Cherri Rapp indicates, during her team's season finale Saturday night, that she will have a successful basketball career. Referred to as the nation's best around woman basketball player, Cherri's interests will go to furthering her education.

The talented, intelligent, attractive Miss Rapp, her flying career with the Wayland Flying Queens has done to acquaint this nation with some town, Estelline, and earned for herself three All American titles and a large number of other honors.

The final honor of Cherri's came following the Queen's victory, 48 to 41, over F. Kennedy Univ., of Wabash, to end the 4th annual Amarillo's Civic Center tournament.

Rapp was named the most valuable player in the tournament, considering that all of the nation's top college players participating, this is a high indeed.

The game between the JFKs and the Flying Queens was telecast by KGNC-TV and for most of this area, this was the first time they had a women's college game full court with five players.

## Childress Captures Cyclone Relays Title

The Childress Bobcats edged Memphis for the first place in the varsity division of the Cyclone Relays by 15 points, while the Memphis B squad took first place in that division, and the Junior High team placed second behind Vernon in the 7th and 8th grade division.

The Bobcats dominated four events, the high jump, sprint relay, 100-yd. dash and the 200-yd. dash to capture 72 of their 97 points.

Although the Memphis team placed second in both relays, captured numerous points in many events, the squad just could not catch the early lead established by the Bobcats.

As always, Clarendon's squad was grabbing its share of points, as the Bronchos finished a close third. Childress had 97 points, Memphis 82 and Clarendon 74 in the final tabulation.

Crowell placed fourth with 35 points and Lefors had 34, Silverton 32 and a half, McLean 26, Wellington 26, Claude 24, Wheeler 23, Hollis 18, Groom 14, Qua-

nah 11, Groom 1 and a half and Flomot 0.

Individual performances were outstanding in several events.

Marvin Self of Silverton set meet records that possibly will stand for years to come, as he hurled the discus 173'6 1/4", completely out of the throwing area. One of Self's tosses hit the front of a parked vehicle and the discus bounced into a headlight, breaking it.

Considering Self was throwing against a stiff wind, the tosses were spectacular. Second place in the discus was Duvivan of McLean with 139'11 1/4", followed by Holland of Childress, Bates of Lefors, Loveday of Claude, and Wheeler of Memphis (127'10").

Self also won the shot put with a toss of 56'7", followed by Candida of Memphis (46'2"), Robbins of Lefors, Bates of Lefors, Garner of Groom, Wellen of Childress.

Childress took a big jump in the scoring in the high jump, placing one, two and three, as Holland cleared the bar at 6'3" for first, Parr took second and Lancaster third, McKnight of Hollis took fourth, King of Clarendon fifth and Minyard of Silverton sixth.

In the mile relay, Clarendon edged Memphis with a time of 3:32.9, while Memphis had a time of 3:33.9. Crowell was third, Claude fourth, Wellington fifth, and Childress sixth.

A tent was erected for scorekeepers by Martin Johnson of Spicers Funeral Home, and Saturday afternoon as winds gusted


to 20 m. p. h. and better, this tent was helpful in keeping papers corraled.

City and School elections will be held Saturday, with the exception of the City of Lakeview councilmen election which will be held next Tuesday in the City Hall.

Here in Memphis, citizens will vote from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Saturday in the councilroom of the Municipal Building, in a joint election for the city and school.

On the Memphis ISD ballot are three names, with candidates seeking two places on the board. Incumbent J. Robert Hanvey, Jr., Dr. Robert E. Clark and Jerry Montgomery are on the ballot.

In the City of Memphis election, four aldermen to be elected, there are four names on the ballot, Homer Tribble, Johnny Farnsworth, Rayford Hutcherson, all incumbents, and Bill Leslie.

The Estelline ISD trustee election and the City of Estelline election will be held at the City Office Saturday from 8 to 7.

Two names will be on the Estelline trustee ballot, including Franklin Wyatt and Tom Cope, two to be elected.

The Estelline voters will cast write-in ballots for councilmen, two to be elected.

The Lakeview ISD trustee election will be held Saturday in the Grade School Auditorium, with three trustees to be elected from a slate of four names.

Names on the ballot are: E. H. Barbee, J. L. (Johnny) Byars, W. O. Clark and Thollie Lindley.

The City of Lakeview election will be held Tuesday in the City Hall at Lakeview, and will be a write-in ballot.

The voters of Estelline and Turkey will be casting ballots for County School Board members. Listed on the ballot in Estelline precinct will be Harlen Hood. Listed on the Turkey precinct ballot is Billie Fuston.

Locally, a heavy turnout has been seen voting absentee in the Memphis ISD trustee election, possibly because of Saturday election falling on the Easter holiday weekend, as 51 absentee ballots were cast by the deadline Tuesday. This is an indication that the voter turnout Saturday will be heavy in this election.

### Heatly Gives Up Post As Chairman Of Appropriations

Representative William S. Heatly of Paducah announced Monday that he has relinquished his duties as chairman of the House Appropriations Committee for the remainder of the 62nd Legislature.

Heatly said, "Certain candidates in the race of Speaker of the House have attempted to make me and my position as chairman of the Appropriations Committee issues in the Speaker's race. I am now removing those supposed issues from the campaign."

"In the interest of establishing an orderly atmosphere in the House and in finding effective solutions to the critical problems facing our state, I am relinquishing the chairmanship for the remainder of the 62nd Legislature. In doing so, however, I pledge to the House membership and hence all the people of Texas my fullest cooperation and best efforts which 20 years in this House, 12 as chairman of the Appropriations Committee, has provided me.

"Our common goal is to provide for primary financing and resolve the highway beautification question. I hope we can accomplish these tasks without name-calling or the creation of non-issues for anyone's personal, political ambition.

"Time is short. Although I have no opposition in my campaign for re-election, most of my colleagues do. I have nothing to gain by the action I am taking today or by having a short session. I have made no deals with or promises to anyone with regard to my stepping down as chairman. I believe this action to be in the best interest of unity and responsibility in the House during this important session."

### Mrs. Mary Owens, Former Resident, Dies In Nevada

Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Owens, a former Memphis resident, were held at 2 p. m. March 27, at the First Methodist Church of Las Vegas, Nevada.

Mrs. Owens died at 6:30 p. m. March 25 in a Nevada Hospital of pneumonia at the age of 84 years. Mrs. Owens worked for the U. S. Post Office here in Memphis for 35 years until she retired and moved to Las Vegas, Nev., to make her home with a daughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Don Sada.

During the years Mrs. Owens lived in Memphis, she was an active member of the First Methodist Church and did club work, making many friends who mourn her passing.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Floyd (Mildred) Baird of Tujunga, California, and Mrs. Don (Brooxie) Sada of Las Vegas, Nevada.

## EDITORIAL

### Residency Requirements May Be Stricken!

To all to the confusion of the forthcoming elections, now comes word from Austin that state officials are awaiting copies of the U. S. Supreme Court decision striking down Tennessee's residency requirements to see whether it affects Texas' residency requirements.

With election of city and school officials coming up immediately, and the First Primaries scheduled for May 6, individuals responsible for supervising the voting may be wondering about their duties.

Most state officials think that the Court's decision striking down Tennessee's residency requirements will affect Texas and all other states.

Randall Wood, director of the election division of the Secretary of State's office in Austin (said last week he feels certain Texas residency laws are unconstitutional on the basis of the decision, and he is awaiting for a copy of the full opinion.

Tennessee law requires a year's residency in state, and three months in the county. The Texas constitution provides that voters must "have resided in this state one year . . . preceding an election, and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote.

The section was amended to allow persons who did not meet residency requirements to vote in general elections for president, vice president and "all offices, questions or propositions to be voted on by all electors through his state" providing they have resided anywhere in the state 30 days prior to the election.

Woods said he is certain the residency requirements will be wiped out before the May 6 primaries. He added that he thinks state laws are unconstitutional.

First Assistant Attorney General Nola White said that he feels the provisions will be enjoyed—and that the Legislature will then pass legislation to correct the provisions.

Amending the constitution would require the approval of Texas voters. Therefore, another amendment may be facing the citizens on the residency requirements.

### Physical Fitness Month!

April has been proclaimed Physical Fitness Month for the State of Texas by Governor Preston Smith.

Physical Fitness Month is being promoted by the new state agency, the Governor's Commission on Physical Fitness, and the following supporting agencies and associations: Texas Education Agency, Texas Medical Assn., American Heart Assn., Texas Assn. of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, Texas Recreation and Parks Society, Texas State Health Dept., Texas Assn. for Retarded Children, Texas Commission for the blind, Governor's Committee on Aging, and the Texas High School Coaches Association.

The goal of the Physical Fitness Commission is to raise the level of physical fitness for all citizens of the state: Children, youth, young adults, adults, the "Third Age" as well as numerous special groups, including all handicapped persons.

Hundreds of special physical fitness activities are being planned during the month, and all citizens are being called on to join in recognition and participation.

The proclamation points out that, Today's increased leisure, accompanied by the poor health habits of overeating, physical inactivity and idleness have contributed to the facts that one-half of America's adults are overweight and that 55 per cent of all deaths in the United States relate to disease of the health and blood vessels, most of which are associated with obesity and physical inactivity.

With warmer weather here, many will turn to outdoor activities, lawn work, bicycling, golfing, swimming, tennis, fishing, boating, etc., but many more will spend their time in idleness in front of an air conditioner.

Life can only be enjoyed by those with healthy bodies. For those unaccustomed to exercise, moderation should be the first rule, with increased activities enjoyed as physical fitness develops.

### Tough To Become A Man

It appears that it never has been so difficult as today for boys to grow up into men. Merely growing older does not make a boy a man. There is a tempering process, a maturity that comes with having made mistakes and overcome obstacles, that makes a man out of a boy.

In times past, boys became men rather quickly. In the primitive pioneer days, a boy was expected to take on a man's work as quickly as he had strength to do so because children had to be a main source of labor to perform the endless tasks that confronted these people.

To become a man, it has always been necessary for boys to associate with men. This has been done by working with men, either on the farm, on a construction job, in the store or other places where a boy can learn by this association just what manhood means.

As a process of growing up, a boy learns how to win the respect of his peers, and also the respect of his elders.

A boy needs a father to guide him and set an example for him. If he doesn't have a father, or if his father can't fill this role, the boy needs some other adult male. This may be an uncle, a grandfather, or maybe just a friend and neighbor. If the boy doesn't have this kind of help, he has a problem becoming a man.

A behavior expert named David Riseman says that young men profoundly need as they grow up to be extended to the limit of their powers. They have to experience situations in which they have to do more than their best in order to escape death, capture, defeat or failure.

But what is there in a boy's life in our present affluent society to extend him to the limit of his powers?

If he goes out for high school

football, and makes the squad, he will learn something about this. He will learn how to keep on keeping on despite fatigue and pain and very unpleasant weather. He learns how to keep doing something he doesn't want to do at a time he doesn't want to do it. This is the chief virtue of football as we see it.

If a boy merely goes through school, being passed from one grade to the next even if he doesn't actually know the work, he has no challenge.

If a boy has no challenge from society, he is apt to device those of his own. The big city youth gangs are an example. The boys in these gangs set up challenges and tests to prove their worth to the gang.

What about drug and the young? If challenges and risk are what so many youths need and are not getting, is it not likely that warning about the dangers of drugs simply makes them more attractive?

A society that doesn't have jobs for boys to do, a society that has the men absent from home for one reason or another, a society that ignores the young and then wonders why they are not responsible adults, has something missing that is more important than most other things.

The special activities and observance were designed to share their experiences and achievements with family, friends and neighbors.


Twirp week was one of the main activities. Tuesday the girls participated in Teacher's Appreciation Day, Wednesday was color day and the girls wore something red and white.

#### Let's Fix Up The House

Let's assume that you have decided to fix up your home, and that you are planning on having repairs made or new additions. You should be particularly cautious about selecting the man for the job. Take some time in determining just who you want to do the work to avoid disappointment, and in some cases, actual deceptive practices which can be costly.

It would be well to contact reputable contractors in your area getting estimates for the work you want done. Compare the prices. To help you arrive at your decision, ask the contractors or workmen to give you the names of homeowners for whom they have worked previously and call them to inquire about the quality of the work.

When pricing home improvements, do not be carried away by advertising which states a specific price for a specific job on your home, sight unseen, with a free television set thrown in as a bonus. It is always best to have someone actually come to your home to examine it in order to determine what the cost will be.

Once you have chosen the man for the job, he and you should have a written contract setting forth in detail the cost of the work to be performed and the work to be done. The total cost should include the price of materials and labor.

Unfortunately, the home improvement area is a fertile field for the unscrupulous fly-by-nighters. For that reason it is usually best to have established reputable local contractors, tree surgeons, exterminators, roof repairman, etc., to do the work for you.

One of the most insidious and reprehensible deceptive practices in this area is the "free termite examination" which is used merely as a "toe-in-the-door" to get additional work.

This ploy has financially harmed many of our elderly citizens who live alone. Usually some one

for the "X" company telephons the unsuspecting senior citizen telling him that the company's workmen and trucks are working in the neighborhood and offering a free termite inspection. Then a workman arrives on the scene, makes an "inspection" under the house, in some instances finding termites, in others, not; but always finding the need for repairs to be done. The consumers are warned that the house is about to fall in, that the floors need leveling, that sills and blocks are needed, that the wiring is dangerous, and that additional repairs are essential. Of course, the workmen are available to do the job. Some of the individuals are frightened

about the condition of their homes and accept the company's low estimate, allowing the workman to proceed.

Very little work, if any, is actually performed around and under the house, but the homeowner gets a bill for the authorized work plus the unauthorized work. It is not unusual for the bill to be three times the estimate. It amounts to an exorbitant price for shoddy work. The presentation of the bill is in per-pay on the spot by check. In men allegedly find termites, the consumer is charged for a spraying job with a solution that is ineffective to rid the house of the pests.

Don't pay for work in advance. Often the homeowner is requested to pay one-half of the agreed price so the contractor can "purchase the necessary materials". After the money is paid, the repairman never shows up. Never pay in advance for home repairs unless you know the person with whom you are dealing.

This tournament determines the national champion each year, and the Queens were going for their third consecutive victory but were stopped in the semi-finals by JFK, by three points.

The Queens victory over JFK gave them their fourth straight Amarillo tournament championship. Cherri was named most valuable player there for four years.

Cherri's future now lies in other fields. She is the top ranked graduating senior at Wayland, with a 3.9 average in mathematics. She has selected an offer by the University of Texas to serve as a teaching assistant while working on her master's degree in the math field. She was choosing between U. of T., A&M and Rice offers.

Cherri's athletic energies will be directed to two other sports she excels in, tennis and golf. Cherri and Anne Rapp have teamed as a tennis doubles team which has advanced to the college nationals in past years, and her two young sisters are playing on the Wayland golf team. Cherri can't participate in golf due to her basketball scholarship stipulations at Wayland.

Miss Rapp has been in the College Senate for four years and is vice president of the student body this year. She was elected Homecoming Queen by the Way-

land student body in January of this year and has held many offices in organizations on campus, including Spinning Wheel the past two years. She is named in the Who's Who of Colleges and Universities.

**County Motorists Pay \$84,000 To Highway System**

NEW YORK—For Hall County's car owners, how expensive a proposition has the nation's controversial 42,500-mile Interstate Highway System become?

How much are they paying to the federal government through gasoline taxes and other automobile taxes, toward the cost of construction?

On the basis of the latest figures, their contribution in the past year came to approximately \$84,000.

This is exclusive of the auto-use taxes collected from them by the local governments.

The average Hall County driver, traveling 10,000 miles a year and getting 14 miles to the gallon, is paying some \$30 annually into the Highway Trust Fund. Those who cover 15,000 miles pay \$45. Most of it comes from the four-cents-per-gallon tax on gasoline.

The money collected in the fund finances 90 per cent of the road construction costs. The other 10 per cent comes from the states.

A battle is now brewing in Congress and elsewhere over the use of this trust fund, which brings in over \$5 billion a year and has a current surplus of about \$3.6 billion.

Should this money continue to be used solely for road building, as it has been since 1956, or should part of it be used for what critics believe to be more immediate needs, such as mass transit?

other needs are being neglected.

The Interstate Highway System which began 16 years ago at an estimated cost of \$41 billion, will cost approximately \$75 billion before it is finished, in 1978.

Because it has six years more to go, Hall County car owners will be putting an additional \$504,000 into the trust fund before they are through, based upon the 2,800 cars in operation locally.

STIN—Texans have just a few days more—until April 5—register to vote in the May 6 primary elections.

Major state candidates, including Gov. Preston Smith, viewed alarm registration totals so far. They noted that less than 3.8 million had registered as of last week, although there are nearly 7 million qualified voters in the state.

Present registrations are trailing the corresponding period in 1968 by 294,000 and the 1970 year by more than 370,000.

In 1968, observed gubernatorial candidate Frances Farenthold, 48 per cent of qualified voters registered before the primaries. This year, only 48 per cent of the potentially-eligible registered. Former U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough pointed out that 63.4 per cent of those qualified registered in 1970, and the 72 dropoff is reflected in many "working class" neighborhoods. Nearly one million more should

register by April 5 if previous patterns are followed, Smith said.

Under the state's new voter registration system, which candidates Farenthold and Yarborough lauded as one of the nation's best, citizens have until 30 days before any election to register and become eligible to vote.

The U. S. Supreme Court threw some confusion over the registration system with a ruling that 12 months' state and six months' local residency requirements for voter eligibility (like those of Texas) are unconstitutional.

The High Court said 30 days' residency is sufficient for any state. Secretary of State Bob Bullock took the case under study. Special legislative attention may be necessary.

**Insurance Rates Again**

Insurance Board Chairman Larry Teaver lambasted two Board colleagues for proposing a \$27 million homeowners increase. He termed it "unnecessary, unjustifiable and an insult to the intelligence of the people of Texas."

Board members Ned Price and Durwood Manford denied any new rates have been finally adopted and said they likely won't be before June 1.

Teaver who advocates a \$14 million decrease in fire and other building coverage, called another meeting for March 29 to review Board actions and to recommend an "economic trend factor" be kept out of rates pending a study of the price freeze and inflation.

# The Crucifixion

As the crowd led Jesus away to his death. Simon of Cyrene, who was just coming into Jerusalem from the country, was forced to follow, carrying Jesus' cross. Great crowds trailed along behind, and many grief-stricken women. Two others, criminals, were led out to be executed with him at a place called "The Skull." There all three were crucified . . . Jesus on the center cross, and the two criminals on either side. "Father, forgive these people, Jesus said, "for they don't know what they are doing" And the soldiers gambled for his clothing, throwing dice for each piece. The crowd watched. And they laughed and scoffed. "He was so good at helping others," they said, "let's see him save himself if he is really God's Chosen One, the Messiah." The soldiers mocked him, too, by offering him a drink . . . of sour wine. And they called on him, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" A signboard was nailed to the cross above him with these words: "This is the King of the Jews." One of the criminals hanging beside him scoffed, "So you're the Messiah, are you? Prove it by saving yourself . . . and us, too, while you're at it!" But the other criminal protested. "Don't you even fear God when you are dying? We deserve to die for our evil deeds, but this man hasn't done one thing wrong. "Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your Kingdom." And Jesus replied, "Today you will be with me in paradise. This is a solemn promise." By now it was noon, and darkness fell across the whole land for three hours, until three o'clock. The light from the sun was gone . . . and suddenly the thick veil hanging in the Temple split apart. Then Jesus shouted, "Father I commit my spirit to you," and with those words he died. When the captain of the Roman military unit handling the executions saw what had happened, he was stricken with awe before God and said, "Surely this man was innocent".



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

### Latest U. S. Census Bureau Reports Hall County's Farms Now Number 583

Hall County shows a total of 583 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

This report was received here last week, and the latest figures on agriculture which has been compiled by the Bureau of the Census.

During the last week in September, 1969, the 1969 Census of Agriculture forms were mailed to a list representing as nearly as possible, all persons and firms associated with the direction of agricultural operations for the year. The list included land owners, tenants, renters, sharecroppers, and hired managers, but excluded hired farm laborers.

The last time a Census of Agriculture was made for 1964. The report shows a comparison of 1969 figures with those of 1964, and showed that there were 534 farms in Hall County for that year. This is a gain of 49 farms from the earlier report.

Of the county's total farms in 1969, 512 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as compared with 461 in 1964.

The report also shows average farm size in the county was 96.0 acres, and average value of these farms (land and buildings) was \$100,800.

Other figures from the report are:  
Value of all farm products sold in 1969, \$7,764,343; in 1964, \$8,058,750.

Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$4,147,567; in 1964, \$6,662,914.

Value of all livestock, poultry, and their products sold in 1969, \$3,616,776; in 1964, \$1,395,531.

Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, five of the county's \$2,500-and-over farms are incorporated.
