Dr. Clark Named Pres. Of Local School Board

Members of the Memphis School Board met Tuesday night in the superintendent's office and canvassed the ballots of the trustee election, and accepted the tabulation totals.

The election saw Dr. Robert E. Clark receive 366 votes, Jerry Montgomery 316 votes, and J. Robert Hanvey, Jr. 310 votes. Clark and Montgomery were elected to positions on the board.

The Memphis ISD board then reorganized for the coming year, and Dr. Clark was elected president. M. C. Allen, Jr., was elected to the board's vice president.

In other business, 13 applications for the position of superintendent of the Memphis Schools were read and some discussion followed, but no action was taken at this time.

The board is still taking applications for this position, it was announced.

Charles Hamner Announces For Commissioner

Charles H. Hamner of Turkey Monday announced that he was entering the race of Commissioner of Precinct No. 4 of Hall County, and authorized The Democrat to make the announcement. He said his election was subject to the action of voters at the Democratic primaries.

Mr. Hamner has been a resident of Turkey since 1955, and has been engaged in farming in that community.

"Between now and the first primary on Saturday, May 6, I intend to be actively campaigning for this important office," he said. "During this time I will try to see as many citizens of my precinct as I can."

"Meanwhile, I will appreciate the support and influence of the people of Turkey."

"If elected, I will try to handle the affairs of our precinct in a business-like manner at all times."

Local American Cancer Chapter To Hold Annual Crusade During April

April is Cancer Control month as proclaimed by the president of the United States and by congressional resolution, it was announced here this week.

During the month the Society conducts its concentrated annual educational and fund raising Crusade.

"The people of Hall County have been most generous in supporting the various activities conducted by the county unit, all attempting to bolster the county's quota of \$2,500.00," Mrs. Lorean Hart, campaign chairman, stated. The Crusade workers will strive to visit every home in the county, but if someone is missed, he is asked to contact Mrs. Roy Guthrie, county chairman, or Mrs. Floyd McIntush, service chairman (since Mrs. Hart teaches school and is not always available).

The Crusade theme, "We want to wipe out cancer in your lifetime," can become a reality through research, cancer prevention, and control using the knowledge of today, it was explained.

"There is much public misunderstanding about the different types of cancer and apathy about going to a doctor for annual health checkups," Mrs. Hart said.

Cancer is the nation's number two killer (heart illness being

City Councilmen Are Elected In Memphis, Estelline, Lakeview Polls

City Council members were elected Saturday and Tuesday in elections in Memphis, Estelline and Lakeview.

In the Memphis election, held Saturday, for aldermen, one from each of the four wards in Memphis, were elected to seats on the City Council.

The total vote in the election was 320, with Homer Tribble receiving 65, Johnny Farnsworth 63, Rayford Hutcherson 146, and Bill Leslie 47.

In the City of Lakeview election, three were named by writing in balloting to fill positions on the City Council.

New Lakeview members are Johnny Fowler, 25 votes, J. C. Stepp, 21 votes, and Russell Payne, 20 votes.

Others receiving votes in the election included: Bill Cofer 5, Mike Cofer 3, Barney Bevers 7, W. C. Hignight 9, and R. A. Mol-

Amarillo Relays Attract Athletes

Primary Elections Only 30 More Days Away Now

First Primary Election dates are fast approaching, as the 30-day deadline of voter registration for the May 6 primaries has passed as of closing time on Wednesday, April 5.

Anyone who failed to become a registered voter by that time will just have to wait to the November election provided they take the opportunity to register to vote 30 days before that election.

Legislative approval last week of a \$2.15 million appropriation bill to finance Texas' May 6 and June 3 Democratic and Republican primaries removed a major problem that has hounded county Democratic chairmen since the federal court knocked out filing fees.

Hall County Democratic Chairman Guy Smith reports that the Executive Committee has arrived at an estimated cost of holding the Democratic primary election to be \$1,714.14. This estimation has been forwarded to the Secretary of State.

Hall County, like other Texas counties, would have held the primary election (without the state funds), but it would have been a problem here as in other counties, the county chairman indicated.

Candidates Still Pay Fees

Although federal court rulings stopped the practice of assessing fees based on a percentage of the salary derived from a four-year office term, the filing fees assessed candidates was upheld by the federal courts and is being paid by candidates.

These filing fees include \$100 for county-wide candidates and \$50.00 for precinct candidates. Multi-county positions like judicial district office seekers and state senators and representatives divide the \$100 filing fee among the counties they are to represent, under the present system.

The Democratic county committee has, and will collect approximately \$1,000 in candidates' filing fees, and these are turned over to the Secretary of State to help finance the election.

Chairman Smith pointed out that these fees will cover over one-half of the election cost in Hall County, but in larger counties, these fees are only a small part of the total cost of the election.

The Wichita Falls Record-News recently quoted Wichita County Democratic Chairman A. F. Edwards as saying that the 1972 Democratic Primary in that county would cost \$13,500 and normal filing fees from candidates would bring in about \$2,000.

Chairman Smith indicated that there will be a seminar in Canyon on Saturday, April 15, for county and precinct chairmen and election officials to get the latest word concerning the primaries and new regulations.

Chairman Smith has received a copy of a school busing referendum proposal to go on the Democratic Primary ballot. The referendum was approved by the State Democratic Committee last month.

Although the referendum on school busing is an emotional issue, the referendum outcome will have no effect other than indicate the "For" or "Against" feelings of county citizens on: "No public school student shall be assigned to or be required to attend a particular school. This referendum applies to the required busing of public school students and provides for equal quality education for all public school students."

Chairman Smith said each of the county's five voting precincts will have Democratic Precinct Conventions at 2 p. m. on May 6, to decide upon delegates to the County Convention.

Lakeview Board Re-Organizes After Election

The Lakeview School Board reorganized for the coming year following the canvassing of the ballots from Saturday's election, which saw the three incumbents returned to positions on the board.

In the election, B. H. Barbee received 27 votes, J. L. (Sonny) Byars 39, and W. O. Clark 42.

In other action by the board, after accepting the resignation of Linton Gardnhire as a trustee, members appointed Thollie Lindley, who received 22 votes in the election, to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Gardnhire which has two years remaining.

B. H. Barbee was elected president, K. D. Byars was elected vice president, and James Richburg was named secretary at the meeting.

Others receiving votes in the election were Coleman Duke and J. B. Byars, each receiving two votes.

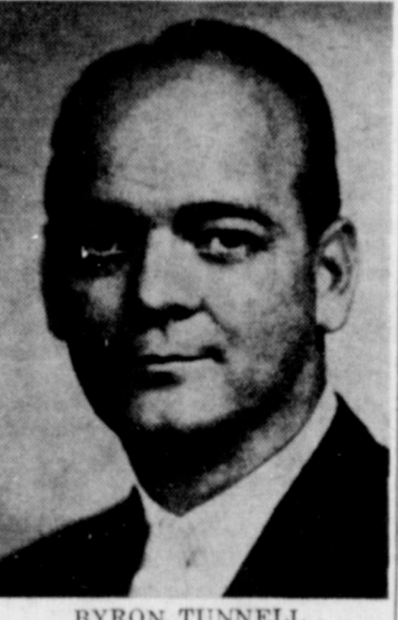
Amarillo rites were held at 10 a. m. in the Polk Street Methodist Church of which he was a member.

Byron Tunnell Announces For R. R. Commission

Byron Tunnell, vigorous young Chairman of the Railroad Commission of Texas, has announced for election to his second full term on the Commission. His election last year as Chairman established him as the youngest presiding officer of the agency in Texas history.

Tunnell is a graduate of Tyler public schools and Baylor University Law School. Prior to his Commission service he was a practicing trial attorney in Tyler.

The candidate is a Navy Air Corps veteran of World War II.

This East Texan has already made a mark as one of Texas' great advocates of conservation of the state's natural resources. Turnnell, in accepting the Chairmanship of the Commission, pledged the full force and effect of the agency to conservation for the economic and ecological welfare of all Texans.

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EDITORIAL

Environmental Education Week!

We hear a lot today about our environment, and in this country, we even get a good mouthful of our soil when the sand blows. But by and large, few parts of this country are as environmental conscious as we are in this area.

This week, April 2-8, has been designated as "Environmental Education Week" in Texas by Governor Preston Smith who urges, "every community to call upon all its educational resources to conduct a planned program of activities during the week to enhance all its citizens' awareness and appreciation of environmental issues."

Lee Scrivner, chairman of the Hall-Childress Soil and Water Conservation District, is leading the district's efforts in various activities in the local schools. Conservation outdoor classrooms have been established by the Memphis and Turkey Schools. The conservation district has provided school children with copies of the booklet, "Plants—How They Improve Our Environment."

Occasionally, this newspaper will make editorial comment about local, state or national observances of special weeks. In fact, almost every week in the year is observed for one thing or another. But, in this instance, this editor found a really remarkable booklet in the one being distributed to the area children by the Hall-Childress SWCD.

The booklet looks like a comic book, but its subject matter deals with more practical information about plants than a person can find anywhere in such a condensed form. The booklet is full of practical knowledge and even experiments young people can do to grow all kinds of plants.

The grasses and soil of Hall County are our number one asset, supporting a major industry, agriculture. The history of Hall County's growth was agriculturally oriented; therefore the future of this county must rest in the roots of our soil.

Anything that improves our environment is of vital concern to all of us, jointly. The days of exploiting these resources for quick gain are long since over. The dust bowls of the 1930's brought a harsh lesson to this nation.

By educating our children and ourselves on the value of plants and how they improve our environment, we will insure our future, and the future of unborn generations in this country. A land flowing with milk and honey can only exist so long as there is grass for cows to eat and flowers from which bees can gather nectar. Mother Nature's laws are harsh when the grass dies and the flowers disappear.

What Other Editors Say

Our Kids Can't Write
DO YOU REALIZE that our darling kids are grammatical and orthographic nincompoops? Who can't spell cat and can't, for the lives of 'em, construct a decent simple sentence?

It is, proud mamma and papa, a sad fact of academic life. Our younguns are graduating from our schools in a blithe oblivion of the rules of English and spelling. They express themselves with all the eloquence and minnesse of a tongue-tied deaf mute.

Though he didn't say it in such fowrbred language, these are the views expressed by Kenneth Rabben, a writer for the Copley News Service. "There is," he said, "a fantastic lack of knowledge of spelling, grammar, punctuation, and word choice and order among members of four groups of young people tested."

In view of all the money taxpayers shell out for education, this neatly fits in the dirty shame file. For no matter how crumful of facts the adolescent brain, if expression devices are absent, those facts are doomed to vegetate among the gray matter. A beautiful thought is an unmined diomond.

Our educational express jumped the tracks, in my opinion, when it abandoned, albeit temporarily, teaching spelling euphonically, or by sound. It spawned a few generations of non-spellers, thereby, and probaby also non-writers, or nonexpressers. Without words, nobody can express himself.

This is a bloomy situation, but it pertains, I would suggest, more to big city schools than locally, for in this part of Texas and Oklahoma spelling and grammar are properly taught. It's a fringe benefit of living in a comparatively small community that the education process works most efficiently.

Truth And Travesty
There are two ways to read the Constitution — the way it is written or the way it might be written today. The Texas and California courts of last resort in criminal matetrs show how he two methods apply.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals has rejected the argument that led the California Supreme Court recently to outlaw capital punishment as cruel and unusual.

Cruel and unusual punishment is indeed forbidden by the Constitution; so the California judges applied contemporary liberal sentiment to make the ban cover the death penalty.

The Texas court found just the

opposite. What, the court asked, does the Constitution say about the death-penalty? It says, in both the Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments, that nobody's life shall be taken without due process of law.

That, says the court means that life can be taken so long as due process—meaning a fair trial is observed. So quite obviously the framers took the death penalty for granted.

Just as obviously, the California judges don't; so they "packed" an irrelevant passage with modern sociology. The Texas court didn't.

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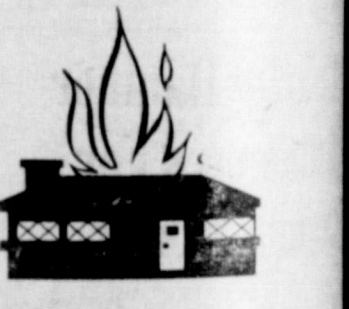

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

An Open Letter To The People Of Texas

Dear Voter:

I'm a candidate for attorney general of Texas because I believe it's time for a change in the office.

Crawford Martin is seeking a fourth term. It's the first time in the history of Texas an attorney general is running for a fourth term.

Campaigns should be run on the issues and I don't like to inject personalities and personal relationships into a political campaign. But the relationship between Frank Sharp and Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin cannot be swept under the rug.

The new book about the Texas stock fraud scandal, "Texas Lives a Cloud," tells about that relationship. On page 128 the book says: "Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin... got some free newspaper publicity when it was revealed in October, 1971, that he received a 'stock tip' from Frank Sharp... while Martin and his family were Sharp's ranch guests late in 1968 and again at Sharp's Houston office early in 1970."

"Sharp was trying personally to sell National Bankers Life stock to Martin, although the attorney general said that Sharp never mentioned the possibility of Sharp's town Bank loans to buy the stock."

"Martin said that he turned the stock offer down because it would have cost too much, because NBL was in 'shaky' condition, and because he did not buy 'speculative' stocks."

"He did not comment on the ethical aspects of a state official accepting a stock tip of that sort—perhaps, because Martin, attorney general, had ruled in favor of Sharp on a key legal issue about Sharpstown State Bank only two and one half years before Sharp made the stock offer to Martin."

"Martin's ruling had the effect of increasing the bank's capitalization dramatically and thus its ability to make large loans, ultimately giving Sharp the financial resources he used in the manipulations charged by the SEC."

"As you know, hundreds of Texans lost their life savings because of Sharp's stock manipulations and it probably wouldn't have happened but for Atty. Gen. Martin's legal opinion."

"Don't you agree, it's time for a change in the office of attorney general of Texas?"

Just so you'll know what you're changing to, I'd like to tell you a little about John Hill. I'm a native Texan, grew up in Wink and Kilgore, was national debate champion at Kilgore Junior College and graduated from the University of Texas Law School. I served in the Navy during World War II, practiced law (much of the time in courtrooms) in Houston, and was secretary of state from 1966 to 1968.

I certainly would appreciate your support.

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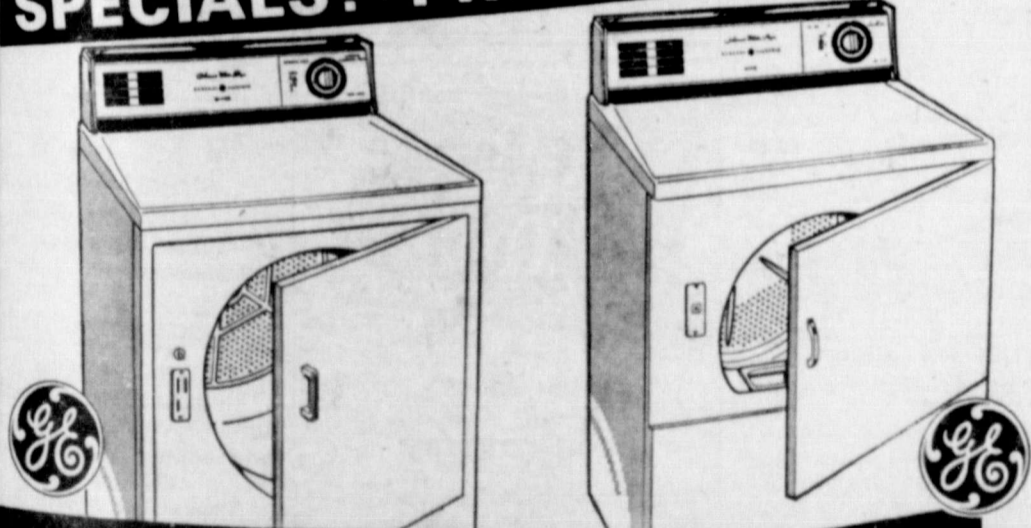
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Pampa To Be Site Of Jehovah's Witnesses Meet
