Bentsen Says 'Good Compromise' Made On 1973 Federal Highway Act

My most difficult coming to the Senate, recently completed as Chairman of a Senate which negotiated the 1973 Highway Members of the U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen

approved the measure the following month," the Senator said. A few weeks later, the House passed its version of the bill, and on May 7, a Conference Committee convened in an effort to iron out differences between the two measures.

"The Conference was one of the most difficult that has ever been held. House and Senate negotiators met 29 times, bargaining for more than 120 hours over a period of some two and one-half months. During this time I offered a series of compromises, seeking to end the seemingly irreconcilable disagreement over the mass transit issue. On several occasions the situation seemed hopeless and negotiations bogged down," he said.

Good Compromise

"Finally, though, Conferees on both sides accepted a proposal I submitted in an effort to meet objections of both sides midway, and a bill was agreed upon. The measure approved by the Conference Committee represents a good compromise between those who feel that the Highway Trust Fund should be used only for highways and those who want some of this money to be used for rail mass transit," he said.

Under terms of the compromise agreement, no money from the Trust Fund can be used for any form of mass transit during the first year of the bill. In the second year, communities will be permitted to use up to \$200 million of Trust Fund money for the purchase of buses. And, during the third year of the Highway Act, up to \$800 million will be available for either bus or rail mass transit.

"I recognize the burning need to provide better mass transit facilities in the densely populated, urban areas of Texas. But, I don't feel there is enough money in the Highway Trust Fund to build both rail transit facilities and the highway our state still needs.

"The compromise highway bill, though, by postponing use of the Trust Fund for rail transit for two years, gives Congress time to find an alternative method of financing transit systems; such as, perhaps, a separate Trust Fund," Sen. Bentsen said.

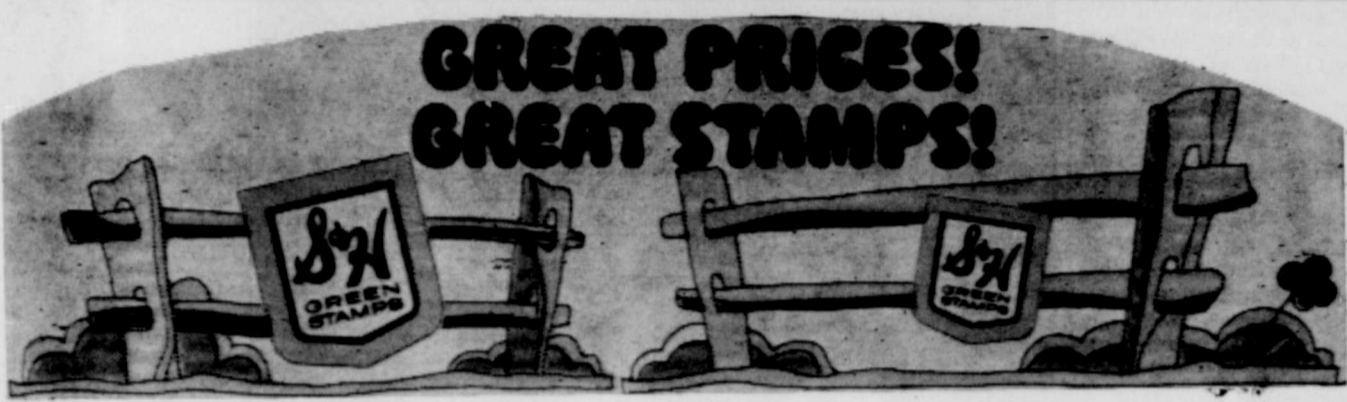
