

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There is no general agreement on what has caused inflation and certainly no agreement on what to do about it. President Ford has asked all of us to spend less and tighten our belts, but practically nobody has yet given up a single simple comfort in the name of inflation fighting.

In our area, where the cattlemen are shell shocked and the farmers are nervous over price prospects, there ought to be a simple and clear statement that would reassure folks in the agriculture areas. But here again, we don't seem to have much of an agreement. There are those who want a return to the government subsidy and guarantee plan but others are just as adamantly opposed to it. Any candidate with strong opinions on agriculture finds various segments of that industry in disagreement so he can't take a strong stand.

About the only understandable thing that can be said about the sconomy right now is that it's bad and something ought to be done about it.

That's a reasonably sound opinion. The trouble is, nobody disagrees with it so candidates can't fight about it, and after you get past that point nobody knows what anybody's talking about.

With the issues so cloudy, and learcut answers so few, this Congressional race will likely be settled, as most of them are, on the basis of personality.
