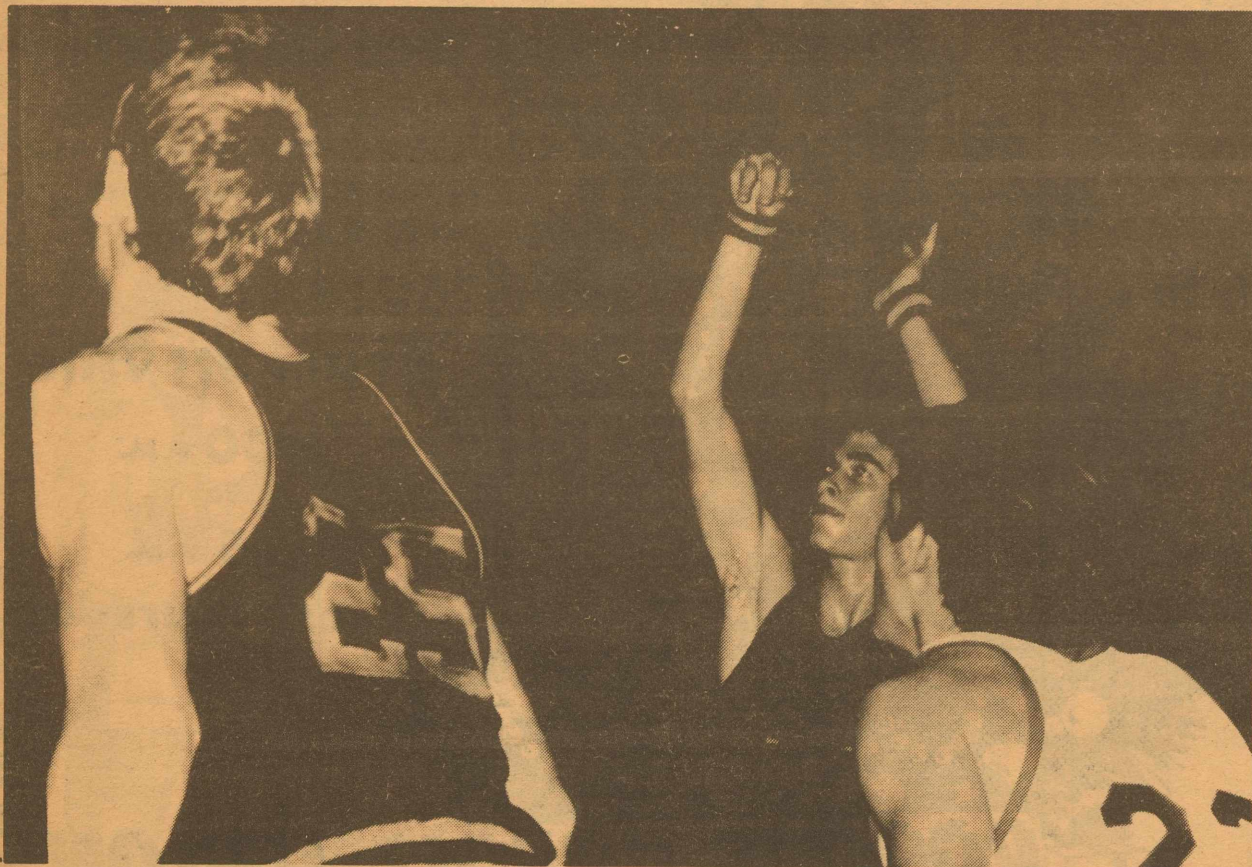

On November the 5th, at 4 P.M., the City was notified that they were eligible for a grant under the "Public Works Employment Act." The City had previously been told they did not qualify for this grant.

The application had to be completed and in Austin by November the 10th. As the application was mostly for construction and the labor it would entail, engineer approval and clear titles to all property involved also action and approval by the City Council.

A special meeting was called for Saturday Night, the 6th of November, at which time many needs were discussed and approved; however, due to the short time, there was no way to get certified plans and titles.

One thing that was in the mill, however, was the construction of a firemen's meeting room above the present fire hall and the extension of the present vehicle storage shed with an added room for the extra fire equipment. This was the only project that could qualify in such short time.

The application was completed by the City Staff and plans drawn for the projects. Both were carried to Austin where we were able to get an engineer to certify the plans and specs after which the complete application was delivered to Economic Development Administration in time.

The City since has received favorable report from the MRGDC a95 reviewing committee, the historical Society and the Governor's office; also notification from EDA that they were still reviewing the application. The Grant is 100% in the amount of \$132,000 of which more than 50% has to be spent on labor.

NEVER GIVE ADVICE IN A CROWD

TAX FORMS TO BE LATE

AUSTIN, TEXAS --Taxpayers should receive their Form 1040 and 1040A income tax packages about two weeks later this year than last year. Late enactment of the Tax Reform Act of 1976 caused the delay, according to Robert M. McKeever, IRS District Director for Southern Texas.

The 1976 Form 1040 packages should arrive at taxpayers' addresses by the middle of January, while the 1040A "short form" packages should arrive by January 7, McKeever said.

The Farmer's Tax Guide (publication 225) should be available by December 15. Such publications as Your Federal Income Tax (publication 17) and the Small Business Guide (publication 334) should be available in early January

YOUR REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS

It's hard to believe that it's almost time for the next legislative session to begin. The 65th Legislature convenes in Austin at noon on January 11, 1976, and will be in session until the end of May.

Every indication is that it will be an interesting, important, and action-packed 140 days.

Of course financing our state government is the number one assignment for each legislature. And I'm delighted to tell you that we anticipate, as of now, a "surplus" of between 2.6 and 3 billion dollars in the state treasury. The surplus dollars will create another problem--keen competition between state agencies and various special interest groups for a piece of the pie.

One area that will receive a fairly heavy ingestion of new state funds is education. Both the Legislature and the Governor are committed to increasing the amount of money Texas spends on educating children. The state's acceptance of more of the cost would have two important consequences: Cost of education in the state would be more equalized, as we are under court order to do; and some of the burden on the local property taxpayer would be lifted. This school financing issue will

probably be the one on which the next Legislature spends the most time, effort, and money.

Also tied in with the budget and the disposition of it, is our highway situation. I don't need to belabor this point, as I'm sure you are by now well aware of the funding crisis our highway department faces.

An adequate and well-maintained highway system--as people in our part of the state well know--is a must for continued economic development in Texas as well as for our very life style. The problems of the state Highway Fund will receive the highest consideration during the 65th session.

Let me take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support and encouragement. It is a great honor and pleasure to serve as your representative, and I appreciate the continued confidence you have demonstrated in me.

During this interim between sessions I have enjoyed traveling in the district, meeting with interested constituents and making speeches, in addition to performing my legislative committee duties. Between now and the first of January, I shall be studying legislative issues and drafting bills in preparation for the coming session. 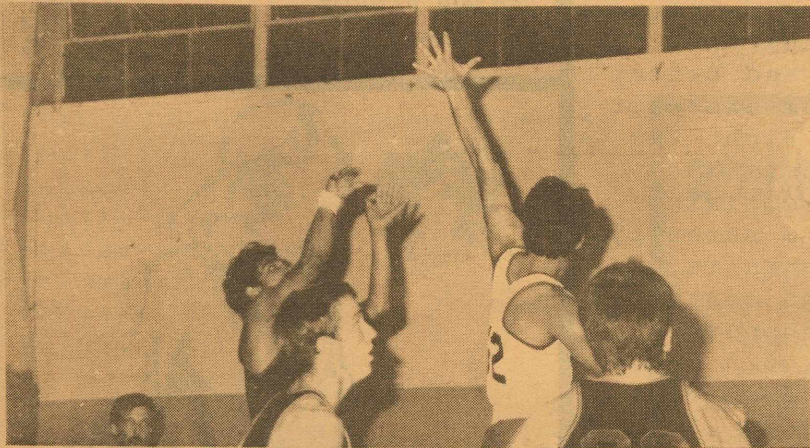

CB BREAK

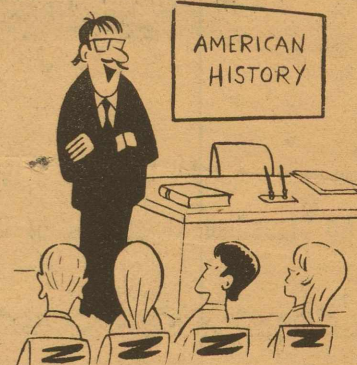

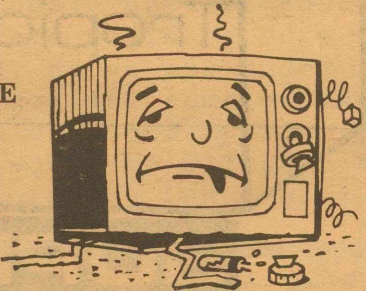
