## Cyclones Battle Skyrockets Fri.

The Memphis Cyclone and the Wellington Skyrockets open the 1974 District 2-A campaign against each other Friday night in Cyclone Stadium with kick-off set at 7:30 p. m.

The Cyclone, 3-0 in non-conference, will probably have the favorite nod of the Skyrockets, a team which has a 1-2 season mark going into the crucial district opener.

The Wellington-Memphis football game is one of the traditional neighborhood rivalries which produces exciting contests on the gridiron even in those years when the two school are not district competitors, and even more so during years the teams compete in the same district.

The Rockets dropped their season opener to Hollis, Okla., 12-0, then defeated Paducah 28 to 0, before losing to Childress 34-0 in their last outing.

The Cyclone defeated Childress 14-12, Crowell 6-0, and Lubbock Christian H. S. 16-6.

"Wellington has a good passing ball club and they also try to mix it up with the running plays. They utilize nine different offensive formations (that we know of) but their basic attack is based around QB George Brewer who is a competent field general," Coach Clyde McMurray said.

Co-Captains for the Rockets are Jim Bob Nall and Steve Emmert.

District Opener "This is a must game for us,"

Coach Clyde McMurray said, "and our team has been working hard preparing for this contest. Our defense has put in some extra time in study and preparation."

Offensive line starters will be ends, Buddy Ballew and James Beck, tackles Kenneth Fields and Candy Reyes, guards Matt Mounzinger and Gary McKay and center Ed Hutcherson. The backfield will have halfbacks Fred Alexander and Charles Bryley, fullback Don Davis and quarterback Ricky Miller.

Defensively, up front will be Isaac Narvaez, Duck Richards, Don Davis, Kenneth Fields and Audie Moore, linebacker Gary McKay and Candy Reyes, rover back Joe Reyes, safeties, James Beck, Rickie Spruill and Dick Hutcherson.

About Lubbock Christian Coach McMurray said that the coaches were glad the game finally ended over at Lubbock. "We got a lot of good out of the game, which lasted so long it was like getting two games of experience," he said.

Homecoming activities for students and fans of Memphis High School begin at 8:30 p. m. tonight with a bonfire on the south end of Cyclone Stadium parking lot.

The Memphis Junior Varsity and Eighth Grade Whirlwinds will be in Wellington for games tonight. The 8th graders begin at 6 p. m. and the JV's at 7:30 p. m.

The Memphis 7th grade will host Wellington 7th grade at 4 p. m. this afternoon.

The Bon fire, a traditional activity of MHS for Homecoming, will be lit at 8:30 tonight, and the Band, Cheerleaders, and a large crowd will be on hand to ignite the spirit of the Cyclone players.

A pep rally will begin at 3:15 p. m. tomorrow in Cyclone Gym and fans are invited to attend this event.

At halftime of the Memphis-Wellington game, a Homecoming queen will be crowned. Candidates are: Miss Sheri Davis, escorted by Phillip Bray; Miss Debbie Roden, escorted by Jimmy Melton; and Miss Connie Miller, escorted by David Cofer.

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## EDITORIAL

### Standard Time Bill!

Members of Congress, the House and the Senate, have finally come to a semblance of common sense with the passage of a bill to return the nation to standard time during the four winter months. It is remarkable that the Senate passed the measure without debate.

If President Ford signs the bill, as expected, clocks in virtually all sections of the nation will be set back one hour on Oct. 27, and the nation will observe standard time until next Feb. 23, when clocks will be rolled forward one hour—beginning an eight-month period of daylight saving time.

The Senate Commerce Committee has estimated that last January, February, March and April, the nation saved 100,-300 barrels of oil per day because of observance of daylight saving time.

On the other side of the coin, however, the American public found that getting up and beginning the day in total darkness, sending children off to school before dawn, was distasteful.

Most citizens had added trouble getting school children to bed an hour earlier in the evening, and dragging them out of bed the next morning was a nightmare in reality. Some schools tried to adjust their starting times to make the situation as "liveable" as possible, but the old clock still has a major hold over everyone's life and it's hard to make an hour's shift without upsetting the whole routine.

Adults, for the most part, just stayed up until midnight, (which normally was 11 p. m.) and then lost an hour's sleep when they had to rise before dawn in the morning. Sleeping habits, established during long years, are not broken by the mere changing of the hands position on a clock.

We welcome the return of standard time for the four winter months. At least this is a step in the right direction.

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

### What Other Editors Say

#### Unpardonable

When President Ford said, shortly after taking office, that he considered it "inappropriate" to consider a presidential pardon for his predecessor in office until the judicial processes had been completed, we thought he was absolutely right.

And when he acted abruptly on Sunday morning to issue an unconditional presidential pardon to ex-President Richard Nixon for any and all misdeeds committed during his term of office, even though the judicial processes were barely begun, we think he was just as absolutely wrong.

His unprecedented action in issuing a pardon even before formal criminal charges had been brought against Mr. Nixon effectively cuts off the judicial process, and short-circuits our entire system of criminal justice.

The act of pardon, and the immediate statement of contrition from Mr. Nixon, do in effect constitute a verdict of "guilty" . . . and if you accept the official story that those two acts came about independently and without prior consultation and agreement, you are entirely too naive.

So Mr. Nixon is deprived of "his day in court" . . . a deprivation which the ex-president will no doubt accept with considerable equanimity. But Mr. Nixon is not alone in this deprivation. The people of the United States, who were the injured parties in all of this, are also deprived of their day in court, and justice has not been served. The people are at least entitled to know the full nature and extent of the crimes for which their former President is being prematurely pardoned, and to have all doubts dispelled.

Others involved in the crimes against the people for which Mr. Nixon is being pardoned must also become the victims, or the beneficiaries as the case may be, of this uneven-handed justice. What of those, such as John Dean, who provided evidence which helped to end a political reign of terror in Washington, who are already serving prison

sentences for their subordinate crimes? And what of those yet awaiting trial . . . those closest to Presidential power, Haldeman, Ehrlichman, and Mitchell? Can they now be tried for their crimes, when their leader has been pardoned for his?

The scales of Justice have not only been tipped, but loaded. We believe that this Presidential pardon is unpardonable.

Sam was public when in school his teacher sent him to store to buy a whip. He could give him a whipping. The time he got back to school the teacher cooled off and not use the whip. He remembered Mrs. Bragg, his teacher in Memphis schools, who had a whip with holes in it that made a stinging. He attended the University of Texas and worked for the Texoma and Continental Companies. He worked for the American Stove Co. out of Virginia for almost a century before retiring. He was in West Virginia, where his Texas sweetheart came to him and they were married (Billie Burton). He has four daughters and one son. Clinton retired from the Southern Union Gas Co. He has two sisters now. Thelma in Shreveport, La., and Mrs. Lee in Memphis. He remembered in the early days when the F. W. & D. 

## Cyclones Win 16-6 Over Lubbock C. H. S.

The Memphis Cyclone finished the non-conference portion of the 1974 football season with a 3-0 record after defeating the Lubbock Christian High School Eagles 16 to 6 Friday in Lubbock.

The Cyclone took the opening kickoff with Charles Bryley snatching the wobbling kick about the 20-yd. line and returned it 10 yards to the Memphis 30.

FB Don Davis cracked through for seven yards, then added one more to the 38. On the next play, HB Bryley battled his way for three yards and a first down.

The next two plays were disappointing as Davis managed a single yard, then QB Ricky Miller was dropped for a 10-yd. loss. On a third and long yardage, QB Miller rolled out and passed the football to End James Beck who was all alone in the flat and 40 yards later Beck was knocked from his feet on the Eagles 30.

Fred Alexander got the call on the next play and blasted his way for 10 yards to the Eagles 20. HB Bryley made a penetration to the 15-yd. line on the next play, then on the power sweep, Bryley broke into the secondary and was tackled on the one-yd. line. As he was going down he stretched to put the ball over and the ball slipped out of his hands and James Beck fell on it in the end-zone for the TD.

J. D. Evans tried to point after touchdown kick but the ball just barely missed the left-hand upright and the score was 6-0 with 8:30 left in the first quarter. The scoring drive covered 70 yards in 9 plays.

The second Cyclone TD came in the second quarter.

Highlighting the drive was a 27-yd. pass from Ricky Miller to End James Beck for one first down and another 35-yd. pass from Miller to Beck setting up the scoring play, as Beck was tackled on the Eagles 4-yd. line. The scoring play was a carry by FB Don Davis who squeezed his way over from four yards out. James Beck shifted to tailback for the extra point play and blasted into the endzone for the two points.

In the third period of play, the Cyclone picked up another two points when a deep snap from center sailed over the Eagles punter's head and across the endzone line giving Memphis a safety.

The only offense the Eagles was able to mount was in the third quarter following the second-half kickoff. They marched down the field and scored with FB Dennis Willis taking the ball over from the six-yard line. This drive accounted for six of the Eagles 10 first downs, and one of these came on a 15-yard penalty against the Cyclone defensive
