Burial was in the Estelline Cemetery under the direction of Spicer Funeral Home.

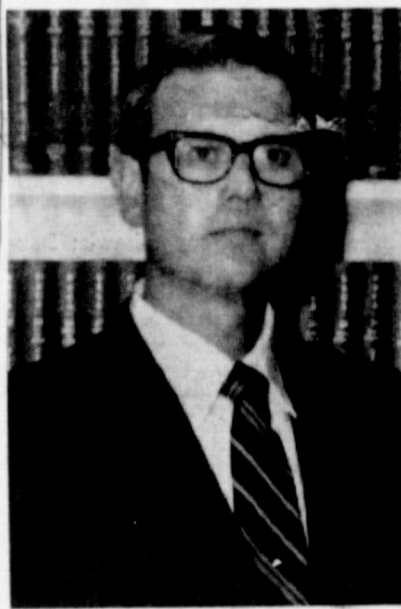
Mrs. Chaudoin died Thursday night at Cousins Home after a long illness.

According to plans announced by civic leaders Wednesday, the Christmas parade will start the celebration at 4:30 p. m. Saturday. Heading the parade will be the Lamesa High School Band. Lamesa is the former hometown of the governor. The parade will start at the west end of Main Street.

From 5 to 7 p. m., a free barbecue will be served in the School Cafeteria to all persons attending the event. From 6:30 to 7:30 p. m. musical entertainment will be furnished by the band in the High School Auditorium.

The evening's program will begin at 7:30 o'clock in the auditorium with Jay Eudy serving as master of ceremonies. Byron Young, Turkey mayor, will welcome the crowd.

Dr. Jim Granberry, mayor of Lubbock, will be the main speaker for the program with Gov. Smith participating in the special portion because of his interest in the revitalization of communities in Texas.

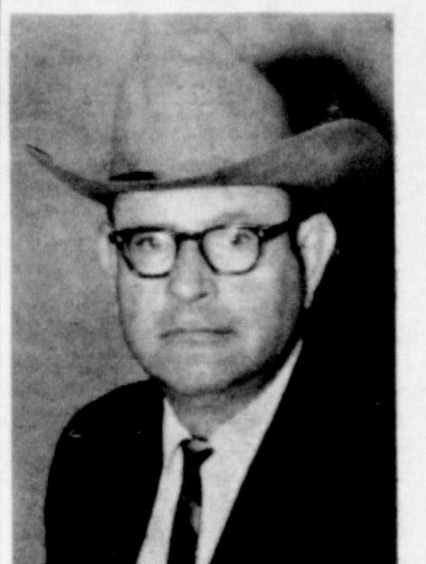
Advance tickets may be obtained from Mrs. Joe Bob Browning. Adult tickets are \$1.50 and tickets for children under 12 are 75 cents.

## Hall County ASC Convention Held

James M. Richburg, well-known Hall County farmer in the Lakeview community was re-elected to the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee by delegates to the ASC County Convention, held Wednesday, Dec. 15, at the Community Building in Memphis.

The delegates selected J. Robert Hanvey, Jr., chairman; James S. Guest, vice-chairman and James M. Richburg, member of the 3-member County Committee, and named Mack D. Richards and J. B. Byars as first and second alternate committeemen.

The County ASC Committee is responsible for local administration of Government farm programs such as acreage allotments and bases, price support for leigible crops, and conservation

cost-sharing on agricultural lands. The vacancies were filled and the County ASC Committee officers named by delegates who are newly-elected ASC community committeemen.

Community committees assist the County Committee in farm program administration and keep farmers informed of program provisions.

County committeemen are elected by the community committeemen to serve three-year staggered terms, so that ordinarily one vacancy occurs each year. The County Committee alternates are elected for one-year terms.

The Hall County ASC Committee and all community committeemen take office on January 1, 1972.



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## EDITORIAL

### Weather Break, A Christmas Blessing!

The weather turned dry and mild late last week and early this week, and the whole mood of this area turned to one of vitality and enthusiasm. Farmers, ginners, and laborers all were busy gathering cotton and combining maize.

Citizens here had been wondering where the Christmas decorations were in the downtown area and on the homes. Usually these decorations are displayed Thanksgiving weekend. Our wondering led us to ask, and the answer was that the weather was so foul that the spirit for decorating outdoors was just not willing.

But with prettier weather, out went the decorations, downtown and on the homes. They're as pretty as we remembered them.

Citizens may have noticed that there are several of the colored light strings which were not put up this year in downtown Memphis. These were the strings which have fallen into such poor condition that restoration would certainly be a difficult task. Memphis has gotten long service from these strings, purchased by donations from Memphis businessmen over 20 years ago. Recently, merchants donated to buy the candles and wreaths which hang on the light poles. We feel that more will be done in future years about providing lights for the shopping areas of Memphis at Christmas time.

Memphis citizens should consider this economic fact before being critical. Local merchants use their profits to decorate their stores and their town for Christmas. If citizens go out of town to buy their Christmas presents, they are just helping some other town prosper while they are hurting their own home town. Merchants are the same everywhere. They buy stock merchandise on past experiences of what sells and what doesn't. Local merchants buy their merchandise at the same shows, and from the same salesmen, as most merchants and purchasing agents from larger stores. When you buy from a local merchant, you're insuring that you and your neighbors will have a local merchant to buy from in the future.

We hear criticism that Christmas has become so commercial it is losing its meaning. This may have some merit, but at least in the rural areas of this nation Christmas has maintained its wonderful appeal to young and old alike.

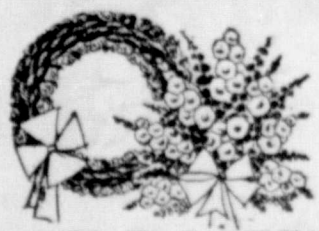
We would comment on Boys Ranch project of providing their boys with a new suit of clothing each Christmas. This raises the question of practical gifts vs. useless gifts. We suspect that children who have everything would belittle a gift of a suit of clothes at Christmas, but for children who have little, this could be the best gift of all, the gift that keeps on giving Sunday after Sunday. Giving practical gifts for Christmas is one of the fine things about the season. If dad gets a tie for Christmas he will not wear, then where is the pleasure of the gift? Mom will enjoy the gift she can use, maybe a luxury she has denied herself for years, like electric scissors, can opener, etc.

When people complain that Christmas is too commercial, their chief complaint is that there is too much pressure selling used to move merchandise. Christmas is the season of exchanging gifts. In order to give a gift, one must first purchase the gift from someone or make the gift themselves. To label the season too commercial is like labeling the 4th of July too noisy.

We would suspect that if the Christmas season was changed to the extent that gifts were not exchanged, given or donated, the season would soon lose much of its appeal.

One enjoyment of the Christmas season is the beautiful decorations. Homes beautifully lighted make a drive over our city a real pleasure. Homeowners are reminded that the judging of the Chamber of Commerce Christmas lighting contest will be next Monday night, Dec. 20, so please leave your homes lighted a little later than normal that evening.

The good weather has certainly seen a lot of activity in the home decoration aspect of the Christmas season. Join in the spirit of the season, decorate.



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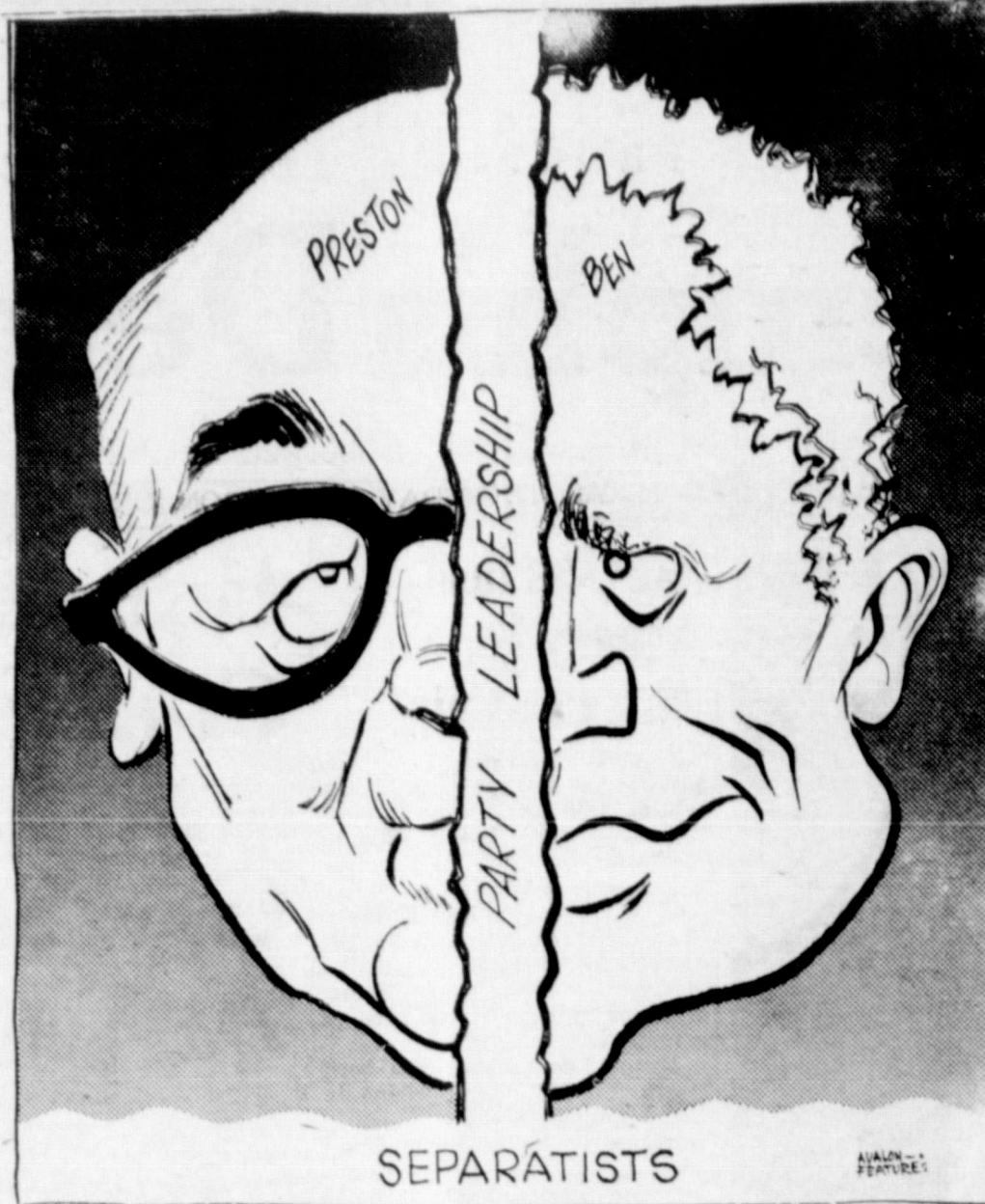

Planning now to run of Congress next year in the Panhandle-through-Wichita Falls congressional district, Democrat Rep. Graham Purcell is telling his new constituents an old story.

Nevertheless, it is the first time in Texas history a Democratic incumbent is running against a Republican incumbent for the same House seat.

It's the story a loving parent tells an adopted child, to make the child feel secure and wanted in the unusual situation. "If we had our own child we'd have to love him (or her) no matter what," the parent explains.

"But in adopting you we could pick and choose. You were the best and we love you the most!"

Purcell of Wichita Falls doesn't use those exact words in explaining why he chose to fight Republican Rep. Bob Price of Pampa for election to the West Texas District, instead of running in the Denton Mid-Cities district where there is no incumbent.

But he says the West Texas district is the natural choice for him because he is more familiar with its rural economy and knows its type of people best.

"They're more my kind of people, the kind I started out representing," Purcell said, trying hard not to sound affectedly romantic.

Another reason Purcell adopted the Panhandle district is he thinks he can win there. "I'm absolutely confident," he says.

He makes no attempt to conceal the fact that he is running hard, now.

Purcell's staff wrote a biography of the Congressman which reveals that he was raised in a "rugged environment" (Archer City) and that he is a "judicious man by temperament and experience (but) can be very blunt at times."

Purcell plans, to serve-up a vigorous "go get 'em" campaign, not a common occurrence in Texas house races. He has to.

For the last nine years Purcell has represented the district close around Wichita Falls. But that district was cut-up by the Texas legislature's redistricting scheme.

Purcell thinks he was caught in the cross-fire of other men's ambitions and became an unwilling victim.

"To the east of me, (State Sen.) Charles Wilson of Lufkin held enough votes in the Redistricting Committee to hold (U. S. Rep.) Dowdy's district intact," Purcell said.

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## Nitric Acid In Atmosphere Adds Fertilizer To Soil

Nitric acid twenty miles up in the atmosphere? "Yes!" say scientists at the University of Denver, and they know because they have sent research balloons high to check. But, before a lead-coated umbrella to avoid corrosion, be reassured by measurements show that there is not very much.

The nitric acid vapor in the atmosphere was discovered by the Denver group in the course of a series of balloon flights over White Sands, New Mexico to measure infrared radiation from the sun. Infrared radiation of all wavelengths is emitted by the sun but radiation of certain wavelengths is selectively absorbed by gases in the earth's atmosphere. By pointing their spectrograph toward the sun and noting which infrared wavelengths have been removed by selective absorption, the Denver group was able to identify various gases in the atmosphere.

The actual amount of nitric acid vapor in the atmosphere was determined by careful laboratory measurements at Kansas State University by two graduate students, Mr. Paul Rhine and Mr. Lloyd Tubbs, and Professor Dudley Williams. The Kansas State measurements indicate that, if all the nitric acid vapor in the atmosphere above an altitude of twelve miles were collected at ground level, the thickness of vapor layer would be only one ten thousandth of an inch. The detection of such small quantities of gas indicates the sensitivity of infrared methods.

The nitric acid vapor is apparently formed in the vicinity of the ozone layer from nitrogen and

oxygen that normally are present in the earth's atmosphere. Long before reaching ground level, the vapor probably dissolves in the water droplets of clouds and reaches the earth during rain. It is well known that rain water has a small nitrate content that contributes to soil fertility. Although much of the nitrate content of rain can be attributed to lightning at the cloud level, it is possible that the earth's newly discovered nitric acid factory in the ozone layer may also contribute appreciably to soil fertility.

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## YOUR COUNTY AGENT SAYS

### Cattleman Warned Poisoning

Livestock producers in Hall County are cautioned to keep a close watch on all cattle grazing on small grain pastures as nitrate poisoning may occur. The problem is especially prevalent during periods of cool, cloudy weather as have been common recently, says County Agricultural Agent W. B. Hooser.

Higher nitrate conditions are more common in plants during such weather conditions. At the same time, grazing animals tend to lose more energy during cooler weather and are therefore more susceptible to nitrate poisoning.

Hooser explains that producers can take certain steps to minimize the risk of nitrate poisoning in the livestock:

1. Feed a high energy ration before placing cattle on small grain pastures. This will provide the animals with energy as well as inhibit a rapid intake of plant material over a short period of time. A mixture of grain and molasses should provide the needed energy.

2. Observe closely all cattle on small grain pastures. A veterinarian should be called at the first signs of illness. Early treatment is necessary to keep affected animals from dying. Other animals in the herd should be moved from

the pasture and fed supplementary rations until the suspected forage can be tested.

3. Forage samples may be sent to the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University to be tested for Nitrate content. This service can help producers decide when pastures can be safely grazed.

### Leaf Rust On Wheat

Leaf rust is infecting some of the fall oat crop in Hall County, reports Hall County Agricultural Agent, W. B. Hooser.

The rust is visible as red or orange circular pustules occurring mainly on the leaves of the plant. The pustules contain spores that can be spread by the wind to other areas to intensify the disease development.

According to Hooser, leaf rust develops when windborne spores invade an area where conditions are favorable for the development of the disease. Warm moist weather (70 to 80 degrees F. and a relative humidity of 95 to 100 per cent) favors rapid development of the disease.

Where leaf rust is prevalent in oats, the best practice is to graze the crop closely to remove infected forage, advises Hooser. The regrowth should not become infected during periods of cool weather.

Certain fungicides are effective in controlling the disease but most of these are not cleared for use. Furthermore, the cost involved in frequent applications would be prohibitive.

# THE INFORMED CONSUMER

BY CRAWFORD C. MARTIN

**Have a Wary, Merry Christmas**  
Happy holidays can be marred by unscrupulous businessmen who take advantage of consumer ignorance. My staff and I take the following method to bring to your attention some things of which you should be aware while you are Christmas shopping and also to extend our best wishes to you during the holidays season.

Manufacturer's prices printed on cartons, packages, or labels are often used on cheap items such as cuff links, imitation pearls, billfolds, Christmas cards and Christmas wrapping paper to give the illusion of bargains. Don't be fooled by misleading manufacturers' prices.

Remember to save your sales slips. Don't discard them until you are sure the product you purchased is satisfactory.

Refunds and exchanges are privileges granted by some firms. They are not a customer right. (Refunds and exchanges depend on store policy.) If you expect these privileges, have a definite agreement and a thorough understanding.

Your should select your Christmas purchases carefully so that exchanges, adjustments or returns won't be necessary.

Carefully read all papers you are asked to sign and keep copies of them.

If you pay an advance deposit on the lay-a-way plan or otherwise, be sure that you can and will go through with the deal. If you change your mind later on, or if you are unable to take the merchandise out as you have agreed,

you may sacrifice your deposit.

Shop at reliable stores with established reputations. Seasonal stores and vendors won't be around after the holidays to service complaints.

Make sure you understand the terms of a guarantee and remember guarantees are as good, or as poor, as the company making them. Guarantees should always be in writing. Guarantees should tell by whom, for how long, what parts, and for whose lifetime.

All sales are final unless a definite agreement exists to the contrary. Some shoppers seem to think contracts are binding only on the "other fellow." Contracts are two-way streets, binding on both parties.

## Savings In County Reach \$947,000 During Past Year

NEW YORK, Dec. 11— With their savings at a record level during the past 12 months, residents of Hall County are in better than usual shape financially. Despite the recession, the average local family is approaching the end of the year with a record amount of cash and other savings tucked away.

The net result is that there is a treasure trove of additional buying power waiting in the wings. Although a little of it has been allowed to trickle out in the last few months, it is still only a trickle, compared with what it could be.

The bulk of it is being held back by consumers to await more stable economic conditions. Once they are convinced that inflation has been brought under control, that their jobs are safe and that the country is heading back to normal, they will be ready to unleash these pent-up savings and embark on a spending spree.

In turn, say the experts, that would give new momentum to industry, would create more jobs, reduce unemployment and spark the economy as a whole.

How much are Hall County families saving? The amount of money put aside during the current year by the local population is expected to reach \$947,000.

This represents liquid assets in the form of bank accounts, shares in savings and loan associations, purchases of U. S. saving bonds and the like.

The figures are based upon data compiled by the Federal Reserve Board, the University of Michigan and other through national sampling surveys.

They show that the amount of money a family puts into savings depends upon several factors, but especially upon its earnings.

Local families that have less than \$4,000 available to them after taxes have little leeway and are unable to do much saving. Among those with net incomes of \$6,500, an average of 5.3 per
