"Mr. Hagy originally felt due to the sandy conditions of the soil at the dam site, the dam possibly might have seepage. The dam, due to its weight, apparently is holding without seepage so Mr. Hagy would like to raise the planned water line by about six servationist Gregory said.

It has been several years since this area has received information concerning a plan called, "Red River Chloride Control Project" which has been in the planning stage for several years by the Dept. of Army's Corps of Engineers. This week information was received with the invitation for area citizens to participate in planning the project.

According to Col. John G. Driskill, District Engineer, Corps of Engineers for Tulsa District, meetings will be held in the study area to discuss the project. Citizens will be notified of these meetings and invited to attend to express views and learn more about the project. In the meantime, citizens can write to "Red River Chloride Control Project" Tulsa District, Corps of Egineers, Post Office Box 61, Tulsa, Okla., 74102.

Congress authorized the Red River Chloride Control Project by two laws. A project to control three salt areas in the Wichita River Basin was authorized for construction by the Flood Control Act of 1966.
