Total Enrollment In Memphis Schools Is 748

The total enrollment of the Memphis Independent School system has been listed as 748 at the present time by Superintendent Bill Wood.

A breakdown of the number includes: (at Travis School, total 218) 45 enrolled in kindergarten, first grade-68, second grade-55, third grade-47 and special ed. at Travis School-3.

At Austin Elementary School (total 114) fourth grade-55, fifth grade-56, and special ed.-3.

Jr. High School total enrollment is listed at 195 and includes: sixth grade-50, seventh grade-69, eighth grade-62 and special ed.-14.

In High School, with a total enrollment of 221, there are 45 ninth graders, 54 tenth graders, 50 eleventh graders, 56 twelfth graders and 16 students in VAC.

There are approximately 20 four-year-olds attending the Head Start program at Travis Elementary, Mr. Wood said.

Interment was in The Estelline Cemetery under the direction of Spicer Funeral Home.

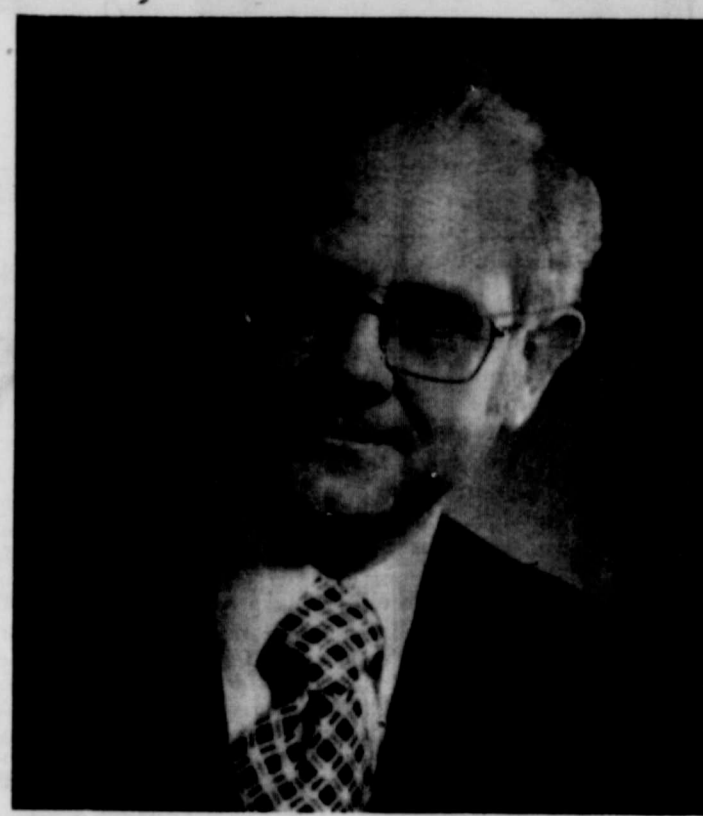

Danny Scarbrough Is Country Club Champ

Danny Scarbrough lead the Memphis Country Club tournament from the first round to win the Club's championship by shooting a five-over par 141, to edge out Barry Ward by one stroke.

Scarbrough, who has held the championship several times since 1968, recaptured the title after two years. His last victory was in 1972.

"I've been hitting the ball better this summer than I have ever hit it," Scarbrough said. Previous rounds indicated he was a strong favorite to win the tournament this year.

Scarbrough's round Saturday was a 69, one over par, and during that round he could have been well under par if several short puts had fallen into the hole instead of "lipping out." He shot a 72 Sunday, and he said he missed even more short puts Sunday.

Greens on the course were made even more difficult to putt when the club's mowing machine developed problems and a part had to be secured from Dallas. The greens were not mowed during tournament play.

Barry Ward, with rounds of 72-70, 142, made his strongest bid for the club championship of his golfing career in Memphis. He had a chance of tying with Scarbrough on the final green, but Ward's putt of about four-feet for a birdie slid by the upper lip of the cup and he had to settle for second place.

Third place went to M. C. (Mackie) Allen, Jr. who defeated Bill Combs in a sudden death play-off, as both finished the tournament with 148s.

A lot of excitement was seen in the lower flights as well, as the championship of the first flight ended all tied up as Doug Fowler and Bill Lockhart both shot 156s. A play-off resulted with Fowler holing a 12-ft. par putt for a win on the 19th hole which gave him the flight championship. Lockhart took second, and Dink Miller placed third in the flight.

In the second flight, John Lemons won first place, while Doc Bates took second and David Hudgins took third.

In the third flight, Darrell Collins with a strong finish of 75 the last day, won the flight, while Harold Smith took second and Terry Monzingo finished third.

The tournament attracted over 30 entries.

Meeting Set For Tuesday On Thirsty Water System

Citizens who have signed up for water service under Phase V of the Thirsty Water System are urged to be present at a meeting at 4 p.m. Tuesday, August 26, in the Councilroom of the Memphis Community Center.

These include those 33 who have signed up in the area west of Memphis and the 26 to 28 who have signed up from the Club Lake project northeast of Mem-

phis. Fred Parkey, General Manager of Red River Authority of Texas will be here, according to Don Cockrell of the First State Bank, who has been signing up those interested in the water service.

Mr. Parkey said in a letter. "It is imperative you be shown the location of pump station, water lines, size of pipe, cost to you each month (minimum bill) and cost

per thousand gallons after the minimum.

He said, "We plan to finalize all plans on Phase V by Sept. 1."

"This is a very important meeting," President Cockrell said, "and all citizens who plan to use the water service should either be signed up now or sign up before the meeting, then be present at the meeting at 4 p.m. Tuesday, August 26."

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EDITORIAL

The Fire Season Approaches!

Memphis citizens are probably not aware of it, but they are starting into the fire season. In the late summer and fall, when vegetation dries out or freezes out, firemen are called into service far more frequently than in other seasons of the year.

However, since the City of Memphis has gone to the "no burn" trash system, there have been fewer times the local firemen have had to answer the call. Burning trash containers in Memphis caused more fires than any other single cause, during the days when all the trash was burned in trash containers.

While solving this fire hazard cause, other problems continue, and among them is the curiosity bug which bites citizens whenever the fire siren does sound. It is not uncommon to see cars stacked up for blocks near a fire scene. Firemen, generally, are able to go about their jobs without interference, but sometimes by-standers are a hazardous evil in firemen's judgment. Sometimes comments are made, and from these comments has come a list entitled: "Firemen Don't Have A Chance!" This list is reproduced below with the hope that citizens will not be guilty of harboring unfair feelings about firemen. Memphis, in particular, and the entire Eastern Panhandle in general, is extremely fortunate to have a highly qualified and hard working Voluntary Fire Department as is the one here. The list is as follows:

"When the trucks are delayed 40 seconds in traffic, people say: 'It took them 20 minutes to get here.'"

"When the truck races at 40 m.p.h., it's: 'Look at those reckless fools.'"

"When four men struggle with an eight-man ladder: 'They don't even know how to raise a ladder.'"

"When firemen open windows for ventilation to reduce heat in fighting a fire: 'Look at the wrecking crew.'"

"When they open the floor to get at the blaze: 'There goes the axe squad.'"

"If the chief stands back where he can see and direct his men, people say: 'He's afraid to go where he sends his men.'"

"If they lose a building: 'It's a lousy department.'"

"If they make a good stop, folk say: 'The fire didn't amount to much.'"

"If a lot of water is necessary: 'They are doing more damage with water than the flames.'"

"If a fireman gets hurt: 'He was a careless guy.'"

"If a citizen gets hurt: 'It's a crazy department.'"

"If a fireman inspects a citizen's property: 'He's meddling in somebody's business.'"

"If he wants fire hazard corrected: 'I'll see the mayor.'"

"If he gets killed and leaves a family destitute: 'That's the chance he took when he joined the fire department.'"

Fighting fires is a serious business. Fires cause great danger to life and property in each of our communities and farms. Just how serious was not made evident to this editor until 16 years ago when he worked on a newspaper in Sunray, Texas. The Sunray story is a chilling reality that any community would hope to avoid. Their voluntary fire department, answering a fire call at a refinery plant, was almost totally wiped out by an explosion. Several business firms in Sunray were still being run by the widows of these firemen several years after that "black" day.

The aftermath of this tragedy is hard to explain. This editor witnessed heavy public support for those families who chose to remain in Sunray to live their lives. The fire department there at that time, was still under the fire chief who bore the scars he received as being one of the few survivors of the explosion. That department, being a volunteer department like all the small communities have, had the same problems as described above. Sunray, however, was making do without several of its most dedicated civic leaders, which was evident in every phase of community life, church, civic clubs, school, community government, etc.

It may be human nature to chase fire trucks, and be critical of the job firemen are doing, but that still doesn't make it right. If a gasoline tank does explode in this town, will you be one of those curiosity has gotten involved?

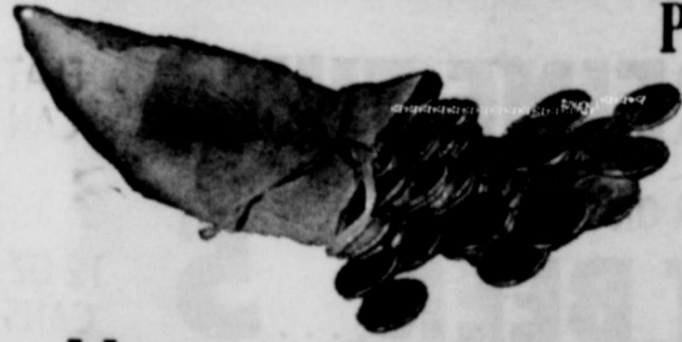

SPORTS AFIELD

"What shotgun and - shotshell combination is best for shooting mourning doves?" Grits Gresham, Shooting Editor for Sport Afield, asks this question and proceeds to give some answers. "The variety of shooting conditions complicates the choice," he declares, "but an examination of the basic requirements involved will narrow the selection."

First, according to Gresham, the target involved is quite small. A dove on the wing or perched on a power line appears rather large, but strip away the feathers and there isn't a great deal left. The bird weighs only four or five ounces.

Since the target is small, the pattern should be dense.

How about quickness? How important is it that our ideal dove gun should be a quick gun? Not very. A hunter usually sees the dove coming and can be prepared.

Firepower isn't very important. There is nothing wrong with using a pump or auto having the three-shot maximum capacity permitted under federal regulations, but trying to knock down two or three doves from a single flock can lead to many cripples and lost birds unless you have a retriever.

Recoil can be more of a factor in dove shooting than in most other forms of gunning for two reasons. First, it's far from unusual for a hunter to burn several boxes of shells in a short time on a dove hunt. Second, most dove hunting takes place in warm weather, so the hunters are lightly clad with little padding on the shoulder.

Small, fast, erratic and evasive, the dove is a most challenging wing target. The general estimate is that four shells are fired for each dove killed which, at the conservative figure would mean some 160,000,000 shotshells used to harvest the 40-million plus doves taken annually. Taking all of this into consideration, what can we do in the selection of gun and shell to improve our odds?

What we are looking for in our ideal dove gun is a combination which will place a dense pattern of small shot into the path of this bird. Summing up Gresham's conclusions, they include the following:

Gauge: either the 20 or the 12. Weight: not less than six

pounds in the 20 gauge or seven pounds in the 12 gauge. Action: pump, automatic, over-and-under or side-by-side double, whichever makes you the happiest. Shotshells: Although there are dove shooters who do well with No. 6 shot and even larger, in maximum loads my vote is for the pattern density delivered by Size 7 1/2 or 8 shot. Choke: It is obvious that no particular degree of choke is best for all dove-hunting situations. A skeet gun, a wide-open boring, can be poison over a water hole where the average shot is 20 to 30 yards. Improved cylinder or modified chokes are probably the best for most dove-hunting conditions. The over-and-under or side-by-side board IC&M is perhaps the nearest approach to our ideal.
