Checking with gins over the area, cotton trailers are loaded with cotton awaiting the gin stands and lined up in row after row. The yards are literally jammed tight with cotton trailers.

"We have not had any bad weather to delay harvest, so the gins are not getting any relief. Farmers fill them up just as soon as they are emptied," one gin manager said.

Also, some gins have had breakdown trouble. The Farmers Union Co-op Gin at Plaska lost power last week when a piece of machinery cut the main power line to the gin. Fortunately, no one was injured in the accident.

The Cold War Goes On!

Americans, be not fooled about the easing of world tensions between free world powers, communist powers Russia & China and third world powers. Times are just as hot now as they have been in years past, despite the absence of shooting wars on any major scale.

All the dirty, nasty tricks are still going on, and some are coming to light in the news media. This week several aspects of cold war have made headlines, which should serve to notify the citizens of the United States that enemy countries are still as untrustworthy as they have been in past years.

Consider the news release concerning the use of laser beams to interfere with American satellites used to check on military build-up in the U. S. S. R. and other countries of the world.

Also, the Soviet Union, in possible violation of the U. S. Soviet strategic arms accord, have placed large canvas covers over certain Russian roads apparently to conceal mobile missiles. The canvas covers appear to violate a provision of the accord which states that neither side would take "deliberate concealment measures" to impede verification of the agreement by satellite.

In past years a miniature electronic "bug", which dropped from a slit cut in the lining of a chair in a House hearing room has been traced by the FBI to the Soviet Union. The tiny listening device was discovered in 1973 in the ornate sanctum of the House International Relations Committee. The battery was dead, but it could have been operating during delicate discussions of the SALT disarmament talks, military aid and the Vietnam withdrawal.

Espionage is a big part of the cold war and it goes on all over the world as major powers try to get information which could be useful in furthering each nations goals and objectives. Americans can not ignore the reality of the powers struggle between nations of the world, nor can they moralize under what rules nations use in conducting espionage against each

On the other hand, however, Americans should understand that this nation must continue to maintain its posture in world affairs, continue to be a world power, despite the tremendous cost. Our faith should not be shaken becausse of adversity or setbacks. As a nation, the United States will make mistakes & expenses, use poor judgement. Congressional committees will investigate failures and our citizens will feel uneasy about the state of af-

These are trying times, and history will be the final judge as to how it will all turn out. In the meantime, it would be wise for our citizens to elect the most qualified and dedicated Junior off to school in a Cadillac men and women to serve this nation in positions of leadership. If we learn any lesson, it should be that the moral value of our leaders greatly determines the moral fiber of our nation's policy on world affairs.

What does it cost to raise a child? A recent government survey says that it now costs middle income families between \$54,-000 and \$75,000 to raise a child and send him or her to public school and through four years of

The experts have an old way of figuring this, but we are here to say that they are wrong. We have had experience with three children, and while they have cost us some money, we can guarantee that they haven't cost us any \$75,000 a piece for the simole reason that we never in our life have had scraped together anywhere close to \$225,000 with which to rear three children.

If you don't have it, you can't spend it, the way we figure it. The experts figure it this way

First, there is an average of \$35,-000 in wages lost by the mother who, except for having children, you think you are. would or could have worked at least part time. The rest is for food, clothing, housing, transportation, medical college, and other

Although the Southern housewife is often pictured as the one worried about how white her wash is, this Michigan study shows that 73 per cent of Southern housewifes are satisfied with their lot and enjoy being a housewife and home maker.

In the East, only 52 per cent say that they are satisfied. In the West the housewife happiness is only 60 per cent.

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

IRA Service at the FNB

What is an IRA?

"IRA" stands for individual retirement account-a new form of tax-favored savings authorized by Federal law.

What's the purpose of IRAs?

For years the tax law has allowed employers and self-employed persons to deduct contributions to "qualified" retirement plans. Millions of employees and self-employeds have benefited accordingly. But employees of companies without plans were left out.

Now at last the Federal tax law grants the privileges of deductible contributions and tax-free accumulation for individual retire-

What are the tax advantages of an IRA?

First, you get a tax deduction for your de posits in an IRA account.

Second, the interest on your account compounds tax-free.

Who can start an IRA?

Any employee who is not covered by a 'qualified' retirement plan (pension, profitsharing, etc.) maintained by his employer. Also a self-employed person who has earnings from personal services and is not covered by an "HR 10" plan.

How much can I put into an IRA?

You can contribute up to 15% of your earnings, but not more than \$1,500 a year. There is no rule against contributing less.

Can I make periodic deposits through the year, such as weekly, monthly, etc.?

Yes, provided you do not go over the 15% -\$1,500 annual limit.

What about husband and wife?

If both have earnings, each one can have an IRA, and the limit applies to each one separately. If husband had \$10,000 wages, he could put \$1,500 into his IRA; and if wife had free-lance earnings of \$9,000 she could put \$1,350 into hers. They could deduct both amounts on their joint return, or each separately if they filed separately. (This is true in community property states, also.)

Once I start, am I required to make a deposit every year?

No. But there is no carryover of an unused deduction. The following year's limit will still be 15%-\$1,500.

What are some examples of the tax deduction for IRA contributions?

In the 22% bracket (married couple, income \$10,000·12,000) the taxes saved by a \$1,500 contribution would be \$330. In effect, the deposit of \$1,500 would cost only \$1,170. The effect may be tabulated

What if I use the standard deduction on my tax return?

It makes no difference. You can deduct your IRA contributions whether you itemize your deductions or take the standard deduction.

Are there any restrictions on withdrawals from an IRA

Yes. Once an IRA has been started, any withdrawal before the depositor reaches the age of 591/2 will result in a penalty tax of 10% of the amount withdrawn. This in addition to the regular income tax on the amount withdrawn. An exception permits per 591/2 withdrawal in case of the depositor's death or disability.

How long can I leave the money in IRA?

Payout must be made, or at least begin, when the depositor reaches the age of 701/2. At that time, if a lump-sum withdrawal is not made, a program of instalment payouts must start.

What happens on the death of an IRA owner?

Provisions may be made for immediate payout. The law requires that, within 5 years, the entire balance in the account must either be paid out in full to, or applied to the purchase of an annuity for, the owner's beneficiary.

How are payouts from IRAs taxed?

Any IRA payout is fully taxable ordinary income. In case of a large withdrawal, the regular 5-year income averaging privilege is available.

One advantage of the instalment payout method is that the income may be spread out over a longer period, thus avoiding higher tax brackets.

COLLEGE STATION -- More than 13 million dogs and cats were destroyed last year at animal shel-ters in the United States because nobody wanted them.

And you can add another five million to that figure to take into account those strays that are never caught and meet their death by starvation, disease or under the wheels of a vehicle. What's the solution to this

tragedy? "Pet owners are chiefly to blame," contends Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "They let their pets stray so they often become lost. But the worst part is that pet owners se sentences should in- take no precaution against accidential breeding of their ani-

To avoid accidential breeding owners should either keep their animals confined or should have them nutered, advises the Texas A&M University System veterinarian. Special attention should be given to spraying female pets.

COLLEGE STATION - To vary this year's holiday menu, try juicy, flavorful lamb for a special treat, Mrs. Mary Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist

"The quality of lamb today has mproved due to the better breeding, feeding and marketing practices. Lamb is rich in protein, iron, and in B vitamins.

"Today's lamb contains less fat and fewer calaries when purchased well trimmed. All cuts of amb are tender because the lamb s less than one year when mar-

"One holiday favorite is leg of lamb, roasted fat side up resting on a bed of onions. Pierce holes in the meat and stuff a small piece of fresh garlic in them.

"If using a meat thermometer, insert it into the roast so the tip is in the center of the roast but does not touch the bone. Roast the leg of lamb in a 325 degree F. oven until medium to well done."

A five to eight pound leg of lamb requires three to four hours of cooking. Boneless lamb roast weighing three to five pounds requires two to three hours, she

Remove the roast from the oven when done. Place onions cooked in the bottom of the pan through a sieve and use to flavor a gravy or sour cream sauce. "The secret in making a smooth

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

Then we spent long hours figuring out just what ingredients would be needed. The recipe we worked out called for crackers, margarine, chocolate, powdered milk, and baking powder, raisins and jam. We took a vote and chose pineapple jam - which meant that we'd ed with the fellows in the other barracks. About this time in the planning someone suggested making some wine to go with the cake so they scrubbed and cleaned a mop pail to make the wine inthen used raisins, sugar and water to make the wine.

The plan called for each man his ration each week: A teaspoonful of powdered milk, a tablespoon of margarine, a quarter of a chocolate bar, a half dozen raisins, one lump of sugar and one cracker. All went well until the first week passed and it became time for the "ration bank" to be started. Two of the fellows announced they would not join with us. "A nibble of food now is worth more than something next month," said one brightly. The other chap mumbled something about not wanting to make a sacrifice only to have the Germans search the barracks and seize the food. They made a crust by mixing the grated crackers with margarine and water. The crust, and inch thick, lined the porcelain pan. The water dried, the crust hardened. 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



Turning to food consumption issue, the economist points out that Americans will eat 1.5 per cent less food in 1975 than last year and that this will be the lowest level in seven years.

"This is due to the fact that prices for feed beef, pork and poultry have been higher. Supplies of these products were restricted due to last year's drought and high-priced feed crops."
