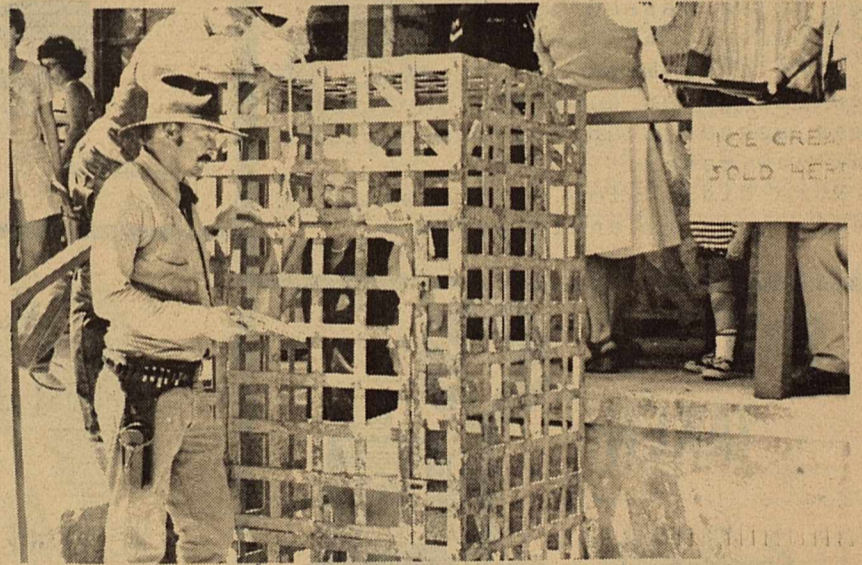

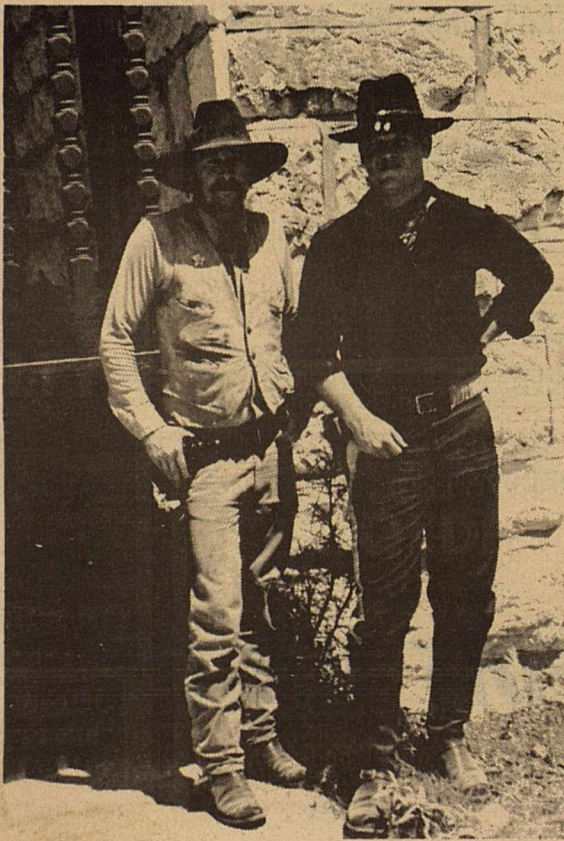

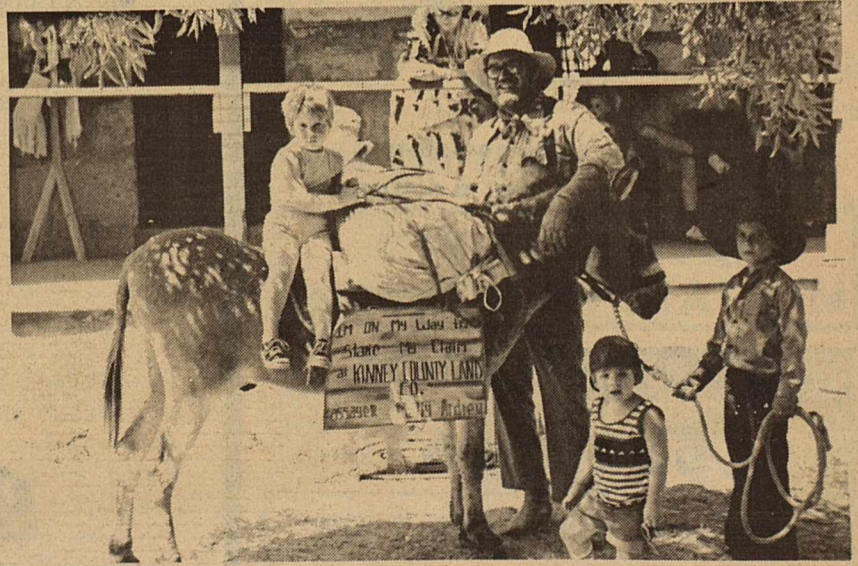

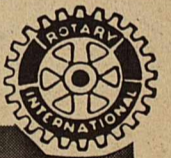
TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS by: **JOE TOWNSEND**

If you have lawn, trees, shrubs, flowers or pot plants outside you have problems. This long stretch of hot weather is very hard on everything that grows. The main solution to the problem is water -- LOTS OF WATER --. There are two problem areas in watering however. Water sprinkled on many plants can severely damage if not destroy the plants. Over-soaking the ground can also be damaging and destroy the plants. Sprinkling generally is the best method of watering and early morning is the best time. By eleven o'clock in the morning, it is too late to water anything but grass or trees and shrubs. This time is mainly a time for survival for growing things. If you will exercise a little care and spend a little extra time on your plants now, they will reward you highly when the weather breaks.

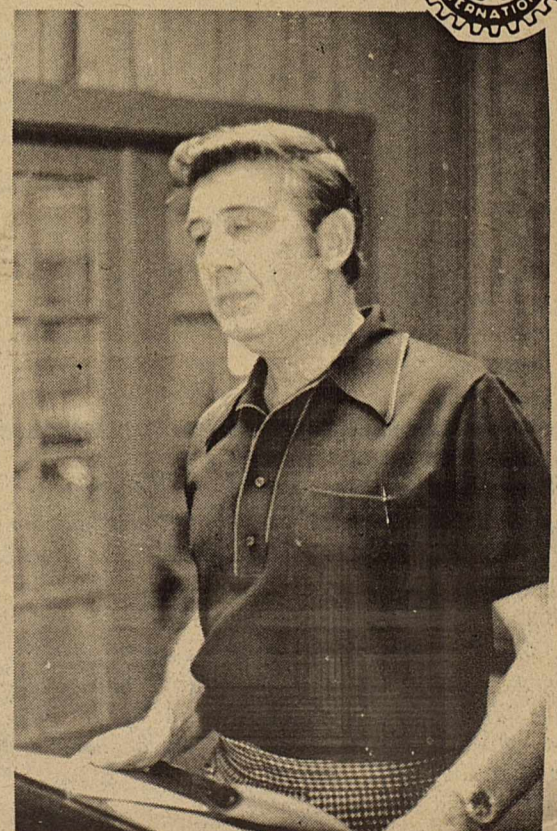
Rotary

STATEMENT OF INTENT BY LO-VACA GATHERING COMPANY AND COASTAL STATES GAS PRODUCING COMPANY TO CHANGE RATES

TO THE HONORABLE RAILROAD COMMISSION OF TEXAS:

Lo-Vaca Gathering Company ("Lo-Vaca") and Coastal States Gas Producing Company ("Coastal"), pursuant to the requirements of Section 43(a) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (1446c, T.R.C.S), files this statement of intent to change rates, effective September 1, 1977, the rates they are charging all customers on the Lo-Vaca system for the purchase of natural gas to a uniform rate applicable to each customer on the system, which rate consists of 100% of Lo-Vaca's weighted average cost of gas plus 16.70 cents per Mcf. The cost of gas is to be adjusted each month in accordance with Lo-Vaca's billing procedure, which is Lo-Vaca Exhibit KLH #515, filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas ("Commission") in Gas Utilities Docket No. 500 on June 13, 1977.

The present rate charged by Lo-Vaca for the sale of natural gas to nearly all Texas customers is 100% of Lo-Vaca's weighted average cost of gas (determined in accordance with the billing procedure set forth in Lo-Vaca Exhibit WKA #17 in Gas Utilities Docket No. 500) plus 5 cents per Mcf.

The new rate is anticipated to increase Lo-Vaca's revenues by \$60,196,106 in calendar year 1978. This is an increase of 5.61% over total revenues which would have been received if the present rate were continued in effect for that year.

**Road Fund Scheduled
For Kinney-Val Verde
Counties**

STATE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS & PUBLIC
TRANSPORTATION

Work in Val Verde and Kinney Counties is included in the 1978 Special Rehabilitation and State Highway Safety & Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

District Engineer Fred Clark, at Del Rio, noted that the Program will be financed with recent funds especially appropriated for this purpose by the 65th Legislature, and will include the following projects:

1. Widening of 8.2 miles of U.S. Highway 90, from 0.4 miles east of Comstock to Evens Creek 18 miles northwest of Del Rio.
2. Seal Coating on 34.1 miles of other highways in Val Verde and Kinney Counties.
3. Estimated cost of all these improvements amount to approximately \$1,070,300.

Statewide, the Rehabilitation Program is the largest in the 60 year history of the Department, providing for the improvement of some 6,900 miles of highways at an estimated construction cost of approximately \$222,560,000 with an additional \$4.3 million set aside for later assignment. Some 1,075 projects will be on State and U.S. Highways, another 30 per cent on Farm to Market Roads, and the remaining 2 per cent reserved for future assignment. The Program is the first phase of a long-range program to restore the highway system to the standards that Texans have come to expect, Clark said.

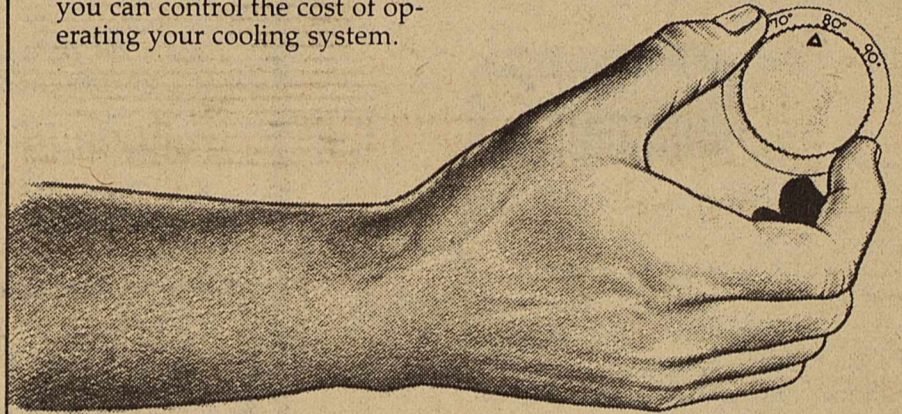

- Keep direct sunlight out of the house with shades or draperies. Trees, shrubs, awnings and shutters also can provide shading for your home and reduce the work load of your air conditioner.
- Clear away tall plants, shrubbery and other obstructions from the outside sections of central air conditioning units. The unit must have free circulation of air for good performance.
- Have your air conditioner cleaned and checked each year to insure that it is running at top efficiency.

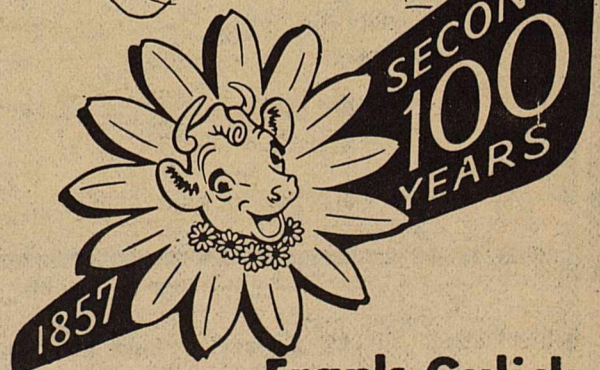

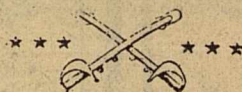
