# Tornado Does Extensive Damage To Whitten Farm

Citizens of Memphis were alerted last Monday night of a tornado threat by vehicle mounted sirens because the electricity was out in Memphis.

The Memphis City Hall personnel, police, firemen and volunteers, rushed over the city sounding sirens to alert citizens of the danger of a tornado sighted west of Memphis.

One funnel cloud damaged the rural home and tore up irrigation equipment and damaged farm buildings on the Paul Whitten farm in the Deep Lake area that evening while the family was huddled in the bathroom.

Mr. Whitten had just been outdoors looking at the threatening clouds. The rain hit a few moments later and then the roar came and the family did not have time to get to a cellar, located just outside the rear door.

The roof of the farm home was lifted from its supports by the suction. Flying debris struck buildings knocking holes in the sides, a Trumatic irrigation system setting in a field southeast of the home was twisted about and probably completely lost. Trailers loaded with hand moving irrigation pipe were emptied of their loads and pipe was strewn all over the field.

The vent pipe in the cellar was knocked over and the cellar caught water during the storm. The farm home had water damage also, and the television antenna was broken. There was no loss of farm animals however.

A large watering tank was lifted from the northwest side of the barn, and was found over a mile away.

The twister headed east by southeast, and several miles later, almost on a straight line, tore away a barn on the Hazel Hall farm west of Plaska. Metal from the barn was thrown over a two mile area to the southeast.

Also in the Plaska area, a neighboring farm home had a tree blown over and a cellar door lifted by the twister. Several cotton trailers were blown over at the Farmers Union Gin at Plaska causing some damage.

In the Newlin area, the Tom Tippetts had a fence blown over and a weather vane torn by high winds. They were in the cellar at the time.

Damage was also reported on the Bradley 3 Ranch, where a barn was blown down, trailers were moved about causing damage, an irrigation system was torn up. There was some damage to fencing and several utility poles were taken down by the storm.

In the area east of Newlin, cotton trailers were also reported damaged.

Rainfall measured an inch and twenty hundredths here in Memphis from the system, and one and three-quarters of an inch at Lakeview. Mr. Whitten was unable to give a rainfall measurement since his rain gauge was lifted out of its holder and was found unbroken on the ground.

From looking at the washing damage in the Plaska area, the rainfall could have been over two inches from the system.

Dist roads in the county are showing signs of severe damage due to the abundance of rainfall, as fields are washing in some spots.

## All Hall County Citizens Urged To Have TB Tests

Urging that all Hall County residents take advantage of the tuberculin skin-testing program due to be held in Memphis at the American Legion Hall on Saturday, May 5, American Lung Association area executive Charles McIntosh states that a projected 2500 cases of active tuberculosis are forecast for the state in 1973.

Tuberculosis struck a majority of the counties in Texas last year including Hall County, he said, and a majority of the cases were not diagnosed until they had reached either moderately or advanced stages, when spread of infection is most likely to occur.

"A lot of people think TB is whipped," he said. "The truth is that if we had as much diphtheria or polio, there would be public hysteria. But there is a tendency to quietly ignore TB, to pretend that it doesn't exist, and this makes it even more dangerous."

A positive tuberculin test does not indicate some vague "allergy" or that the individual's reaction is due to having a cold, or having received some immunization injection, he stressed. "A positive tuberculin skin test means one thing: the individual

**1972 Loss**

Persons in Hall County who had crop losses because of drought or hail the first six months of 1972 and who have not received an FHA Emergency loan are asked to apply for the loan on or before May 8, 1973.

Persons who apply by the deadline will be considered for emergency loans at one percent interest at the Farmers Home Administration office, 1002 West 10th St.

In addition, those who qualify for a forgiveness benefit their loan of not to exceed \$5,000 based on losses that are compensated by insurance service.

### The Weather . . The Weather . . The Weather

Texas Panhandle weather has been the subject of conversation so much that people hereabouts are running out of expressions to describe their feelings. The problem it seems is to adjusting wardrobes to meet the occasions.

Housewives and mothers don't know whether to hand their children overcoats, raincoats, or dress their children in cool light weight cottons. There just doesn't seem to be any way of getting ahead of changing conditions.

One farmer said he was watching it snow recently, when a flash of lightning, and clap of thunder made him think of a spring thunderstorm.

The weather has now moved into the dangerous cycle, tornado season, and Hall County has already had two twisters pay their visits. This brings us to the subject of storm alerts here in Memphis.

Monday night, the power went off shortly before 10 p. m. in Memphis. A call came in from west of Memphis that a funnel cloud was sighted. Due to the loss of power, City Police and Firemen could not sound the big sirens so the sirens on Police and Fire vehicles were used to alert a large portion of the community.

Monday night, the power is off and you hear a vehicle with a siren going, during a thunderstorm, you should assume that it is a tornado alert. It might be the ambulance, but more chances than not it is the tornado alert being sounded.

New residents need to be reminded that the tornado alert is a long, continuous blast of the fire sirens. The pitch of this blast does not go from high to low and back again, as with the fire alerts, but it stays on the high pitch throughout a long sounding period.

The pattern of wet weather begun last year is continuing on into 1973, with Hall County in the wettest condition it has been during April in years. Fields and terraces are standing under water. Well over nine inches of moisture have been recorded since Jan. 1, and considering the winter and early spring months are normally dry months, it makes one wonder what May and June will be.

A drive over the territory shows that small lakes are appearing where no lakes have been before. Last Wednesday evening, the area received a big rain, then on Thursday the wind blew so hard that sand filled the air and it was so bad that highway travel was restricted due to reduced visibility. Friday, Saturday and Sunday were beautiful spring-type days which made the Easter Weekend a lovely spring.

Citizens during periods of tornado warnings need to observe special safety caution. Driving an automobile on wet streets rushing to a storm cellar in blinding rain and hail storm is dangerous, because there are always others doing the same thing. You have a lot better odds taking your chance with a tornado than being involved in a traffic accident.

The spring tornado season is a time when we all need to be aware of the dangers from threatening weather. Memphis and most of the rural homes around this area are equipped with storm cellars. These are used frequently.

### Briscoe supports area's goals

Gov. Dolph Briscoe is never more impressive than when he comes to North Texas. The state's chief executive showed his genuine concern for this area last weekend when he flew to Vernon to dedicate a new junior college, traveled on to Electra to officially open a new manufacturing plant and finally departed the area from Wichita Falls.

The governor is a firm believer that education opens the doors to opportunities, and he dedicated new Vernon Regional Junior College to that end. Himself a native of a rural area, Briscoe realizes the importance of maintaining stable economics in the smaller communities, and he emphasized at Electra his desire to apply emphasis in that direction. Briscoe repeated he is asking creation of the Texas Rural Development Commission to operate through his office in efforts to strengthen rural areas and small towns in their bids for new jobs and better living.

Training centers such as the Vernon junior college fit into the over-all Briscoe plan. The Record News believes the governor's interest to be sincere, and it is vitally needed if the population movement to urban areas is to be stemmed. We hope urban legislators are made fully aware of the situation and will join Briscoe in improving economic opportunities in the smaller towns.

Briscoe's determination to keep the state's operations within the means of existing revenue was stressed in his Wichita Falls stop. This also is commendable. Not to do so would only burden areas, such as ours, that are trying to lift themselves onto the road of prosperity.

The case against more state taxes Everyone knows that taxes have gone up in recent years.

But how high is up? One measurement, recently received by The Dispatch from the Tax Foundation, is that the average American spends two hours and 34 minutes of his eight-hour working day earning the money to pay his combined local, state and federal taxes.

That's 32 per cent of his time. About one dollar of every three earned by the average citizen is now utilized for taxes.

The total tax bill averages about \$4,500 per household, which is \$2,000 more per household than the average only ten years ago.

Small wonder that most Americans believe it's time to hold the line on taxes.

While federal requirements amount to most of the tax burden, state demands are also heavy.

During the fiscal year that end-

ed last June, taxes paid to the state rose by \$8.3 billion to \$59.8 billion—an increase of 16 per cent over the previous year.

Nationally, state tax collections per capita have risen dramatically since 1967. In those five years, the average state tax bill has gone up from \$161.92 to \$288.35 per person, according to the U. S. Census Bureau.

Over that period, the Texas per capita tax has climbed 80 per cent, compared to the national average of 78 per cent.

Sooner or later, we're all agreed, the Texas Legislature must come to grips with effective measures to impose spending controls.

Some ideas are catching on, such as forbidding House-Senate conferences on appropriations from increasing the spending level above that voted by the two houses (a common and expensive practice in past years), and requiring legislative committees to give accurate estimates of the cost of each bill (price tagging).

Both of these reforms should be written into law as well as being incorporated into legislative rules.

Other proposals have met considerable opposition, including a constitutional system of executive budget control. Gov. Dolph Briscoe recommends establishment of a Budget Commission.



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Another proposal calls for a review by the Governor of all state spending on a quarterly basis, so that the Executive Department will have some means to deal with unneeded spending.

Yet another proposal which could lead to greater economy is authority for the Legislative Budget Board to conduct audits on the efficiency of state programs. Every successful business has some means of reviewing its programs and imposing quality controls. The state government, however, lacks an adequate system to monitor these programs.

There are a number of other commonsense approaches to economy, but space does not permit us listing them here. Suffice it to say that at long last Texas may be taking the path to curbing taxes—new ones, at least.

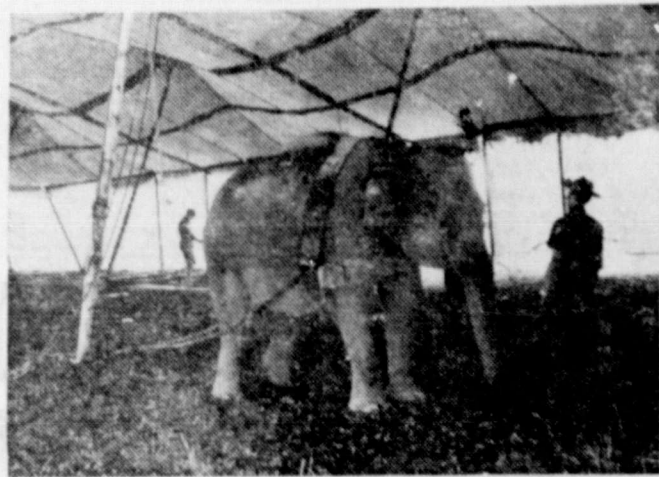

## Self-Employed In Hall County Number 626

NEW YORK, April 23 — In Hall County, new businesses are being born all the time.

Despite the difficulties and the pitfalls involved, with each succeeding year an additional number of local residents, anxious to be their own bosses, embark on new ventures.

They give up their jobs and the security of a weekly income, gather together the money they have saved or can borrow and take the plunge. Some buy existing businesses and others start new ones from scratch.

Many of them are inadequately financed. They do not have enough capital to carry them through the lean early years. Others are handicapped because of insufficient know-how of the field they are entering.

However, although the hazards are great and the odds are heavily stacked against a new business lasting more than two or three years, there are many that succeed very well.

Evidence of that is to be seen in the fact that no less than 626 residents of Hall County make their living from their own businesses or professions, according to the Department of Commerce.

They are the storekeepers, the doctors, the farmers, the barbers, electricians, gas station operators and the like.

In terms of the number of people in the local area who are employed, it means that 27.5 percent are self-employed.

That is above the ratio reported for many areas of the country. The average, in the United States is 7.7 percent and, in the West South Central States, 9.5 percent.

Nationally, most individually-owned businesses are in some kind of retail trade, the figures show. That is the field that attracts many of the people who are just

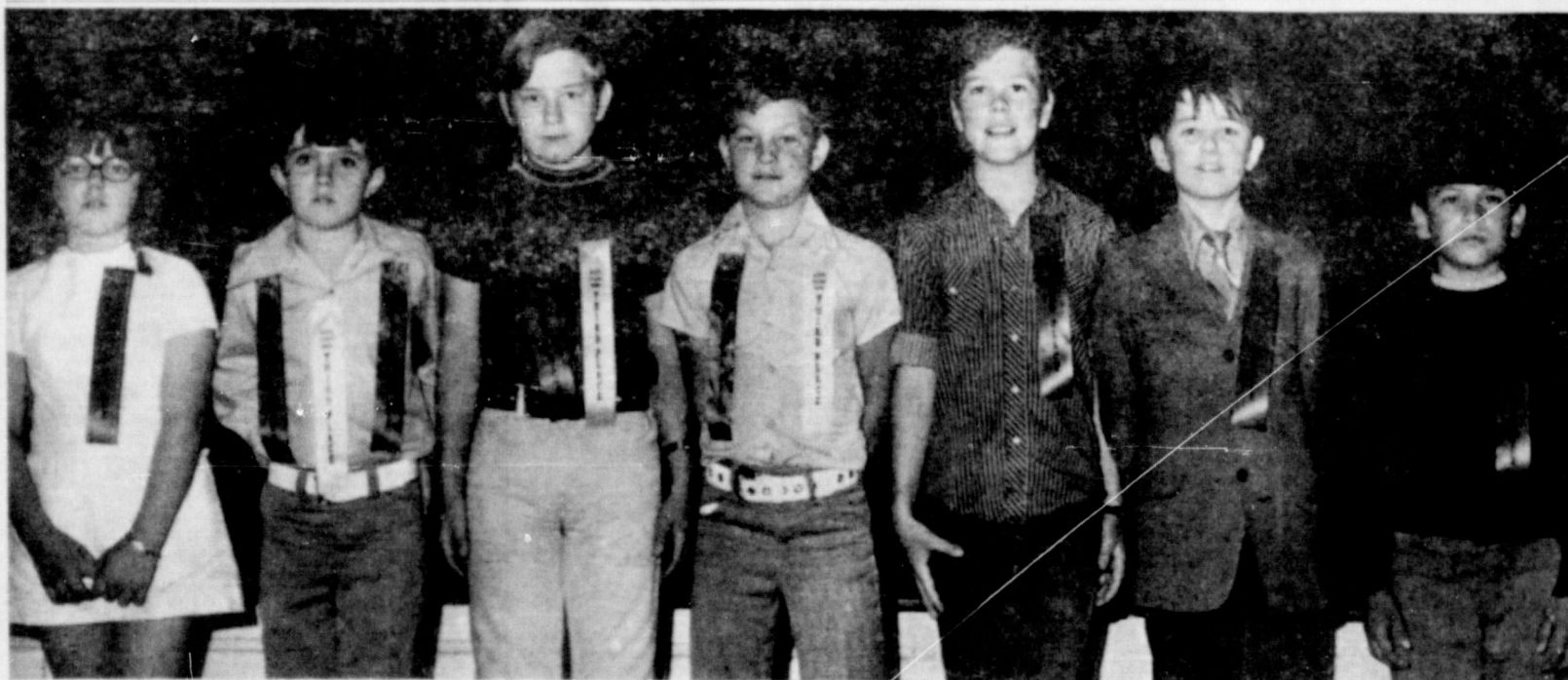
## Ramona Ballew To Work In Summer Mission

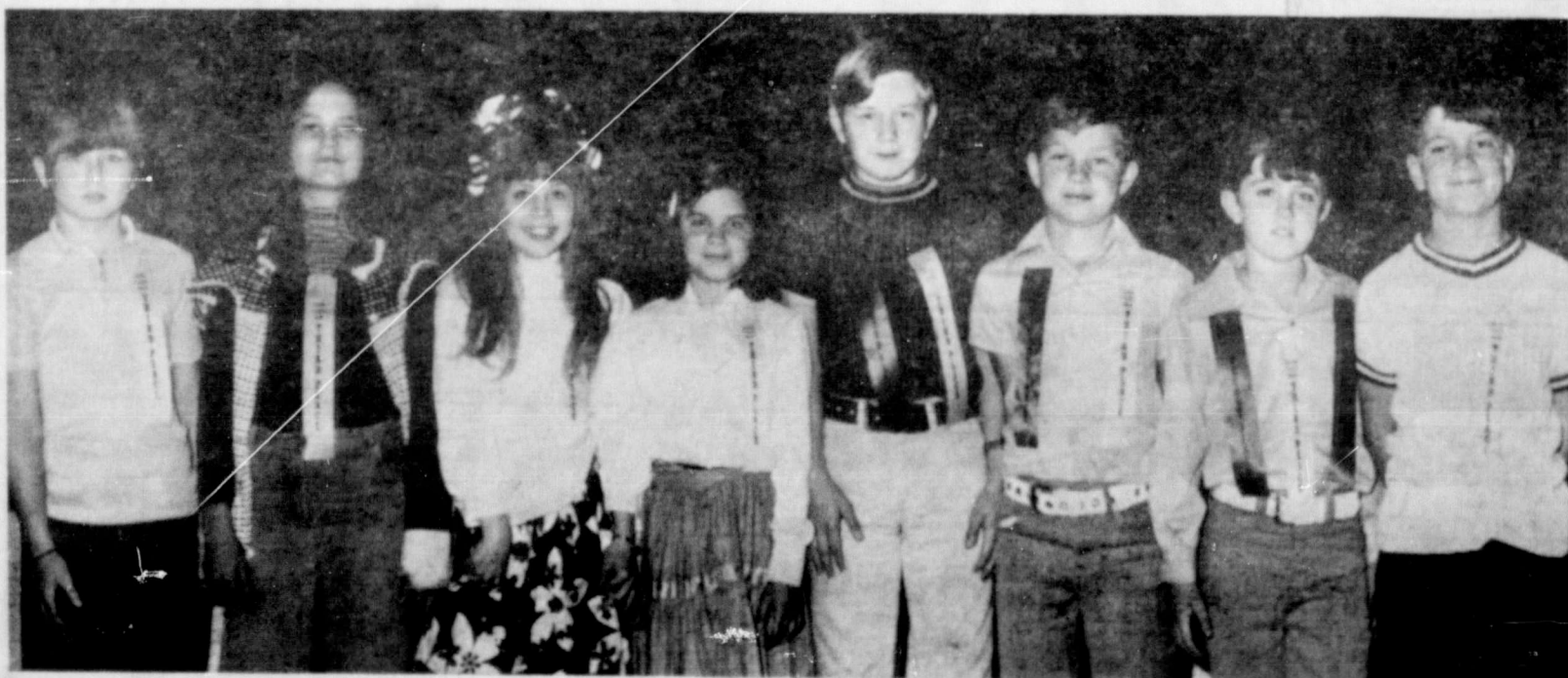
She will report to California Baptist College at Riverside, Calif., for orientation and training and then will be taken to her field assignment along with a group of other college summer missionaries from across the nation.

**Multi-Colored Texas Soil Map Now For Sale**

A multi-colored general soil map of Texas has now been published and is available for sale to the public, a local conservation official said this week.

Henry Gregory, district conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Memphis, said the beautiful 36-by-45-inch map can be seen in his office. It shows soil information compiled from years of detailed soil survey work by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Gregory said the map lists basic soil information which should be useful to teachers, planners, conservationists, contractors, engineers, developers, realtors, farmers, ranchers, researchers, and others.

The map gives color delineations of the 73 major soil associations (containing 161 separate soil series) in the state and their extent. It also lists special limitations of the soils that affect their use.

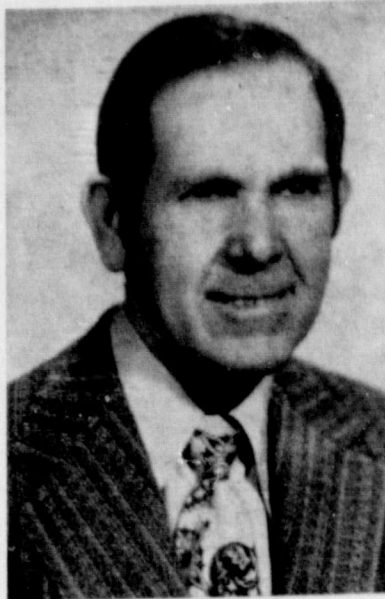
Inset maps show rainfall, temperature, and length of growing season across the state. Current and potential urban and rural uses by soil associations are also listed.

Published cooperatively by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Soil Conservation Service, the map is available in two sheets or printed front and back. Printed front and back, the map costs \$3.00. Printed on two separate sheets, the map costs \$4.00.

For mounting on a wall, Gregory recommended the two-sheet style. For folding and filing, he said the map printed on both sides might be the best.

The map may be purchased from the Department of Agricultural Communications, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.
