The public is cordially invited to attend the opening. Prizes totaling \$650.00 will be given away during the opening as well as 50,000 Buccaneer stamps. Refreshments will also be served during the day. Mike Gamble, assistant vice president of the Association, will be in Memphis as temporary manager. Mrs. Peggy Moreman, lifelong resident and former employee of West Texas Utilities Co., will be with the firm as secretary.

Founded in 1960 by R. B. Tanner, Vernon Savings and Loan Association has grown into one of Vernon's leading industries. Last year, the Association paid out \$1,068,632 in interest on savings accounts alone and the firm expects to pay out some \$1,350,000 this year, Mr. Tanner said.

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EDITORIAL

The Gamble of Agriculture

In the world of business, few would be willing to take the financial risks involved in a one shot operation, but that is the yearly choice of agriculturists throughout the world, and here in the United States the financial risks are higher than anywhere else.

Last year, few newspapers or other news media were saying very much about the plight of the farmers because, for the most part, farmers had no plight. Record crops were being made in all areas except where flooding made crop growing impossible.

However, this year is another story. Sampling news stories from county newspapers over this area last week, shows that almost every one had some type of story about adverse conditions for agriculture.

An example is an article from Post in Garza County which states that dryland cotton is losing out to drouth, the first time in 21 years this has happened in their county. Drouth conditions are now stretching into the second year. Not since 1953 when only 12,000 bales were harvested, almost entirely off irrigated land has the county been in such dire shape moisture wise.

Contrast this with Donley and portions of Hall County where some farmers have planted three and four times due to wind and rain and hail. June 20, is now passed and all cotton farmers think in terms of June 20, as the last planting day to get up a cotton crop and not gamble too strongly with the early freeze date.

Modern farming techniques make it real difficult on farmers in switching crops. Many, in order to help with weed control, have used Treflan, or other chemicals, and certain grain crops cannot be planted on this soil, or at least it is not too advisable to try to replant using grain sorghum.

Cotton has continued to dominate as the cash crop for this area, as it has in other areas, however, some farmers continue to experiment with other crops. Some are trying vegetable crops.

Agricultural pursuits are by nature controlled by nature, Mother Nature, we sometimes refer to it. But then markets and supply and demand play a big role too.

The 1974 picture is being considered a "new ballgame" so to speak for agriculture. Farmers in recent years received government subsidies if they set aside certain acreage. This all stopped in 1974.

Farmers this year will receive the market value of their products. If they have no product to market due to natural disaster, a government program is set up to aid them. A limited yield crop is another situation, however.

Meat producers are facing another situation. The meat markets have been on a steady decline for several months. The market is expected to improve but much damage has already been done.

What all this means to those who make their living in agriculture is that there is a great financial risk involved in agricultural vocations. The weather and proper timing of market cycles seems to be keys of success. Fortunes are made or lost on gambles.

But the vital thing for this nation is this, without farmers and ranchers taking these gambles each year, we could all starve to death.

Mankind's development has been great, but this development would have been totally impossible without nature's assistance. The blessing of planting a seed and seeing it multiply many fold is age-old and natural one.

Modern technology has brought about many changes in the life of farmers and ranchers. Farming is more complex with less physical labor, but tremendously expensive as compared to what it was two decades ago.

Because of these ever climbing expenses, farming is becoming a bigger and bigger gamble each year. There is the land and the grasses on the ranges. Each acre must be put to the best and most profitable use. Mismanagement or poor judgement on the one hand, or adverse conditions from nature or at the market place on the other could easily spell disaster for many operations.

One farmer said, "I've planted 55 cotton crops in this county and none of them were alike. Each one had its own problems. Some were planted as early as April and others as late as early July. Yields vary on all of them, from nothing to over a bale to an acre." He has seen farming change from mule drawn one-row planters to six-row air conditioned cab tractors and concludes, "I wouldn't go back, I like it better now."

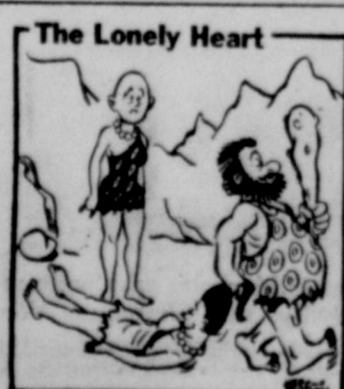

Social Security Benefits To Be Increased in July

The second part of a two-step increase in monthly social security benefits will be included in checks delivered in July, according to Travis C. Briggs social security manager in Amarillo,

Texas. The overall increase will amount to 11 per cent for most people getting social security payments. A 7-per cent increase was included in checks starting in April.

The increase will enhance the financial security of about 30 million people who get social security benefits. People getting social security checks don't have to do anything to get the higher payments. The increase will be added automatically.

Starting in July, average social security retirement payments will go from \$161 to \$181 a month. Average social security disability payments will go from \$184 to \$206 a month. Average survivors payments to a widowed mother with two children in her care will go from \$418 to \$435 a month.

For 1974 the amount of yearly earnings subject to social security deductions has been increased from the first \$10,800 to the first \$13,200, but there is no increase in the contribution rate. Employees and employers will continue to pay 5.8 percent each on covered earnings, and the rate for self-employed people drops to 7.9 percent.

The Social Security Administration is an agency of the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The Amarillo social security office is at 317 East Third St. The phone number is 806-376-2241.

Mr. Porter is a graduate of West Texas State University with a degree in agronomy. Mr. and Mrs. Porter are members of the Baptist Church.

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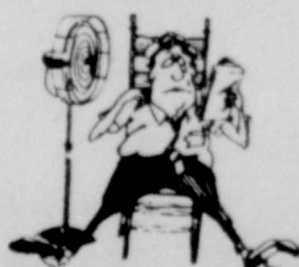
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Vernon Abram Is Outstanding Workshop Student
