## Daughter of Paul Morris Dies In California July 12

Funeral services for Mrs. Margaret Helen Hanes were held Tuesday, July 16, at 2:30 p. m. from McMillian Mortuary in Gardena, California.

The Memphis Country Club's "club championship" tournament will be held Saturday and Sunday with an entry fee of \$8.50 per golfer. This year the tournament will be 36 holes medal play with golfers flighted into 8-men flights at the end of the first 18 holes of play following Saturday's round. Saturday's round will count in totaling the final flight winners. The winner of the championship flight is considered the Club Champion for the next 12 months, and gets to keep an 18-inch trophy and have his name placed on the name plate. This trophy was begun in 1966 when the late Jay Dunbar was the club champion, and the plate lists Dunbar in 1966, Bill Combs in 1967, Danny Scarbrough in 1968, Larry Parks in 1969, Danny Scarbrough in 1970, and 1971 and 1972, and Bill Combs in 1973. It was decided by the tournament committee this year to give trophies to winners in all flights, so that school-age golfers may compete in the tournament. The committee has planned for six flights. The tournament should attract a big field of golfers participating, as the date has been set for several months and most have made plans to play. Larry Parks will be out-of-town. He was runner-up last year, but all the other top contenders have indicated they will compete. The tournament committee indicated that if there are several golfers (over eight) in close contention for the club championship, the top flight can be extended to include these golfers following Saturday's round. Golfers will be allowed to play their rounds anytime during the day and they can choose their own groups to play in, it was announced. Sunday rounds will also be left up to the golfers, but they probably will want to play with golfers in their own flight. It is almost a tradition that the championship groups go off between one and one-thirty on Sunday afternoon, if spectators want to watch the last round of play.

## EDITORIAL

### A Two-Way Street

A United States Supreme Court ruling last week reaffirmed the Constitution's guarantee of a free press. In its unanimous decision, the Court declared unconstitutional a Florida law requiring newspapers to give a free and equal space to political candidates who feel they have been editorially attacked.

The Court held that there is no Constitutional "right of reply" which requires newspaper editors to provide free space, on demand, to citizens who want to express contrary views. One commentator summed up the decision in a few words: "The Constitution requires that the press be free . . . it does not require that it be fair."

Most of us who are the self-appointed guardians of the free press, the editors and publishers of the country's newspapers, would readily agree with the Justices that the press is not always "fair"; and that there is no way in which it can always be. "One man's meat is another man's poison," as the old saying runs. Or to put it another way, one man's fare may be another man's foul.

Your particular beef may be choicest tenderloin to you but pure bull to your neighbor.

So the Supreme Court will not enforce a "fairness doctrine" on the press which the Constitution never envisioned in the first place. Justice White recognized the problem, and the dangers inherent in it, in a concurring opinion: "Regardless of how beneficent-sounding the purposes of controlling the press might be," he declared, "we prefer the power of reason as applied through public discussion and remain intensely skeptical about those measures that would allow government to insinuate itself into the editorial rooms of this nation's press."

Thomas Jefferson, one of the original authors, put it more succinctly: "Were it left for me to decide whether we should have a government without newspapers, or newspapers without a government, I should not hesitate a moment to prefer the latter."

We're glad we were never forced to make that choice. We have Constitutional government in this nation, and we have a Constitutionally-free press, . . . and while they have often been at odds in our two hundred years of nationhood, they have always been able to co-exist, and that is one of the great strengths of our Union.

Neither the government nor the press is either monolithic or omnipotent, and as long as we guard our Constitutional freedoms carefully, neither will be. Nowhere does the press hold a monopoly power over the public opinion. No license is required to publish a newspaper in this country and give free rein to your opinions . . . but there are controls: Because it is also true that no law requires any citizen to read one word of what any editor writes, or to agree with it if he does.

"Freedom of the Press" in the United States of America is a two-way street . . . the Press is free to speak its editorial mind, and the People are equally free to read or ignore, or to choose which newspaper they want to read or ignore, and the choice is great. Neither end of this avenue of communication is controlled, and neither should be.

#### Egg-Painted Raisin Cookies



Baking raisin cookies is one thing. Painting them is another. That makes two great summer activities for youngsters. Saucer-size cookies are cut out with a two-pound empty coffee can which definitely adds to the drama.

The big plump California raisins are inspirational, artistically as well as gastronomically. They make an eye here, a nose there, and maybe the sly grin or scary scowl. Simply mix egg yolk with food colors for the paints and set them on the half-shell in the egg carton. You'll probably need some shaggy and sparkly cake decorations, too.

#### RAISIN EGG-PAINTED COOKIES

- 1 cup butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 4 cups sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 1/2 cups California raisins
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Cream butter and sugar; add eggs one at a time. Sift flour, baking powder, and salt into butter mixture and blend. Stir in raisins and vanilla. Chill dough. Roll dough about 1/4-inch thick. Cut out cookies with an empty 2-pound coffee can. Bake at 375 degrees for 15 minutes. Makes 10 cookies.

### What Other Editors Say

#### Impact Protection

Some years ago we met Col. John Paul Stapp, then a member of the U. S. Air Force who had achieved international recognition with his daring experiments on a rocket sled to determine how much stress a human body can stand.

Col. Stapp, who is also an M. D. and a Ph. D., established the land speed record of 632 miles per hour on a rocket sled in 1954 and rode the sled hundreds of times in carefully controlled tests to see what sudden acceleration and deceleration would do to a human body.

Thus this man has perhaps the best qualifications in the world to judge the effectiveness of the proposed mandatory air bag on American passenger.

Col. Stapp says the air bag isn't worth the effort.

He cites five "fall dangerous" characteristics. It may inflate on first impact and provide no protection on subsequent impacts; it may injure a passenger who is bending over or turned to one side; it offers little protection against side impacts.

These are reasonable observations and carry a lot of weight when made by a man with Col. Stapp's qualifications. Yet our bureaucrats ignore him, and every other critic, and pursue a relentless course which will require all automobile manufacturers to install air bags within the next couple of years.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration insists that air bags must be installed. Chrysler Corporation got a court

order a while back delaying the order on the grounds that no tests they have been able to devise have made the air bag fool-proof and thus places the company in danger of fine by the government for non-compliance.

The NHTSA, under the skillful prodding of Ralph Nader, is bent on putting air bags on every car made in this country, hopefully by 1976.

Air bags will cost at least \$335 a car, Col. Stapp and other gives them five "fall dangerous" strikes and urges safety straps instead; there still is no assurance that a manufacturer will have good enough test results to prove he is in compliance with federal regulations.

No doubt there are many ways to improve highway safety and we seem to have a lot of people studying the problem.

It is beginning to appear, however, that the biggest need right now is some method to protect motorists against impacts with federal bureaucrats who are intoxicated with power.

tain 1.25 billion records on Americans. The little publicized report is scary, to say the least.

The four-year study found that some agencies kept data on race, income and drug addiction, that only 10 per cent of the data banks were authorized by law, more than 40 per cent of them did not tell people that records were kept on them, about half did not allow persons to review and correct their files and about 29 banks were concerned primarily with derogatory information.

Senate investigators said their study was extremely difficult because the various government agencies would not cooperate.

The right of privacy, guaranteed by the Constitution, is obviously being flagrantly violated by the federal bureaucracy. As Sen. Sam Ervin has said, "legislation is needed to keep Americans from being numbered, punched, processed and filed away."

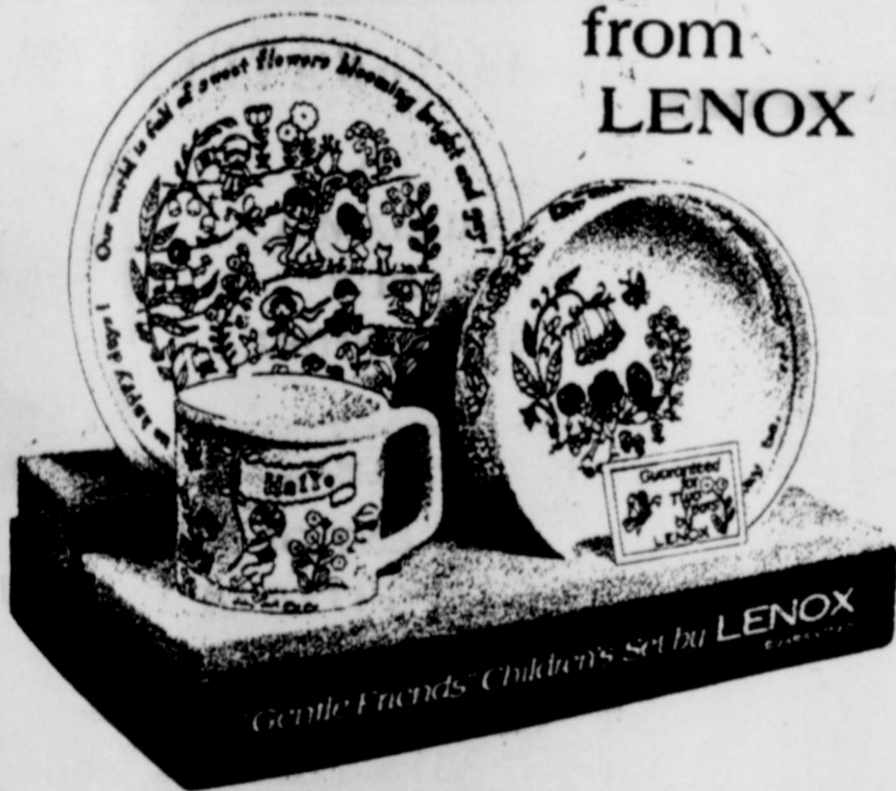

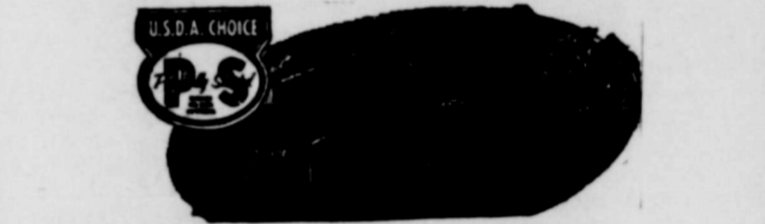

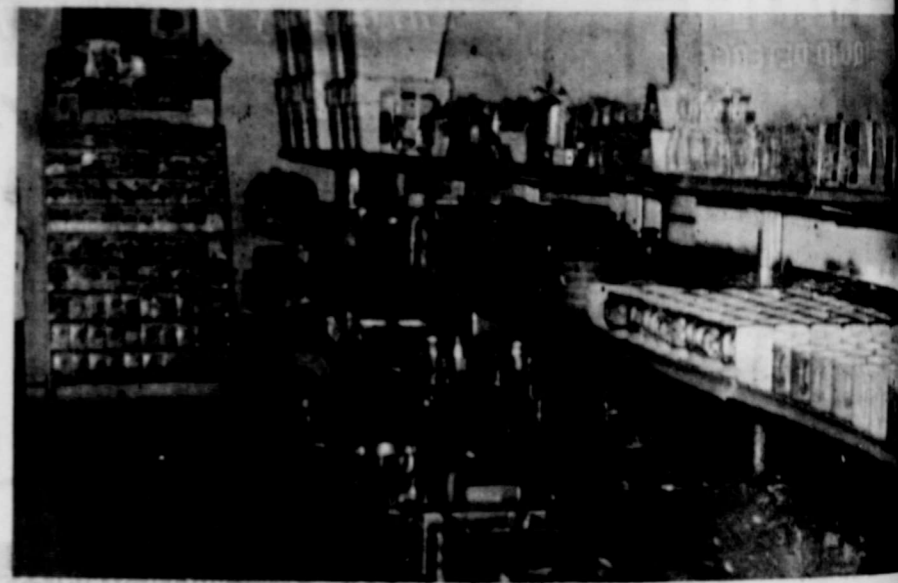
