Well, you might ask, isn't the ause of this increased demand?

An affimative answer to that question has to be followed by a significant "but." Yes, the present high demand for farm promean a substantial boost in cash receipts down on the farm this year. But, the irony of the situation is that this increase in farm prices is being accompanied by an even sharper rise in farm production expenses. As a result, the food and fiber production this year is not expected to be a high as it was last year.

Too bad, you say, but what does this have to do with me? More than you think. Threefourths of our food and fiber production is coming from less than 600,000 farmers who sell more than \$20,000 worth of farm products a year. These farmers not only operate on extremely thin profit margins and have to gamble on weather and other risky elements, but many of them also carry a heavy debt load because of the great amount of capital required for today's modern farm efficiency.

Consequently, when inflation cuts into the farmer's net return as it's doing now-is seriously threatens his very economic survi-

Last year, the number of farms in this country dropped by one per cent and this year a further drop of .4 per cent is indicated. Perhaps this sounds like a small percentage but think back to that less than 600,000 farms" again.

Since almost every family has a relative or friend who at least dabbles in oil painting and has been good enouh to share a painting or two I think it would well to ng job he was doing consider the cleaning and preservation of an oil.

First, determine if a varnish or other finish has been applied after the painting was completed. If not and it has been three to six months since it's completion it should be applied.

Two commercial finishes are available and maybe applied by the layman. They are a varnish (gloss) and matte (dull). It is extremely important that the painting be free of dust and grease film before anything is applied. This should be done by rubbing the surface gently with wads of absorbant cotton lightly moistened with turpentine follow ed immediately with dry cotton wads. The painting should be laid horizontally and the surface supported from behind. Continue the same position to apply the finish.

The finish is brushed on (thin coats) according to directions on the container.

As to the choice of finish, paintings done in darker colors usually prefer the gloss while the matte seems to compliment the lighter ones; however it is a matter of personal preference by the owner or the artist. Both em-Marie and Katherine. phasize colors in the paintings and give it that all important protective coating which can be cleaned without disturbing the paints.

Farmland In Hall County Up In Price

NEW YORK, May 12-What price farmland in Hall County How much have land values gone up, locally, in the last few years?

The competition for farm properties, as they become available. has become more intense than

Farmers are bidding against one another in the desire to enlarge their acreage and attain operating efficiency through the use of more sophisticated machinery.

Also, as pointed out by the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago in its recent Agricultural Letter, the large farms are able to achieve economies in the purchase of supplies and equipment and advantages in the marketings of their products.

It finds that the boom in farmland prices reached a peak, nationally, in the past year. They were 10 percent over the preyear-to-year gain since 1951.

In Hall County, as elsewhere, the values have been zooming upward. Back in 1964, farm real estate in the local area averaged \$93 per acre, according to the Census of Agriculture taken that year. The figure represents the price of land plus the buildings

Throughout the State of Texas, at the time, the average value of such property was \$106 per

Now, nine years later, farm real estate has reached a record high \$170 per acre, the statewide average as of November, 1972, according to the latest findings of the Department of
