EDITORIAL

Agriculture In First Place!

As the harvest of 1971 crops ends, plans are being made for 1972 with the age-old goal of more production going from the 188,000 farms and ranches of Texas which contain 140 million acres. The higher the yield from crops, livestock and other segments of agriculture, the better the financial condition of the state.

These facts are not recognized by the majority of residents of the state who are in the category of "city dwellers." Except from the group of rural Texas who have moved to the cities, the role of agriculture is not understood nor appreciated. Therefore, it is time to bring up-to-date facts before everyone in an effort to get recognition of this state's most important "industry."

Among the facts which have been documented, last year 292,000 farm workers applied a half billion man-hours of labor of this vast enterprise. At the same time, in order to operate the overall agriculture plant, Texas Farmers and ranchers spent the following:

\$517 million for feed and seed: \$387 million for machinery and other capital items; \$352 million for repairs, petroleum, etc.; \$294 million for livestock; \$250 million for hired labor; \$127 million for interest on farm mortgage debts; \$115 million for fertilizer and lime; \$119 million for farm real estate taxes; and \$460 million for interest on operating loans, and a wide variety of other operating imputs.

The total of the above, if our addition is correct, reads: \$2,622,000,000.00.

From the side of receipts, the farmers and ranchers sold: \$1,383 million of cattle and calves; \$221 million of poultry and eggs; \$205 million of dairy products; \$68 million of hogs; \$69 million of other livestock products; \$395 million of feed crops; \$355 mlllion of cotton; \$147 million of wheat and stride. When they are called to rice; \$185 million of vegetables, fruits and nuts; and \$107 million of other crops.

The total of the above is \$3,137,000,000.00.

Area Ranchers Are Planning Brush Control

Many Ranchers in the Hall-Childress Soil and Water Conservation District are making plans to control Mesquite and other species of brush on their rangland this winter, according to James L. McDonald, Soil Conservationist.

McDonald stated that the Hall County Conservation Needs Inventory shows there to be 576,000 acres in Hall Co. 325,000 acres are in Rangland and of this, 60% or 240,000 acres are in need of brush control and improved stand of range grasses.

McDonald said, "Brush control by treedozing is best done during the months of December through June, as this is the time to seed 2663. range grasses.

Range seeding is a very improcess as the orginal grasses are aprooted along with the brush. When Brush control and range seeding is done grasses are inthus preventing an annual vegeta- individuals. ive crop of weeds.


