### President Ford's Inherited Problem

President Gerald Ford has accepted a massive callenge, attempting to straighten out a sick economy, plagued with high inflation, beset with this country's sixth postwar recession predicted to be the longest and most severe.

When President Nixon took over the Presidency from the late President L. B. Johnson of Texas, the country was fairing pretty well as far as the economy was concerned. Interest rates pleased with market prices and the nation was concerned with the war in Southeast Asia.

Nixon's election victory was called a victory for conservative government and his major support came from industrial leaders and conservatives.

Nixon said all the right things, balancing the budget, fighting inflation, curbing government spending, making peace in Vietnam.
