Area basketball teams all ended up playing each other this week, as Lakeview and Estelline teams met Monday night and Memphis teams played Estelline Tuesday night. The Memphis varsity boys hosted Quannah Tuesday night, and the Lakeview girls played Groom Tuesday. Estelline-Lakeview Teams from Estelline and Lakeview split games Monday night at Estelline, with the Lakeview girls winning 56 to 48 and the Estelline boys winning 62 to 53. Carolyn Hughes set the scoring pace for Lakeview Egglettes as they led all four periods to down the Bearettes. Patti Welch had a 23-point night for the losers. In the boys game, Zane Gilbert with 14 points led the Eagles in a contest which saw Lakeview lead through three quarters of play, 15 to 8, tied 25-25 and 42- to 37. In the final stanza, Estelline captured the victory with a 9-point advantage at the final buzzer. Ivory Williams was the leading scorer for Estelline. Tuesday Night The Cyclonettes of Coach Joe Bain extended its winning streak to two by defeating the Bearettes of Estelline 47 to 31. The score was tied at 8-all in the first period, but Memphis extended its lead throughout the remaining periods. Mickie Henderson led the Memphis team in scoring with 15 points while Patti Welch had 16 for Estelline. 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EDITORIAL

Farmers Feel Jilted After Cotton Announcement!

As far as the here and now of it is concerned, cotton farmers viewed President Nixon's first act on the commodity front since the election with just about the same reaction as they did the continuing snowfall which has kept them from harvesting one of the best cotton crops in two decades; the same reaction as a jilted suitor, or the victim of some Greek tragedy.

Farmers are more accustomed to accepting the antics of Mother Nature, providing a bountiful crop, then making it almost impossible to harvest, or breaking droughts with floods. But to farmers who have just supported the President and his administration, following the USDA's advice to raise more cotton issued only nine months before, then see a complete about face, it is understandable why farmers feel jilted.

Farmers are now being informed that next year, things will not be good. Their acreage allotments will be cut, their government checks will be sliced, and USDA will not raise the price support on cotton, even though the world market price on the average for the last two years has climbed to 24 cents per pound. The support price will remain at 19.5 cents per pound.

Farmers had hoped that the long battle of increased production costs and static or declining prices for cotton was just about over, as last year's cotton prices were up for the first time in many years, the demand for cotton was exceeding the supply. But Mother Nature helped farmers grow a bumper cotton crop this year; so Nixon's Administration followed the logical course of selecting a program which will benefit the cotton trade at the expense of cotton producers, using the old story of over production vs. demand as justification for this course of action.

The most disappointing aspect of the announcement to cotton producers was why the 1973 cotton loan would not be raised from the 1972 level of 19.5 cents per pound.

"It is beyond our understanding that the Secretary of Agriculture would leave the U. S. cotton loan seven cents a pound or more below the average market price," said Ray Joe Riley of Hart, president of the Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

The average market price for middling-inch cotton for the 1970 and 1971 marketing years was determined by USDA to be about 26.5 cents. Current law provides that the U. S. loan shall be set at 90 per cent of that average, except that the Secretary may adjust the figure downward if he deems it necessary to keep U. S. Cotton prices competitive.

It was under this latter authority that Secretary Earl Butz announced the 1973 loan at 19.5 cents, less than 74 per cent of the world market price average.

National Farmers Union President Tony Dechant and Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman have lodged letters of protest with Secretary Butz.

As far as Hall County is concerned, it is possible under the guidelines outlined by the USDA announcement for the 1973 cotton crop that this county would have as few as 55,000 to 58,000 acres planted next year as compared to 81,000 in 1971 and 1972. Since exact figures are not available on this as yet, this is only an unofficial, educated guess.

The major worry is what effect all this will have on cotton's future in the world market place and in meeting competition with man-made fibers.

Hunter's Lament

Another bird hunting season is just around the calendar but more and more hunters may find themselves with less and less opportunity to pursue their favorite sport.

The public hunter is destined the same fate as the Dodo and the dinosaurs and many believe they are digging their own grave with tin cans and plastic forks.

One veteran game officer has declared that more land is posted every year against hunters because of rubbish and debris than for any other reason—even shooting cows.

Landowners are justly irate at having pastures littered with left-over lunches, shell casings and other products designed to comfort the hunter. The most careful man with a shotgun may be the most careless with his sandwich wrapper.

With the squeeze on for land to hunt, it becomes the well-heeled hunter who plucks down his cash for a chance to shoot. Leasing the land to those willing to pay doesn't insure the landowner his hunters won't litter but they may want the hunting rights again next season.

With the plight of the free hunter growing steadily worse hunting law infractions in some areas are also worsening. Shooting from roadways is the outlet for the frustrated hunter without

hunting rights many times takes.

Hunting from roadways is at best only dangerous to the hunter. Many innocent people unknowingly in harm's way when the guns start blazing.

As long as there are men, there will be those who hunt for it is man's nature. It is saddening, however, that if current conditions are not corrected, only a very few will be able to afford or able to find a place to ply their sport.

AX LERNER, in his book "America As A Civilization", wasn't quite sure where to draw the line between the small town and the city. But he made this memorable observation: "One might say that a small town ceases to be one as soon as someone who has lived in it a number of years finds unfamiliar faces as he walks down the street and is not moved to discover who they are and how they got there."

That's a good way to suggest what a small town is not.

And an old story that used to make the rounds made unquestionably clear what a small town is.

A merchant who ordered some merchandise through a traveling salesman felt he was gypped when the goods arrived to Centerville. So he sent the stuff back to the

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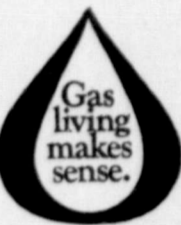

Young Men Must Register With Selective Service

AUSTIN—Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, has again reminded young men of their obligation to register with Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday.

Glantz stressed that the requirement to register will continue in full effect whether the all-voluntary military force becomes a reality or not. Every native born and resident-alien young man are required to present himself for registration from 30 days before to 30 days after his 18th birthday. If for any reason, a young man has failed to register he should do so immediately to escape the penalty of Federal law.

Failure to register may result in a fine imprisonment, or both, under provisions of the Military Selective Service Act.

Young men may register at the office of the local board near their home or place of residence, or may be registered by volunteer registrars who are located in most high schools or other similarly convenient locations.

Registrars in Hall County are Mrs. Loetta Ferguson, Ferguson Ins. Agency, Turkey; and Billy B. Holland, Post Office, in Estelline.

"An attempt will be made to secure a registrar in Memphis Texas in the near future and you will be advised of name and place to register," Col Glantz said.

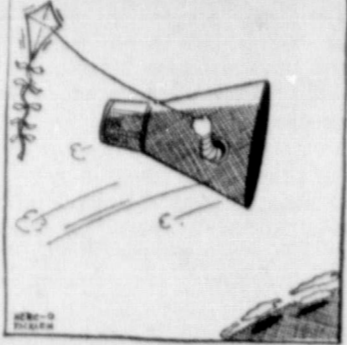
Forrest a graduate of West Texas State University, has been active in television farm broadcasting since 1961 and has been seen daily in the Panhandle for over five years.
