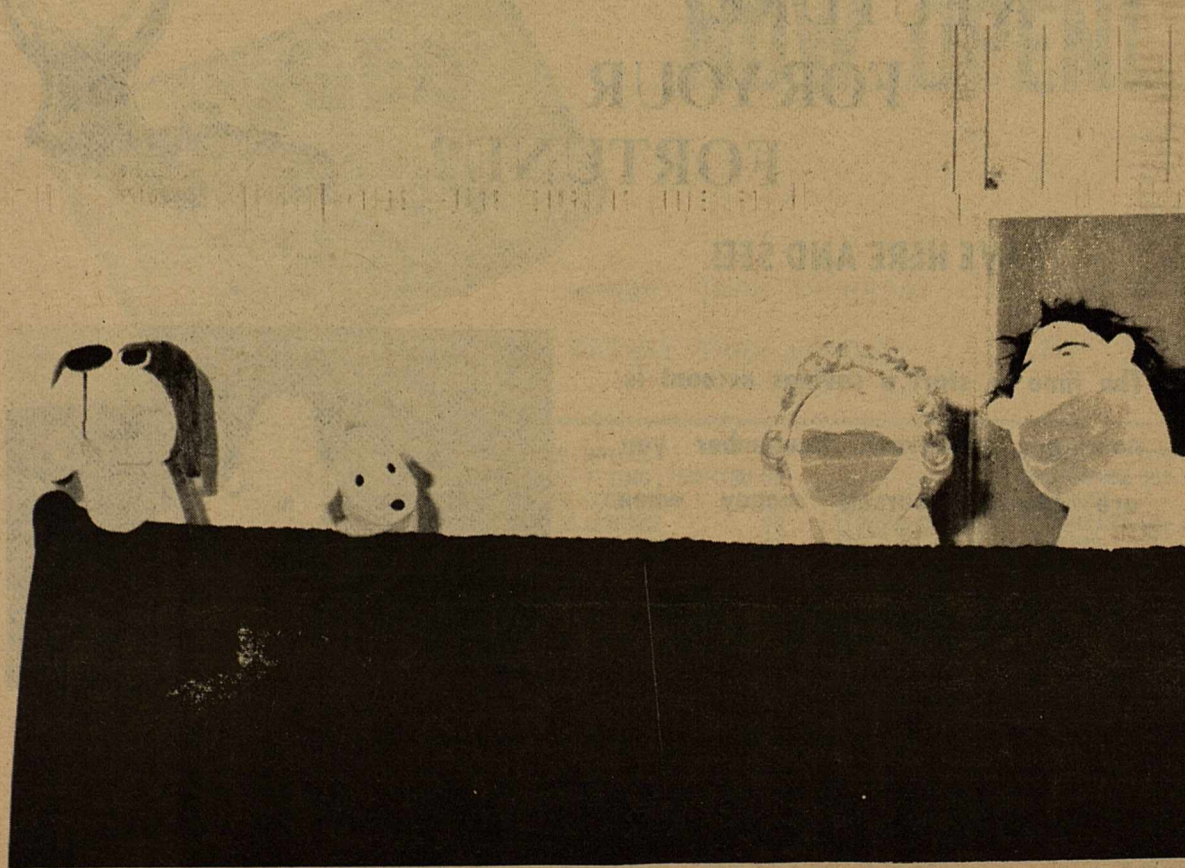
## FILMING STARTS

UVALDE---Students from migrant/seasonal farm labor families may qualify for a new Southwest Texas Junior College educational program which provides financial aid and supportive counseling and academic services for 50 persons.

Although administered by the junior college, the Higher Education Migrant Program is funded by the Department of Labor through the Governor's Office of Migrant Affairs.

The purpose of the program is to provide financial assistance to 50 students who desire to complete an academic degree but lack the financial resources.

The program also will seek to help the student succeed in his academic studies through academic counseling and tutorial services.

Tuition, fees and books will be paid by the migrant program for two semesters of study during the freshman year. Thrity semester hours will be the maxium allowable course load to be funded by the project.

"We not only want to assist the student with his studies," said Project Coordinator Ramiro Cano, "But we also want to enhance his chances for success in higher education by providing a structured personal development program which will include personel counceling and human relations skills and values clarification."

Cano said the new college migrant program will provide an opportunity for these students to explore a variety of career opportunities through a program of work experience.

Each student is guaranteed employment for 10 hours per week for two semesters during the academic year at \$2.65 per hour of the current minimum wage.

Since fall registracion is scheduled August 23-25, Cano urged all students wishing to apply for the new migrant education program to contact his officie by calling 512-278-4401, Ext. 260 or his home 278-7533.

To qualify for the program, applicants must be a member of a migrant seasonal farm labor failly. A seasonal farm laborer would have had to perform agricultural labor within the county for at least 30 days during the year, whereas a migrant farmworker must have worked during the preceding 12

months at a agricultural labor job requiring such travel that the worker was unable to return to his accepted place of residence within the same day.

IN addition, the student must be a resident of Dimmit, Edwards, Kinney, LaSalle, Maverick, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, or Zavala Counties. The applicant should be a high school graduate or have passed the G.E.D. equivalency test and be a citizen or legal resident of the United States.

Students to participate in the program will be selected from the applicants on the basis of high school grades, G.E.D. scores, letters of recommendations, career interest displayed by the student and a personal interview with the program counselor.

The program will provide the participating students with bus transportation to the campus from the area towns of Carrizo Springs, Del Rio, Crystal City, LaPryor, Leakey, Camp Wood, Barksdale, Utopia and Asherton.

HAY CUTTING TIME IN SOUTHWEST TEXAS

UVALDE---Hay cutting and baling kept most Southwest Texas farmers and ranchers in the field last week.

Hay yeilds are generally low around the region due to dry spring and late rains. Most reporting stations indicate that ranges remain green with cattle holding their own in condition. There is an indication, however, that moisture from earlier rains is now playing out and stress will come soon without more.

Extension Agent Bill Schumann said one area of Comal County has received only four inches of rain during the past 12 months.

Maverick County Extension Agent Dennis Hengst reports cotton crops there are looking good to excellent. In neighboring Zavala County, Agent Ray Caraveo says the corn has reached the dent stage and farmers will not need any further irrigation. Also, some vegetables harvesting is continuing in Zavala County.

County agent Werner Lindig says pecan growth in Bandera is very slow and peaches are small this season.

The entire region continues very hot and dry with strong winds prevailing.

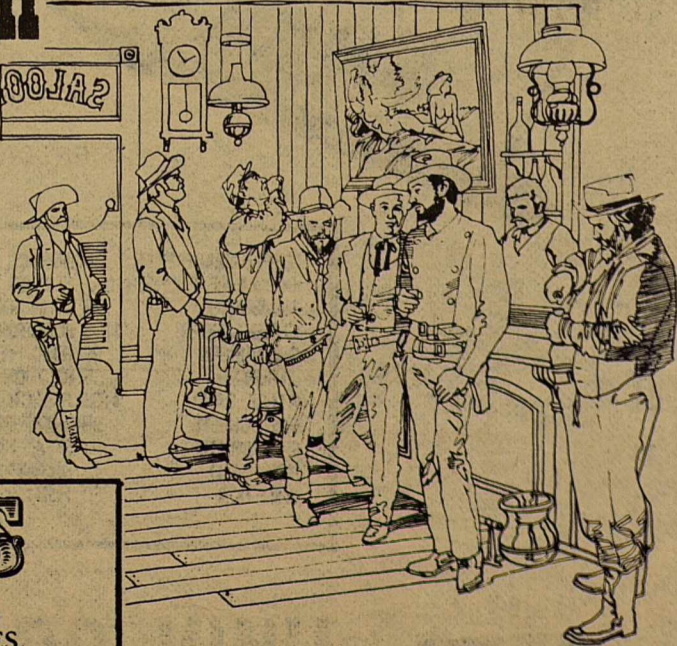

### Department of Human Resources

REGISTRATION REQUIRED OF BABYSITTERS

If you are caring for children in your home, you could be violating state laws and not even know it. The Child Care Licensing Act of 1975 requires all persons caring for unrelated children in their home to be licensed or registered by the Texas Department of Human Resources.

"Most persons caring for only a few children in their home fall under the simple registration procedures," said Thomas Barnett, Brackettville, area licensing representative for the state agency. "The standards for registered family homes, under which many home child care providers fall, are common sense rules developed with the assistance of people actually involved in the child care business."

Barnett added that registration is a simple matter generally handled by mail. Once registered, the home is placed on a list of registered family homes. This list is available free charge, to the general public.

"Professional technicians can assist potential registered family homes with the application procedures including providing the home with the minimum standards," said Barnett. "We strive to help persons meet the law and provide better and safer child care."

"Since there are very few registered family homes in Kinney County, there is obvious need for development and registration of new family homes to care for our children," said Barnett. "We try to see that quality child care is easily available and simple to provide. A good example is that there is no registration fees required to become a registered family home."

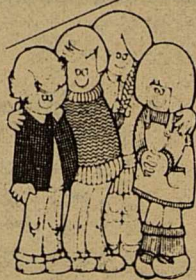

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### TEXAS THOROUGHBRED BREEDERS ASS'N.

Executive Secretary Tom Russell of the Texas Thoroughbred Breeders Association announced today that he would not serve as Sales Director for the upcoming 1978 Texas Thoroughbred Breeders Association Sale. Russell, who started with the sale in 1972, saw sales total figures rise from \$189,750 with horses averaging \$1,498 in that year to last year's highly successful sale which exceeded three million dollars for the first time with an average price of \$8,000.

"The Texas Sale," Russell said, "has progressed to where it will continue to be an on going sale. My time will be devoted in the future to several projects which are in their infancy."

Russell, President of the TTBA Members Credit Union, will pursue the credit union more activately devoting more time to the establishment of a lending policy for horesmen.

Russell will continue to hold the Louisiana Downs Two-Year-Old In Training Sale. The first sale held on June 11, 1978, was highly successful and, "I believe," Russell said, "it will grow into the greatest Two-Year-

Old In Training Sale in the nation, at least, that what we are going to try to make it."

The Texas Astrodome Sale should continue to grow and prosper as it has in the past, Russell said.

### CATTLE RAISERS PRESIDENT SEEKS TAX LIMITATION

FORT WORTH--A constitutional limitation on state and local taxes similar to California's Porposition 13 has been called for by the president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, John Armstrong of Kingsville, Texas, representing one of the larger groups of land-owners in Texas.

In a letter to Governor Dolph Briscoe, Armstrong said, "I would like to request that you give serious thought to calling a special session of the Legislative to consider a constitutional limitation on state and and local taxes. This would provide the people of our state with the power of initiative and referendum. In this way, the people of Texas will have the same mechanism to influence a state government on this issue as the people of California."

Armstrong referred to the landslide vote for Proposition 13 in California which has caught the attention of public officials and provate citizens all over the nation. "We must strike while the sentiment is strong to limit taxation, thus slowing down the overdevelopment of bureaucracy. In six or eight more months, this enthusiam and concern may well have cooled. Meaningful tax limitations put on by the Legislative depend on the backing of an aroused citizenry." Armstrong added that the upward trend of property taxes must be stemmed.

The Texas Constitution provides for regular sessions of the Legislature only in odd numbered years from January to June. Unless called into a special session by the governor, the Legislature will not meet until January, 1979.

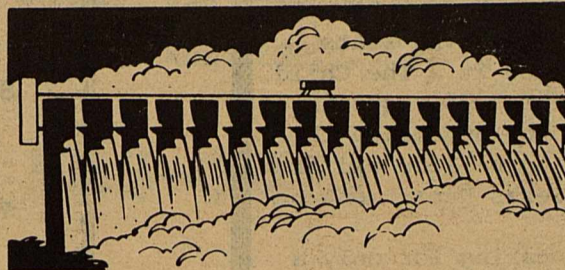
# Present Day Myths

# GREEN THUMBS

We are having many inquires regarding the health of trees. Many trees have leaves turning yellow and/or dying up and falling off. This may be because the particular type of tree will not do well in this area. It mostly means the trees need to be fed. The quickest way to get food to the tree is by root feeding. A quick shot of slight lasting value is to spray with a nutrient of some type. It will give the appearance of great good but will be of little lasting value.

Food spikes driven into the soil about the base of the tree will serve as a good food program for several months. If a tree is in real need of food the better program is to root feed the tree and follow immediately with food spikes.

If this dones not solve the problem the problem it may well be that the tree need treatment for some fungus. This can be accomplished by spraying the tree with some good fungicide. Many times the problem is simply a lack of water.

MOST tree problems can be rather easily solved if the tree is one that will grow at all in this area.

## SHEEP & GOAT RAISERS NEWS

All through the eagle controversies producers have been told that their complaints of eagle predation on domestic livestock are considered baseless because they lack scientific evidence. Eagle defenders have used the data gap to depict ranchers as wild-eyed savages bent on the pointless annihilation of a harmless bird. All that's changing now.

Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association president Bill Schneemann says the association is "most appreciative" of the efforts of Drs. Dale Wade and Charlie Livingston in assimilating the types of evidence needed to substantiate eagle predation. Dr. Wade is area wildlife specialist and Dr. Livingston research veterinarian with the San Angelo Research and Experiment Station. They, along with University of Montana researcher Dr. Bart O'Gara have handled the laboratory end of the association's "Operation Dead Lamb."

The "Dead Lamb" project, conducted between January and May 30 of this year, involved necropsies on a total of 75 lambs and goat kids collected by ranchers in 16 Texas counties. Ranchers were asked to collect, bag, and freeze and store suspicious carcasses for examination at the San Angelo research facility.

Of the 75 samples studied, 23 were confirmed eagle kills, an additional 21 described as probable eagle kills. Another 18 fell prey to mammalian predators and 13 were attributed to unknown causes. Of the latter group, a summation report issued by Wade and Livingston says some were probably lost to disease or starvation; others may have been killed by predators but too carcass remained for accurate diagnosis.

In case the separate figures slipped past unnoticed, 23 eagle kills plus 21 probable equals 44, well over half the 75 carcass total. This should pretty well put the lie to protectionist claims that loss data has been unavailable because losses do not really occur. Of course, it can be argued that such a relatively high percentage of eagle kills to total samples reflects the fact that ranchers were specially looking for eagle damage and have passed up other types of ills. This argument

is a self-defeating one for the protectionists, however,--it contradicts other pet claim that ranchers can't tell the difference between a lamb killed by an eagle and a lamb squashed by a falling rock.

To the accuracy of the necropsies, the Wade-Livingston report is very specific in laying out the types of evidence required to confirm an eagle kill. The report describes in detail the characteristics of triangular puncture wounds inflicted by an attacking eagle as well as the puncture pattern produced by the opposing talons. It further points out that small prey such as lambs and kids often are not punctured by all an eagle's talons at one time, and the punctures are seldom accompanied by the type of crushing characteristics of mammalian jaws.

For the benefit of those who would protest that talon punctures might indicate only feeding by eagles and not necessarily killing, the report states with finality that all carcasses attributed to predation were marked by considerable hemorrhaging, capillary bleeding or bruising about the wounds. This, the report adds, is physically impossible once the prey has died and the heart stopped pumping--the wounds unquestionably occurred while the victim was alive.

There will surely be attempts to attack the necropsy evidence, but TS&GRA is hoping to establish another "Operation Dead Lamb" during next spring's eagle season, and by the time maybe most of the objections will have been heard. If so, any perceived shortcomings in data or procedures can be eliminated. Producers have long known what's actually happening--it's time everyone else found out. ####

which is bulleted at #17 in Billboard #19 in Cash Box, and #24 in Record World for the week of July 1.

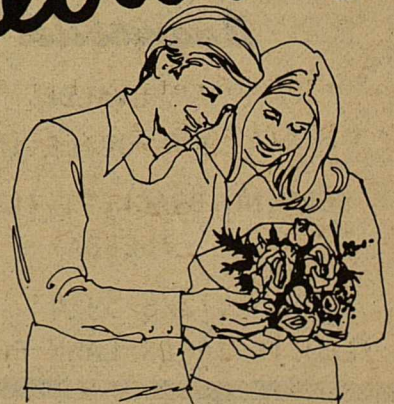
