LONG-TIME RESIDENT DIES

NEW ATHLETIC DIRECTOR HIRED

Superintendent for the Brackett Independent School District, Marion Wills, announced last week that the School Board had hired James H. (Jimmy) Simmons as Athletic Director.

Simmons will take the slot opened when Bobby Slaughter accepted the position of Athletic Director with the Eagle Pass High School.

Simmons will come to Tiger territory from New Braunfels where he has coached both football and track for the Unicorns.

He is qualified to teach P.E., History, Health and Driver's Education.

He began his coaching career at Fredericksburg in 1968 and spent 3 years there with Jr. football, basketball and track. He also coached in Eagle Pass on the Varsity football staff and was assistant track coach.

He and his family, wife Phyllis, a teacher; eighth grade daughter Jacqueline and pre-schooler Rex, age five belong to the Episcopal Church.

The Simmon's family are expected to join our community soon.

The Dancers, under the direction of Nelda Drury, professor of physical education, perform a variety of international dances from Poland, Germany, Italy, Hawaii, Yugoslavia, Mexico, South America and the Philippines.

The group has given performances at New York's World Fair, San Antonio's Hemisfair, the Texas Folklife Festival and numerous other civic affairs. Last summer they toured Japan as guest of the Federation of Musicians. The students combine their performing skills with teaching skills when they are invited to attend a dance workshop. The Dancers have taught and performed in Washington, D.C., Denver, Colorado and Covington, Kentucky.

Carl Esser Reports:

A countywide meeting about the proposed Beef Research and Information Act has been called for 12:00 noon April 19 at the Brackettville Country Club by P.H. Coates III, chairman of the Kinney County Beef Development Task Force.

Details about the upcoming beef referendum will be explained, the chairman has announced.

The educational program, which is designed for all beef and dairy cattle owners of the county, will include two slide presentations about the Beef Research and Information Act--one prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service--and the second by the Beef Development Task Force. There will be a period for questions and comments from producers.

Additionally, the BDT chairman, County Extension Agent Carl Esser, and Extension Livestock specialist Leroy Hoermann, will provide more detailed information about the forthcoming beef referendum.

The Beef Research and Information Act serves as enabling legislation and authorized the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a referendum among beef producers to determine whether they want a beef development plan, developed by an industry-wide committee.


"The beef development plan is a proposed national checkoff program that would be financed by assessment as spelled out in the beef marketing order. If approved, the plan would provide some \$30 to \$40 million per year for beef research, consumer and producer information, promotion and market development," explains Coates.

Expenditures, he added, would be directed by a 68-member board of cattlemen and representatives of livestock organizations.

To be eligible to participate in the beef referendum, beef and dairy cattle owners need to make two trips to their county Agri-

cultural Stabilization and Conservation Offices: the first trip to register, and the second to vote.


"This bell is now a symbol for the Mental Health Association, ringing out hope for the mentally ill and victory over mental illness," she added.

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STAR, SAN ANTONIO CHAMBER TO COMBINE ANNUAL MEETINGS


