## Lowery Johnson, Former Resident, Dies March 15

Lowery Johnson, 85, a former resident of Memphis died last Friday, March 15th in Weatherford. He was a resident of Jacksonville, Fla.

While in Memphis, Mr. Johnson was Superintendent of the Memphis Cotton Oil Company, and Staff Poet of the Memphis Democrat.

He built and operated Cotton Mills in Texas, California, and Turkey for many years. He was a chemist, taxidermist, inventor, a dinner speaker, poet and a lance writer.

He is survived by two sons, Ed Johnson of Carrollton, Tex., and Charles Johnson of Weatherford, Tex.; two daughters, Betty Johnson of Pueblo, Colo., and Shelia Whitmore of Wichita Falls; two brothers, Clifford Johnson of Hedley, Bill Johnson of Memphis, and George Johnson of Childress; and several grand-children. His wife, Pearl, died about 8 years ago.

Funeral services were conducted in Weatherford at 1 p. m. Sunday, March 17. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery in Jacksonville.

He was a Methodist and a Member of the Memphis Democrat.

Absentee balloting in all these elections begins 20 days prior to the election date.

Four men are seeking aldermen positions for the City of Memphis, as no races are contested. These include: for ward number one, Homer Tribble, for ward number two, Michael Branigan, for ward number three, Rayford E. Hutcherson, and for ward number four Will E. Leslie.

This election will be in the Councilroom of the Municipal Building in conjunction with the school board trustee election of Memphis ISD, April 6.

Two men are seeking two positions of the Memphis ISD trustee election. These include M. C. Allen Jr. and Loyd Becker, both incumbents.

The Esteline City election and the Esteline ISD election will be held in the City Hall Building in Esteline on April 6.

Gene Jouett and Billy Bob "Rab" Holland are seeking the two positions on the Esteline ISD board. Harlen Hood is seeking the position on the Hall County School Board from the Esteline Precinct.

Handling the election for the Esteline School will be Arthur Eddleman, judge, and Mrs. Carl Hill and Mrs. Eula Adams, clerks.

## Memphis Track Team Takes 2nd Place Saturday

The Memphis Track team placed second in the Clarendon meet last Saturday, behind Shamrock, and the point difference was in the 20-point range. The local squad, however, is showing improvements in most events.

One of the disappointing things to happen was the 440-yard relay performance. The local team placed fifth with a time of 46.3, after experiencing difficulties. This quartet however expects to do better this week in competition in the Memphis Track Meet Saturday.

The 880 runners, Ricky Douthit with a 2:09.9 for first place and Jay Campbell with 2:12.4 for third place picked up several points.

Bobby Hall ran a 15.8 in the high hurdles to place fourth. This is his best time of the season.

James Beck ran a 51.8 to win the quarter mile and Jimmy Melton ran a 24.6 to win the 220 dash.

Ricky Spruill ran a 10.6 in the 100 for fifth place. McKay placed sixth in the mile run with a 5:21; and Ricky Douthit took third in the 330 hurdles with a 42.0.

The mile relay team won first with a time of 3:39.0. Ricky Spruill, Wayne Davis, Ricky Douthit and James Beck competed in this event for Memphis.

In field events, Ben Smith placed in pole vault with a 12'-6" mark, while Don Davis took fourth at 10'. Beck took second and Spruill third in the long jump, both at 19'5" and Beck took third in the high jump.

## General Telephone Co. Of SW Is Repricing Rural Customer Rates

SAN ANGELO—Rates resulting from a rural repricing program, inaugurated in Texas earlier this year by General Telephone Company of the Southwest, have been modified, but basic philosophy of placing the cost on "cost causers" has been retained, according to a statement released by the company.

Announcement of the change followed a reevaluation by the company after customers in some of the more than 50 exchanges where rural rates had been upped under a new repricing system complained that the price increase was too great.

The reevaluated rural rates which result in decreases will be retroactive and the effects of the changes will be shown on customer bills as soon as possible; however, it is anticipated that it may be June 1, before the work required to make the change is completed. Reevaluated rates which result in increases will not be retroactive.

Notices will be included with bills when the revised or reevaluated repricing program becomes effective.

The revised repricing of rural rates involves changing from five to seven zones, the nearest zone extending one mile from the base rate area (BRA) which approximates the city limits and the most distant, 25 miles and beyond from the BRA. Mileage will be increased for single party customers from 75 cents to \$1.00

for each quarter mile from the BRA.

The company statement pointed out that the percentage of increases under the reevaluated program will vary from customer to customer and may still range up to 100 per cent in zones 15 miles and more from BRA, where only three per cent of the rural customers reside.

General Telephone of the Southwest earnings in 1973 were the lowest in 20 years and many services throughout the company are being repriced under the philosophy of placing the cost of service on cost causers — or those using the service.

Charges for new installations, moves, coin telephones, specialized PBX, PABX and other telephone services used by business customers have been or are being increased.

The administrative costs of arbitrary name changes in the telephone directory, handling non-published telephone numbers, reserving telephone numbers, processing of returned checks, are other charges that have been or are being adjusted by the company as rapidly as possible to more nearly cover the cost of these services.

For example, why should the customer who never moves subsidize the cost of customers who do move?

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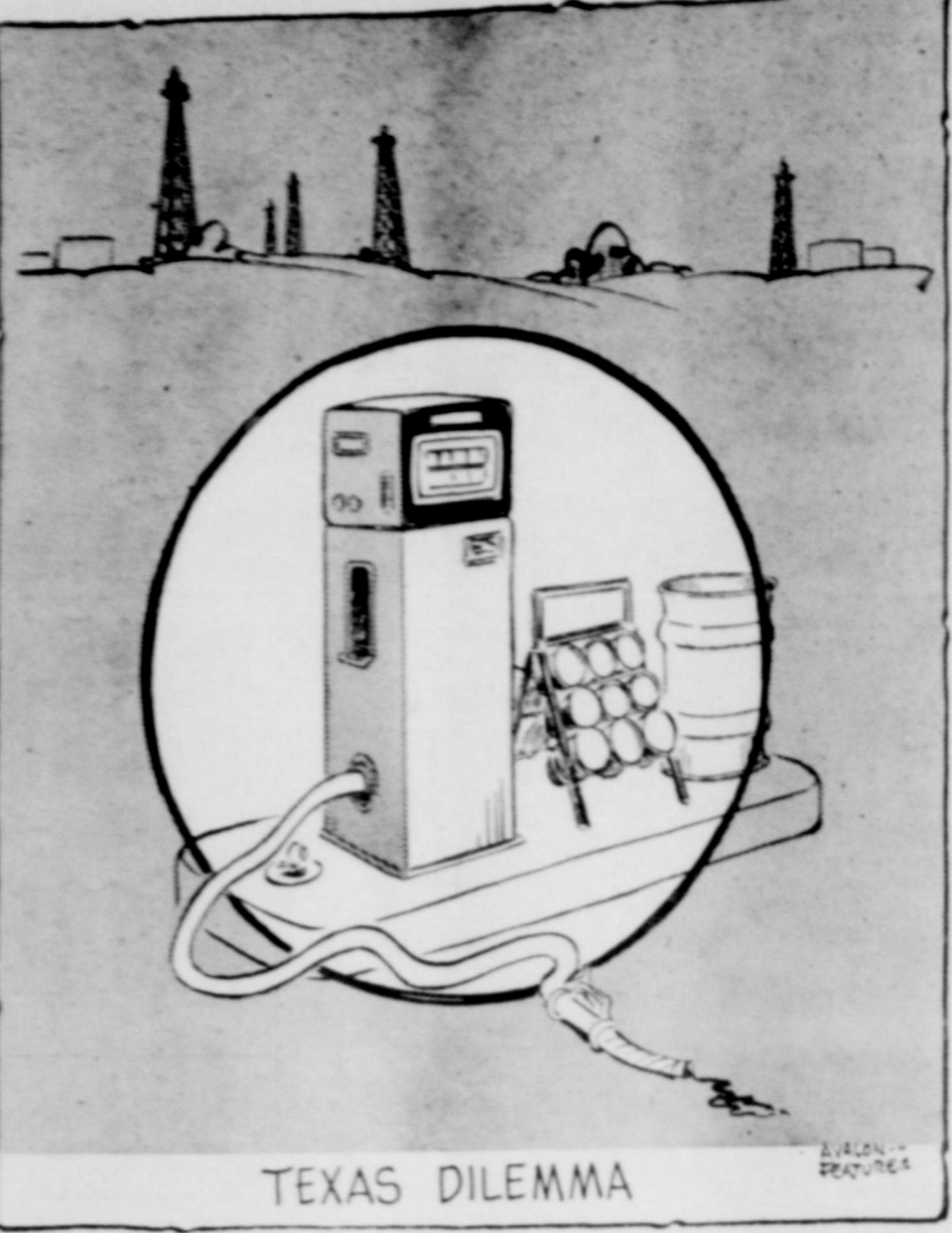
EDITORIAL
Mandatory Death Penalty!

The U. S. Senate went on record in favor of mandatory execution for certain crimes as part of legislation which would restore the death penalty. The capital punishment bill is expected to go to vote before the Senate this week.
The bill would provide the death penalty for treason, espionage and other crimes which lead to death, such as murder, political assassination, killing a policeman or prison guard, hijacking and kidnapping.
There have been no executions in the United States since 1967. In 1972 the Supreme Court invalidated existing death penalty laws of the states saying they contained too many different standards. It invited Congress to provide new guidelines under which the death penalty could be imposed.
Writing legislation of this nature is a most difficult task for men of the P. S. Congress to tackle. However, if you ask most on the streets of our area, you would find most favor a death penalty.
Some believe that maybe public hanging would be more beneficial to our society for those found guilty of crimes which included death to their victims.
Punishment for crimes include prison sentence of less than 10 years (actual serving time) seems mild, for a convicted murderer, when at the same time a criminal may serve the same sentence for theft or other less serious violations of the law. Also consider the difficult position of the guards in prison who have to control convicted murderers who know that, even if they kill guards they have nothing more to fear except another few years of prison life.
Also, foreign espionage agents feel comfortable going about their business in a land where there is no execution for their type crimes against the nation.
Americans generally feel that life is most precious. Possibly this is behind the movement to abolish the death penalty, and why many states, prior to 1972 Supreme Court ruling, did not execute anyone from 1967 until 1972. Another reason is that many juries found murderers mentally insane instead of guilty of the crimes they were charged with.
This nation needs the mandatory death penalty. Mankind's technology developed into high forms of civilization, but mankind's morality is far slower in development. Serious crime in this country continues to climb. The most recent increase in kidnappings is one example, hijacking another, and we all should fear for all our leaders with political assassination a daily threat.
This nation has also been fortunate enough to miss much of the civic uprisings which have plagued many, many nations of the world. Possibly the reason is the free election system and the "jury system" used by the courts of our land.
Even if the death penalty was mandatory, each member of the jury considering a death sentence conviction, would have to believe, "beyond a shadow of a doubt", that the defendant was guilty of the crime as charged.
Assassinations, shootings, killings, treason and espionage are going on every day. Any student of American history would have to wonder about what would become of the United States in the early days of this nation if legal executions were unlawful. It would bring us to wonder how long a nation could survive.

What Other Editors Say

Advertising And Beef
Anyone questioning the efficacy of advertising might take a long look at some of the problems of the beef industry in recent months.
We are speaking of advertising in its true sense . . . any action that causes a person to think and, hopefully, to act in a particular way, whether it be a classified ad in the newspaper, a billboard, word of mouth testimonial, or all the other devices man uses.
Unfortunately, the most effective advertising can't be bought. The most effective advertising is the personal recommendation of a product or service by one human to another. Perhaps the next best ad is endorsement in an editorial. And then comes the hidden ad in a news story!
For several years, the beef industry has been making a mild attempt to persuade Americans to "eat more beef." Ads were bought in daily papers and magazines, billboards, and of course we all have seen the bumper stickers, usually on pickups.
We suspect that many beef-steaks have been sold because the gastric juices started flowing as persons saw a picture of a juicy steak prepared to perfection or as they were reminded of the nutritional value of this protein-packed food.
But all this advertising was nothing compared to the negative advertising the beef industry received last spring and summer! This negative advertising consisted of selling the public on just one point . . . "beef is too high." One phase of this multi-million dollar negative advertising program was the housewife boycott

down payment!
But beef, like all agricultural products, was one of those items that has long been underpriced, not because the farmer or cattleman was overly generous, less greedy, but because in our economy he had no other choice. He long raised his cattle, grew his wheat or cotton, and stuck out his hand, asking, "What will you give me?" Humanlike, we all assumed this too-low price was the norm. And when for once in a lifetime beef reached parity with everything else man buys, it just SEEMED that beef was too high!
We'd be the same way about buying a \$5,000 car if we had been paying \$2,500 for a model only to find that the new model had doubled in price.
Dried navy beans have increased 500 per cent in price over the past year, with kidney, pinto, lima and the others not far behind. Navy beans are selling for \$51 a hundred, pinto beans \$42! Even yellow split peas have jumped from \$7.75 to \$29.50 per hundred. But we don't see this screamed on television every night! We don't see the price of a new car mentioned, even in the paid ads!
The cattleman, the feedlot, and the communities supported by them, have a vast new selling job to do . . . if they expect to survive.

#### Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.

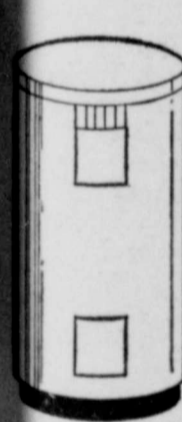

(Continued from Page 1) changes had been "priced out", but the full impact of the cost on customers was not known until all customers had been billed. "The company is still soundly behind the new pricing philosophy of putting the cost on cost causers; however, the reevaluated rates do not provide the revenue necessary to cover the cost of service in rural areas," the statement said. "While our revenue needs are urgent, we are not going to be able to move as quickly as the first review indicated in needed." With the technology now available it is not possible to provide the existing four and eight party rural customers with one party service at the same cost as in urban areas. The cost of providing service has been spiraling rapidly and must be reflected in the charge for service.

# April 1 Is Last Day To Register Vehicles

AUSTIN — Monday, April 1st, is the last day for registering Texas motor vehicles, according to R. W. Townsley, Director of the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department. Townsley noted that owners of motor vehicles must display 1974 license plates by 12:01 a. m. Tuesday, April 2, to avoid penalty. "Unfortunately, many owners choose to wait until the last minute when the lines are longer," said Townsley. "When, in fact, county tax officers and substations have been open for registration since February 1." Townsley encouraged vehicle owners already possessing new plates to put them on. "It's the best advertising we can get in reminding owners that the registration deadline is fast approaching."

nothing is changed in the registration procedure from last year. The renewal form and payment are all the vehicle owner must present at the time of registration.

If the registration form has been misplaced, the owner will be required to bring his certificate of title and last year's license receipt.

Townsley reminded that beginning in 1975, Texas will change over to the 5-year license plate. "We're already manufacturing the '75 plates. That's how much lead-time we have to give ourselves."

In 1976, instead of buying a new license plate, motorists will purchase a 1 - by 2 - inch adhesive-type sticker that will be placed on the upper left corner of the plate," said Townsley. "In 1977, the sticker will be stuck to the upper right corner, then alternated for the following years."

According to Townsley, the 5-year plate will feature an entirely new design, including the use of vowels for the first time.
