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EDITORIAL A New President!

The drafters of the U. S. Constitution almost 200 years ago foresaw many, many situations, but it took almost two centuries for a situation to come about where a President would resign from office and another man, not voted upon by the people of this country, to come into the office of President, upon the vote of Congress, rather than the vote of the people.

History students from today onward will have to commit to memory yet another unique aspect of the Democratic form of government and the week of August 5 through August 10, 1974, will be well read by students of government for centuries to come.

Gerald R. Ford, 38th President of the United States, addressed the Congress and the American people Monday night, and remarkable as it may be, this was the first time many Americans have gotten to hear the Michigan (from Grand Rapids) Republican, a former member of the U. S. House of Representatives, deliver a speech.

Richard M. Nixon, has quietly retired to San Clemente, Calif., after resigning from the office of President, before almost certain impeachment by the U. S. House of Representatives and a trial by the U. S. Senate. Mr. Nixon's support in the Senate had dwindled to only 15, shortly before his announcement to resign.

The whole turn of events since November, 1972, is almost unthinkable. The ticket of Richard Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew experienced tremendous popularity at the polls, despite reports of the break-in of the Democratic National Headquarters before the Democratic Party National Convention.

It took months and months of investigation by the Nation's news media, before governmental officials started formal investigations.

Then, another bombshell struck with the resignation of Vice President Agnew, which brought about the appointment of Mr. Ford as Vice President, the first man to be appointed to that office in the history of the country.

President Ford left no doubt that he will make an effort, as his top priority, to combat the inflationary spiral, and some leaders in government indicate his approach may resemble that of Harry S. Truman, as he will be more open and accessible to the people.

We wonder if a man of Gerald R. Ford's background, winner of 13 elections to the House of Representatives, a minority leader in the House, could have won his party's nomination to the office he now holds? He is a man who has been helped by Democrats and by labor-union officials in past years. He is a moderate in legislation and a conservative in spending and monetary matters, according to his own admission.

All that is being written about him paints a picture of a man who is "straight as an arrow," projects sincerity and integrity and who has some of the old-fashioned virtues that people are still interested in.

Americans, either bored or disgusted with Watergate, nervous about rapidly rising inflation, hope to see national government leaders working and pulling together.

A government of the people, by the people and for the people, seemed to have a hollow ring, in light of past revelations.

President Ford will have three years in office before he will finish out Nixon's term. Many are predicting that he is the front runner now to capture the Republican Party's 1976 Presidential nomination.

President Ford wishes to restore faith in Government, combat rising inflation, continue President Nixon's foreign policies, and cooperate and work closely with the House and Senate in writing new legislation. Most of all he wants to be remembered as a good President.

These aims correspond with popular feelings of most Americans. Considering the events which brought Gerald R. Ford into the White House, after he was retiring as a U. S. Representative, one can't help but wonder what the future will hold.

30 YEARS AGO Aug. 17, 1944

Forty thousand pounds of scrap paper were shipped out of Memphis to paper manufacturers on Wednesday night and Thursday morning, thus meeting the government's challenge for all-out collection of salvage paper. The salvage paper was collected by the Boy Scouts, and they will continue the drive for the next 30 days.

At the 'M' System watermelons are 2c a lb., Lelia Lake Cantaloupes are 10c each, and sugar is 71c for 10 lbs. A year's subscription to the Memphis Democrat is \$2.00 for area residents and \$2.50 for others. The Firestone Deluxe Champion Tire can be purchased for \$16.05 at E. E. Cudd, N-D-Pendent Gas and Oil.

Rain averaging from nearly 3 inches in Memphis to one half inch in the west side of the county, revived prospects for a near normal crop and broke a prolonged drought and devastating heat wave, Thursday morning. Choose the cycle that is precisely appropriate for the clothes you are washing. Is a "hot" temperature setting really necessary? Except for heavily soiled items, most loads will come clean in either a cold or warm wash. Look into cold wash detergents.

Use the least amount of detergent that will get your clothes clean—most loads require only an ounce or less!
Overloading causes extra strain and wear on your equipment—check the manufacturer's recommendations for load weight. Balance your load by alternating small and large items.

For Safety Sake
Be sure control is "off" before reaching into your washer.
If one is necessary, use only a heavy duty extension cord.
Be sure your washer is grounded.
Keep dry cleaning agents, color remover and glass out of your washer. If a good idea, use a wash clothes containing cleaning fluids in your washer.

Hightower Makes Statement On President Ford
