County Attorney, Hal B. Landrum,
Jr. attended a three-day seminar in
Austin this past week. The seminar was
sponsored by the Texas District and
County Attorney's Association and con-
cerned the topic of "Economic Crime."

Topics covered were generally
divided into three areas of law:
Lying, Cheating and Stealing. Some of
the more "unique" talks concerned land
frauds, computer frauds, and construc-
tion kickbacks.

Landrum's opinion was that al-
though the seminar was very interest-
ing, much of what was discussed did
not pertain to Kinney County, since,
in Landrum's opinion, there is no
organized crime in Kinney County.

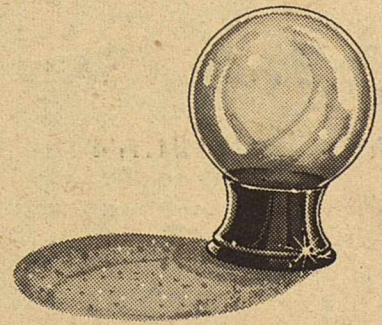

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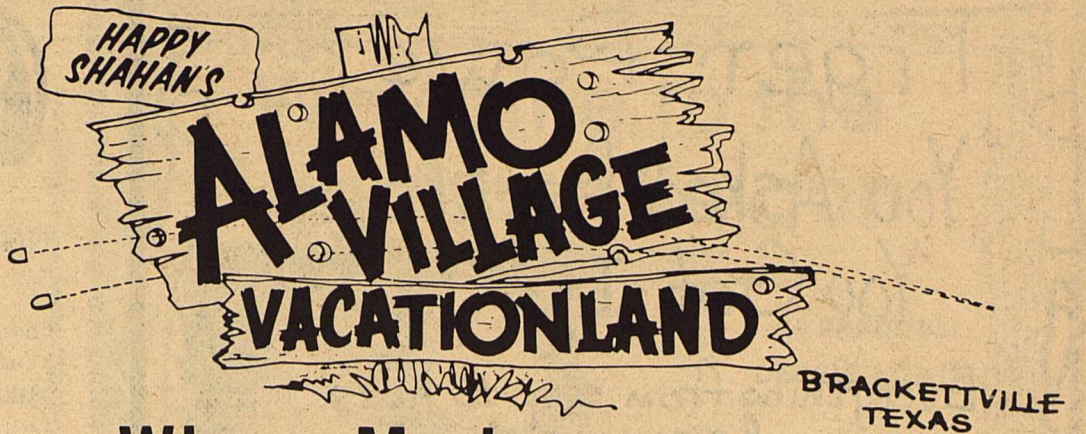
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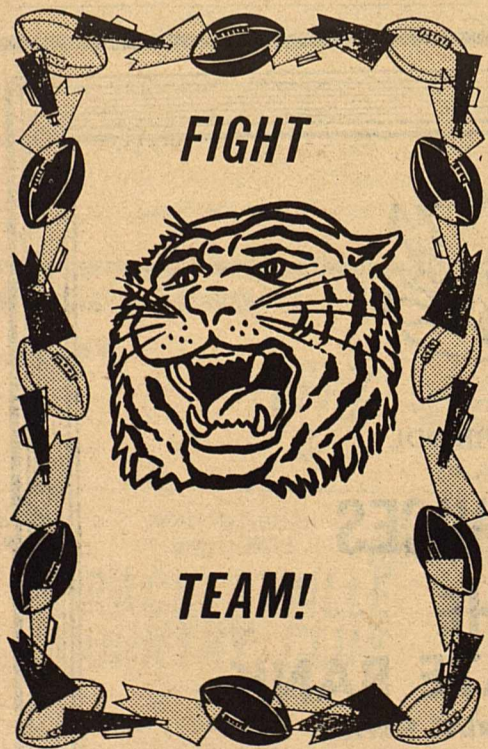
**BRACKETT WINS
DISTRICT GAME**

The Brackett Tigers opened district play against the Sabinal Yellowjackets on Friday, September 30. Tiger senior quarterback, Tony Samaniego, passed for 191 yards in 9 attempts to lead the Tigers to their first district win.

With the fine pass receiving of Art Terrazas, Moses Benites, and David Koch, and the strong defensive efforts of Happy Cervantez, Nelson Payne, and Walter Goodloe, the Tigers were able to overpower the Yellowjackets 14-0.

The offense started rolling after a 55 yard pass from Tony Samaniego to Art Terrazas to start off the scoring. The extra point was kicked by Samaniego. The next touchdown was set up by a 61 yard run off a screen pass. The touchdown was scored on a pass to David Koch who strolled into the end zone untouched. Samaniego added a point. The defensive standouts were Nelson Payne, Happy Cervantez and Daniel Samaniego. They kept the Yellowjacket big man, Neely, in check all night, allowing him only 67 yards rushing.

Between Us

Did you ever watch a circus train pull onto a siding late in the night and stop? Did you ever watch as the train become a beehive of activity as the crews unloaded the fancy rolling cages of animals and all the equipment for the circus? As a boy did you ever get a job carrying water to the elephants to earn ticket to the show? Did you ever watch in fascination as they raised the "Big Top" and set up the seats for a giant "five ring" circus? Did you ever stand on the main street of your town on circus day and watch the parade as the beautifully decorated animal cages rolled majestically by with the Tigers, Lions, Apes and other animals? Did you ever look in awe as the Elephants, Giraffes, Zebras, etc., strolled unconcernedly by? Did you ever wade through the dust in the menagerie seeing all the animals at close range. Did you ever go on in to the big top and watch in amazement the show- trying to watch all five rings of entertainment at once? Did you ever watch a lion ride a horse's back and

leap through a burning hoop and breathe easier when you saw his mane was not afire? Did you ever watch the clown catch the seat of his pants on fire and shoot water out of the top of his hat. Did you ever reluctantly get up out of your seat when the show was over and find the tent of the menagerie was gone and the animals cages were already loaded on the train? Did you ever stand and watch, for what seemed a few minutes, and see the big tent come crashing to the ground? Did you ever see the elephants pull the wagons loaded with equipment onto the flat cars? Did you ever watch the circus train huff and puff as it slowly picked up steam bound for the next town? Did you ever stand with a gubby hand waving goodbye to the circus train knowing you could look forward to seeing it again next year? If you've done this You're past the half-century mark in years. If you've never done this you've missed one of the truly great experiences of America. Too many have the idea that all old things are not much good and only the new are worthwhile. Many great and good things have faded into the distant past never to be seen again. Too bad--all good things can't last forever. A boy who has never had the full experience of the circus has missed a great and thrilling contribution to life.

Q. Why is CPL building those costly new plants?

A. It is the only way we can assure you of continued reliable service.

Because of the shortage of natural gas, Central Power and Light Company must turn to other fuels for production of electricity.

The Texas Railroad Commission ruled nearly three years ago that deliveries of natural gas used for making electricity must be curtailed—10 percent by 1981, and 25 percent by 1985. Also, the Public Utilities Commission of Texas has said it will not approve construction of any new gas-fired electric generating plants.

To insure that our customers would continue to have a reliable supply of power, we started making plans more than seven years ago for the switch to other fuels. By the mid-1980's about 40 percent of our electricity will come from coal-fired and nuclear plants.

Coletto Creek Power Station, our first coal-fired unit, is under construction and will begin supplying power by late 1979. CPL also has a 25.2 percent share in the South Texas Project, a nuclear plant being built in Matagorda

County. The first unit will go into operation by late 1980, the second in 1982.

Because they are more complex, nuclear and coal-fired plants are more expensive to build than gas-fired units—and inflation continues to drive costs higher and higher. Rigorous environmental protection and safety systems add to the cost of these plants. Transporting huge quantities of coal over long distances is still another expense.

Inevitably, power production will cost more in the future than it has in former years. We must, however, build the new plants; we have no choice if we are to maintain a supply of power that will be available to you whenever you need it.



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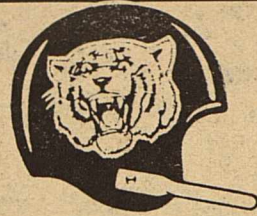

All Junior and Senior High students are invited along with Parents, Exes, and Friends.

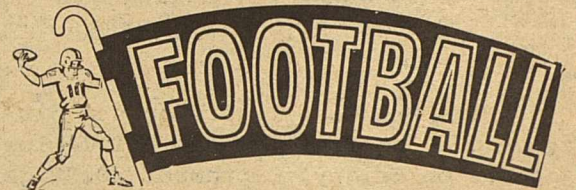

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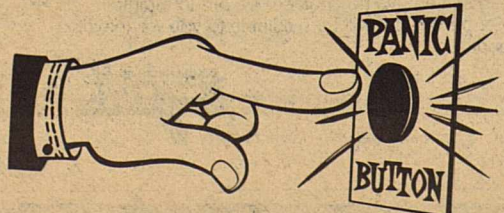
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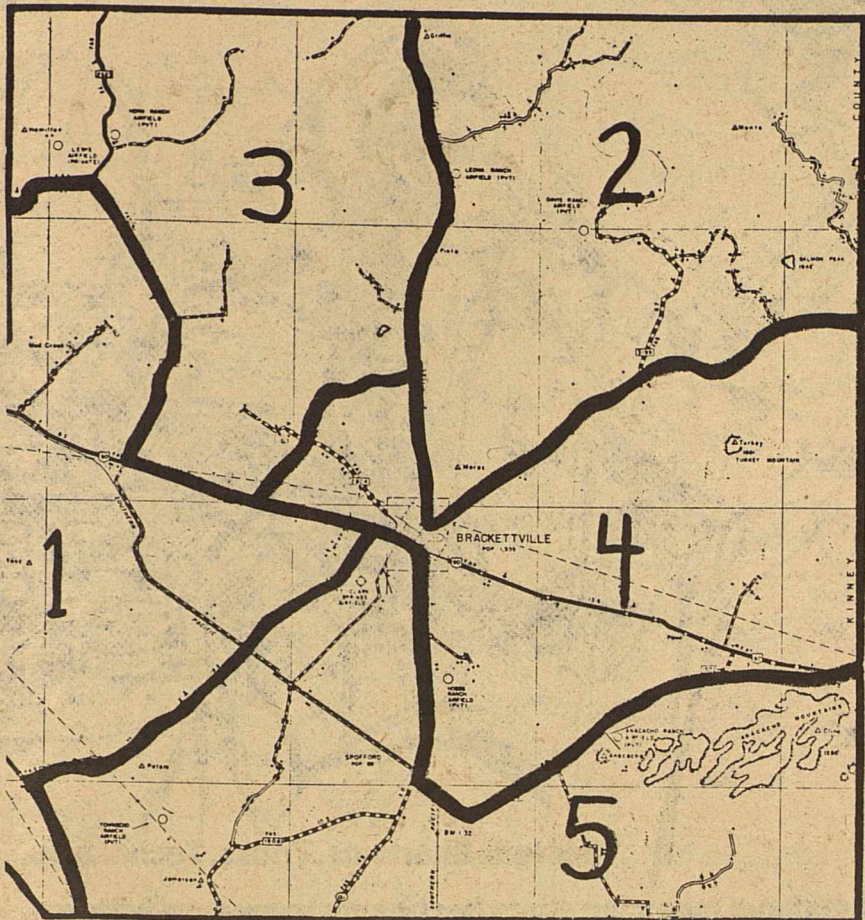

Soil Conservation

An election for a director to serve in Zone 4 on the West Nueces-Los Moras Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 14, 1977 at the C.L. Orr Ranch, announced Mr. Orr chairman of the board. The election will be held at 10:00 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 21 years of age.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 21 years of age and be actively engaged in farming and ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 4 of the district is shown on the accompanying map. This map also shows the new district and Zone boundaries of the West Nueces-Las Moras Soil and Water Conservation District.

The purpose of the district with headquarters in Brackettville is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and so serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authorities to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

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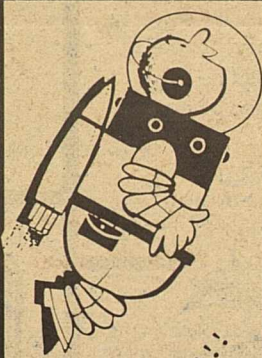

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Red Riding Hood — Today

"Tell me a story, daddy! Tell me a story."
"Once upon a time, in a faraway country, there lived a little girl called Red Riding Hood. One day her mother asked her to take a basket of fruit to her grandmother, who had been ill and lived alone in a cottage in the forest.

"It happened that a wolf was lurking in the bushes and overheard the conversation. He decided to take a shortcut to the grandmother's house and get the goodies for himself. The wolf killed the grandmother, then dressed in her nightgown and jumped into bed to await the little girl.

"When she arrived, he made several nasty suggestions and then tried to grab her. But by that time, the child was very frightened and ran screaming from the cottage. A woodcutter, working nearby, heard her cries and rushed to the rescue. He killed the wolf with his ax, thereby saving Red Riding Hood's life. All the townspeople hurried to the scene and proclaimed the woodcutter a hero. But at the inquest, several facts emerged: (1) The wolf had never been advised of his rights. (2) The woodcutter had made no warning swings before striking the fatal blow. (3) The Civil Liberties Union stressed the point that, although the act of eating Grandma may have been in bad taste, the wolf was only "doing his thing" and thus didn't deserve the death penalty. (4) The SDS contended that the killing of the grandmother should be considered self-defense since she was over 30 and, therefore, couldn't be taken seriously because the wolf was trying to make love, not war.

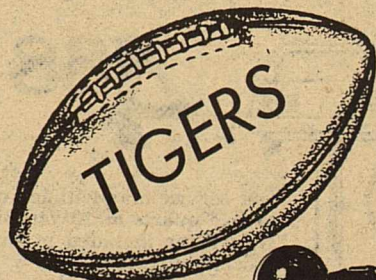
"On the basis of these considerations, it was decided there was no valid basis for charges against the wolf. Moreover, the woodcutter was indicted for unaggravated assault with a deadly weapon. Several nights later, the woodcutter's cottage was burned to the ground. One year from the date of 'The Incident at Grandma's' her cottage was made a shrine for the wolf who had bled and died there. All the village officials spoke at the dedication, but it was Red Riding Hood who gave the most touching tribute.

"She said that, while she had been selfishly grateful for the woodcutter's intervention, she realized in retrospect that he had overreacted. As she knelt, and placed a wreath in honor of the brave wolf, there wasn't a dry eye in the whole forest.

"They named two bridges, one school, and a street for the wolf. Two denominations gave huge funds in his memory to reconcile all other wolves."

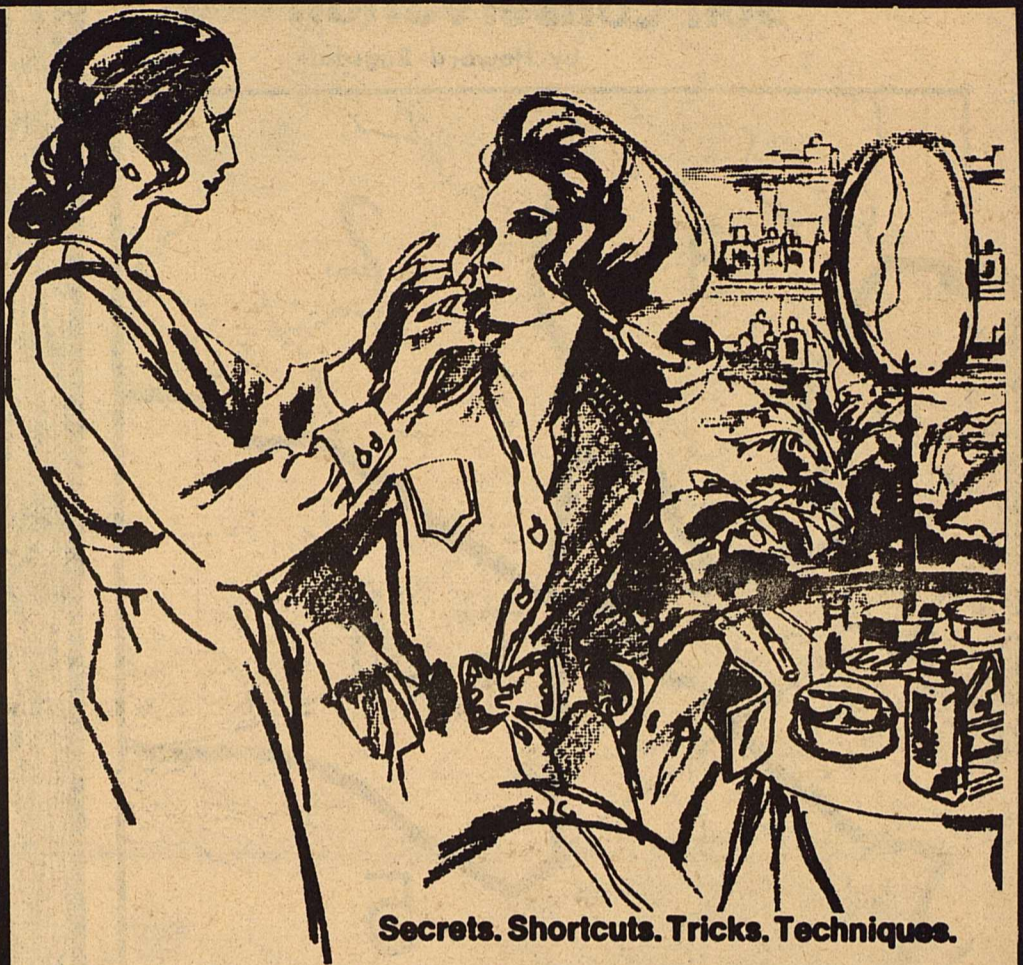
PTA MEMBERSHIP DRIVE IS UNDERWAY
