#### The Year's End

With 1974 finale fast approaching, and 1975 just a few days away, people's minds are generally filled with thoughts of tomorrow. What does the future really hold for us?

Specifically, for this area, the question is, "What is the future of agriculture?" . . . since most of the income of Hall County comes from agricultural activities.

According to a national news magazine: "Agriculture, in 1975, will remain one of the brightest spots in an economy that has been fading fast. But farming-and related lines of business-will slip below this year's prosperous levels. So say Government's top experts.

At a mid-December conference of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, on the farm outlook, some predictions were made that bear repeating.

- 1. The year 1975 will be another 12 months of all-out production effort in agriculture.



"Bankrupt" is much too strong a term to use for an economy as strong as that of the U. S. But we have devalued our currency. and we have experienced the two effects I've mentioned: Imports cost more now, and our exports are more attractive to foreigners, who buy more from us, which leaves less for us, which raises prices here. Food is an excellent example.
