## Winds of One to Two Inches Are Received

This morning, a huge thunderstorm which had been building northwest of Hall County all hours, and flooded the area with 6-plus inches of rain, finally moved out on a westerly path right across the county. The storm did carry some hail with it, but the real blessing was in the form of one to two inches of general rain. Farmers have been nervous about the lack of rain. May as chance after rain showers falling. The rain today, plus more rain tonight and tomorrow, have farmers feeling a lot better. Even those who had planted and possibly face prospect of re-planting. The area received 1.60 inch of moisture and a large amount of small hail stones, it was this morning. The city received 1.60 inches of rain, three miles west of Estaline 1.00 inch was reported. At this same location, .50 fell last Thursday and .10 on Tuesday of this week. East of Memphis, an area which has been dry since March, 2.00 inches was reported this morning from points five and seven miles east and south of State Hwy. 256. Rains in this area appeared to be fairly general, it was reported. In the Lakeview area amounts appeared to be about 1.50 inches. Here in Memphis, one unofficial rain gauge caught 1.40 inches and another a few blocks away caught one inch. A gauge on North 16th street caught 1.00 inch. The Eli area reported .70 of an inch of moisture, while Plaska area reported 1.30 inches. This area received heavy winter moisture and good moisture in early spring. Farmers will be able to begin, or resume planting unless Mother Nature opens the flood gates. Weathermen reported last night that rain prospects will be good until a cool front passes later on in the week.

Tom Jones, a junior student at O.S.U. proved that youth and expertise can combine for excellent performance as he humbled the Memphis Country Club's nine-hole course with 8 - under par golf to win the invitational tournament here this weekend. Firing three sub-par round of 65-64-67 for a 196, Jones won the tournament by 12 strokes over Ted Harrison of Lawton, Okla. who posted a two-over par 208 for the 54-hole tournament. Jones is a native of Tulsa, Okla., and won the respect and admiration of all those who witnessed his play. One of the competing golfers said, "he's such a nice fellow we think he's a great guy for winning, and if any of the rest of us had won it would have been something else." "The course is different from what I'm used to playing," Jones said, "driver and short wedge on most the holes, but it's a great course and I've really enjoyed the whole tournament." One of the largest galleries to ever follow the championship foursome witnessed the excellent golf play and many said that Jones is the best amateur they had ever seen. Jones' caddy reported that his clubs have a worn "sweet spot" right in the center. Finishing in the top eight of a field of 21 championship golfers, besides Jones and Harrison, were: David Parker of Pampa, 209, Ken Bailey of Amarillo 210, Max Rickley of Pampa, 214, Steve Talbert of Snyder (also of O.S.U.) 214, John Zett of Amarillo 215 and Bobby McAfee of Chickasha 215. In the first flight, David Cofer posted rounds of 72-72-71 for 215 to win the flight. Bill Combs was second with 217, James Avery of Amarillo third with 220 and Don Fagan of Amarillo fourth with 224. Second flight winner was John Miller of Shamrock with a 79, winner over George Morey of Childress in a sudden death. John Haynes of McLean had an 82 in the consolation. Third flight was won by the Wansleys of Lakeview, a R. S. (Mutt) Wansley had an 80 for first place, and son Terry, with an 85, won a sudden death from Ronnie Browning who also had an 85. Consolation was won by Roddy Bice with an 81. Harold Smith won the fourth flight with an 80, while Richard Holland of Lubbock had an 87 for second. Seibert Worley of Shamrock was consolation winner with a 92. The tournament this year saw 114 golfers competing in five flights, and was the largest field to ever compete in the 4-day tournament. Weather was ideal for the tournament for the first time in several years.

Funeral services for O. L. "Buster" Helm, 69, were held at 2 p.m. Sunday, May 25, in the First Presbyterian Church with the Rev. Owen McGarity, pastor, officiating. Graveside services were conducted at 10:30 a.m. Monday by Rev. Phillip Walker in Shiloh Cemetery at Corinth under the direction of Spicer Funeral Home. O. L. Helm was born June 29, 1905, in Ula and had been a Memphis resident 51 years. He was united in marriage to Evelyn Selby on Oct. 31, 1942, in Alexandria, La. Mr. Helm died Friday near his home while taking his daily walk. Associated with the First National Bank of Memphis from 1926 to 1966, he was a director of the bank and a retired farmer at the time of his death. He was a member of the Memphis Lions Club, a former president and member of the Memphis Country Club, a member of the Cyclone Booster Club and was active in scouting. In recent years he had received the area Outstanding Conservationist Farmer award. A member and elder of the Presbyterian Church, Mr. Helm served as an alderman and mayor of Memphis from 1954 to 1965. He was a veteran of World War II, having been awarded a battlefield commission in the European theatre and also received a commendation medal for meritorious service. Mr. Helm was a member of the Simmons - Noel American Legion Post here. Survivors include: his wife of the home; one son, Larry of Dallas; one daughter, Mrs. Leslie H. Fry of Dallas; two brothers, Min or of Dallas and Arvis of Vian, Okla.; seven sisters, Mrs. D. P. Hollis, Mrs. Olin Ford, Mrs. Jack Shirey, Mrs. Mack Simmons, Dr. Ruby Herd and Mrs. John Wilson, all of Denton; and Mrs. Norman Locksley of Silver Spring, Md.; and two grandchildren. Pallbearers were Mackie Allen, A. L. Gailley, Gayle Monzingo, Temple Deaver, Allen Dunbar, Lesley Foxhall, Mack Tarver and Wendell Harrison. Honorary pallbearers were officers, directors and employees of the First National Bank.

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## EDITORIAL

### Mood Of Restraint!

Surprising everyone it seems, is the fact that the 94th Congress of the United States, with the largest Democratic majorities in years, and with many freshmen, is moving in a direction of making earnest efforts to clamp down on federal spending.

But this same Congress rushed through an emergency farm bill which would give some relief to the agriculture industry, only to see this legislation vetoed by The Republican President.

One of the major steps taken by both houses was completed in mid-May when a "target" was set on spending ceiling for the next fiscal year, the first time a ceiling has been established in many years. The target was set at 367 billion dollars, which is far from the 80 to 100-billion deficit feared last month.

One of the reasons for the mood of restraint is coming from many younger Democrats who are increasingly disillusioned with Great Society-type programs. Many of these ran on platforms of reforming governmental institutions and the newly established congressional budget system is new and they are working to see that it is successful.

The new budget process does not necessarily envision the elimination of deficits, but the elimination of "unplanned" deficits. It is designed to enable Congress to plan just how large a deficit—if any—should be permitted to provide sufficient stimulus to the economy without producing inflation later on.

However, if Congress does not have the will to stick with the consequences of establishing budget guidelines and votes to discard them, then all this will go down the drain and the economy with advance into new rounds of run-away inflation and huge deficit spending by the Federal Government.

House Appropriations Committee Chairman George H. Mahon puts it: "If Congress has the will to provide adequate revenues and control spending, it can. But if it does not, then all the budget resolutions in the world will not get the job done."

American families have had to establish family budgets and stick with them rigidly. Inflation has eroded the purchasing power of the dollar in huge chunks to the point that providing the food, clothing, transportation and housing, medical attention, and insurance coverage, along with paying taxes, is exhausting the family budget.

Families cannot exist on deficit spending, and neither can a nation.

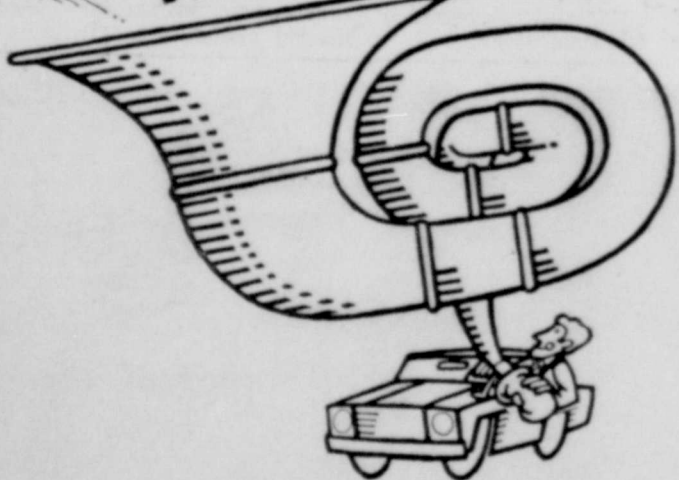

#### SB 69 MUST BE DEFEATED

Senate Bill 69, if passed into law, will cause financial harm to almost every person, family, and business in Texas. Sponsored by loan company lobbyists, it authorizes an enormous increase in interest rates on loans up to \$5000.

Though it was introduced only January 22, notices of hearings on the bill were posted on January 29, and the hearings were actually started on February 3. The expeditious treatment given to this legislation was further evidenced by its being reported out of committee favorably by a vote of 5 to 1 on February 17. Unless the people become aroused and start contacting their Senators, Representatives, Lieutenant Governor, and Governor about this sinister legislation, SB 69 will surely become law.

The law already authorizes rates that are too high. For a loan of \$1000 over 37 months, a finance company can now charge you \$339.17. SB 69 would jump that cost to \$425.50 — a greater than 25.4 percent increase in dollar charges for interest alone.

The legal rate of interest, a loan company can now charge for a \$1000 loan over 37 months is 19.54 percent. The new rate the loan company lobbyists are asking for is 24.4 percent for the same outlay.

Loan companies frequently gouge borrowers by requiring them to pay for life, health, and property insurance premiums. When credit life, and accident & health costs are imposed, the annual percentage rates on a \$1000 loan over 37 months jump to 31.02 percent under SB 69. This high borrowing cost does not include property insurance which may be required in addition. The loan companies can no doubt add some of the insurance charges to their other profits from interest charges.

A borrower from a finance company will be surprised to compare the few dollars he takes with him as he leaves a loan company office to the many dollars described in his repayment obligation to the loan company.

A married couple that borrows \$3000 for 60 months must obligate themselves to pay the loan company \$4640. By deducting insurance charges, the loan company is able to cut down on what the couple actually receives to \$2326.98. The \$4640 obligation is nearly twice the amount they take home.

Inflation and the problems it causes will be greatly aggravated by Senate Bill 69. Every wage earner who comes into the clutches of the loan companies, and who is forced to pay the extra high rates of SB 69, will be asking for increases in salary. These will have to be passed on to consumers. The upward spiral of prices will con-

punished by these outrageously increased borrowing costs. SB 69 would be doing the families of Texas a great injustice.

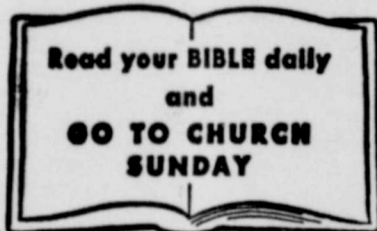

### 48% of Local Spending Goes For Education

**NEW YORK** — What price education in Hall County? How do local governmental expenditures for school operations compare with those in other communities?

A report recently released by the Department of Commerce, following a nationwide survey, shows that education is, by far, the most costly element in local budgets.

No less than 48 percent of the expenditures made in Hall County by local government agencies are for school construction and maintenance, for teachers salaries, for equipment and for various other expenses connected with school operations. It runs considerably more than this in some parts of the country and somewhat less in others.

On the average, throughout the United States, local governments have been allotting 41 percent of their budgets for education. In the State of Texas, 53 percent has been ear-marked for that purpose.

Local governments provide only a portion of the education bill. The rest comes from Federal and state sources.

The data was compiled by the Social and Economic Statistics Administration in the first study of the kind since 1967. It surveys the finances of local communities

### Divorced Women Eligible For SS Benefits

Some divorced women may be unaware of possible social security benefits payable to them on the account of a former husband, according to Maurine Travis, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office.

Women who were divorced from their husbands after being married for 20 years or longer may qualify for benefits much the same as if they never were divorced.

A woman whose divorced husband is still alive may qualify at age 62 provided the marriage lasted over 20 years, she is unmarried (even though she may have had a subsequent marriage and divorce), and is not entitled to a larger benefit on another record. The most the divorced wife of a living ex-husband can get is 50 percent of what he receives.

In the case of the surviving divorced wife, one whose ex-husband is dead, benefits may be payable as early as age 60, or at age 50 if the woman is severely disabled. The other requirements of not being currently married, of having been married for over 20 years, and of not being eligible for a higher benefit on another account also apply. If the surviving divorced wife is age 65 or older, she may qualify for as much as 100 percent of what her ex-husband would get if he were alive. At ages under 65, it would be reduced.

Of the total expenditures made by governmental bodies in Hall County, which were equivalent to \$363 for every man, woman and child in the population, \$176 went for education, it shows. By way of comparison, the outlay for education at the local level elsewhere in the United States was \$234 per capita. The average was \$214 in Texas.

The magnitude of education's impact on the American economy is indicated in reports released by the National Education Association and the U. S. Office of Education. They estimate that expenses in the current school year will amount to \$108 billion, which is about 8 percent of our gross national product. Some \$68 billion of it will be going to elementary and secondary schools and \$40 billion to institutions of higher education. Involved are 58.6 million students and over 3 million teachers.

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## Verification Of Income Mandatory For Food Stamps

All income received by food stamp recipients must be verified if it is expected to be received during the certification period or is meant for use during the certification period. This includes total salary and wages, gifts or awards for maintenance and bonuses paid as income (such as the crop bonus commonly given by farmers).

Charges are occasionally made that employers do not report total wages paid to employees, particularly the crop bonus. However, local welfare officials are somewhat skeptical of these reports. Both the employee and employer commit criminal offenses when income is intentionally reported incorrectly to obtain benefits or increase benefits from the food stamp program. Local officials feel it is not likely an employer would conspire with his employees to defraud the government. Employers simply have nothing to gain when their criminal responsibility is taken into consideration. The employer commits a criminal offense when he intentionally signs a false income verification statement. The provisions are contained in The Penal Code of Texas, Section 32.32, subsection b.

It is recognized that some abuse is possible in any program. Consequently, an investigation unit has been created by the State Department of Public Welfare. This unit is composed primarily of former police officers who are familiar with investigative responsibilities and the proper legal procedures. If you have knowledge of any attempts to defraud the government, you should report it immediately to the welfare office at Box 1109, Clarendon, Texas 79226 or Telephone 874-3592.

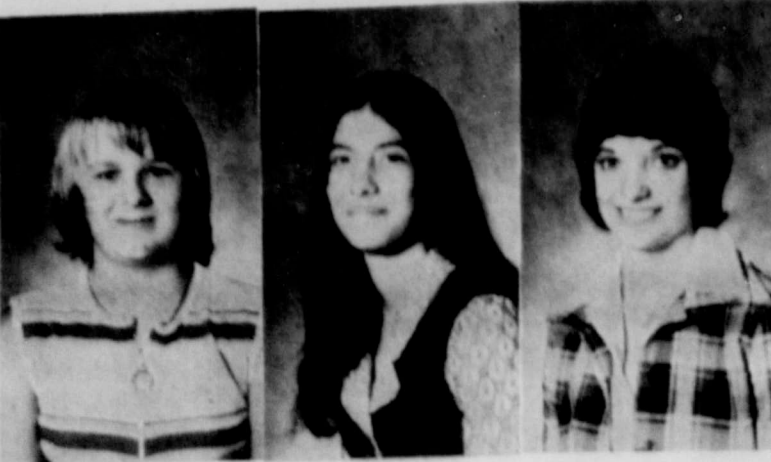

Bill is married to the former Silvas Ayers of Memphis, who will graduate from Southwestern's School of Pharmacy in October.

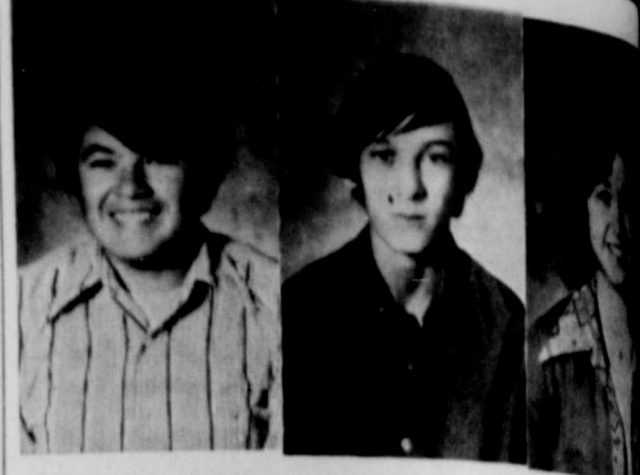

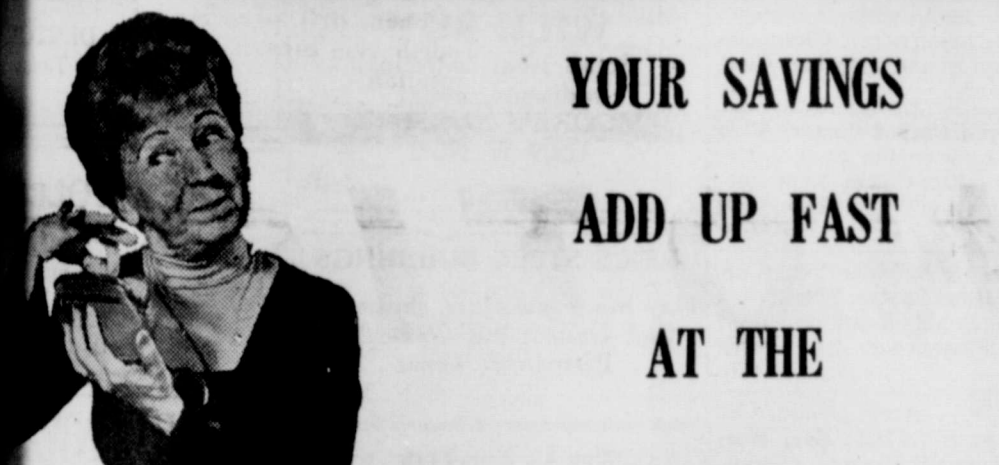
