## RABIES CASE HERE

### RABIES CLINICS SET

Dennis Harris, Fort Clark Springs General Manager, informed the Cavalryman that a confirmed rabied skunk had been found in a residential area at Fort Clark. Harris said they were instantly initiating a vaccination program that would take place this Saturday, March 5, from 9 to 5 p.m. at Town Hall at Fort Clark. The Vaccination program will be open to the public at a \$3 fee per animal. Persons who are not residents of Fort Clark may bring their animals for the program by informing the gate guard that they are taking their animal for vaccination at the Town Hall.

City Hall was contacted and City Secretary, Roland Williams, stated that a vaccination program will take place at City Hall on March 12 at \$3 per animal (see page 7, City Hall).

There will be another rabies vaccination program taking place on March 15 from 1 to 6 p.m. at the Kinney County Wool & Mohair, also for a \$3 fee.

Regardless of where your animals are vaccinated, they need to be registered with the city since the city of Brackettville is the only agency involved with animal control. If your animal is not registered and is not wearing tags, it is subject to being picked up and possible destroyed.

### DUPREE TO SPEAK AT SPORTS BANQUET



The Annual All Sports Banquet will be held on March 15th at 8:00 P.M. at the Brackett Civic Center. This year the program will feature Billy Joe DuPree.

DuPree regained the starting slot at tight end when Jean Fugett signed with Washington, and hopes to prove that he can hold the spot and play like a first round draft choice in 1976. Nagging injuries, including a broken finger, kept Billy Joe out of the production line for most of last season, although one of his nine receptions was a big one - the overtime winner against St. Louis. "Billy Joe is a solid football player," said Tom Landry. "He does a yeoman's job for us every time we ask him to. He'll continue to play well." DuPree said: "As far as my game - blocking and catching the ball - is concerned, I feel I'm as good as any tight end in the league and better than most. I like to play but I would like to play healthy. If I'd been physically OK I'd have been a bit hacked off (about not starting) because when I'm healthy I can do the job. You can count on it." Healthy again and in top shape after an off-season, when he made 20 receptions in the final seven games of the season.

Playing in a run-oriented offense at Michigan State, DuPree caught 60 passes in three varsity seasons for 1,222 yards and six touchdowns before being drafted in the first round by the Cowboys in '73. He played one season of varsity basketball for the Spartans.

Billy Joe, his wife Marsha and son Shon make their home in Dallas where, he "manages" the highly active Cowboy basketball team which he helped organize. "B.J.", who grew up in Monroe, La., is active with Big Brothers of America.

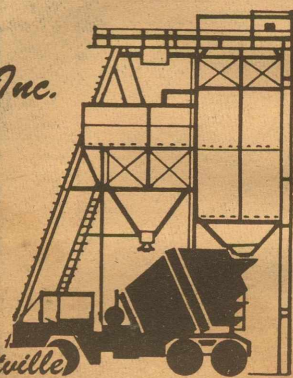

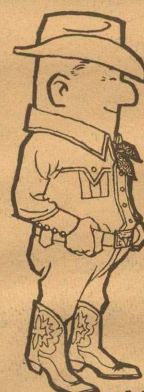
## CB BREAK

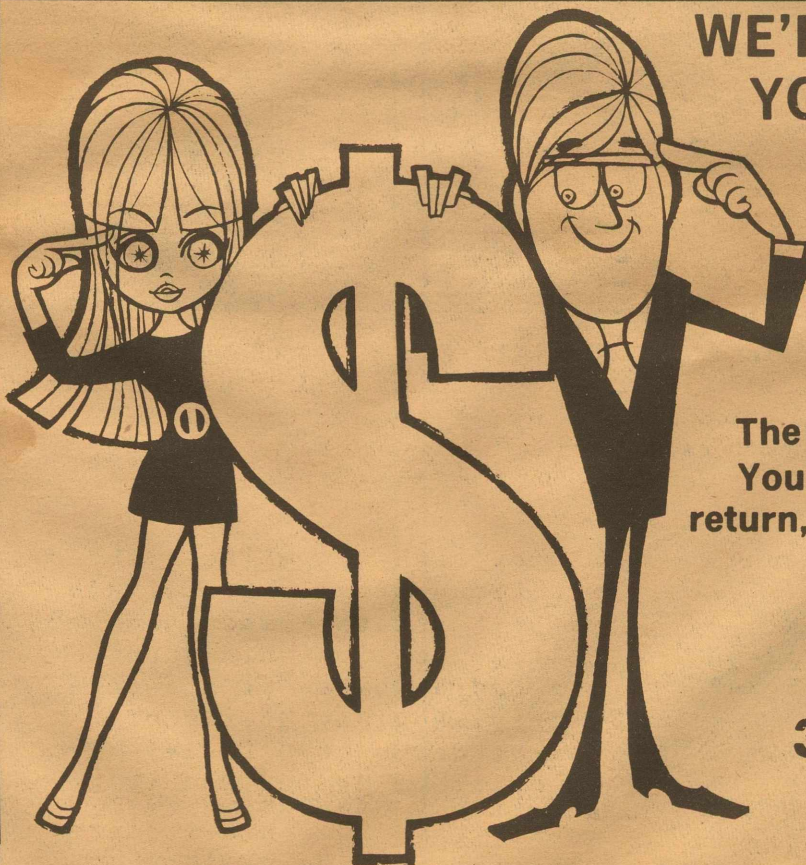
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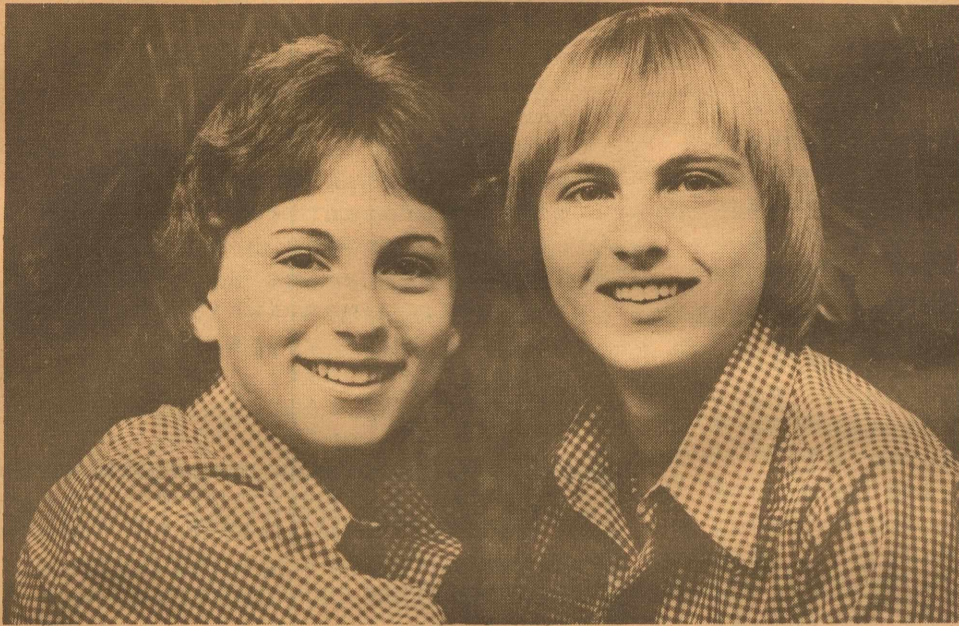

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**RED CROSS**

The Kinney County, Texas Chapter, American Red Cross is being re-organized with Linda Young as Chairman and Judge Tommy Seargeant as Co-Chairman. Mary Schwander is our Treasurer, Mary Flores is Service to Military Families and Alvin F. Hall will head up the Disaster Committee.

The main purpose of the American Red Cross is too fold: Service to military families and disaster relief.

However, over the years the organization has expanded its programs into the following areas: Nursing and Health programs which include: Disaster Nurses--Trained nurses to assist you in shelters during a disaster.

Community Gatherings--A volunteer nurse can provide first aid and nursing care at large community gatherings.

Free Health Care--Our trained volunteer instructor will

teach your group one of a variety of health courses. These courses can be arranged at a place in your neighborhood.

Home Nursing--A course in which one learns the basic nursing fundamentals needed to care for a sick or injured person in the home.

Mother & Baby Care--A course for expectant parents to help them prepare for parenthood. Learn about bathing diapering, feeding, and caring for a sick infant.

Mother's Aide--A course for young people to help them learn the skills of baby sitting.

Groovy Grooming--A course for teenagers to help them make the very best use of their physical and psychological self. Learn about hygiene, wardrobe, diet, makeup, etc.

Disaster Nursing Workshop--A course designed for registered nurses, vocational nurses and nursing students to train them how to use their nursing skills during disaster.

Other Red Cross courses include Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), Water Safety and first aid courses. Your American Red Cross is still very active in the Blood Bank Program.

"As you can see, there are many programs available to our community through our local Red Cross Chapter here in Kinney County.

I believe it is very important that all of us support our chapter either accepting a position on the Board of Directors by volunteering for various projects and finally through you financial support."

In the near future a letter campaign will be implemented to give you an opportunity to support your Kinney County Chapter financially so that some of the programs mentioned earlier in this article can begin in Brackettville.

Each contribution to the Kinney County Chapter of the American Red Cross is tax-exempt.

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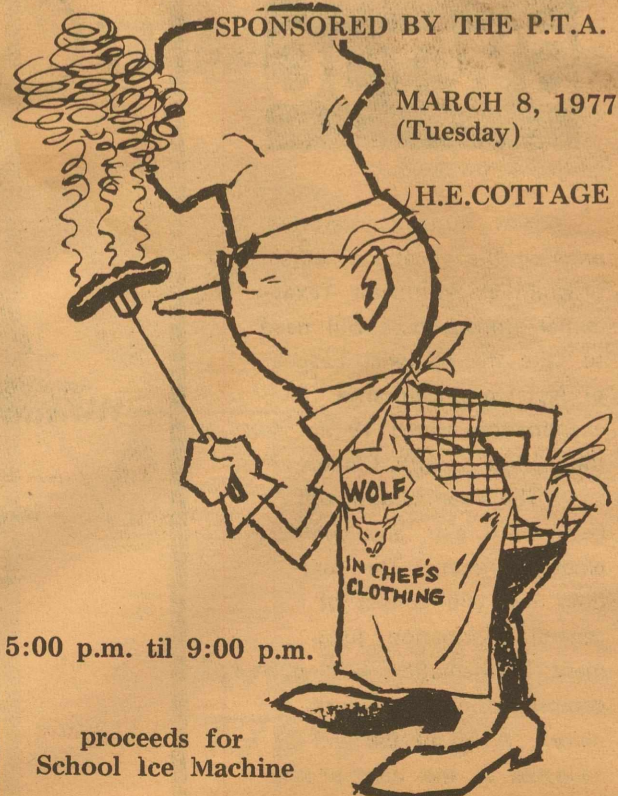
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## OUTSTANDING CITIZEN

Too often the citizens of the Community who really make things move are given scant if any recognition. It shall be the purpose of this column to spotlight individuals who deserve recognition but seldom receive it.

One such example is Roland Williams. He was brought to Brackettville as a very small boy by his parents and has spent his life here. He has been in a variety of business enterprises in the city. In 1957 he was awarded a "Proclamation of Appreciation for Services Rendered" and proclaimed "Buddy to Boys" because of his work with Kinney County Teenage Ball Team. He was twice given awards for work with Girl Scouts. In 1964 he along with

Joe York, Jr. was instrumental in securing water for Brackettville when the spring went dry. In 1964 he was awarded a plaque "For Loyalty and Service" on the Brackettville School Board. In 1965 he was given a certificate of appreciation by the Future Farmers of America. In 1967 he received a shield for "Service Rendered to Youth" as member of Brackettville School Board. In 1968, Roland was cited for "Outstanding Leadership" as mayor of Brackettville. Roland took time out to do a combat hitch in World War II. He served on the City Council for many years and has served as City Secretary for 6 years. The drainage system in Brackettville as well as the paving of the streets is attributable to the hard work of Roland Williams. The handling of the water system,

the sewer system and the natural gas system has been ably carried out by this man. Roland is a man of hard work, little pay (his low salary is a disgrace) and slight praise but he is a most important key to our city. When you hear the announcers voice at the football games (which has been his for more years than most people remember) just remember it belongs to a man worthy of commendation.

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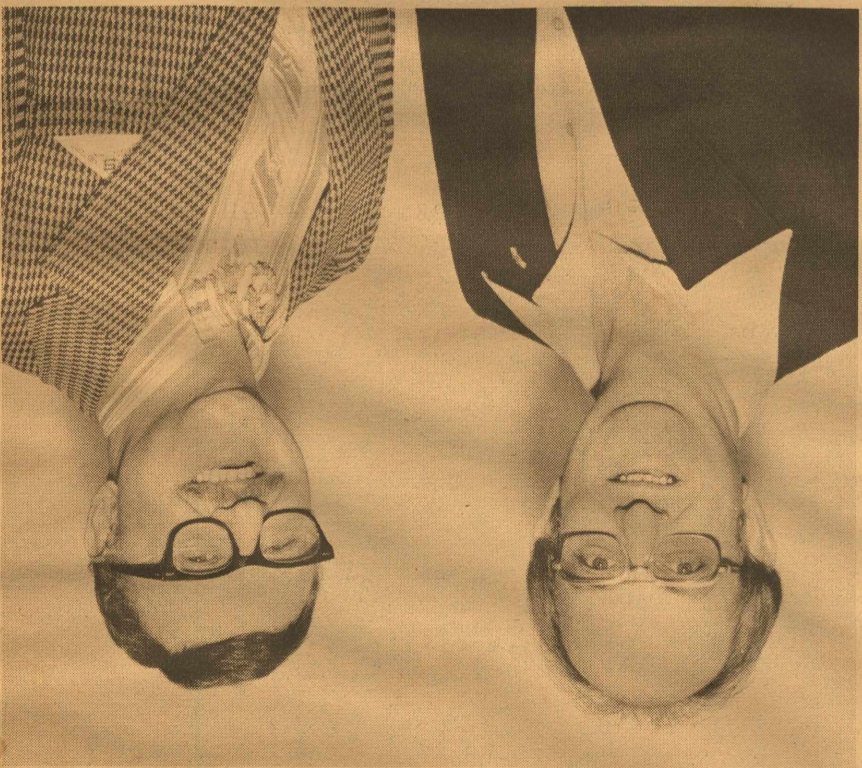
**NEW TALENT FIRM**

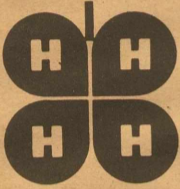
The company opened officially February 1st, and for the record Bob Bray is the President. When asked what his role in the new company is, Happy quips, "I am the janitor."

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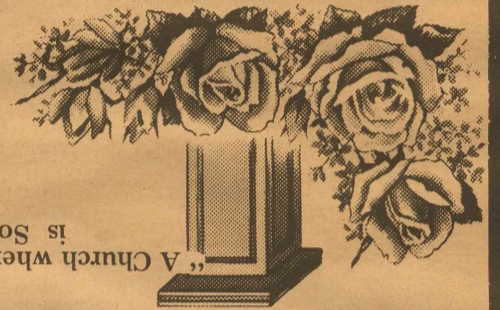
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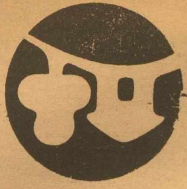

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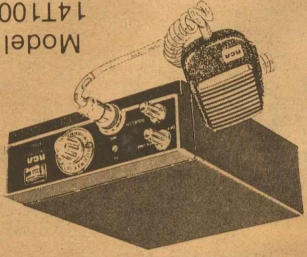
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# YOUR REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS:

The most interesting news from Austin since my last report is the tax reduction bill that passed the House overwhelmingly on February 14. The cut was a double-pronged one, and its effects will be felt by every Texas, both now and in the years to come. One part of the bill repealed the 4% sales tax on residential utility bills. Admittedly a 4% reduction on your utility bill is not a large amount, but with the utility costs skyrocketing, every little bit of saving will help. In addition to the 4% reduction, cities that currently levy a 1% sales tax on utilities will have the option of repealing it, thus affording consumers in some areas a 5% saving. You'll see the reduction on your utility bills beginning July 1 if the tax cut package passes the Senate, where it is now in committee, as I write this report.

The second part of the proposal raised the state inheritance tax exemption from \$25,000 to \$200,000. Thus many people will be able to pass homes, small businesses, and accumulated assets on to their heirs without worrying that the inheritance tax will consume their estate.

I am serving as secretary of the West Texas Legislative Delegation. This group is made up of all state legislators representing districts that lie west of Fort Worth, and we meet monthly to discuss issues of particular concern to our part of the state.

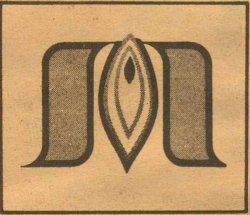

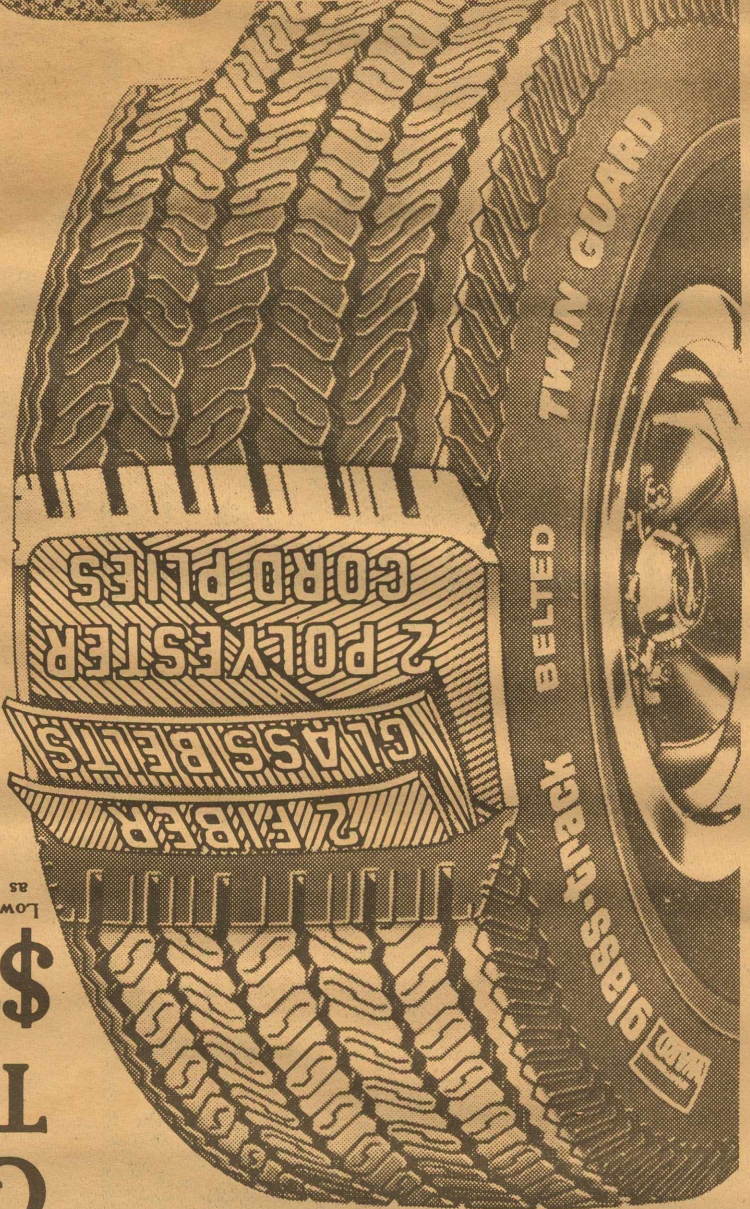

**ELECTION**  
As of March 2, 1977, six persons have filed for office of Alderman. March 3, 1977 will be the last day to file for this office. The election is to fill two expiring terms. Absentee voting starts March 14 thru 29, 1977. Election date is April 2, 1977.

**RABIES**  
The City of Brackettville urgently asks that everyone with pets have them vaccinated for rabies during the Vaccination Program at the City Hall Building on March 12, 1977 (SEE AD). Rabies is very prevalent this year and seems to be working north. The City has had to destroy several dogs this year, three of which were sent for tests which all showed negative. We must all agree that there are too many dogs running loose in the city without proper care, these animals will be required to have tags or be registered otherwise they will be impounded and if not claimed will be destroyed.

The City has been invited to submit a full application for Block Grant. The original request was for \$250,000.00, but on the point system used by Department Housing & Urban Development we were tied with two other cities. HUD decided to grant each \$100,000.00. This grant was to install valves in our main water supply lines to eliminate having to close the entire city off in cases of emergencies, also to install some curbs and gutters, widen the bridge on El Paso Street, improve some alleys and line portions of the drainage systems.

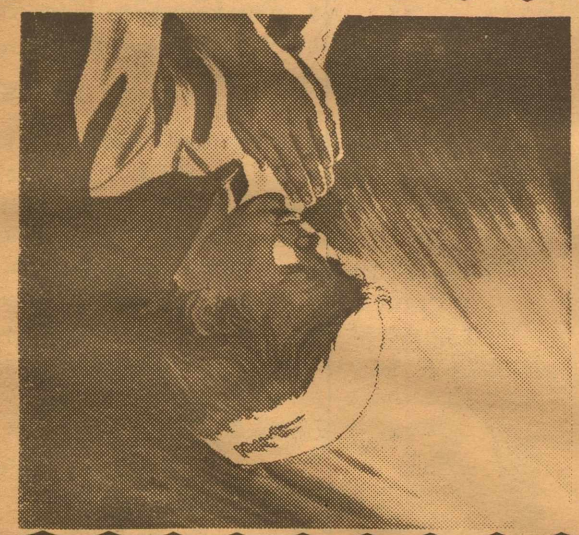
