Myrtle Jenkins Pleads Guilty To Fraud Action

Myrtle Mae Jenkins pled guilty Friday before County Judge Logan Denton to charges of giving "fraudulent statements in order to obtain greater assistance than she was entitled," in a complaint filed by Richard Williams, a Field Investigator for State Welfare Department of the State of Texas.

This is the first such case of this type to be filed in Hall County since the State Welfare Department began auditing Welfare Roles for possible "fraud" cases.

Wichita Falls, Texas has had several cases, as has other larger cities in the state recently.

Myrtle Jenkins was filed upon for "making false statements while under oath" and plead guilty. (Continued On Page 10)

The City Of Memphis, Texas, has received a \$20,000 grant-in-aid from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department according to John Livingston, of the Grants-in-Aid Division.

The \$20,000 will be matched by the City of Memphis to renovate and improve facilities at the Memphis City Park, a project begun in Jan. 1973.

Jim Edd Wines, Project Director, was given official word of the approval of the grant-in-aid from John Livingston Wednesday afternoon late in a telephone conversation.

The first word that the Memphis project had been approved came last weekend when Amarillo news media announced that the Memphis, Shamrock and Amarillo projects were all approved.

The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission had previously approved the Memphis Park Project and endorsed its funding by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Members of the Park Renovation Project committee are W. R. Parker, City Councilman, Rayford Hutcherson, City Councilman, Mike Branigan, City Councilman and Chamber of Commerce, and Larry Parks, Chamber of Commerce.

Project Director Wines has appeared before civic clubs and other clubs and groups during the past months explaining the project and what improvements were being planned in a 50-page portfolio.

Cooperating in the drafting of plans has been the Soil Conservation Service Work Unit.

Generally, the plans call for the improvement of park facilities from picnic areas to landscaping. Memphis is blessed with a fine park facility, and following the renovation completion, it will be even better.

Contracts Let For Area Hwy. Seal Coating

A total of 145,109 miles of seal coating contracts were let in January for the Childress Area work by the Texas Highway Commission, and 6,519 miles will be done in Hall County.

The Hall County project is on FM 2361 and will cover slightly over six and a half miles from Spur 2361 in Memphis, West.

The work, supervised by District Engineer Lewis H. White, will be in Collingsworth, Briscoe, Donley, Hall and Wheeler Counties.

A contract was awarded to High Plains Pavers, Inc. and W. D. Turner Construction Company of Plainview. Low bid was \$698,364.14 for all 19 separate sites to be seal coated.

Cotton Harvest Tops Out At 49,616 Bales

The final season ginning report of the 1974 harvest season was taken this morning by this newspaper's editorial staff and the 12 ginning points reported 49,616 bales, with most gins completed and other reporting only a few bales remaining.

This figure indicates that yields for 1974 were just about one-half the yields of 1973, from the same number of acres planted and the disheartening thing is that prices being offered in many instances are not even half what was paid last season, and about half in others.

The Memphis, Texas, Cotton Classing Offices, of USDA, Agricultural Marketing Service, shut down last Friday for the season, and the last news release from W. E. Cain, officer in charge, indicated the 120,650 sam-

ples had been classed up to Friday, Jan. 17.

Farmers report the only bright thing in the harvest was the price paid for cottonseed at gins which averaged about \$125.00 per ton.

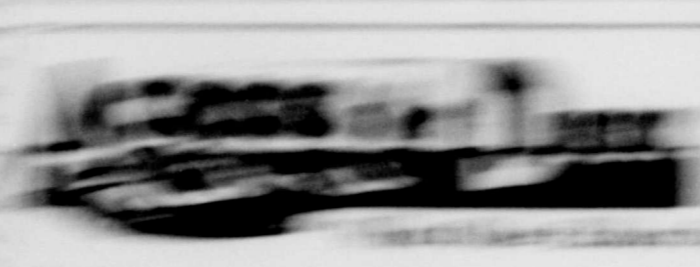
One farmer, in the Lesley area, said that weather was the hardest problem he had on his irrigated and dry land farms. "I got over 30 inches of moisture this year and none of it fell during the growing season. On top of this we had two or three hail storms. What cotton we did gather is of poor quality and brings a low price, so it has been a rough year," he said.

He went on to estimate that not very many of the farmers in his area even broke even (got back what they put into the crop) this year.

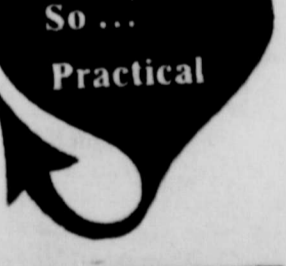

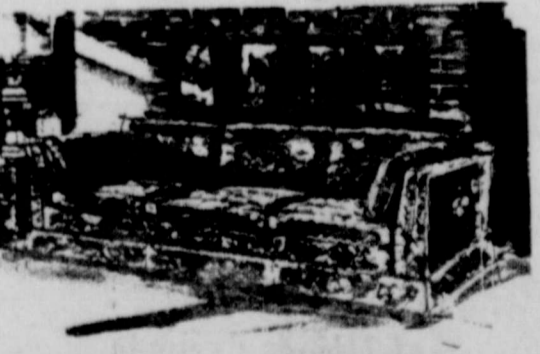

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The Chamber Corner



We have just received all of the engraved plaques for our Bob Wills bi-centennial coin sets. The four-coin sets which are made up of the gold coin, silver coin, antique silver coin and bronze coin will be encased in a white case with the inscription, "First Medal of Bob Wills Series, Hall County, Texas, 1975." The inscription is in gold lettering with gold border and each set has its own individual serial number. The three-coin set case is blue with gold inscription and will be composed of silver coin, antique silver coin and bronze coin. The two-coin set case is black with gold inscription and will contain the antique silver and bronze coin. All of the cases are engraved with the same inscription and also have engraved individual serial numbers to correspond with each serial numbered coin.

Individual gold coins and silver coins will also come in engraved cases. The gold coin will be in white cases and the silver coin will be in black cases.

All of the bi-centennial coins will be individually serial numbered beginning with No. 1 and the serial number will be minted on the edge of the coin.

With the purchase of the coin this year will also mean the purchase and rights of the serial number for all annual issues of the Bob Wills Series in the future. For example, the buyer of serial number 100 of the gold coin will have the exclusive ownership and right of No. 100 of the coin in 1976 and all of the years to come.

Bob Wills' portrait will remain on the coin and on the obverse side of the coin, the design will be changed each year. The new design will be selected by the Hall County Bi-centennial Committee at the end of each year.

The coins are expected to arrive in March and we are currently having advance sales. At present, the four-coin sets are selling very well and the silver coins are going well, also. There is a limited number of the coins and we have only 57 of the four-coin sets left. Out of the 57 four-coin sets still available, 10 of the sets will be auctioned off to the public at the Chamber of Commerce banquet. The sets to be auctioned are serial number coins No. 1 through No. 10. In Pampa the Chamber auctioned their No. 1 coin set for \$1,500 and we are ex-

pecting that our auction will go as successfully as theirs. The Memphis auction will be held at the Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Order blanks and information of the Bob Wills Series bi-centennial coin are available in all of the banks in Hall County and the Chamber office. Out-of-town residents who are interested may write the Chamber of Commerce, P. O. Box 789, Memphis, Texas 79245 for information and order forms.

Most of our coin sales have been out of town and as far as California, Nevada and Wisconsin. We will soon have a press release on the Hall Co. Bi-centennial Coin ready for publication in many of the state and nation's major newspapers.

Dr. Charles Townsend, professor of history, West Texas State University, who is currently finishing the biography on Bob Wills entitled "San Antonio Rose" is also writing a short essay on Bob Wills in Hall County and how Bob's early life in Hall County affected his music in later years. The essay will be printed with an illustrated map of Hall County and will be available exclusively with each coin only.

Tentative plans for the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet will be centered around our bi-centennial theme of Hall County. Banquet dates and theme will be announced after the February Board of Directors meeting.

An invitation has been extended to Memphis residents to attend the Wellington Chamber of Commerce Banquet Tuesday, Feb. 4, at 7:15 p.m. Western artist Kenneth Wyatt will be the featured speaker.

Phil Cates Is Named To Business Industry Committee

AUSTIN . . . State Representative Phil Cates of Pampa today was named Vice Chairman of the Business and Industry Committee in the Texas House of Representatives by House Speaker Bill Clayton.

The choice committee post was given to the third term House veteran along with assignment to the seven member House Administration Committee.

Rep. Cates also captured a seat on the Environmental Affairs Committee by virtue of his seniority.

"I am especially looking forward to serving on the Business and Industry Committee and actively seeking new areas of industrial growth for Texas, especially the Panhandle area," Rep. Cates stated at the Capitol.

"I am concerned that Texas showed a 17 percent drop from 1973 to 1974 in the number of new Texas factories. This is, of course, mainly due to stresses on our national economy. The number of expansions also declined by 7 percent over the same period."

"I am also concerned that nearly three-quarters of the state's total industrial growth stayed within the metro-plex areas. Research studies show that in 1974 more than 72 percent of the total industrial growth went to the Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas. Big cities are ballooning while small towns and rural areas that vitally need new growth, continue to shrink," Rep. Cates reported.

"I hope to shift a sizable amount of the expansion and growth interest to small towns and rural areas," Cates stated. "This would give Texas a more equitable industrial balance and help stabilize our economy."

"The East Texas city of Longview is a good example of an aggressive program for industrial growth among the smaller cities. Longview led the state in new plants from the non-metro area with a reported 37-an increase of 16 percent over 1973.

"I see no reason why other cities of comparable size cannot also receive the benefit of industrial expansion. And, I will aggressively seek to entice industry to this state, giving Texas additional job opportunities."

"Business and Industry Committee also works with the Texas Tourist Development Agency in increasing tourism in the state. I have had a longtime interest in

the continued growth of tourists which is beneficial to Texans and out-of-staters alike," Cates explained.

In commenting on his appointment to the House Administration Committee Rep. Cates said that he would work to assure the smooth continuance of the day-to-day matters of House operations and expenditures.

Cates expects the environmental affairs committee will handle legislation concerning the preservation of wildlife and fish within Texas; hunting and fishing laws and the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

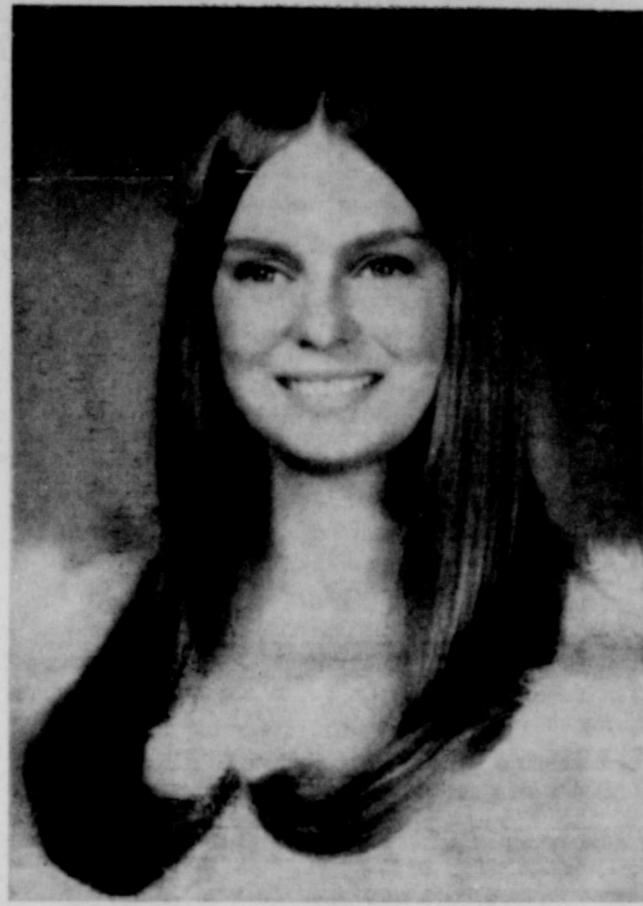

More Insurance Is Owned Locally Per Family

NEW YORK, Jan. 18—Despite the money problems caused by national economic conditions, Hall County residents have been holding on to their life insurance in the last few years and, in many cases, increasing it.

As a result, local families began the current year with more life insurance protection than ever before.

In addition, most of them have been maintaining their other safeguards, such as student insurance, health insurance and fire insurance.

Especially, however, because of the uncertainties of the times, they have been adding to their life insurance, for the most part buying term insurance, which is the cheapest kind.

The effect has been to bring life insurance holdings in Hall County to an estimated total of \$42,544,000.

Data on the number of policyholders and the extent of their coverage is given for each of the states and for the country as a whole by the Department of Commerce and the Institute of Life Insurance.

They show that the amount in force in the United States is now in excess of \$1.8 trillion.

In the State of Texas alone, according to the findings, the total is \$95,668,000,000. It compares with \$85,824,000,000 ten years ago.

This is exclusive of insurance provided by the Federal government for veterans and insurance issued by fraternal organizations.

In general, there is a direct relationship between a family's income and the amount of insurance it carries. The figures show that the amount held by the average family in the state is equal to 25.1 months income, after taxes.

This is about twice as much as most families had ten years ago and is more than is held in many communities.

Of the grand total of \$42,544,000 carried by the local population, the bulk is in the form of ordinary insurance, with group insurance in second place.

An indicator of the times is the disclosure that borrowing on life insurance policies has reached record proportions. In the past year it was well above \$4.5 billion.

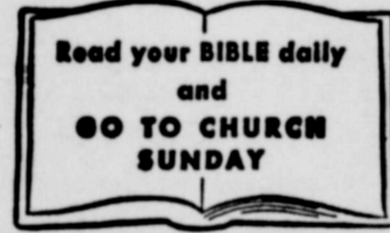

Girl Scouts To Sell Cookies Starting Friday

The annual Girl Scout cookie sale will begin at 4 p.m. Friday, Jan. 31, according to Mrs. Ray Evans, scout leader. The goal for this year is 36,000 boxes. Each girl who sells 24 boxes will receive a patch, especially designed, to show her active participation in the one All-Council fund raising project for the year. The money raised will be used exclusively for Camp Development.

Girls who sell cookies receive \$2 toward campships to the resident camp when they top their 24 boxes required for a patch. For each carton of 12 they sell, they receive an additional \$2 toward this campship, Mrs. Evans said.

Cookie flavors available include assorted sandwich, mint, shorties, peanut butter and chocolate chip and boxes will sell for \$1.25 each. They are baked by the Southern Biscuit Company of Richmond, Va., F.V.V. Brand.

Money raised in this year's cookie campaign stays here in the Quivira Girl Scout Council area. Camp Cibola, near Clarendon, has provided three weeks of outdoor experience for at least 1 out of every 6 girls registered and is in its fifth year of development, Mrs. Evans concluded.

County Farmers Eligible For FHA Emerg. Loans

Farmers and ranchers in Hall County, Texas, who sustained production losses and physical losses as a result of drought from January 1 to September 15, 1974; excessive rainfall May 20-24, 1974; hailstorms June 11, 1974 and October 21, 1974, and windstorms June 21-23, 1974, may be eligible to receive an emergency loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

Those who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering from their loss may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at Agricultural Building, 1002 W. Noel Street, in Memphis, before close of business March 21, 1975 for physical losses and October 21, 1975 for production losses.

These loan applications will be taken under the terms of a new law (P.L. 93-237) enacted January 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made of each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible.

Loans based on qualifying production losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975.

Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment ability. No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained. The interest rate for these loans is five percent and there will be no principal cancellation. These loans must be secured by crops, livestock, farm machinery, or real estate.

Hall Co. 4-H Food Show Set For February 1

Interested 4-H'ers will focus on typical foods in the Southwest when the Hall County 4-H Foods Show gets underway February 1 with several youths competing in senior and junior divisions. Pam Wallace, Asst. County Extension Agent at-large announced.

Following the "Southwest Foods" theme, local youth will prepare main dishes, side dishes, breads and desserts, or snacks and beverages as they choose one of the four entry classes for competition.

Food entry exhibits will be on display for the public from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m. at the Memphis High School Homemaking Department. "The divisions will offer a blue, red, or white award ribbon for each entry, with a first, second and third place winner in each of the four entry classes," the agent explained.

"Because our foods program emphasized nutrition, contestants will be asked to demonstrate knowledge of nutrition, as well as the ability to prepare food," she added.

The Hall County 4-H Food Show is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M System.

Veterans To Receive Payments From GI Insurance

NEW YORK, Jan. 25 — For some 100 of the war veterans living in Hall County, Washington is offering greetings of a pleasant kind.

With the greetings is the news that they will receive approximately \$8,000 in the months ahead as their share of a \$335.6 million melon being cut by the Government.

The money represents dividends that have fallen due them under their GI insurance policies.

Local veterans whose service was solely in the Vietnam War will not participate at this time because of the type of insurance policies they hold.

On the other hand, veterans of the Korean War will be getting payments for the first time. The majority of the recipients are those who saw service in World War II. Also participating are World War I vets.

According to the Veterans Administration, the \$335.6 million divided to be distributed this year breaks all records. It is \$31.8 million more than ever before.

The bigger payout was made possible by the fact that the interest earned by the trust funds that govern the insurance policies has been higher than usual lately.

The great majority of those who will be receiving checks are World War II vets who hold National Service Life Insurance policies bearing the letter V.

World War I vets who hold U. S. Government Life Insurance policies starting with the letter K and those who were in the Korean conflict and have Veterans Special Life Insurance will also participate.

The 100 residents of Hall County who will be benefiting represent only 21 percent of the 500 World War and Korean veterans in the local area. They are the ones who kept their policies in force.

What they will receive will vary in amount, depending upon their age and the size and type of their policies.

For World War I vets the average will be \$169, for those who were in World War II, \$83, and for Korean vets, \$11.

Their checks will arrive automatically on the anniversary dates of their policies. No applications are necessary.
