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

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

butions being made by volunteers.





Sound Facts - The Battle of Waterloo was fought on June 18, 1815, between the French army of Napoleon and the Anglo-Dutch army under the general command of the Duke of Wellington. The battle was so fierce and intense that the sounds of the heavy artillery fire and cavalry attacks could be heard on the English coast at Dover. The distance from the battle field at Waterloo, near Bussels, to Dover is 130 miles, about half over land and half over water.

The case of The Spinning Football - When you spin a football on one of its ends, it will spin like a top for 10 to 20 seconds before falling down. However, when you spin it on its side, it will spin for a number of seconds and then perform work as it rises up on one of its ends. It will then continue to spin like a top until it again falls down. You can do the same thing with a hard-boiled egg, a school class ring or a lemon.

Hard-boiled Egg - How do you tell a fresh egg from a hard-boiled egg? When you try to spin a fresh egg on end, it will fall immediately. A hard-boiled egg will spin on end like a top for 10 to 20 seconds.

Ice-air - Water can exist in 3 states - solid, liquid, and gas. We are used to seeing it go from ice to water to gas as it warms up and evaporates. Evaporation usually takes place from a liquid as it turns into a gas, but evaporation can also take place directly from a solid. That is why uncovered ice cubes will "disappear" from a deep-freeze and snow from a countryside. It is thus necessary to properly wrap frozen foods so their moisture won't evaporate and cause the food to shrivel up. Evaporation is precisely the method used to remove water from the modern freeze-dried coffee.

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
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



INTEREST IN LITERARY EVENTS AT AN ALL TIME LOW

Do you ever wonder why there is so little interest in U.I.L. Competition? Journalism class wants to know too. The following interview includes what Mrs. Bunsen thinks about this problem.

Noemi: Why do you think there is so

little interest in U.I.L. competition in high school?

Mrs. Bunsen: I think that there is little interest in the literary U.I.L. events, because they require the individual's time in preparation. In small schools, it seem that students are more willing to participate in group activities such as sports.

Various students have commented that to prepare for an individual literary event requires "WORK" and participation in U.I.L. sports is fun.

Noemi: What do you think could be done to encourage U.I.L. participation?

Mrs. Bunsen: I honestly do not know. Noemi: Could having more departments or classes increase interest?

Mrs. Bunsen: I think we need more required courses (for local credit) that will guide students toward literary events. I think mini course offered in a 6 weeks basis are good, because they give students a taste of different subject areas.

Noemi: Does this lack of interest in academic contest worry you? Why?

Mrs. Bunsen: The thing that worries me is the number of students who want good grades but are not willing to put forth the hard mental work involved in learning. Sports require physical and mental work. Many a student seem to prefer this kind of activity over the individual satisfaction and fulfillment of the literary events.

Look for a high EER number—preferably 8 or more—when you buy an air conditioner. It's an important way to use energy wisely.



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
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

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SHEEP & GOAT RAISERS NEWS

USDA has released the wool incentive level for the 1977 market year. The level is 37.5 percent, or a 37.5 cent payment for every dollar's worth of wool sold during the 1977 market year. Had it not been for the diligent efforts of industry leaders such as former Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Ass'n. president Bill Pfluger the payment would have been zero.

Incentive levels are based upon the difference between the average price of wool marketed during the year and the official wool support price. For much of the past decade, support prices have been frozen at 72 cents. It took a great deal of bush beating, hand shaking and good ole country jawboning by industry leaders to unfreeze the freeze and allow support prices to rise the way they were originally designed to do.

It might put all this into a little better perspective to note that the official U.S. average wool price in 1977 was about 72 cents---the same as the old frozen support level. This means, of course, that the producers are 37.5 cents per dollar of sales better off than they would have been without the help of the National Wool Growers and the TS&GRA.

Strong industry representation has scored another victory, too; it's been instrumental in pulling a series of predator hearings out of the concrete jungles of the cities and into the sheep country where they belong.

The hearings are part of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service probe into the predator problem and that agency's role in dealing with it. The outcome of the probe can either help or hurt the livestock industry, and can go either direction in a mighty big way.

The hearings, three originally, were set for Ft. Worth, Denver, and Washington, D.C., Notification of the dates was to be published only 10 or fewer days prior to the hearings themselves; this, of course, would

have meant very little participation by the real sufferers from predation--livestock producers.

The locations were later changed to Albuquerque, Boise, and Washington but the timing stayed the same. Only after considerable objection were the locations again changed to San Angelo, Boise, Casper and Washington, and this time the notification period was lengthened, too--by nearly a month.

The current schedule has the hearings in Boise, May 22, Casper, May 23, San Angelo, May 25, and Washington, May 31. Official confirmation of times and place will appear in the Federal Register April 28. This should allow enough time for interested parties on both sides to make their own plans.

Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Ass'n, is anxious to hear from a producer who wish to testify or present a written statement before the hearing. Particularly welcome are statements or testimony from producers who have been driven out of the sheep and or goat business by predation.

TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS

It is now time to give a great deal of attention to trees. If you have ash trees you should check them for insects and fungi. If leaves are curling under check to see if there are not blueish gray bugs under the leaf. If there are brown dry dead edges on leaves the tree should be treated. If the tree is healthy and looking good it still should be checked. All trees should be fed. Tree food spikes are good. They can be driven into the ground around the tree and will give food for many months. Root feeding by using a device going into the earth 18 to 24 inches and feeding fertilizer and water under ground is an excellent way. Working fertilizer into the soil around the tree is another way. Spraying the trees with a foliar feed is yet another way. To have good trees through the year take care of their needs now.

gated as required by the "Safe Drink-
ing Water Act," Public Law 93-523.
Drinking water containing coliform
bacteria in excess of the standard may
constitute a potential threat to
public health. Your water system has
collected additional check samples
as required by the "Drinking Water
Standards" and coliform organisms
were not found.

Coliform organisms are common to
the intestinal tract of man and
animals. Their presence in water is
an indicator of bacteriological
contamination of the sample either
from the water system or from a samp-
ling error.

Increased monitoring (check samples)
and customer notification of the public
when the standards are exceeded are
required by law as means of keeping
the public informed.
