Local Cager Seasons End Here Tuesday

Cyclonettes lost to Claude's 30 to 36 Tuesday night which was the last game of the 1974-75 season. Mickey Henderson, James Beck Are Leading Scorers For Local Cagers

Memphis Coach Wayne Thompson said Wednesday that Memphis has some really promising basketball talent coming up for next year's teams.

"Mickey Henderson and James Beck are possibly the best basketball players I'll get to coach anytime, and they will not be back," the coach said.

Coach Thompson's boys finished 12 and 7 for the season, and were in the race for the district title most of the way, and the girls finished 22 and 4, and gave Claude's girls a real run for the money for the district crown.

The Memphis girls average 60 points per game while allowing their opponents a 45 point per game average this season.

The Memphis boys averaged 61.2 points per game while opponents averaged 48.5 points per game.

The Cyclonettes' forward end had Mickey Henderson scoring and averaging 29 points per game and rebounding 5.1 times. Faye Beck, a freshman, averaged 17 points per game and rebounded 5.7 times per game. Terry Salinas averaged 7 points and 2.5 rebounds.

Promising forwards are Jana Davis and Melba Walker. Jana is a sophomore this year and Melba is a junior. Guards stats show Marilyn Mason with 6.0 rebounds per game, Debra Cannon with 3.4 and Jeanetta Matthews with 2.8. Promising guard is Alfredia Walkers, a sophomore.

All Co. Judge Speaks Out On Crime Prevention

February 10-15 is National Crime Prevention Week and in observance of the occasion, County Judge Loran Denton released a statement concerning the need for cooperation from law abiding citizens. His statement is as follows:

"I don't 'They' do something about the crime and violence. You have probably heard phrases or possibly made a statement yourself. The prosecutors, and the courts means to effectively do the job but more importantly need YOUR help. You are the 'They' and you do something about crime and violence in your community. There are two things you can do. (1) You can get involved by serving on juries when called, reporting crimes and suspicious persons, and taking part in community affairs. (2) You can provide necessary tools through your elected governmental representatives. Adequate law enforcement personnel, prosecutors, courts, and correctional facilities are essential but they must operate within the frame work of the laws passed by the legislature.

"Contact your state legislator — let them know how you feel — Get Involved" Judge Denton concluded.

Persons Asked To Sign Up As Blood Donors

Local residents who would like to volunteer to give blood to the Coffee Memorial Blood Center, Inc., of Amarillo are being asked to sign lists which can be found at all local business firms or at the local churches, Rayford Hutcherson said this week.

The service project in Memphis is being sponsored by the Memphis Lions Club. Hall County has been set a quota of 200 blood donors. Mr. Hutcherson is serving as project chairman.

Blood Centers throughout the nation are no longer paying for blood. By going to an all volunteer program to collect blood, it is hoped that more healthy blood donation can be received, John Mitchell of Coffee Memorial said.

Mr. Mitchell explained the family plan like this, "The donor's family will receive cash reimbursements for all blood costs from Coffee Memorial should the donor or any member of his or her family ever need blood, regardless of how many pints are needed during the following 12 months after the donation is made."

Those who can give blood must be between the ages of 18 and 65. Those 17 years old can give with their parents consent, but those under 17 or over 65 are not to give blood.

No volunteer will be asked to give more than one pint a year; however, they can volunteer to give more than once if they so chose.

Mr. Mitchell said that the all volunteer program is new with Coffee Memorial, as this is the first time in 40 years that most of the blood needs of the Texas Panhandle have not come from "professional" donors.

Health Dept. To Be Here For Clinic Feb. 20

Personnel from the Texas State Department of Health from Amarillo will be in Memphis on February 20 from 1 to 4 p.m. to hold a clinic offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases.

The clinic will be held at the Memphis Housing Project center. Parents of children who have not had the necessary vaccines against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw, whooping cough, measles and rubella are urged to bring their children to the clinic.

There is no charge for the vaccines.

The Memphis School Board met Tuesday night, awarded contracts to Principals, Head Coach, Tax Assessor - Collector, and School Secretaries.

The Board last month extended Supt. Bill Wood's contract for a three year period.

Head Coach and Athletic Director Clyde McMurray was given a two year contract.

Principals C. E. Voyles, Neal Hindman, Ethel Hillhouse and Mrs. C. D. Morris had their contracts extended another year by the board.

The board accepted a bid from A. L. Carroll of \$225.10 for the 1969 school station wagon.

One of the major items before the board was the approving of the 1975-76 School Calendar, which will be under the Texas Schools new four quarter system.

The calendar calls for the opening of school on August 18, and ending on May 20, 1976.

Holidays are Labor Day, Sept. 1, Thanksgiving, Nov. 27-28, Christmas - New Years, Dec. 22 through Jan. 2 (with school taking up Jan. 5.) Easter April 15-16. In service training days (when students do not attend school) are set for August 13-15, Nov. 7 and 10, February 23, March 26 and May 21, 24-25.

The board set the Baccalaureate for 8 p.m. May 18, 1975, and Commencement for 8 p.m. May 23, for this year's graduating senior class.

The board called for a trustee election to elect two trustees for April 5 in conjunction with the City of Memphis election. Filing deadline is 30 days prior to the election date and applications can be secured from the Office of the Superintendent.

Terms of office expiring include those of Dr. R. E. Clark and Jerry Montgomery.

Superintendent Bill Wood reported to the Board that enrollment in the Memphis schools is down 56 students from this time last year.

A comparison reveals that Travis enrollment is down 19, Austin enrollment down 23, Junior High enrollment down 25 and High School enrollment up 11, over this time last year.

The local board approved the investigation of participation in a Plan A Special Education cooperative with four other area schools. The schools involved would be Memphis, Childress, Quanah and Crowell. Supt. Wood said he will be meeting with school officials from these four schools to work out possible participation.

"The play would make it possible to work special education students, who could qualify, to work into regular classes. Some students are capable of handling regular work in some classes, and it would be to their advantage to do so," Supt. Wood said.

Members of the Board of Directors of the Hall-Childress Soil Conservation District judged the contest. The Board was very complimentary of all the essays and expressed appreciation to Miss Kennedy and the students for the fine work done.

Commerce banquet will go on sale in March and tickets will be \$6 each; mark your calendar for the Friday evening annual banquet April 4. Past Chamber President John Kehr will formally present the gavel to incoming President Mike Branigan and the entire evening promises to be an eventful one. This year's chamber banquet will be one that will be long remembered as we have an excellent program lined up and a completely different style to be presented which will include a vastly changed menu as compared to those used in the past banquets in Memphis. Chamber President Mike Branigan and Executive Vice-president Jim Edd Wines attended a leadership workshop in Amarillo Wednesday. Topics included in the workshop, sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, were government relations, room occupancy tax for tourism promotion, membership relations and free enterprise concepts for the area.

Among the various categories of the Governor's Community Achievement Awards contest are: Community - wide beautification which lists the city, school and club projects that made Memphis a more pleasing place in which to live. What did they do to improve the highway approaches, parks, store fronts, streets? Were there civic clubs, schools, churches or other group projects that enhanced the appearance of Memphis? Mrs. Wanda Stevenson is chairwoman of the committee to collect all of the information and pictures of our community development during 1974. We are urging all clubs and groups to help us with the scrapbook by turning all of your information of activities of this area of community development by your group.

The Bob Wills Series bicentennial coin for Hall County is the project of the Bob Wills Foundation of Turkey and the bicentennial committee of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce. All proceeds of the coin sales will be divided between the two groups and will be used toward each group's projects in Turkey, Memphis and Hall County. Project goals for the Bob Wills Foundation include the development of the park and site of the Bob Wills Monument in Turkey. Also, the future erecting of facilities in Turkey in honor of Bob Wills and for the Bob Wills Reunion Day in Turkey of the Bicentennial Committee of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce include a tourist brochure of Memphis and Hall County, various projects for the Hall County Heritage Hall and promotion of the entire county on a tourist - historical level. Of course, the primary portion of the coin sales will be used for the cost of the coins and we hope everyone will help us by buying a coin set or individual coin. The Bob Wills coins are excellent gifts for children and grandchildren; and will also help promote the tourist industry for Memphis and Hall County. Orders forms for the bicentennial coins are available in all of the banks of Hall County and chamber office. Coins will be ready to display in March.

Among business at the Board of Directors meeting last Monday was a report for a community sign for the recognition of the

1974 Regional Champs, Memphis Cyclone. Work is currently underway for a sign project and will be under the direction of Don Cockrell and Bill Crane. A report as for the project expenses and proposals will be presented at the March meeting scheduled for the second Monday in March in relation to the community sign.

Among the projects and program of work this year of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce will be: Cotton Boll Enduro to be scheduled in the last weekend in October, work has begun to obtain state recognition for the motorcycle enduro. We will also sponsor a cracker barrel sale in conjunction with the Hall County Picnic Sept. 20 and 21; the first annual flea market to be held on an all day basis during the spring and hopefully a carnival on a week-long engagement during the month of August in conjunction with the opening of school for the 1975 school year. Goals for 1975 of the Memphis Chamber will include the City Park Project, campaign of the miniature cotton bales and promotion of our cot-

ton industry and community slogan, "Cotton Capital of the Panhandle." Our primary goal will be to attract another industry for the Memphis area and national recognition for Hall County in relation to the Bob Wills coin campaign. Of course, Bicentennial activities will be included in the chamber work program and the entry of the Texas Beautification awards contest will be of primary concern.

As reported by the financial committee composed of Larry Parks, Harold Moffitt, Jim Chappell, Ace Gailey, Allen Dunbar, J. M. Ferrel, Don Long, Gordon Maddox and John Fowler, the chamber members and with the raising of base rate of chamber dues to \$36 individual annual rate and \$60 annual rate for business. STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex.—The voters will decide April 22 in a statewide constitutional amendments election whether they want to increase retirement benefits for school teachers and state employees.

Both houses of the legislature have agreed on the proposal to lift the present six per cent ceiling on matching state contributions to the pension funds (replacing it with a 10 per cent limit).

If voters approve, retired teachers will get boosts in their benefits ranging from five to 15 per cent, and pensioned state employees will get an additional 12 per cent.

Cost of the teacher benefits' raise is estimated at about \$98 million and the state employees' pension improvements at \$21.8 million.

Meanwhile, the House of Representatives also approved for the April 22 ballot a proposed constitutional change to raise legislators' pay from \$400 to \$600 a month and expense allowances from \$12 to \$30 a day for length of a lawmaking session.

Senators may balk at the pay raise proposal which has been advanced in more than half a dozen forms over the last 15 years, without convincing voters.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe said he will actively support the legislative pay raise proposition if the Senate goes along with submitting it on the April 22 ballot.

A quick recapitulation on emergency spending matters already before the legislature (or finally passed) indicates about \$310 million in outlays have been committed during the first month of the 64th lawmaking session.

And Governor Briscoe submitt-

ed \$672,000 more in recommended quickie appropriations late last week.

FLOOD AID VOTED — A legislative resolution will allow the state to spend money already appropriated to the governor as matching funds to aid victims of natural disasters.

Immediately, funds can be used to provide the state's 25 per cent share of aid to residents of flood-hit Anderson, Bell, Cooke, Denton, El Paso, Hopkins, McLennan, Parker, Williamson, Falls and Nacogdoches counties.

The federal government will match state dollars three to one. The federal disaster act of 1974 provides for financial aid up to \$5,000 per individual or family.

PAY RAISES SET — One hundred and twenty-five thousand state employees were assured a \$93 million pay raise effective February 1.

Governor Briscoe signed the legislation into law to provide the raises over a seven-month period.

Most state employees in the low-to-medium pay bracket will receive a 13 per cent raise, and most of those in the middle-to-top category will get a nine per cent increase. Additional raises are expected to be voted on a permanent basis after September 1.

LANDS LEASED — Leases of 88,506 acres of state land for oil and gas drilling brought the state \$4,199,099.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong termed results of the sale better than expected.

Submerged tract bids totalled \$2.26 million.

Highest bidder was Texas Oil and Gas Corp. — \$708,400 for

642 acres in Ward County.

The School Land Board leased 4,317 acres of uplands for more than \$1 million in bonus payments; 28761 in Texas bays for \$901664 and 925 acres in Texas rivers, creeks, lakes and bayous for \$27,114.

AG OPINIONS — A state university can permit religious-oriented groups to use its meeting room on a non-discretionary, first-come-first-served basis, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

Funds help support professional treatment centers in Texas, where services are provided to those crippled children and adults who cannot provide for themselves and who do not qualify for help from any other source.

"The people of Texas have always responded generously to helping the handicapped, and I feel certain they will make it possible to increase Easter Seal services to crippled Texans throughout the coming year," Parks said.

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Texas Taxpayers To Pay 17.819 Billion Dollars

Texas taxpayers will be required to pay out approximately \$17.819,400,000 in Federal taxes as their share of the cost of the Federal spending budget of \$349.4 billion proposed by President Ford for the 1976 Federal fiscal year beginning July 1, 1975, according to an estimate today by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

This estimate was based on the Chamber's calculations that Texas taxpayers bear 5.10 percent of all Federal taxes.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce pointed out that any change which Congress may make in this budget will reduce or increase the amount that Texas taxpayers will have to bear depending on whether Congress cuts or spends more.

The \$17.8 billion share which would be borne by Texas taxpayers to support the President's proposed budget is 4 1/2 times the total Texas state spending in 1972.

"The average citizen of Texas has a hard time relating to a \$349.4 billion national budget," J. Fike Godfrey, Executive Vice President of the WTCC said. "In fact, the average person can't relate to 5 percent of that amount, the \$17.8 billion that Texas taxpayers will pay."

"How much is the \$17.8 billion of Federal taxes that Texans will pay?" Godfrey asks. "Well, let's look at it in terms we can all understand."

"The Federal taxes Texans will pay on a \$349.4 billion budget would amount to \$1,590 for every man, woman and child in Texas or to \$6,360.00 for an average family of four."

"Put another way, Texas' Federal tax bill would build nearly a half a million \$30,000 homes, or if the inhabitants of Fort Worth could divide that much money among themselves, each man, woman and child in Fort Worth would get about \$23,382.00 each."

"If all the farmers and ranchers in Texas had to pay the 1976 Federal tax load for Texans, it would take all the cash receipts for all the farms and ranches in Texas nearly five years to pay up. The \$17.8 billion Federal tax load on Texans is nearly 17 times larger than all the effective buying income of all El Pasoans in 1972."
