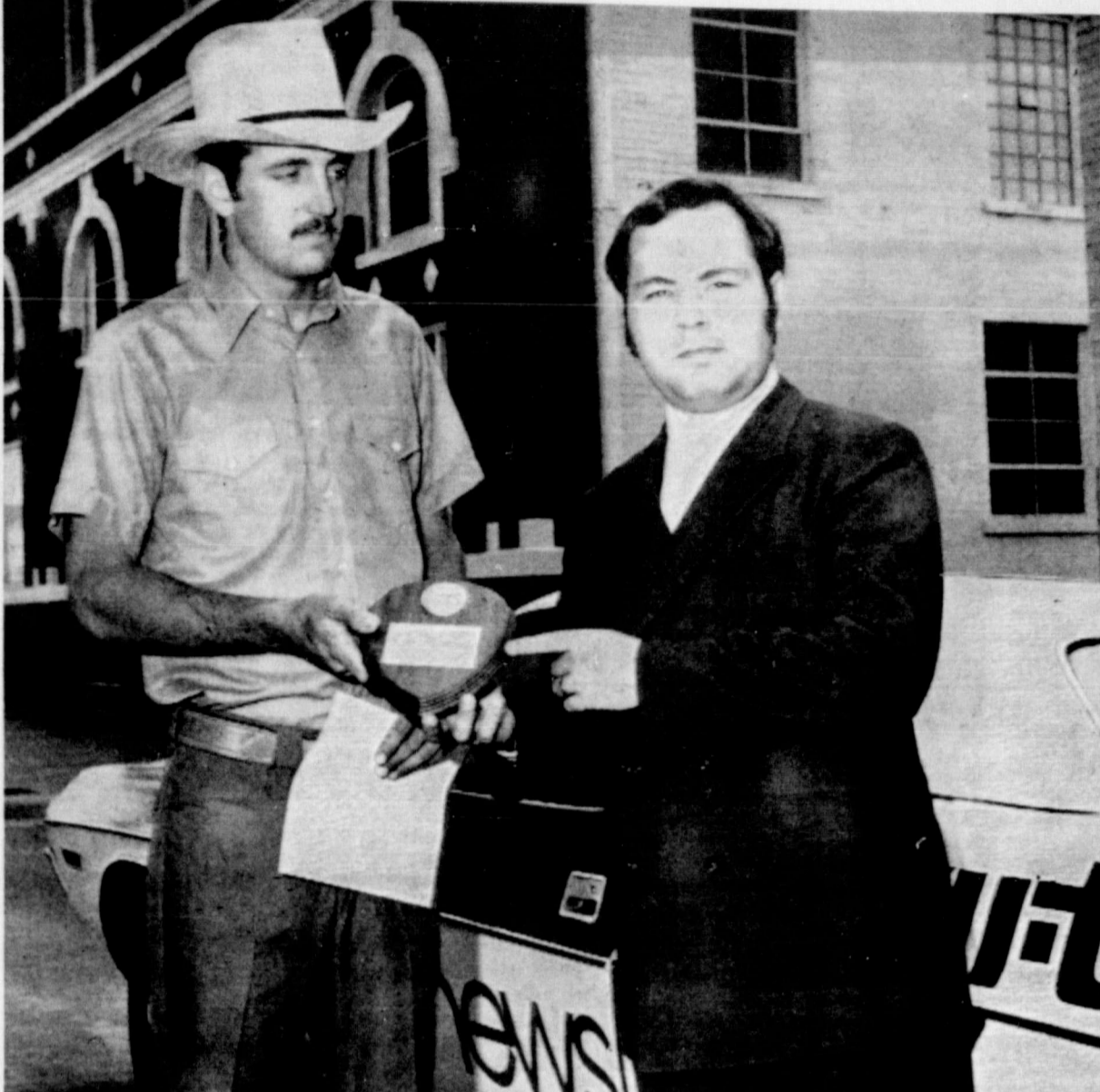

Don't Chase Fire Wagon— Memphis Firemen Again Ask For Citizens-Motorists Cooperation

Memphis firemen issued a reminder and warning to local citizens this week urging them to please stop following fire trucks and creating congestion at fire scenes. It is a continuing problem for firemen who are trying to arrive at a fire site for sightseers and motorists to clog the streets. Violators can be issued tickets for it is against the law to chase fire trucks or to hamper firemen in carrying out their duties at the scene of a fire. In many instances, a few moments can mean the difference in many dollars worth of damage being done by fire. Firemen go through many hours of training each year to develop skills of fighting fires quickly and effectively. Seldom is it necessary for the local fire department to need volunteer help from untrained citizens at the scene of a fire, so there is little necessity for citizens to be on hand.

Petit Jury List Is Selected By 'Jury Wheel' For First Time Here

Hall County petit jury lists for both District and County Courts for the September term were drawn from a "Jury Wheel" for the first time in the history of this county.

The Grand Jury panel for the September term was selected by the Jury Commission, county officials reported, as has been the practice in past years.

Because of the "Jury Wheel" selection of jurors for petit service, and the changing of laws governing the selection of jurors names, many citizens will be called for jury service who have never been selected before.

Names of all persons on the voter registration list, except those under the age of 21, were placed in a wheel and drawn out until the lists were filled.

District Judge Robert Montgomery explained the regulations as set forth in the statutes concerning "Jury Wheel" selection of jurors.

The law requires that the sheriff, district clerk, county clerk and tax collector shall meet sometime each year between Aug. 1 and Aug. 15 and prepare the wheel.

Judge Montgomery said that the Legislature removed all exemptions from jury service, with the exception of persons over 65 and women with children under 10 years of age.

For this reason, Judge Montgomery said, many persons never before selected to serve on juries will be called, including doctors, ministers, school teachers, morticians and other persons in public service type occupations.

The Legislature also restricted the authority of Trial Judges to grant excuses from jury service and directed that all excuses must be submitted by sworn application to the Court.

The difference this time and in the past in the selection of jury panels was brought about when the Texas Legislature wrote a new law which did not set out to eliminate jury commissions except in counties having more than 10,000 or more population, but in effect did so.

Attorney General Crawford Martin issued a legal opinion on July 14 in which he held that all counties must comply with the new law. He said all laws pertaining to jury commissions have

County Insect Control Group To Meet Mon.

Hall County Insect Control Association members will meet Monday, Aug. 30, at the City Council Room of the Municipal Bldg. in Memphis at 8 p. m., President Harold Hodges announced this week.

New officers will be elected, and plans will be set in motion to make application to the Texas Department of Agriculture for matching funds to combat boll weevils in cotton fields.

"We are up to the time to make plans with the large stalks of cotton this year, and the abundance of moisture, the threat is with us now," Hodges said.

Farmers are urged to be on the lookout for the appearance of weevils. It has been reported that a few weevil grubs have been found to date.

Garden Of Economic Delights!

Nothing has hit the free world with such impact since the assassination of President John F. Kennedy and the landing of the first man on the moon, as has President Nixon's "New Economic Policy" in which wages rents and prices were frozen and the United States stopped purchasing gold at \$35-an-ounce.

One newsman, Jude Wanniski of Washington, describes the whole scene as, "The Garden of Earthly Delights", referring to Hieronymus Bosch, the Dutch painter, who composed a triptych with this title, and across the front panel, in an inscription appropriate to Bosch's painting, Bosch wrote (from the Book of Psalms): "For he spake, and it was done; he commanded, and it stood fast."

One public opinion survey taken this week revealed that nine out of ten Americans know about the New Economic Policy of President Nixon, and that seven out of ten indicated

Considering that a week before the presidential election, polls indicated that over one-third of the eligible voters in this nation did not know the names of the candidates, Wallace-Nixon-Humphrey, the fact that ninety per cent or better of the citizens of America know about the economic program is remarkable.

Although most Americans are in favor of the economic package, as seen in the stock market setting all time records, and the relief expressed in statements like, "it should have been done months ago," most economists realize that the fixing of wages and prices in this nation was prompted by international matters rather than domestic fears of inflation.

In order for President Nixon to set the dollar free in the world market, taking it off the gold standard, something had to be done to stop soaring inflation at home, which this move alone would foster.

Then, a 10 per cent investment tax credit would have brought about bitter criticism from the masses of small people for it is definitely beneficial to wealthy industrialists in this nation.

The complexity of the international money market is totally beyond the comprehension of Mr. Average American. The fact that this nation was being placed in an increasingly difficult position, primarily by Japan and West Germany, two nations who have strong currency, but refused to increase its value because of the valuable export market to the U. S., made the move almost mandatory.

The 10 per cent surcharge on imports into this nation is another point in the package meant to protect this nation against an import explosion. American importers would have stockpiled foreign supplies while the international money market was in a spin as the American Dollar sought its level in a free market.

Tourists are really having a problem, and most U. S. experts are advising changing the dollar for foreign currency before leaving this country.

Will the freeze be extended beyond the 90 days? Most say no it won't, but the President will probably enter into a Phase II program and it's anyone's guess just what that will be. Actually, the President's economic advisers will feel relieved if the American people abide by the freeze for 90 days.

Actually, the way the program is administered, it is almost a voluntary one at best.

Nixon's New Economic Policy came about after pressures have built up in this country over inflation, unemployment, and the economy in general, and the continuing of the wage-cost spiral.

The impact of the policy has been felt throughout the country. It may take Americans many months to realize the wage-price-rent freeze is a semi-regulation act, where personal liberties are set aside, where free markets are controlled.

Miss Carolyn Montgomery has returned from Trojan Camp near Boulder, Colo., where she spent the past two months as a counselor.

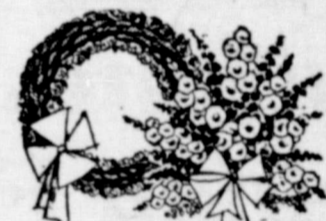

Public Notice

The Law (Article 6999j VACS) Relating to the Recording and RERECORDING OF Livestock Brands and Marks (Effective August 30, 1971)

SECTION 1. (a) This Law shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Law takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether they have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and marks in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first re-

corded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Law, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Law takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

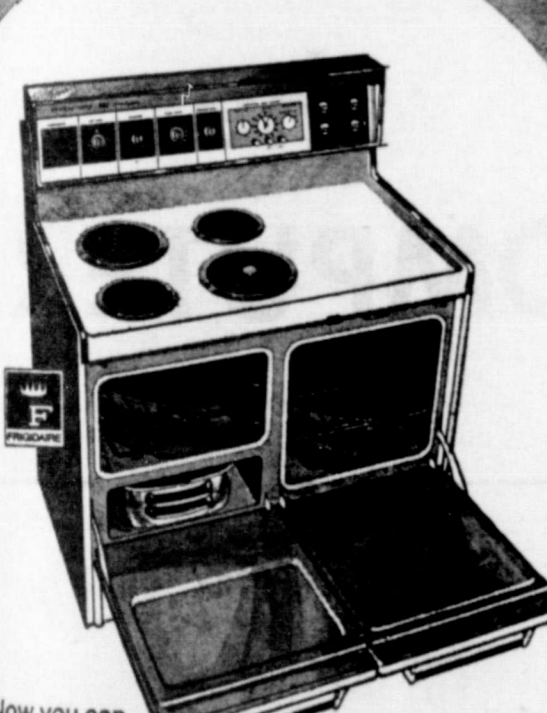
SECTION 2. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Law shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Law.

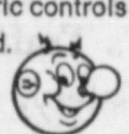

Officials Urge Maximum Production By Farmers From 1971 Crop of Cotton

COLLEGE STATION. Cotton sales during the past five years have exceeded cotton production and the situation has reduced carryover stocks of some lint qualities to dangerously low levels, says Dr. John E. Hutchison, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

To avoid the possibility of a serious shortage of cotton and to strengthen the future market position of cotton, an educational program "Better Cotton Yields for Profits and Markets" was recently started by the Extension Service and the National Cotton Council.

To launch the program in Texas, and to acquaint industry leaders with its goals, meetings were held during July in Lubbock, Dallas, Waco, and Harlingen. Attendance at these meetings included producers, ginners, editors, bankers, agribusiness, farm organization representatives, and county agricultural leaders.

About 375 industry leaders attended the meetings which were sponsored by the state co-chairman Donnell Echols, president of the Plains Cotton Producers Association, and Hutchison.

Improved harvesting efficiency was one of the practices mentioned in these meetings that offers good potential for increased cotton yields in 1971. Surveys conducted by the Statistical Research Service have shown that in the fourteen-state cotton belt the average field loss is 11 percent of the total yield.

In Texas, these surveys showed an average nine percent loss. Reducing losses to four percent in spindle-picking operations and two percent in mechanical cotton stripping operations are possible with near ideal field conditions, skilled operators, and properly-adjusted machines, Hutchison says.

Commission Gives Approval For New Use Of Highways

AUSTIN. The Texas Highway Commission has approved an expanded program for multiple use of highway right of way.

The policy provides for the construction of parking areas, recreational areas and public parks beneath overhead structures or certain other areas of right of way.

Recreational facilities may include hike and bike trails, nature trails, bridge paths; basketball, handball or tennis courts, children's playgrounds or mini-parks and boat launching facilities.

Generally, the Highway Department will be responsible for construction of the site, but local governmental units will provide playground equipment or other recreational facilities.

Cooperative agreements will be concluded with city, county, State and Federal authorities on request.

State and Federal agencies will participate in use of right of way for purposes relating to law enforcement, vehicular weights and measures control, safety inspection of trucks, immigration control, special gas tax inspection and other official functions.

The policy is subject to the condition that should the Department conclude that the facility has become a hazard to traffic safety or to be not in the public interest, the cooperative agreement may be modified or terminated.

So, in Texas where 15 percent of the crop is spindle-picked and 85 percent is stripped, the theoretical field loss should average two and one-half percent.

"This level of efficiency will likely never be achieved due to weather and other uncontrollable conditions associated with cotton production," he adds, "we believe, however, that an obtainable goal is to improve harvesting efficiency by two percent."

"On last year's crop this would have meant better than an \$8 million increase in the value of the lint and seed from upland and American Egyptian cotton," Hutchison continued.

Under the Agricultural Act of 1970, actual yield for 1971 will be used in computing the payment base for 1972 and '73. This is an additional incentive for individual producers to do a better job on all production practices, particularly harvesting efficiency.

Secure cotton markets require a dependable source of raw materials for spinners. Thus, keeping a complete inventory of the various lint qualities in sufficient supply is a necessary part of a stable cotton industry. Efforts by producers to increase yield will therefore add to the stability of the cotton industry of the future, the Director asserts.

The Extension Service is cooperating with producer organizations, mass media, leading agencies, the National Cotton Committee and all other concerned with the industry to emphasize the need for better cotton yield in 1971. This effort will be supported by news releases, radio tapes, field demonstrations, county meetings for producers, area meetings for ginners and special publications that are available from County Agricultural Agent offices.

"This effort could make cotton's future brighter in Texas," Hutchison concluded.

UT To Construct New Apartments For Married Students

AUSTIN - Work begins soon on 200 new apartments for married students at The University of Texas.

A construction contract of \$2,565,000 has been awarded to the S & G Construction Company of Austin for 50 one-bedroom and 150 two-bedroom apartments.

The apartment complex will be contained in 18 separate buildings on West Sixth Street at the site of the former "Old Confederate Home." A group of 200 additional apartments for married students, to be located on the same site, is being planned.

Don't Unplug For Dove

Dove Season Begins At Noon On Wednesday, Sept. 1 In North Zone

Dove hunters will take to the fields and creeks on Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 1, but are warned to have their shotguns plugged by officials of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

When the Parks and Wildlife Commission removed the three-shell limit on shotguns, they did it only for non-migratory birds such as quail and turkey.

Migratory birds, and these include both mourning and white-winged doves, can be legally hunted with shotguns only if the shotguns are permanently plugged to hold three shells. Other migratory birds in Texas are ducks, geese, brant, coots, rails, gallinules, jacksnipes, woodcock and sandhill cranes.

James U. Cross, executive director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said, "We have had some reports that dove hunters are happily anticipating the coming dove season because they can do more shooting with unplugged guns. These hunters have obviously misinterpreted the law."

Hunters are warned that white-

winged Dove Stamp (\$3.00) is required of all persons who hunt white-winged doves.

Another change is that in all counties under regulatory responsibility of the Parks and Wildlife Commission, no hunting is permitted on railroad right-of-ways and in State owned river beds.

Shooting hours are from 12 noon to sunset each day from Sept. 1 to October 30. Daily bag limit is 10 with 20 in possession.

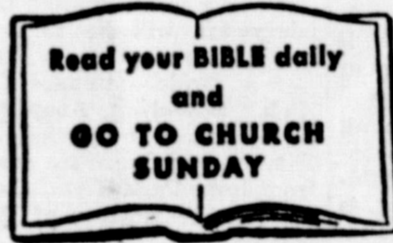

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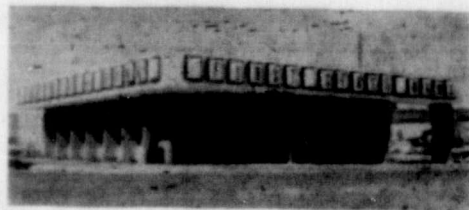

Some of our local churches are planning a homecoming on the third Sunday in September, the day of the Hall County Picnic. We hope all of our churches will participate in the Homecoming.

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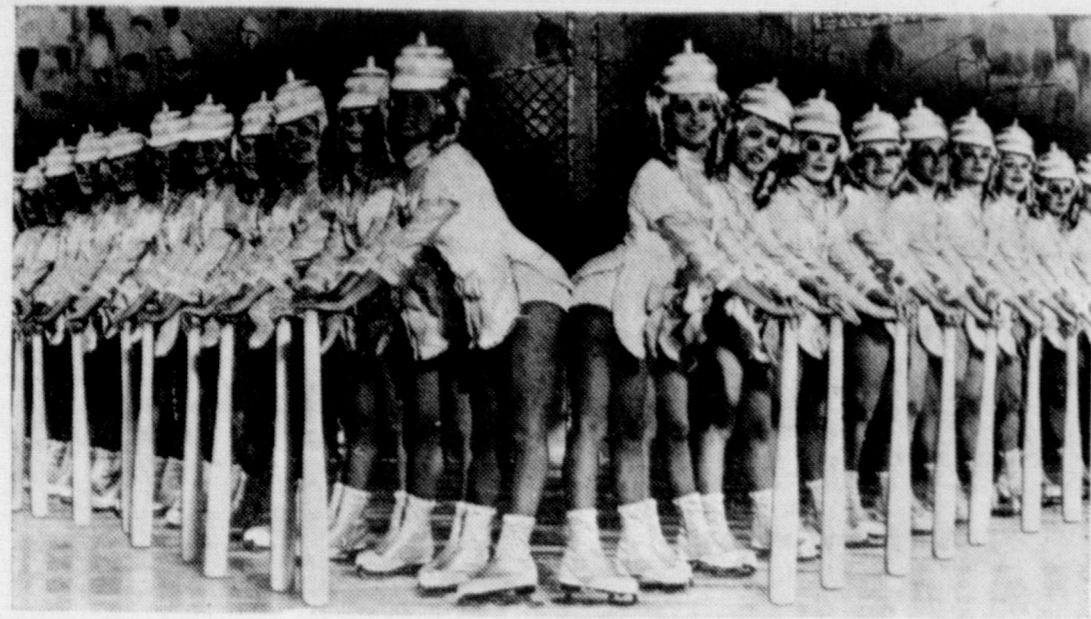

file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the county clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a

separate recording of that brand. There is no limit to the number of brands and (or) marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law.
