City Paving Project Is Underway

The City of Memphis has let a contract to do seal-coating on a portion of the streets in Memphis, this being the northwestern portion of the city.

This street work is a continuation of work the City leaders have planned starting three years ago. The southern portion of Memphis was done summer before last, and the central portion last summer.

City streets, however, were hit by heavy rains during past summers, which has created strains on city budgeting to keep up with street repairs.

The work under this contract began on June 21 and is to be completed by July 20.

The bid, which is subject to alterations, was let to C. R. Caperton and sons construction of Hereford for \$15,174.00. The firm submitted the low bid of 27 cents a yard.

Two other firms submitted bids each at 44 cents a yard, City secretary A. L. Gailey, said. Other firms bidding were J. L. Miligan, Inc., of Amarillo and Hi-Plains Pavers of Plainview.

The City entered into the contract with enthusiasm due to the attractive figure submitted by the low bidding firm.

The city has endeavored to keep city streets (previously paved) in good repair by seal-coating and applying gravel, and yet try to remain within budget limitations. This is one of the reasons the City fathers chose to split the paving project over a three-year period.

But when huge rainfall floods the streets, washing off gravel, washing out streets, and causing unexpected damage, problems develop and costs of repairs climb.

Motorists are urged to extend every courtesy to crews as they work and cooperate in every way.

The City Council met Tuesday night in the July session, and discussed re-codification of existing ordinances at length and a new code will be adopted at the August meeting.

This is a process where all City ordinances will be brought up to date.

The Council authorized the Health and Sanitation committee to purchase a new insect fogging machine, since the old one is not repairable.

Mayor Kenneth Dale said it might be sometime before a new machine is available. All efforts to repair the old machine, which is over 30 years old, have failed.

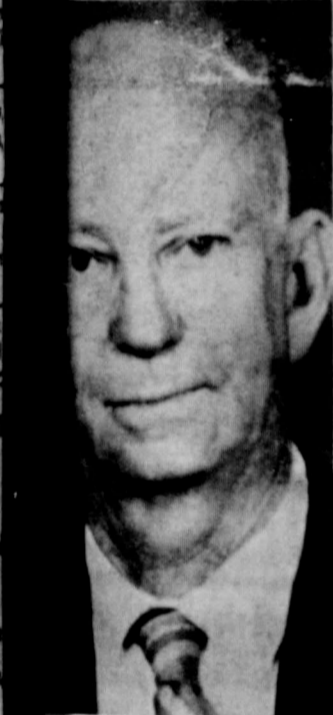

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EDITORIAL July 4th of 1974!

The United States of America is almost 200 years old 198 to be exact, and the whole nation is making plans for the 200th birthday, the Bicentennial. Each state, county and township has some kind of plans or the other for the celebration.

But 1974 is the starting point of these activities and a lot will have to be done the next two years to make the celebrations successful.

One historian wrote recently that the history of this country is full of situations which create national crisis or emergencies of one kind or the other. So far, this democracy has withstood all of them.

It would seem that when a nation, and its citizens, were on the eve of preparing for a huge celebration of numerical importance, such as a centennial, that everything would be calm and smooth throughout the land.

But this historian said that a democracy just doesn't work that way. When things are torn up, citizens concerned with what decisions and activities are going on in their seats of government, corruption is discovered and aired to public view, men of power are discovered in misuse or dishonesty, and in general, everything appears to be in a real mess, than democracy is growing and progressing.

What many times is called this nation's darkest hours have proved to be the greatest advancement points in our history, in every aspect of civilization and materialistic progress.

It takes depressions, wars, civil disorder, corruption, crime, assassinations, dishonesty and all the bad things to force citizens into correcting situations which must be corrected.

In writing on present-day problems, Watergate, pollution, energy crisis, soaring population, shortages of all kinds and raging inflation, the historian points out that throughout the history of our nation these same types of problems confronted our forefathers.

In conclusion, the historian had only one fear about the state of the union. As long as Americans demand a government by law, rather than government by man, and keep military forces under control of government rather than control of military leaders, and as long as Americans are involved in and participate freely in elections of leaders, democracy will continue.

"Should each of us neglect our right to vote, or yield to a government of men, rather than a government by laws, we have little hope of surviving as a nation of free men," the historian wrote.

There is nothing new in this message. The theme has been covered many, many times before, yet sometimes, we as citizens, get to thinking that things need to be straightened out. Leaders rise up promising to do things that sound good to us so we support them. Later we discover their promises are better than their actions.

The healthiest sign we see is the concern of citizens about the state of the union and about the future of this nation as a world leader. Fear not from enemies without, but be watchful of those within, who do not have the concern of the nation at heart.

More Americans will live through the July 4th holidays this year because of the 55 mph speed limit. We wouldn't slow down to save lives, but we did to conserve fuel. Think on these things.

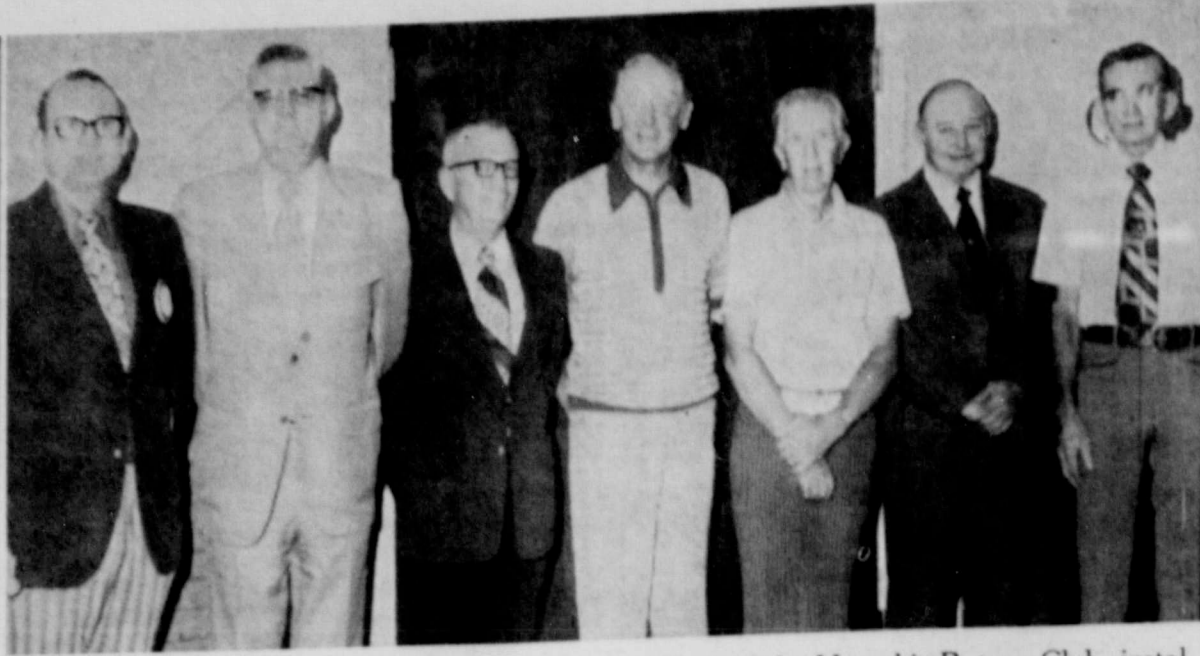

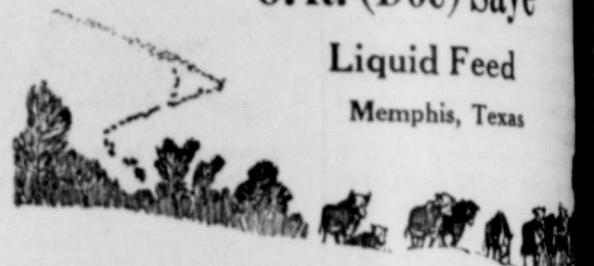

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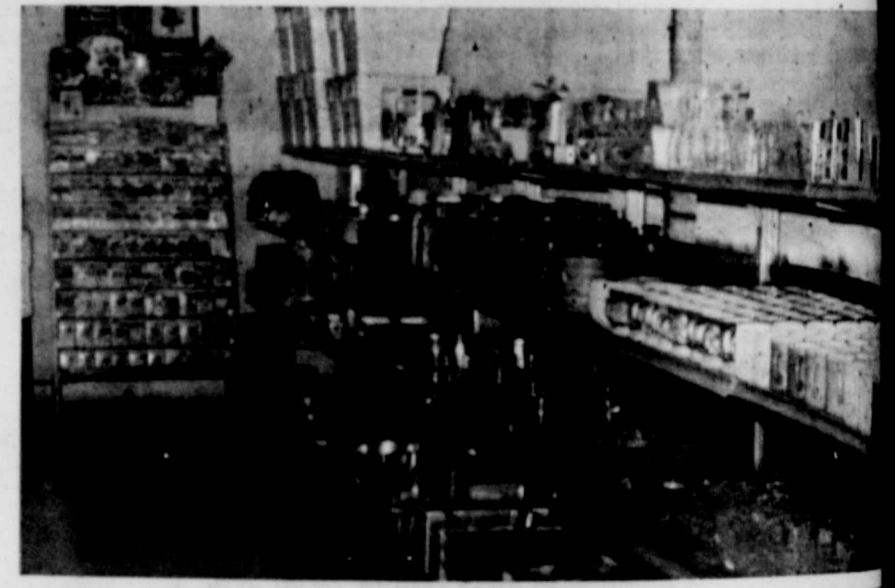
