


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KINNEY COUNTY 4-H CLUB HOLDS ANNUAL HORSE SHOW

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

PULBIC HERARING TO HELP ALLOCATE \$21 MILLION FOR TWENTY-ONE COUNTIES

How and where over \$21 million will be spent on social welfare services in this twenty-one county South Texas area will be the topic of a regional public hearing scheduled for june 6 in San Antonio. The regional hearing is sponosred by the Texas Department of Human Resources (TDHR), the agency charged with allocating the Title XX social service funds.

Social welfare services eligible for Title XX funding protective (antichild abuse) services for children, including foster care and adoptions, community-based care for aged, flind and disabled, family planning services and employment services for low-income families.

"Last year the San Antonio regional office of T.D.H.R. contracted theough over forty community agencies to provide social services to low-income families throught South Texas," said Ron Gossen, spokesman for the agency. "These agency contracts amounted to over \$6.8 million in state funded community-based services."

"Since Title XX funds can be utilizied to provide various services and in varying degrees, the importance of concerned citizens to testify as to their needs cannot be over emphasized," said Gossen. "With the ablility to to contract funds to meet specific needs, the TDHR regional office must be made aware of the specific needs within the twenty-one counties which we serve. This public hearing is one of the bests ways to tell us."

The planning cycle for scocial services funding under Title XX of the COcial Security Act dictates that a proposed comphrehensive annual services program plan be published for comment. The proposed poan for the 1979 fiscal year, begining October 1. 1978, has been produced be the state agency and will be available at the hearing. The proposed polan outlines what services the department plans to offer, who is eleigible, how many persons will be served and the stimated cost.

The June 6th hearing is scheduled to begin at 8:30 a.m. at the Holiday Inn, 318 W. Durango Street, San Antonio.





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



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Soil Conservation

RANGE MANAGEMENT

Doctors tell us that the trials and rigors of our everyday life demand that we take some time off occasionally for a vacation and rest so we may grow new strength and vigor into our bodies.

Well, a grass plant needs a vaction ocasionally also for the same reason that people do. It needs to recover from the wear and tear of grazing to rebuild its root system and develop a seed crop.

The vacation should be during the spring or fall growing season so the plant can make the most of its rest.

The season (spring or fall) of rest should be changed so the plant does not get a rest at the same time each year. Livestock will take the most palatable and better forage first simply becasue it takes good to them. These same plants take the most beating because of this preference These plants weaken faster and can then be replaced by less desireable and less palatable plants.

When vigor weakens in a plant community, the overall weight of forage production goes down. This means less pounds of grazing material produced for use by livestock and wildlife.

A rest is necessary following brush control or reseeding. When the brushy cover is removed and the grass and other plants suddenly have sunshine and extra moisture available to them. The result is lush growth and if livestock are not removed, they use these areas heavily and further damage a plant that has been weakened by the cover of brush.

The new plant seedlings coming up after a reseeding operation are likewise tender and easily damaged.

A good rule of thumb is to rest for at least three months duing the spring (April, May and June) or fall (September, October, and November) growing season. This should be done at least every two or three years to prevent deterioration of the range. A rest period more often

will likewise be more beneficial.

Rotational grazing systems have this rest period
built into them and these systems will improve the range

much faster thatn a continous period of grazing.

A piece of rangeland that is never grazed will begin
to deterioate after a few years of no use. An area that is
overused or continously used will do the same. The proper
amount of treatment is between thee two extremes.

GREEN THUMBS

So finally we had some rain. Now I can stop watering the grass and the trees and the garden. This seems to be the feeling of some people. There is no good substitute for rain. But as good as rain is a small rain desn't last forever. It's easy to fool ourselves into thinking everything is wet enough because it rained. That rain will last about as long as one good watering. So if you want your grass, beds and gardens to do well don't expect one rain (even a good slow 2 inch rain) to last all summer. Keep the water going to keep things green and growing.


