We have a very desperate situation, losing our doctor, which none of these gentlemen seem to be concerned about.

While the City Council brings up insignificant points of which councilman's street will be paved next to his business, and another councilman wants to know where his sewer tap is, and the county commissioners dicker over who's going to use who's equipment, none of them have brought up the point of a doctor for our community.

It's quite evident that the county commissioners court is pleased with spending thousands of dollars of federal tax money to supply transportation for the elderly, but they don't give a dam about securing local medical facilities for these same people.

I don't no where the blame should fall, our clinic committee has dropped the ball, the city fathers and county dads evidently are not concerned. After all, shouldn't they be the ones responsible for the welfare of the people of our community?

Youth ages 14-19 compete in the senior program which the junior division contest involves ages 11-13 and preteens are 9 and 10 years old. "One participant in each division will be select for district com-

"in order that the individual may select and make clothing which is becoming and expressive of the personality, our clothing program emphasizes development of an understanding of 'self', as well as developing skills in planning, buying and constructing clothing," the agent added. "Other purposes are to develop the ability to select suitable and becoming accessories, to develop grace, good posture, and habits of good grooming while learning to work and share with others."

The 3 major areas judged and the points each counts are" Overall appearance--50 points, construction--35 points; and record--15 points. The record is a 2-page questionnaire to help determine leadership and personal development which is judged by leaders prior to the 4-H contest. The construction judging is a through examination of the garment off the girl for quality of work, suitability for fabric and pattern style and creative techniques. Judging for overall appearance is a look at the garment on the girl for personal appearance, becomingness and suitability of garment and accessories, fit for the person and current fashion; and practicality of the outfit for the persons' age, activities and personality.

Whoever you are, whatever you do, 4-H has a place for you. The 4-H Clothing project is just one of its many-sided phases.

The dress revue is a national 4-H awards program sponsored by Simplicity Pattern Company in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A & M University System.

TIPS FOR GREEN

It's time again for ants to become a problem. The most damaging are the "cutting ants" These can strip a good sized tree overnight. They can do tremendous damage to roses, shrubs, and other plants. They often work at night, but sometimes work during day light hours. While they are indeed fascinating to watch and interesting to study, they still work havoc. If you catch them working you will have little trouble following their trail to the hole. There are many ant "baits" available. Most are not really effective. The bureaucrats have had their ears twisted by the "environmentalists" and have robbed us of the most effective controls, DDT and Dieldrin. They shortly will take away chloradane. Chloradane is still available in many places and is the best pesticide presently usable. Sprinkle the ground around an ant hole liberally with chloradane in a circle about 36" in diameter. This will effectively stop your ant problem from that den at least for a while. Sprinkling chloradane where ants travel will effectively control them. This pesticide is inexpensive and relatively harmless. Follow the directions and you'll have no trouble.

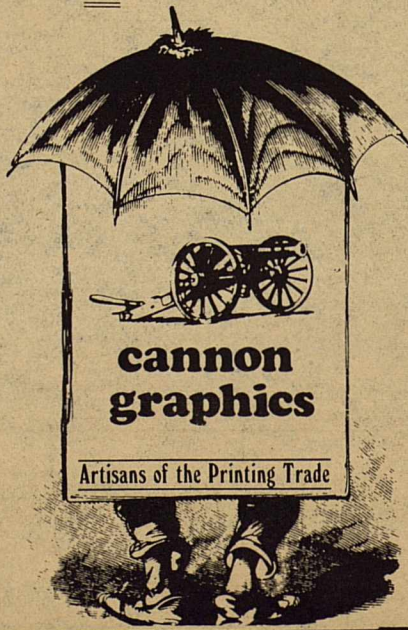

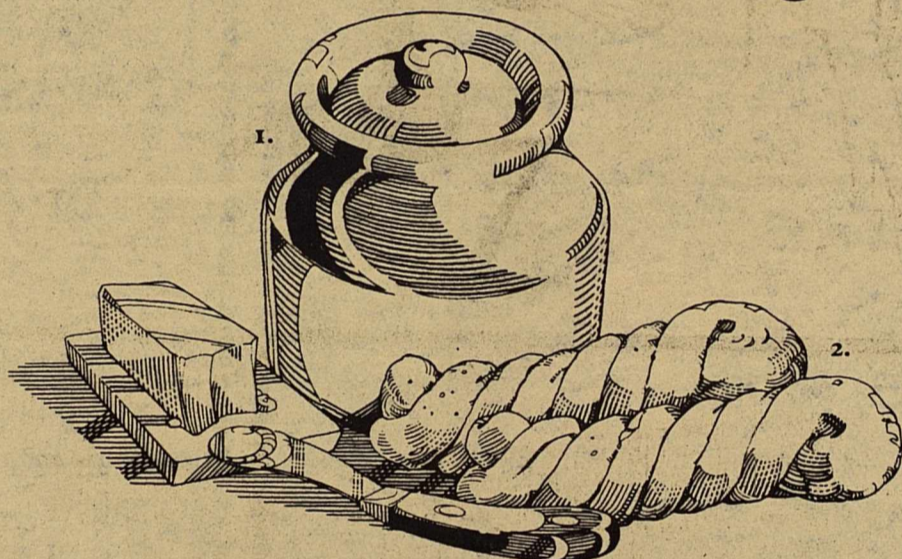


LADIES WATER POLO----- Brackett's Mary Jane Flores and Gladys Hall put up a real fight against the Del Rio team.

1. SOURDOUGH STARTER

| 1 package active dry yeast | 1 cup instant nonfat dry milk |
| 2½ cups warm water (105° to 115°) | 2 tablespoons sugar |
| | 4 cups all-purpose flour |

a) Stir yeast, water, dry milk and sugar in 2½ quart crock or non-metallic bowl until yeast is dissolved. Stir in flour gradually until a smooth batter forms. Let stand loosely covered in warm place, 3 to 5 days. Stir down batter occasionally. Store loosely covered in refrigerator.

b) Replace exact amount of starter used for each recipe by stirring equal amounts of homogenized milk and flour back into starter. (For example, replace 1 cup starter with ½ cup homogenized milk and ½ cup flour). Let stand loosely covered until it bubbles, overnight. Stir down. Each time this process is repeated, the starter becomes more active and develops a more sour flavor. Note: if stored as much as two to three weeks between usings, just pour off the watery layer on top and replace following procedure in (b).

2. SOURDOUGH BREAD STICKS

- | | |
|--|-----------------------------------|
| 1 cup instant nonfat dry milk | 2 teaspoons salt |
| 1 cup warm water (105° to 115°) | 2 teaspoons sugar |
| 1 cup Sourdough Starter (see Recipe No. 1) | ½ teaspoon baking soda |
| 2 cups all-purpose flour | ½ to 1 cup all-purpose flour |
| 3 tablespoons vegetable oil | ¼ cup butter or margarine, melted |

a) Mix dry milk, water, Sourdough Starter and 2 cups flour in non-metallic bowl; cover loosely. Let stand in warm place until mixture is coarse and bubbly, at least 8 hours.


b) Mix oil, salt, sugar and baking soda into sourdough mixture. Stir in enough of the remaining flour to make dough easy to handle. Knead dough lightly on well-floured board, about 2 minutes.

c) Roll dough into rectangle, 15 x 10 inches, on well-floured board. Cut into fifteen 1-inch strips. Roll each strip into even round strand, about 14 inches long. Double strand over and twist to form bread stick. Place bread sticks on greased baking sheet, brush with melted butter. Cover with plastic wrap. Let rise in warm place until double, 1 to 1½ hours.

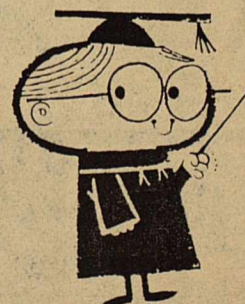
d) Heat oven to 375°. Bake bread sticks until golden brown, 30 to 35 minutes. (Makes 15).

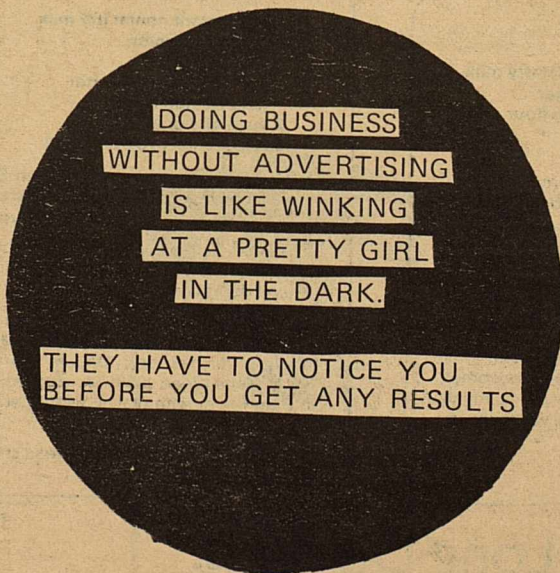

After the business meeting the whole department enjoyed a delicious banquet.

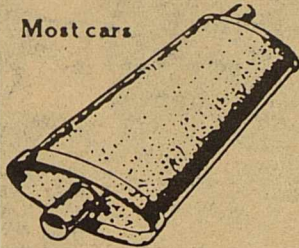

BY THE SKY PILOT

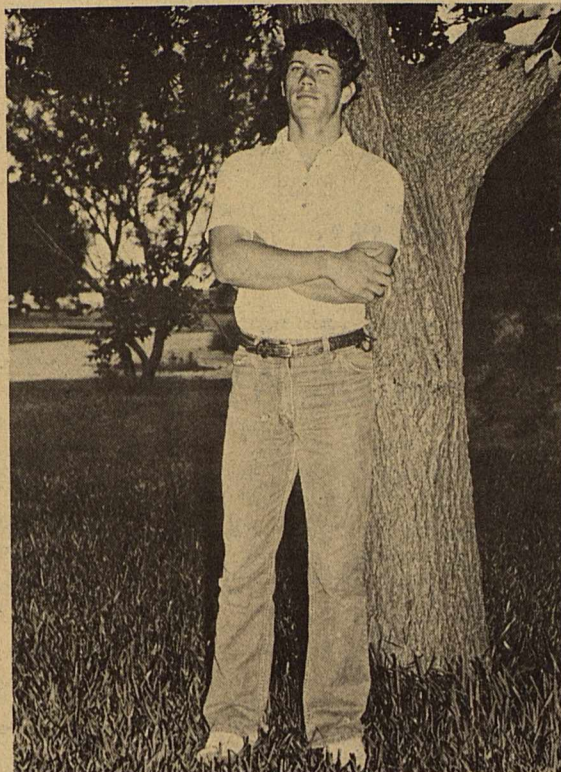

BETWEEN US

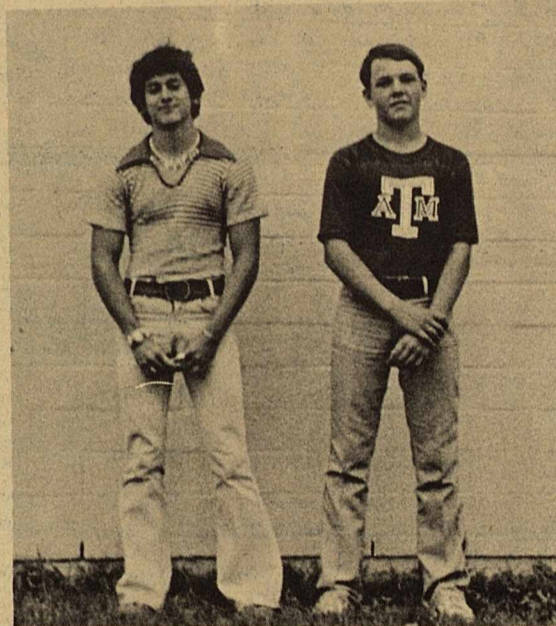

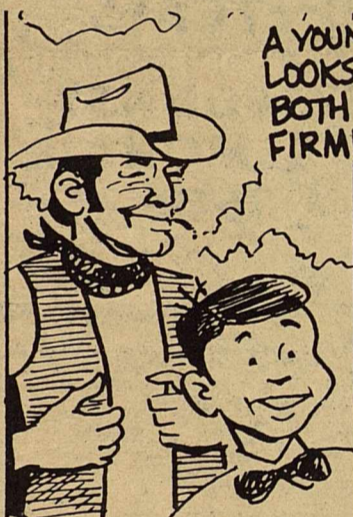
