

Jack Hightower, Our New Representative!

We express the general, popular feeling of our citizens when we say we are proud of, and proud for, State Senator Jack -Hightower who won election to be U. S. Representative from the 13th Congressional District.

He will be dropping the title of Senator and taking on a title of "Honorable" or "Representative" when he is sworn in to office in early January. The title "Honorable" is one that somehow seems to fit like a glove on this man, a native son of Hall County.

News media personnel, especially from the Amarillo area, seemed to express disbelief that Hightower would sweep to victory by such a large percentage, especially after Incumbent Bob Price, up to the eve of the election, said that he was the leader in the race and would be re-elected.

Obviously, opinion polls were not too accurate in judging this race. This was the second major political victory pulled off by Hightower this year, as he won the primary race over two opponents with 65 percent of the vote carrying in all 33 coun-

The term "depression" meaningless to most local people since they never experienced one personally. There hasn't been one in the Unitd States since the 1930's. Two-thirds of those now living in Hall County were not alive then or were too young to remember it.

To the other one-third it brings back some bitter recollections. It was a time when industry ground almost to a standstill and when millions of workers lost their

Might it happen again? The consensus among the experts is that it is most improbable because of economic safeguards created since then.

What was it like, generally, during the 1930's? According to U. S. News and World Report, unemployment reached 25 percent, which is over four times the rate in Hall County at present.





- Maintain heating equipment for maximum efficiency by having it checked by a competent
- Dirty filters cause heating equipment to work harder and use more fuel. Check your filters every 30 days. If they're the permanent type, clean them according to the manufacturer's directions. If they're the disposable type, replace them at least every 90 days.
- Don't be a "thermostat jiggler". Turning the thermostat up or down doesn't cause the equipment to heat or cool faster. It simply works longer to satisfy the setting. The national conservation program calls for settings of no more than 68°F. in heating weather. If you are going to be away for several days, lower the temperature
- front of heating registers or return air openings. This blocks the flow of warm air.
- Open blinds and draperies on sunny days to help heat your home during the day but close them at night to help reduce heat loss.
- Keep the fireplace damper closed when the
- fireplace is not in use. Storm doors and windows are not customarily used in this part of the country, but they do reduce heat loss. As a temporary substitute, a sheet of clear plastic stapled or tacked over screen doors or windows works well.
- Keep the opening and closing of doors to a inimum to reduce the loss of warm air.




