## Memphis JVs Play Today as Other Teams Are Open

Memphis Cyclone Football will open today with a game against the 7th and 8th grade Memphis, but the Memphis Varsity opens its season by traveling to Clarksville for a 7:30 p.m. game. The Cyclone Football team really gets underway next week with the Junior High teams playing at 6:00 and 6:00, and the Varsity plays at 7:00, all on Monday night, Sept. 12, the Cyclone Football team will play at 8 p.m. in a real season opener. The Cyclone Football team hosts Clarendon this night at 8 p.m. Wellington Hall.

"The Cyclone has been trying to sharpen individual skills of blocking and tackling this week. The players have been blocking against all kinds of defenses. ### Cyclone Mothers Meet; Plan Bake Sale, Promotions

The Cyclone Mother's Club met Tuesday, Sept. 2, with 10 members present. Their goal for this fall is to purchase a Video Tape Machine with a purchase price of \$2,100 for the Memphis High School which can be used in several departments as well as the Athletic Dept., it was announced. The club still has candy, bumper stickers, key chains, Cyclone hats, pennants and football schedules to sell and anyone wishing to purchase one of these items may contact any Cyclone Mother. The club will have a bake sale on Saturday, Sept. 20, and urges anyone needing a cake for the Hall County Picnic to purchase one from the Cyclone Mothers.

The Memphis City Council had a busy session Tuesday night as Councilmen heard rate increase requests from public utilities and services.

The City Council passed an Ordinance (No. 469) granting Cablecom General Inc. a \$50 per month rate increase, from \$7.00 to \$7.50 for a single connection, with the rate going into effect contingent upon the addition of three new channels to Memphis homes receiving their service.

These three new channels (Nos. 11, 39 and 13) can be available to Memphis viewers within 30 to 60 days depending upon installation of special equipment, a spokesman for the corporation told City officials.

The Council heard, then discussed, a proposed rate increase by Lone Star Gas to raise gas rates within the City Limits of Memphis. Mayor Kenneth Dale appointed a committee to study the proposed rate increases and report back to the Council at the next meeting.

The City Council last month approved telephone rate increases for General Telephone Co. of the Southwest with the passage of Ordinance No. 467. The new rates will become effective September 13, 1975.

Monthly rates for businesses with individual line service will be \$19.00 under the newly approved rate schedule. Extension service is \$2.00 per month for businesses.

Residents individual line service will be \$8.85, while two-party line service is \$7.15 and residence extension is \$1.50.

Semi-public individual line service, business, is \$19.00, as are key lines and PABX trunks.

### Park Project

The Memphis City Council opened bids submitted under the Memphis City Park project, a program whereby the City was cooperating with Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission for improvement of the Memphis City Park.

Bids submitted were for the construction of underground electrical service in the City Park and for paving. After the bids were opened and studied, the Council voted to table any action on all bids opened.

After this action was taken, the council voted unanimously on a motion to terminate the city's participation in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission's grant program. The bids received by the City of Memphis indicated that it would cost \$10,585 to install underground electrical facilities in the City Park to meet requirements set out by Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, plus the City would need another \$2,000 expenditure to provide new utility wiring to the City Park to tie in with the underground system, according to City Secretary A. L. Gailey. In addition, to make the roads meet Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission standards an additional \$10,000 would be needed, so the paving and electrical work would total about \$22,500 of the entire \$40,000 project with the City of Memphis providing a \$20,000 and the Commission's grant matching this amount.

The City Secretary said that the City Council has set up \$10,000 to be used for City Park improvements in 1976, and another \$10,000 in 1977 and the Council felt that this money could be better spent providing improvements to the park without costly underground wiring system.

City fathers felt that through participation, the City Park would fall under the rules and regulations of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, with annual inspections, etc. "We can better serve our people with more useable park facilities by maintaining control over the park," Mayor Kenneth Dale said.

In other action by the Council, the Council voted to grant permission to the Memphis Chamber of Commerce to use City Park property to have another Carnival the last week in August, 1976.

## EDITORIAL

### Farmers Hurt Most!

The figures are out now, and for the agricultural segment of our economy, the facts should paint a clear picture as to what has been going on the past two years during the recession. Where has the recession hit the hardest?

According to a most recent issue of a national news magazine, farmer's income over this nation is down 39 per cent from 1973 to 1975. Farm income was listed as \$33.6 billion in 1973, and \$20.5 billion in 1975.

In a listing, by states of how the different states fared during the two-year recession, the states with declining incomes during that period were Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, North Dakota, and South Dakota, while Texas has an increase of 5.6 per cent during that period, in the bottom one-third of the nation. All the agriculture states fared poorly.

What states are the winners? Alaska had personal income increase of 30.3 per cent during the period, thanks primarily to construction boom related to laying of the oil pipeline. West Virginia incomes soared by 16.2 per cent due to the revival of the coal industry, and the District of Columbia with the principal occupation—Government—which never seems to have a bad year, where personal income rose 15.3 per cent.

The report states that nationwide, wages and salaries of manufacturing employees fell 0.2 per cent. But factory workers in Michigan lost more than 17 per cent. Incomes from construction work dropped 5.2 per cent over the U. S.

In every state, one source of income increased. That was unemployment compensation. In 13 States jobless pay soared more than 400 per cent. Consider these percentage figures: total spending in U. S. is down 7.4; people's income, up 10.4; people at work, down 1.4; auto sales down 23.8; capital spending, down 9.5; new orders for durable goods, down 9.9; cost of living, up 15.8; home building down 34.3; people out of work, up 99.7; farmers' income down 39; corporate profits down 7.9; output of industry down 13.9; and retail sales down 4.3.

For the nation as a whole, the slide from late 1973 to the spring of 1975 was costly indeed. Total output dropped more than seven per cent. If the economy had grown at a normal pace in the year and a half of recession, an additional 187 billion dollars' worth of good and services would have been produced.

All these figures show one important fact as far as rural America is concerned. Agriculture suffered more during the recession than any other part of the U. S. economy, even the home building industry.

But even more serious a problem is this. Our national leaders are for more concerned with trying to "help" the home building industry than they are the farmers. They seem more concerned with suppressing agricultural market prices than with encouraging exports.

The problem of agriculture today is a 39 percent decline in income and a 15.8 percent increase in the cost of living. What makes this all even more unrealistic, is the huge demand for agricultural products in the world market places and the U. S. producing record setting amounts.

The idea that it is fine to build agriculture surplus (restricting export) to drive down raw material prices to combat inflation in the market place, while granting cost of living increases in salaries for all labor union employees, government workers, etc. is unreasonable and unfair.

#### TOO MUCH DEMAGOGUERY

It is ridiculous really to protest farmers selling their wheat anywhere in the world that can get a buyer. Isn't that what American free enterprise is all about.

Among the many crazy movements on today is the effort of various organizations and politicians to be overly protective to the consumer. We are a consumer orientated society, no doubt about that.

But that has helped neither the consumer, the producer, nor the manufacturer really.

All this hullabaloo being raised by the longshoremen's union over loading wheat sold to the Soviet Union is real crazy.

We were born and raised in the nation's wheat belt, and spent much of our life there. Most of those years we witnessed the concrete prairie skyscrapers rising along almost every railroad spur to hold grain the farmers raised but nobody wanted to buy.

Now we have a world food shortage. Now we have a year of bumper wheat production in this country. Usually that means a catastrophe for the farmer who produces the grain.

Europe has been devastated by drought, not just Russia.

So foreign countries want to buy American grain. But too many Americans are concerned only that it will increase the price of bread to the American consumer. What kind of a short-sighted policy is this?

For the first time in 40 years, the wheat farmer is growing a crop to sell instead of store on government loan. He has responded to government leaders exhorting him to produce to the maximum to prevent world starvation.

What happens? The cry is raised against wheat exports because the fear of price increases.

This is stupid. Only a few cents represent the cost of the grain used in a loaf of bread. Inflation in wages and in the distribution system is the culprit in the high cost of bread, not the price

of wheat. Today's bread is mostly air and water.

America ought to be proud of farmers who can grow bumper crops, not fear the cost if some of those crops are sold overseas.

It was only a few scant years ago that the United States had a huge deficit in foreign trade. The only reason that deficit doesn't exist today, with tremendous negative effects upon our economy, is because the farmer has at last gotten rid of crop surpluses and developed overseas markets.

It's a crazy world when unionized dockworkers can try to decrease America's economic policies and put the American farmer on the back burner.

If the wheat wasn't going to Russia, not a word would be said. There is too much cheap demagoguery in America today being substituted for national leadership.

#### TEXAS TOPS IN FARMLAND OWNERS

Texas boasts more farmland owners than any other state in the nation, says an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Texas has 267,000 of the 3.3 million farmland owners in the United States. The next leading states are Iowa and Illinois. Texas also leads in the number of nonfarm land owners, or landlords who lease their land to others, with 87,500. Individual Texas land holdings by both farmers and non-farmers average 548 acres compared to 320 acres for the national average.



# Public Notice

**ORDINANCE NO. 466**  
 AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO LONE STAR GAS COMPANY, A CORPORATION, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO FURNISH AND SUPPLY GAS TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN THE CITY OF MEMPHIS, HALL COUNTY, TEXAS, FOR THE TRANSPORTING, DELIVERY, SALE, AND DISTRIBUTION OF GAS IN, OUT OF, AND THROUGH SAID MUNICIPALITY FOR ALL PURPOSES; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF A FEE OR CHARGE FOR THE USE OF THE STREETS, ALLEYS AND PUBLIC WAYS; PROVIDING THAT IT SHALL BE IN LIEU OF OTHER FEES AND CHARGES, EXCEPTING AD VALOREM TAXES; AND REPEALING ALL PREVIOUS GAS FRANCHISE ORDINANCES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MEMPHIS, TEXAS:

**SECTION 1.** That the City of Memphis, Texas, hereinafter called "City," hereby grants to Lone Star Gas Company, hereinafter called "Company," its successors and assigns, consent to use and occupy the present and future streets, alleys, highways, public places, public thoroughfares, and grounds of City for the purpose of laying, maintaining, constructing, operating, and replacing therein and thereon pipelines and all other appurtenant equipment needed and necessary to deliver gas in, out of, and through said City and to sell gas to persons, firms, and corporations, including all the general public, within the City's corporate limits, said consent being granted for a term of twenty-five (25) years from and after the date of the final passage and approval of this ordinance.

**SECTION 2.** Company shall lay, maintain, construct, operate, and replace its pipes, mains, laterals, and other equipment so as to interfere as little as possible with traffic and shall promptly clean up and restore to an approximate original condition, at its cost, all thoroughfares and other surfaces which it may disturb. City will determine to its satisfaction that repairs are made so as to restore surfaces to their approximate original condition. The location of all mains, pipes, laterals, and other appurtenant equipment shall be fixed under the supervision of the City Council or an authorized committee or agent appointed by said Council.

**SECTION 3.** When Company shall make or cause to be made excavations or shall place obstructions in any street, alley, or other public place, the public shall be protected by barriers and lights placed, erected, and maintained by Company; and in the event of injury to any person or damage to any property by reason of the construction, operation, or maintenance of the gas distributing plant or system of Company, Company shall indemnify and keep harmless City from any and all liability in connection therewith. Company shall repair, clean up, and restore to an approximate original condition all streets and alleys disturbed during the construction and repair of its gas distributing system. City will determine to its satisfaction that repairs are made so as to restore surfaces to their approximate original condition.

**SECTION 4.** In addition to the rates charged for gas supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules, and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business, including a charge for services rendered in the inauguration of natural gas service, and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, any and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the Company's main in the streets or alleys to and throughout the consumer's premises. Company shall own, operate, and maintain all service lines, which are defined as the supply lines from the Company's main to the consumer's curb line, when mains are located in the streets and to the consumer's property line when mains are located in the alleys. The consumer shall own, operate, and maintain all yard lines and house piping. Yard lines are defined as the underground supply lines extending the point of connection with Company's service line to the point of connection with consumer's house piping.

**SECTION 5.** Company shall not be required to extend mains on any street more than one hundred (100) feet for any one consumer of gas.

**SECTION 6.** Company shall be entitled to require from each and every consumer of gas, before gas service is commenced, a deposit of twice the amount of an estimated average monthly bill, which said deposit may be retained by Company until service is discontinued and all bills therefor have been paid. Company shall then return said deposit to the consumer, together with six per-

cent (6%) interest per annum thereon from the date of said deposit up to the date of discontinuance of service. Company shall be entitled to apply said deposit, with accrued interest, to any indebtedness owed Company by the consumer making the deposit.

**SECTION 7.** The rights, privileges and franchises granted by this ordinance are not to be considered exclusive, and City hereinafter expressly reserves the right to grant, at any time, like privileges, rights, and franchises as it may see fit to any other person or corporation for the purpose of furnishing gas for light, heat, and power to and for City and the inhabitants thereof.

**SECTION 8.** Company shall furnish reasonably adequate service to the public at reasonable rates and charges therefor; and Company shall maintain its property, equipment, and appliances in good order and condition.

**SECTION 9.** Company, its successors and assigns, agrees to pay and City agrees to accept, on or before the 1st day of March, 1976, and on or before the same day of each succeeding year during the life of this franchise, up to and including the year 2000, a sum of money which shall be equivalent to three percent (3%) of the gross receipts received by Company from the sale of gas to its domestic and commercial consumers within the corporate limits of said City (expressly excluding, however, receipts derived from sales to industrial and governmental users and consumers in said City) for the preceding calendar year, which annual payment shall be for the rights and privileges herein granted to Company, including expressly, without limitation, the right to use the streets, alleys, and public ways of said City. And it is also expressly agreed that the aforesaid annual payment shall be in lieu of any and all other and additional occupation taxes, easements, and franchise taxes or charges (whether levied as an ad valorem, special or other character of tax or charge), in lieu of municipal license and inspection fees, street taxes, and street or alley rentals or charges, and all other and additional municipal taxes, charges, levies, fees, and rentals of whatsoever kind and character which City may impose or hereafter be authorized to levy and collect, excepting only the usual general or special ad valorem taxes, which City is authorized to levy and impose upon real and personal property. Should City not have the legal power to agree that the payment of the foregoing sums of money shall be in lieu of taxes, licenses, fees, street or alley rentals or charges, easement, or franchise taxes or charges aforesaid, then City agrees that it will apply so much of said sums of money paid as may be necessary to satisfy Company's obligations, if any, to pay any such taxes, licenses, charges, fees, rentals, easement, or franchise taxes or charges.

In order to determine the gross receipts received by Company from the sale of gas (expressly excluding the sale of gas to industrial and governmental consumers) within the corporate limits of City, Company agrees that on the same date that payments are made, as provided in the preceding paragraph of this Section 9, it will file with the City Clerk a sworn report showing the gross receipts from the sale of gas to its domestic and commercial consumers within said corporate limits for the calendar year preceding the date of payment. City may, if it sees fit, have the books and records of Company examined by a representative of said City to ascertain the correctness of the sworn reports agreed to be filed herein.

Receipts from sales to governmental users or consumers shall include all those receipts derived from the sale of gas to federal, state, county or city governments or branches and subdivisions thereof, school districts, or other similar districts, it being the intention to include within the term "governmental users and consumers" all tax-supported institutions owned or operated directly or indirectly by said governments and branches or subdivisions thereof, such as schools, colleges, hospitals, eleemosynary institutions, army or training camps, airports, courthouses, city hall, and other institutions of like or similar kind.

and character. "Industrial users or consumers," as herein used, are those generally and commonly classified as such by Company.

The payment herein provided shall be for the period January 1 to December 31 of the respective year that the payment is made.

**SECTION 10.** When this franchise ordinance shall have become effective, all previous ordinances of said City granting franchises for gas distribution purposes, which were held by Company, shall be automatically cancelled and annulled, and shall be of no further force and effect.

**SECTION 11.** Company shall file its written acceptance of this franchise ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by said City.

This is Collingsworth County's biggest annual event and a real treat for the family of an old fashion county fair.

We will add names of those who have entered the contest in the next several issues of "The Chamber Corner." To enter the beard growing contest all contestants need to get a "Gold" Hall County Shaving Permit from either one of the banks or any Chamber committee member. Shaving permits for those who are growing beards are \$1.00 each.

There are several residents who are taking the easy way out with a "Clean Shave Permit"; these are also available at \$5.00 each. The contest will be judged September 20th, so there are only two weeks left to go or grow! Last week we featured a story of factual historical information on Hall County written by Mrs. Lucille Dennis. The information was from the book entitled, "Yesterday In Hall County," by Inez Baker. Again, a revision of the past of "The Old Rath Trail." The "Rath Trail" was one of several trails laid out by the buffalo hunters after 1872. They established camps at several points where business was transacted by the freighters carrying supplies to the hunters and in turn gathering hides for the market. The main supply points were Fort Griffin (near Albany, Texas) and Fort Dodge in Kansas; both military installations set up by the United States government to help control the marauding Indians of the territory.

The "Rath Trail" was laid out by Charles Rath in 1874. He had

a store at the best known of the camps which was called Adobe Walls and located in Hutchinson County (near Stinnett, Texas in the Turkey Track Ranch area).

Beginning at Fort Griffin, the Rath Trail ran northward past the Double Fork Mountain on the Brazos River, thence on to Roaring Springs in Motley County and to Teepee City where there was a Buffalo Supply Store.

From Teepee City, the Rath Trail entered Hall County, crossed the North Pease River at the mouth of Wind River, then to Ridge Springs which was a buffalo store and a relay station for the mail riders. From Ridge Springs the trail crossed Red River at Fields Crossing near Parnell. It led on to the Shoe Bar Ranch Headquarters on Oaks Creek, then entered Donley County four miles to the north, passed Old Clarendon, and proceeded from there to Adobe Walls. From Adobe Walls (in Hutchinson County) the trail led to Dodge City, Kansas.

This, The Rath Trail was well known to many including: Colonel Charles Goodnight, James Vardy, and Dik Bassell, an old Buffalo hunter.

It was very disappointing to learn of the dropping of the \$43,000 matching grant for the renovation project of the Memphis City Park. However, state and federal regulations with such grants require certain provisions in regards to the public standards of the facility to be improved upon. In our case the environmental standards as well as child-rental safety standards required underground utilities in the project area. This standard as well as several others was noted and announced long before the program was approved by the City Council. However, with the economic situation among other factors of the present; the allocated government funding which was approved by the state during the early part of 1975 has been dropped by City officials.

In June the City Council replaced Park Coordinator Jim Edd Wines with the appointment of Mrs. Jerrie Gailey to that position. Mrs. Gailey with the work of the Park Committee will still seek renovation plans and projects for our City Park. All civic clubs and groups are still encouraged to reserve special activities for projects in the development of the City Park which are planned to be continued on a local basis of level. The Memphis Chamber appreciates the opportunity of serving the citizens of Memphis and City Officials in the proposals of a major renovation park project. We now have a beautiful park and just a small amount of interest on a local level can make our park much more attractive and beautiful.

### Sights On Safety

#### Avoid A Pool Of Trouble



A quick dip in a family swimming pool is a refreshing remedy for the long, hot summer. However, a piece of poolside electrical equipment can become an instrument of death if damaged or handled in a manner that causes electric current to leak into people.

The danger of leakage current is intensified at a poolside location, where it is likely that a person's skin will become wet. Skin moisture significantly reduces the skin's capacity to resist electric shock. Underwriters Laboratories Inc., an independent, not-for-profit organization testing for public safety, urges you to keep the following tips in mind when handling electrical equipment near a swimming pool.

Leakage current occurs when a flow of electricity is diverted from its intended path to ground. This irregularity is termed a "ground fault". Even a small quantity of leakage current can prove fatal to a normally healthy adult. A protective device, called a "ground fault circuit interrupter" (GFCI), is designed to interrupt the electrical power supply if a ground fault is detected. A GFCI will respond to a ground fault current as low as 5/1000 of an ampere, and will shut off the source of electric power in as little as 1/40th of a second, less time than it takes a heart to beat once.

The area around a swimming pool is particularly susceptible to leakage current. A defective filler pump motor, electric panelboard, or underwater light can cause disaster. Appliances used around the pool, such as electric barbecues, radio and television sets, or electric hand tools are also potentially dangerous. UL recommends that you install GFCI's in every circuit that supplies electric power to the pool area. This practice is also called for in the 1975 National

Electrical Code (NEC). The Code provides installation requirements that are widely implemented by various electrical inspection authorities.

The installation of GFCI's is the answer to one facet of swimming pool safety. UL recommends that the following safety rules should also be observed:

- If you feel a tingling sensation when in the water or approaching the pool, tell someone on deck to turn off all electrical power feeding equipment and appliances in and around the pool. You should then leave the pool area as quickly as possible, without contacting metallic objects. Children should be specifically warned about the consequences of this hazard. There have been cases reported in which children, aware of the presence of an electrical field, were hurt or killed because they dared each other to stay in the water longer or more closely approach the source of the field.
- Look for the UL Listing Mark on your electrical equipment. It's your assurance that the design of the equipment has been tested with regard to nationally recognized safety standards.

UL warns that electricity and water don't mix. To avoid a shocking experience, follow these important precautions.





And this week, the team has


been undergoing a lot of work. Tuesday night, Coach McMurray told local boosters that the team had its best workout on Tuesday.
