EDITORIAL Ecology Problems . . . Not Enough Technology!

U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen spoke to a Joint Engineers Council in Longview last week and he talked on ecological programs and problems and summed it all up with "So the problem, after all, is not 'too much technology'-but rather, not enough technology; or technology that has not been sophisticated enough; or that has been poorly used, or not used at all."

The facts still remain, that to this day, one third of all Americans-including residents of Manhattan-have no primary sewage treatment, although the technology has been available for decades. Likewise, some utilities have not installed stack controls-although precipitators were invented half a century ago

We, in rural America are feeling the effects of controls to clean up the environment. Chemical uses in agriculture are being restricted. Sewage treatment for our communities and livestock operations are required and enforced.

The City of Memphis, by virtue of being over 3,000 in population, has until Dec. 31, 1973, to stop burning trash and develop a system of earth filling to dispose of trash and garbage. Memphis sewage users are paying for a fine sewage treatment facility regulations made manditory. The cost of the sewage plant was feasible, we can all be thankful, but City Fathers are wrestling with the new regulation on trash collection, and disposal, because of the cost estimates, and certainly need the understanding and support of our citizens.

Sen. Bentsen's speech pointed out some things we should all take into consideration, because ecology has become the big national cause with Ecology the hero and Technology the villian.

Let us draw some comparisons. Memphis sewage treatment is so great that water from it is available for irrigation use. But our big cities dump raw sewage into our rivers. Lake Erie is virtually a dead biological unit, the Potomac River is restricted as a health hazard, the Cuyahoga River is a fire hazard. Its chemical content is so high that there is a constant danger of ignition.

The City of Miami dumped raw sewage into the ocean for years while the City of Memphis, Tenn., dumped raw sewage drug education program is about into the Mississippi River for years.
