The MHS Thinclads won a decisive victory at White Deer Friday by sweeping the District 2-A track meet and bringing home the local school's fourth district championship in four years.

The local team, young in many key positions, won both relay events and qualified several of its members for participation in the Regional Meet.

Whether or not the local team is strong enough this year to capture a Regional championship remains to be seen, but indications are the lads have a fighting chance.

The MHS freshmen had to win first place in the last event of the day, the mile relay, in order to win the district meet. The relay team of Ricky Bloxom, Pedro Salinas, Melvin Norton and Doug Hindman trimmed seven seconds off their best time to run a 3:51.0 to win the event and capture the victory.

Memphis scored 131 and a fourth points for first place, with Wellington capturing 121, Clarendon 84, Claude 75, Wheeler 68, Silverton 8 and Valley and McLean 0.

Pedro Salinas won the 880 run to be the only other first place finisher in the freshmen division for Memphis, but the team has a whole bunch of second, third and fourth places.

This was certainly a satisfying victory for the MHS freshmen.

Thollie Lindley, Jimmy Don Molloy Win Lakeview School Trustee Positions

In elections held over the area, several incumbents were returned to positions on city councils and school boards.

The School Trustee election in Lakeview was an exception, however, as one of the three candidates on the ballot, Thollie Lindley, received the largest majority of the vote, 53, while a write-in candidate, Jimmy Don Molloy, received the second highest number, 24, and captured the other trustee position.

The two other filed candidates Nolan Salmon received 12 votes, and T. U. Hughes, 18 votes. Write-in votes were cast for Jerry Byars, 2, Tony Molloy, 1, and Roy Gene Pate, 1.

In the Lakeview City election, which was a written-in ballotting, Russell Payne, J. C. Stepp and Johnny Fowler were elected councilmen for another term as each were incumbents.

Crime Up Again

The Texas crime rate rose last year by 3 per cent, and across the nation serious crime in the U. S. rose again in 1973 after registering its first decrease in 17 years in 1972.

In the U. S., serious crime rose 5 per cent last year compared with 4 per cent decline in 1972.

Every American has a stake in the fight to lower the crime rate. The safety of our families, our businesses and our neighborhoods demands it.

The crime spiral of the 1960's peaked in 1968 when serious crime rose 14 per cent above the previous year. This was the era of permissiveness, when U. S. Attorney General Ramsey Clark cowered in his office for some four hours while demonstrators sneered at him.

After 1968, public sentiment and a tougher attitude on the part of the courts brought about a lessening of the crime rate increase. Things got better until it took an actual downturn in 1972.

Now crime is back up again. The largest increase in crime is in the robbery category, up 17 per cent over 1972.

As far as we in Perryton are concerned, we can take some consolation in the fact that while the city crime rate rose by 6 per cent in Texas last year, the crime rate was down 12.7 per cent in rural areas.

Our nearest big city neighbor, Amarillo, had an increase of 32 per cent in violent crime in 1973 as compared with 1972. This is not too surprising because all of us remember watching on television and reading in the newspapers what seems to be an almost daily occurrence of a liquor store or drive-in grocery holdup in that city.

There is no major city in the United States where it is safe to

walk the streets alone after dark, and that includes our nation's capitol.

After we in this nation get our fill of Watergate and streakers, maybe we can turn our attention to the problem of how to deal with the criminals who seem to be taking over this country.

whole towns and so few people killed. A lot of good testimonies came in on T. V. among all of the debris. A lot of people lost all of their worldly possessions.

I appreciated the interest shown in the question of the impeachment of any of our presidents of the United States. After gathering information from others and resources of my own, we came up with the answer that we have never had one of our Presidents impeached. The nearest to being impeached was the 17th president of the U. S., Andrew Johnson, in 1868.

He was impeached by the House and tried by the Senate. A 2/3 vote was required for conviction and failed by one vote. He served as President from April 15, 1865 to March 3, 1869.

He was born at Raleigh, N. C. Dec. 20, 1808. His father was a sexton, porter and constable. His father died when he was 4 years old, and at 10 years of age he was apprenticed to a tailor.

In 1826 Johnson moved to Greenville, Tenn. where he set up his own tailor shop. He served as Alderman and as Mayor of his home town. He served in the Legislature and Senate in Tenn. In Foreign Affairs he and the Sec. of State, Seward, achieved, in 1867, the purchase of Alaska from Russia. After leaving the White House, Johnson ran unsuccessfully for Congress. In 1874 he was elected to the U. S. Senate. He was the only former President to become a Senator.

He only served a short session in 1875. He returned to Tenn. where he suffered a stroke and died July 31, 1875. Thanks for the information given me by different ones.

In checking around with our farm implement dealers, I discovered that besides being cotton King of the Panhandle I think we are the main center of the Panhandle for farm implements, which come in green, yellow, orange and red.

The present day college kids may think they have something new and different that never happened before with the streakers. This may have been started in Memphis over 60 years ago, when some men were taking their swim and bath in a swimming hole east of the cemetery. The last one to come out of the swimming hole found all of his clothes missing. It was almost dawn and he sneaked up to the cemetery and was standing behind one of the tombstones, waiting to catch a ride to town. Finally a man came along in his wagon and the swimmer stepped from behind the stone to ask for a ride, and when the man on the wagon saw this, he whipped his horses and raced them into town looking back over his shoulder, while whipping the horses. The next person that came by the cemetery was a cowboy on his horse and when he saw this

streaker step from behind a stone, he used his quirt on his horse traveling as fast as he could to get to town and give his report. The sheriff and his deputy finally decided to check things out at the cemetery after hearing the two reports. They found this man and covered him with their yellow slicker and escorted him home, where he could get some clothing. Some of you old-timers may remember some names to go with this story. I heard the names several years ago, but have forgotten them.

While visiting in Hall County Hospital last Saturday I met Linda Somers of Plainview, Tex., who was a patient with a broken leg and collar bone. She and her husband Ronnie were in a car wreck near Memphis while on their way to Vinson, Okla., where Ronnie is serving as Pastor while attending Wayland College. They will graduate in May. 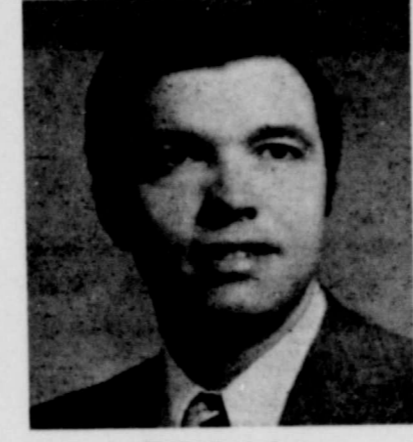

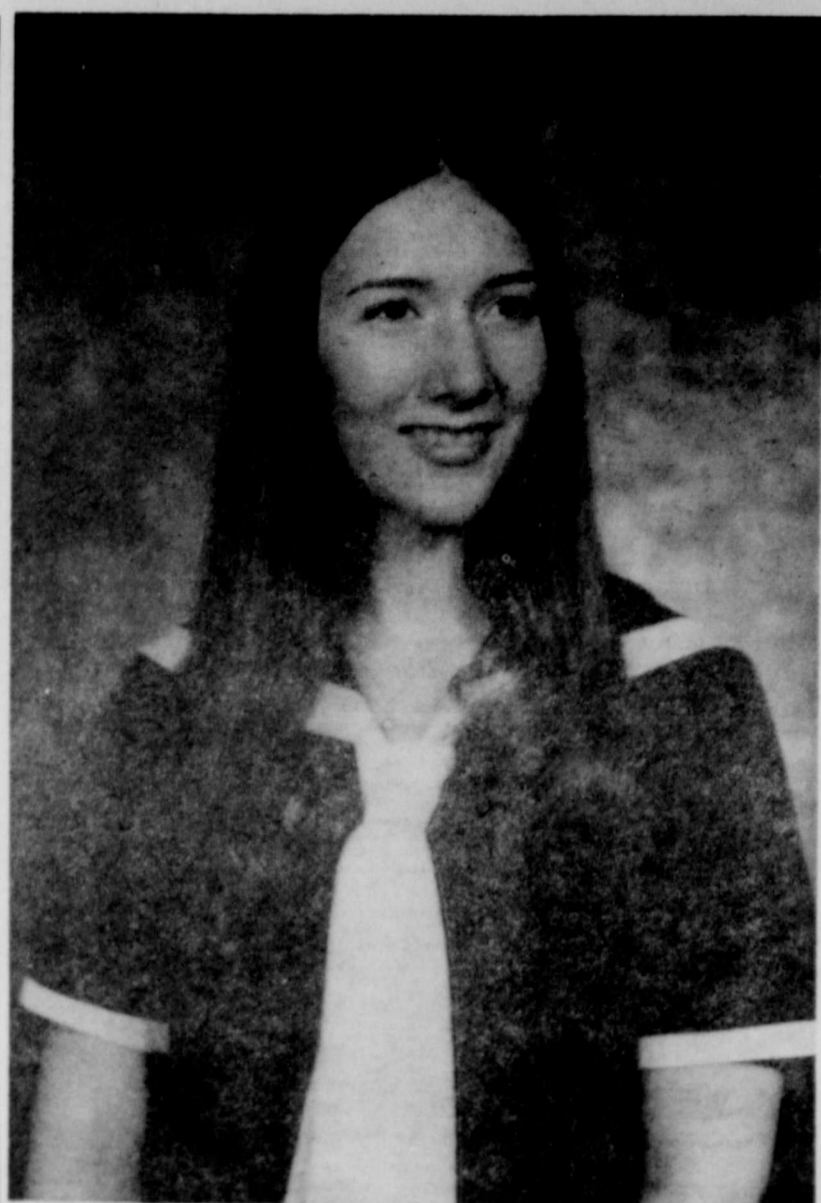

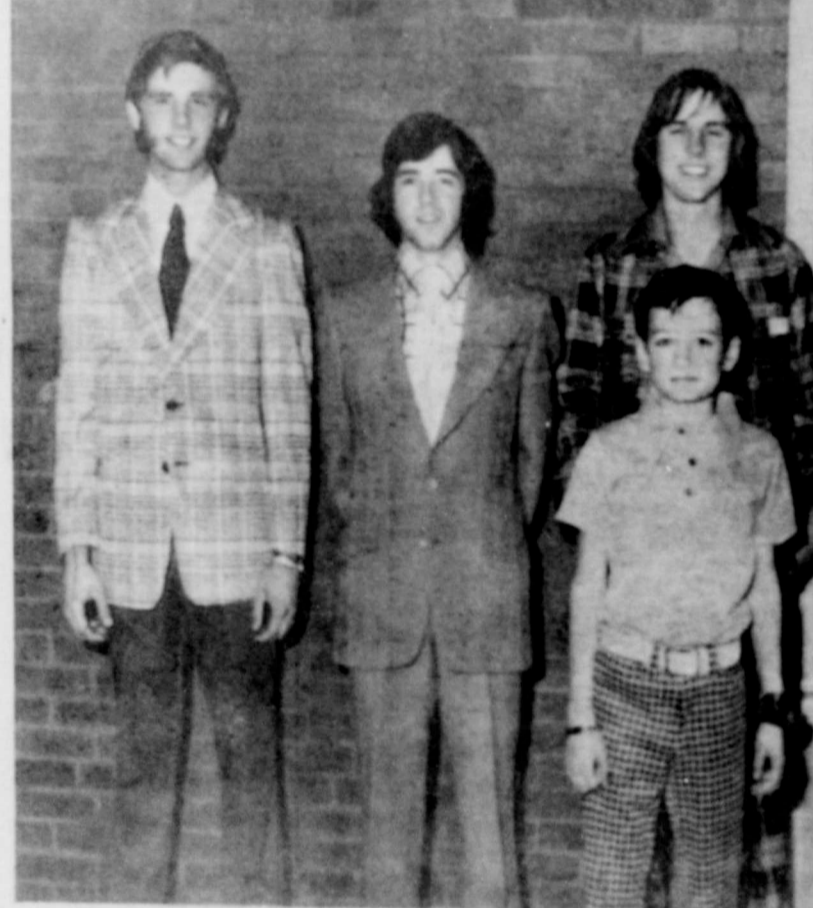
