

Tourism, More For The United States!

The United States of America, which used to be the promised land for immigrants of many nationalities, is no longer look. ed upon as such by citizens of the rest of the world, but due to the changing monetary system, the old U. S. of A. has suddenly become the world's ideal vacation spot.

The U. S. News and World Report Magazine this week proclaims: "From Europe, the Orient, Latin America, all corners of the world, foreigners suddenly are deciding that this country is an ideal vacation spot.

At a time when the U. S. dollar needs all the help it can get, foreign tourist currency could certainly become a big blessing to this country.

What has happened to reverse the trend? I. Double evaluation of the dollar in the past 18 months-thus lowering the price of American products in terms of foreign currencies-has made dollar costs a "bargain" for visitors. New Pesticide Law To Affect Farmers

Persons engaged in farm operations will need to comply with certain emergency regulations in the use of organophosphorous pesticides beginning June 18. The regulations come under the Occupational Safety and Health to County Extension Agent W. B. Hooser.

This federal act establishes regulations where employers are plements. obligated to follow certain standards in assuring a safe and healthful workplace for their em-

The temporary regulations are effective through the 1973 crop year and concern only those at high speeds so steer it with pesticides with a phosphorous base that are considered highly Among these are diazinon, malathion, methyl parathion, paration and disulfoton (Di-Sys-

Under the new guidelines, employers are required to do the

1. During pesticide application, remove all employees from the field who are not engaged in the application.

2. Prohibit employees from reentering a pesticide treated field until a predetermined safety period has passed.

3. Post written warning signs as indicated by the regulations and give oral notice if necessary. Maintain records of all

warnings, both written and oral. 5. Supply protective clothing and equipment to all applicators, and provide safe methods of cleaning such clothing and equipment after use.

6. Maintain certain sanitary equipment and clothig change areas and storage areas away from food and water.

7. Maintain first aid supplies and a supply of portable water for emergencies in reasonable vicinity to any field being treated with pesticides.

According to Hooser, the emergency regulations are published in the May 1, issue of the Federal Register. Information is also available from the U. S. Department of Labor or from individual congressmen.

Public hearings will be conducted on the regulations before they are retained past 1973.



Extreme care is essential when entering or crossing a road with a tractor or other farm equip-Act (OSHA) of 1970, according ment. Make allowances for the additional time needed to turn with a trailer or other long im-

When traveling on a public road with farm equipment, pull over when possible to let traffic pass. Be sure to signal turns and check for passing vehicles before

With a tractor moving 15 to 20 miles per hour and a car travelling 60 to 70 miles per hour, there isn't much time only a few seconds—to react once a motorist sights a tractor in




