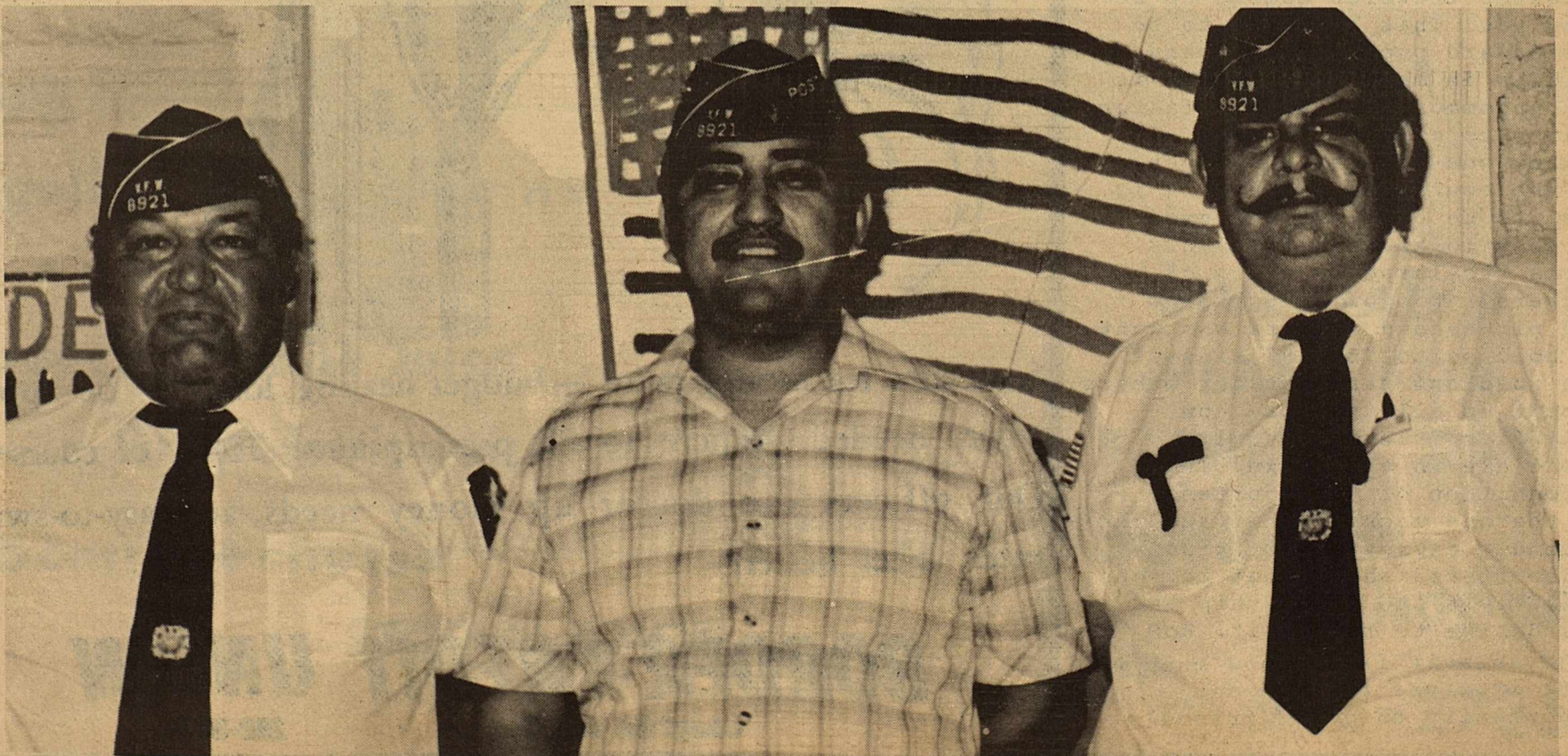

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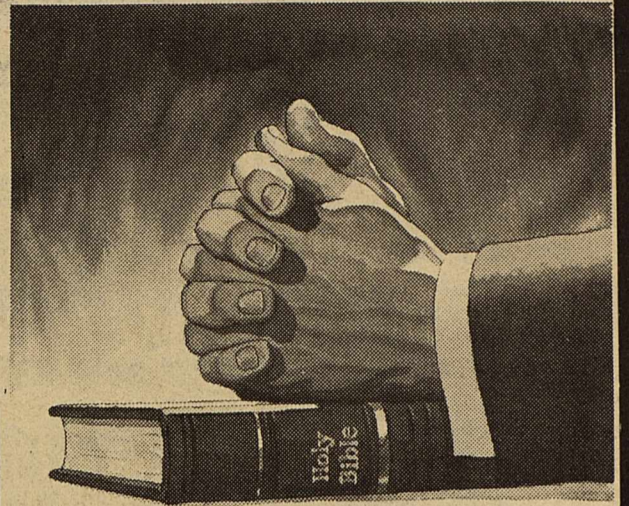

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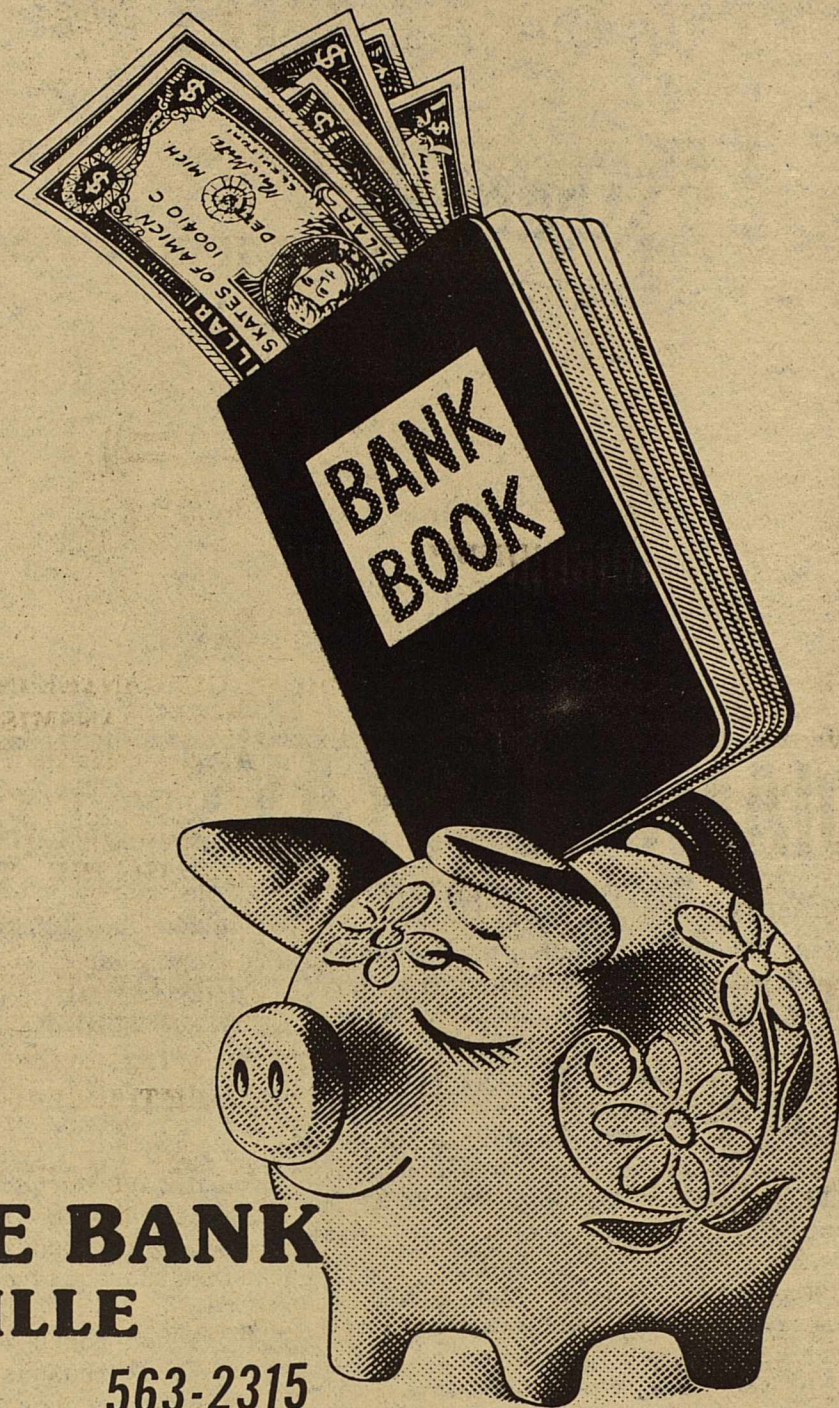

INTEREST IN RANGELAND

MANAGING BRUSH ESSENTIAL TO MAKING RANGE PAYOFF

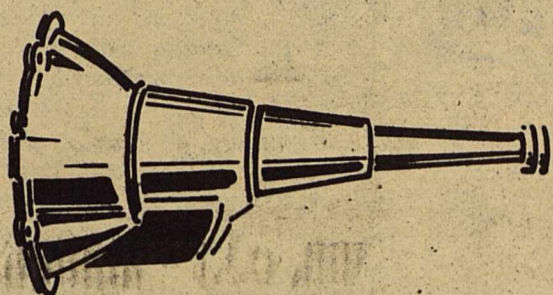
UVALDE--Tied very closely to grazing management research goals in Southwest Texas will be a determined effort to find new information useful to ranchers in the areas of brush management and range improvement. "Grazing management alone will not provide for optimum forage and livestock production under conditions of heavy brush infestation and severely deteriorated range conditions," said Dr. Dean Chamrad, a range scientist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Dr. Chamrad, the latest addition to the research staff at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center here, is just beginning his work on brush management and range improvement. He works with

other range, wildlife and beef cattle scientists as a research team at the Rio Grande Plain Experimental Ranch near Spofford. "Other practices, in conjunction with should grazing management, are often necessary to accelerate or facilitate range improvement," Dr. Chamrad said. The scientist said native vegetation on the Rio Grande Plain is complex and varies a great deal on many range sites. He said the area historically supported a grassland or savannah type vegetation which was dominated by a mixture of mid, short, and tall grasses with scattered woody plants or mottes of shrubs and trees. "With incresed grazing pressure, concentration of livestock and suppression of fire, the more palatable grasses and forbs decreased and woody species increased throughout the Plain Dr Chamrad said. "Excessive amount of brush and deteriorated range conditions have reduced livestock production, lowered the quality of wildlife habitat, contributed to soil erosion, wasted valuable water and increased ranching costs." The range scientist said brush management and range seeding are major range improvement practices needed to bring all these factors back into balance on the South Texas rangelands. "Such practices would simultaneously conserve valuable soil and water and help improve environmental quality," Dr. Chamrad said. He said this appears at present

to be the best approach to utilizing the South Texas rangelands since economics make the purchase of additional land for range livestock production unfeasible. "Brush management and range seeding in conjunction with grazing management offer us out most economically feasible means of expanding ranching operations or increasing economic returns to existing ranches," Dr. Chamrad emphasized. He said there is a good base on which to build future research, because progressive ranchers in this area have pioneered a number of useful range improvements practice on their lands. These include various mechanical practices such as rootplowing, tree-doing, disking, chaining, shredding and roller chopping. Herbicides such as 2,4,5-T, picloram and dicamba also have been developed for efective brush and weed control. "Despite these pioneering efforts, many original problems still exist, and new porblems are being encountered every day," Dr. Chamrad said. "Some practices are shortlived and require continual or periodic maintenance for effective range improvement on a sustained basis. "Reinvation of noxious species is a major problem associated with most brush control operations, and another problem following this initial brush control effort is the release of former subdominant species. Some of these plants often become a

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Q: I know a couple that has never paid income tax, and they seem to get away with it. The wife has always wanted to pay the taxes, but her husband wouldn't do it. Is she as guilty as he is? If he died, would she be responsible? And one more thing, is it my duty as a citizen to turn them in?

A: When a joint return is filed, each spouse is liable for the full amount of the tax, interest and penalties due. However, fraud penalties don't apply to a spouse who had no intention of defrauding the government. So, the wife might not be held responsible. Although you have no legal duty to report them, you can. Anyone supplying helpful information to the IRS about tax evaders may receive a reward of up to 10% of the taxes collected.

Q: I moved out of an apartment a month or so ago, leaving a forwarding address. Last week a friend of mine watched the manager opening a beauty club package that was addressed to me. Is there anything I can do to stop this invasion of privacy?

A: Federal law prohibits opening or destroying the mail of another person. However, the Attorney General is the only one who can file suit. All you can do is report a suspected violation to the Postal Department. One other thing, you could institute private suit for invasion of privacy, and if you

are successful, you could get damages for your "mental suffering". In most cases, though, one must base such an action on a very important, fundamental right, and it is uncertain whether the opening of a beauty club package would be a violation of such a right.

Q: My divorce became final in April of 1973. I found out the other day that my husband remarried in October of 1972! Six months before the divorce was final! I have a copy of his marriage license. Is he legally married to this other woman?

A: His marriage became valid when the prior marriage to you was dissolved. It's valid if since that time your ex and his present wife have lived together as husband and wife and held themselves out to others as being married.

Q: What happens to my children if my wife and I do not have a will and we die at the same time?

A: The court will appoint a guardian to take care of each child that is under 18 years of age and to administer all of their property. The Texas law sets out a list of specific relatives from which the court will appoint a guardian, depending upon which relatives are alive and able to serve. If there are no relatives, the court will use its discretion in choosing a guardian.

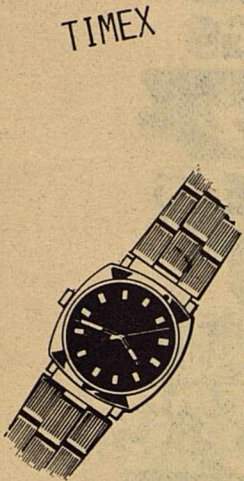

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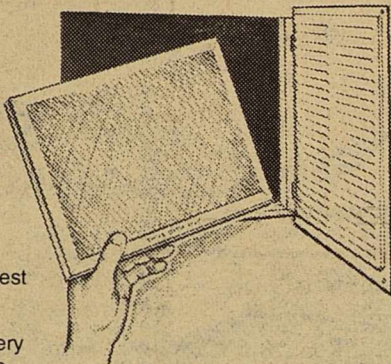

YOU can control your use of electricity and your bill by using energy wisely.

Higher fuel prices and inflation have pushed electric costs higher in recent years. But YOU still are a key factor in determining the size of your electric bill. Because only you can control the amount of electricity you use, a large part of the control over your bill is in your hands.

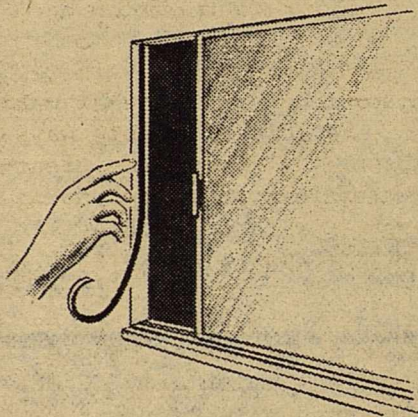
We offer these wise-use suggestions as a guide for getting the most out of every dollar you spend for electricity:

- Make sure your house has insulation equal to at least an R-19 rating in the ceiling and R-11 in the walls. Insulation pays for itself within a few years in reduced heating and cooling costs.
- Weatherstrip windows and doors, then keep them closed.
- Eliminate excess heat with draperies, storm windows, reflective films, window shades and overhangs.
- Set air conditioning thermostat at the highest comfortable setting, around 78 degrees.
- Clean or replace air conditioner filters every month or—even better—every two weeks.
- Have leaky hot water faucets repaired immediately; they waste both water and the energy used to heat it.



- Check the temperature control on your water heater. For most needs, the correct setting is 135 degrees; water heaters used for baths only may be set at 110 to 120 degrees.

By following these tips, you should be able to cut your use of electricity—and the size of your bill.

greater problem than the original target plants."

Dr. Chamrad said one example of this is the invasion of the noxious weed, *ericameria* following chemical control of blackbush in Zavala and McMullen Counties. He said there is currently no effective control for this plant.

"Increase of whitebrush following mesquite control has created the need for new and different methods and materials," Dr. Chamrad said. "Improved pastures of buffelgrass and kleigrass are especially susceptible to invasion by twisted acacida, another difficult species to control."

Answer to these problems are just part of the information that Dr. Chamrad will be trying to find in his research.

Another important phase of range improvement research deals with range seeding to revegetate deteriorated ranges with more productive or more nutritious plants. Kinds and amount of existing range forage plants and productive potential of given range sites determines the needs and feasibility of this range improvement practice.

"Research is needed to develop more economical methods for range revegetation; to develop better technology on seedbed preparation and planting techniques; and to develop improved plant materials for use in range revegetation," Dr. Chamrad said.

"Current research must continue to screen various new herbicides and search for improved ways to apply them. New mechanical methods must be evaluated to determine how effective or economically feasible they are," he said.

Dr. Chamrad said current research will direct greater emphasis on "Brush management system" versus "one-time treatment."

"Brush management systems will generally involve more than one basic category of brush control, including mechanical, chemical, biological, and prescribing burning," Dr. Chamrad said. "Other range improvements practices, such as range seeding, also must be integrated into these systems when they are appropriate."

In addition to the work going on at the Experimental Ranch, Dr. Chamrad and Research Associate David Oefinger are establishing studies on various private ranches in the 19 county area surrounding Uvalde.

Certain phases of the range improvement work are being coordinated closely with Soil Conservation personnel including Virgil Hem and Kenneth Sparks of Uvalde; and DeReath Palmer and Herb Senne of Temple.

Other consultants and co-workers will include Agricultural Research Service worker, Dr. Herman Mayeuz of Temple and County Extension Agents Dennis Hengst of Eagle Pass, and David Wolfe of Cotulla and Rex Stultz of Del Rio.

Cooperating from the main offices at Texas A&M University campus at College Station are Dr. Bob Whitson, Dr. Will Blackburn, Dr. Marshall Haferkamp, and Dr. Joe Schuster of the Range Science Department.

TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS

It's definitely time to spray trees. We've seen tent caterpillars and army worms in pecan, mulberry, ash, redbud, and box elder trees. The time to spray is at the first sign of a wet or striped leaf. A matter of a few days makes a tremendous difference. There are many insecticides that do a good job. The one we've found most effective is diajanon—marketed here under the trade name of Spectracide. It is good to mix some household ammonia with the spray. This increases the efficiency. The spraying will leave a residue on the leaves which will be effective for some time. When the trees are sprayed once no matter how effective the spraying is normally to be expected that more worms will appear. Likely in three or four weeks more worms will appear. This will necessitate more spraying. Beginning as early as they have it looks like a long siege of tent caterpillars in particular. If your neighbor has susceptible trees respect him enough to give proper care to your trees and thus prevent spread of worms from your trees to his.

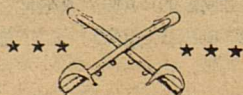
