


# 19 FILE FOR COUNTY POSTS

AUSTIN--Fourteen agriculture leaders from Kinney County have been appointed by Governor Dolph Briscoe to serve on the Governor Committee to Make Texas Agriculture No. 1 in Income and Profit.

Committees are being established in every Texas County as part of the statewide effort "to strengthen the economic position of agriculture--our most vital industry," Governor Briscoe said.

The County committees have the responsibility of promoting cooperation and mutual support among agencies, organizations, and groups involved in agriculture and agribusiness.

Mr. Tupper, Administrator of the Eagle Pass Hospital and Clinic and Mr. George Garza, Director of the Southwestern Community Council, were guest at the Clinic Committe Meeting here January 27, 1978.

Mr. Tupper proposed to include Kinney County in the World Health Initiative Program with Eagle Pass. In this program, a doctor would be sent to Brackettville for three half-days a week to begin with and the time would be increased as the patient load increased.

The Doctor would be a General Practitioner and would be able to see all types of patients.

Eagle Pass has had this program for approximately two years and it has work ed out very well.

The Clinic Committee voted to try Mr. Tupper's Proposal.

Mrs. Rose Ann York, Kinney County Democratic Party Chairman, announced Wednesday afternoon that three additional candidates had filed for the upcoming primary to be held May 6th. # HOME DEMO CLUBS

"Erforts are being made to organize home demonstrations clubs in Kinney and Val Verde Counties," reports Becky Rogers, County Extension Agent -at -Large.

Home demonstration clubs have been the backbone of Extension home economics work in Texas. They provide homemakers an opportunity for continuous informal education in a variety of areas relating to the home, family, community, and county.

"A home demonstration club is composed of a small group of homemakers (8 to 10 members) who learn together, the agent explained. Everyone is involved. Members learn by attending club and leader training meetings. They taach lessons, take part in discussions plan recreation and participate in community projects sponsored by the club. The County Extension Agent, resource persons and members themselves give educational programs at club meetings, she continues.







# Susan Gurley McBee



Representative Susan Gurley McBee of Del Rio has announced that she has filed in the Democratic Primary for re-election to the position of State Representative District 70.

District 70 includes Brewster, Crockett, Edwards, Kinney, Maverick, Sutton, Terrell, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties.

"It continues to be an honor as well as a pleasure to represent this district in the Texas House," Mrs. McBee stated.

Repersentative McBee serves as Vice-Chairman of the Calendars Committee and Vice-Chairman of the the Elections Committes, as well as being a member of the Agriculture and Livestock Committee. #### Deeper in debt

As of the beginning of 1978, the federal government is more than \$700 billion in debt, and by spending more than it collects, is going deeper in debt each week by more than a billion dollars.

The interest of this growing debt is now costing the taxpayer \$800 millions a week with interest rates going up and the debt total rising, interests costs might soon reach a billion a week!

For 1978, it's estimated, the federal government will spend \$250 billions in welfare payments of one form or another. That's well over half the federal budget—and the payments come from 182 different welfare programs. Spending for this fiscal year (ending in October) is estimated to exceed tax collections by up to sixty billion dollars!



# you land the LAW

Q: My husband and I are separated, and our five children live with me. A friend told me that she saw several hundred dollars in checks made out to my husband's girlfriend recorded in his checkbook. Isn't he legally responsible for financially supporting his family first and foremost?

A: This is the kind of thing for which you need some personal legal help. You need to contact a lawyer who will institute court proceedings for temporary alimony and child support. Your lawyer will also help you obtain an order for an inventory and accounting. If you don't know a lawyer, call the Texas Lawyer Referral Service at 1-800-252-9690

Q: A friend of mine wants to have a will prepared leaving all of his property to their grandchildren and leaving his daughter nothing. Could his daughter break a will like that?

A: In Texas, a person can disinherit any relative, including children, by leaving property to someone else. Grounds for contesting a will include: lack of mental capacity, failure to observe some legal requirement in the execution of the will, or fraud. However, disinheritance alone is not a ground for challenging a will.


Q: My divorce decree granted in 1966 states that I pay child support until each of my children reaches "his majority". Does the 18 year old voting rights act mean that I will pay until the kids reach 18 or 21 or what?

A: Generally, the law says you must provide child support until he is 18. But, if the court finds that the child requires continuous care and personal supervision because of a mental or physical handicap and is unable to support himself, the court may order child support after the age of 18 for an indefinate period.

Q: The manager of my son's apartment made him move to another unit recently saying that he was making too much noise by running the vacuum and dishwasher after 10 P.M. He went along with it even though the new place was too small. Can a manager legally force a tenant to move for these reasons?

A: The provisions of the lease agreement and the extent of the alleged disturbance will determine whether the manager had the right to require the move. If the lease permitted the manager to evict a tenant who persisted in annoying other tenants, then your son has no legal remedy, provided proper notice of termination was given. If the lease contained no provisions for notice, the landlord usually is required to give the tenant one month's notice.

### MCBEE APPOINTED

AUSTIN --- State Rep. Susan McBee of Del Rio has been appointed chairwoman of the House Elections Committee by House Speaker Bill Clayton.

Ms. McBee, who is serving her second term in the House, has been vice chairwoman of the committee. The appointment came after committee chairman Herman Adams of Silsbee resigned his seat in the House.

The appointment runs until the next legislative session in 1979. During the course of the year the com mittee chaired by Ms. McBee will undertake a number of studies and report their findings for legislative action.

Among the studies are a thorough look at proposals for Presidential preference primaries, including the possiblity of regional primaries; weighing the desirability and effect of moving the date for the general primary elections in Texas; a study of various voting procedures and systems with emphasis on the possibilities of fraud and abuse involved in each.

Ms. McBee was appointed previously as one of two state representatives on the 12 - member Texas Election Code Revision Commission.

She will continue her work in that capacity as the committee seeks to revise and recodify the Texas Election Code to eliminate conflicts in the code or between the code and other statutes. The clarification of vague provisions and improvement of the elective processes regulated by the Code are goals of the commission

In making the announcement of Ms. McBee's elevation to chairwoman Clayton said he was doing so because of his faith in her ability. "Throughout her term as vice chairwoman of the committee she has been extremely dedicated to the job. She is very qualified to oversee the tasks of the committee. I am confident that she will perform thorough and effective studies in her roles as committee chairwoman and as a member of the Election Code Revision Commission. layton said.

# Perils of newspapering not what they used to be

#### **GUEST** Some 100 years ago the perils of pursuing a journalistic career

on the American frontier were aptly illustrated by a report that showman P. T. Barnum had added to his collection of circus curiosities a man who edited a weekly newspaper in Texas for two years.

"He carries 37 bullets in his body", the account noted, "and 116 bowie-knife scars, has one eye gouged out, one ear bit off, his nose twisted around, all his teeth knocked out and his skull trepanned.

Upon his departure from Texas, he was the senior editor in the state ... so the account

Thankfully, things have changed a bit. Editors may yet be as deserving of such treatment as this side-show specimen, but the attitude of readers has joyously changed—they are considerably less violent than they were, apparently, a century ago.

Despite the fact that newspaper readership has eeen holding its own in competition with other forms of informational media, newspapers seem to be among the most misunderstood products of human endeavor even

though many readersespecially of weekly newspapers-consider themselves very close to their own community publication.

Perhaps the misunderstanding exists because newspapers simply fail to explain themselves to their readers.

Newspapers nowadays are no longer the personal product of one person, namely, the editor, who in years past wrote most of the news, set it into type and then hand-fed a press in the final stage of a process that had his personal touch from start to

It is little wonder that editors such as the unfortunate chap from Texas had a bit of rough going on occasion.

The vast majority of weekly newspapers today are printed by the offset method-using primarily photographic techniques-involving computers and central printing plants in a nearby city.

From the technical standpoint, the same "bugs" that drove newspaper people crazy 30 years ago still exist, except in more sophisticated forms. Cams and pulleys do not break nowadays; computer panels, magnetic chips and various electronic snitties do malfunction, however.

But the more common annoyances, rooted in human nature, are still the same.

People still call in on press day—usually Wednesday for most weekly newspapers-and cannot understand why a news item or classified advertisement cannot be inserted at that very moment.

We simply cannot run into the press room and yell "Stop the presses!" without incurring the expense of a long-distance telephone call that will not stop the presses anyway

Letters to the editor are usually good for one migrane headache a week. Either the letter-writer refuses to sign his name-something most editors require-or he finds it incomprehensible that he cannot call his competitor a lying, cheating, double-dealing fraud and have the letter printed as written.

Or, perhaps, the letter may have been mimeographed-sent en masse to several newspapers-or from a political candidate seeking votes.

And there are local poets (some are very good, really) who want to use the "letters" column as a launching paid to being a published author. Print one, though, and a hundred will

There are always readers who send in color photographs, out of focus and taken from 20 feet away, who become irate when

told that the printed results will be somewhat less than desirable. "Print it anyway" they say, and then complain when the subjects are unrecognizable after publication.

Small news items come from one hundred-and-one different sources each week. Omit one, and a publicity chairman or illhumored contributor calls promptly.

Some readers become irate whenever a news item they sent in must be re-written to conform to news styles, or to correct errors in grammar and spelling, with teachers and lawyers being the worst offenders in this regard.

And so goes the weekly grind of newspapering. For one reason or another, it seems that computers are more inclined to malfunction and readers more apt to become irritated when the weather is bad.

All of which, I might add in retrospect, is much more preferable than bullets, knife scars, gouged eyes, deformed ears and noses and a trepanned
