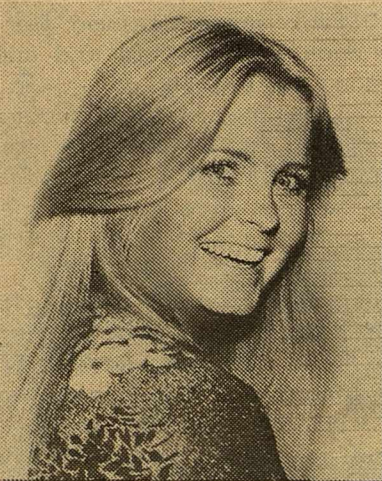

It's Wild, Man! It's Wild



The Alamo West 250 Off Road Races, a 30 mile course on some of the roughest terrain either side of the Nueces, is set for September 30th at Alamo Village, Brackettville, Texas. A kick-off rally and

dance will be held at the Village Cantina on Friday evening preceding the races with DOTTSY, (upper left) RCA recording artist, performing with Calvin Wallen and the Touch of Class Band.

Brackettville, Texas — The Alamo West 250 Off Road Races; high powered racers being driven by experienced and well known race car drivers taking off on a 30 mile course on some of the roughest terrain either side of the Nueces.

The course is set at Alamo Village, movie capitol of Texas and the date is Saturday, September 30th, from 9 am to 5 pm over some of the same countryside where the sensational heart rendering "Jody" G-rated movie was filmed in March.

One hundred cars will start at thirty-second intervals in a race against time on the rugged 30 mile run. It is estimated that 50 percent of them will never finish the gruelling race.

Rancher Happy Shahan and the Bess Brothers of Deer Park, Texas, are promoting the race which is sanctioned by "Score International."

According to owner Shahan, spectators will be able to see the most exciting features of the race from a high vantage point near the Alamo set where the race will begin. It will be an exciting day for spectators who will enjoy not only the

races, but tour the movie site and the Village Cantina will be open serving food and soft drinks.

Anything can happen to cars entered in the "Alamo West 250." It is not unusual for motors to burn out, wheels to run off and the cars to turn over. Spectators will also see the cars make pit stops and all of the excitement of the behind-the-scenes of racing.

With the staggering starts, the "Alamo West 250" is obviously not a race to see who crosses the finish line first. The object of Off-Road racing is to race against time.

DOTTSY, RCA recording artist, will be backed by Calvin Wallen and the Touch of Class Band at the kick-off rally and dance to be held at the Village Cantina on Friday evening preceding the races on Saturday.

4-H NEWS

NATIONAL 4-H WEEK, OCTOBER 1-7

Nearly 5.5 million young people will observe National 4-H Week, Oct. 1-7.

Kinney County 4-H Clubs will be observing 4-H Week by holding their Annual 4-H Awards Banquet, October 7, 1978. The 4-H Clubs will also be sponsoring a dance at 9:00 p.m. that evening at the Brackettville Civic Center.

National 4-H Week is set aside annually by the Cooperative Extension Service to focus attention on the values of 4-H as an informal education program for boys and girls 9 to 19 years old.

One hundred twenty-five boys and girls from Kinney County are enrolled in 4-H this year. They take part in 4-H through special interest groups, nutrition education programs, short-term activities and camping.

4-H, the youth education program of the Cooperative Extension Service, emphasizes learn-by-doing projects and activities that build character and leadership-citizenship skills.

4-H operates through a partnership of government, land-grant universities volunteer leaders and the private sector. It is administered through the universities in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, with the Cooperative Extension Service responsible for program leadership

County and area leadership is provided by extension agents specializing in agriculture, home economics and 4-H. Parents also play an important role in local 4-H.

Many businesses, organizations and individuals lend their support to the program of all levels. Nationally, private-sector support the 4-H is coordinated by National 4-H Council, a nonprofit educational organization.

SHEEP & GOAT RAISERS NEWS

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Association's fall directors' meeting will be Saturday, Oct. 7 at the Menard High School, Menard.

Registration will begin at 8 a.m. Committee meetings will be split, beginning at 9 and 10:30, followed by a dutch treat meal.

Members are urged to attend if at all possible. We may not be able to solve all the world's problems at one whack, but we'll durn sure give it a try. It'll also give us an opportunity to advise you how things went during the September 18 and 19 tour of West Texas ranch and farmland by top EPA and USDA officials.

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association favors the Texas Tax Relief Amendment. There's a simple, forthright statement if ever we made one.

The amendment comes up for a vote by the people November 7. It's not necessarily all that all of us might have wished, but it does a more than credible job of addressing several important points that have long needed addressing.

The amendment is a compromise measure, but it really couldn't have been anything else, considering the wide variations of interests represented within the State of Texas. It mandates some tax-related changes and allows for others at the discretion of the legislature.

Mandated changes that the amendments will provide include:

A homestead exemption from school taxes of \$5,000 off the market value; notice to a homeowner of a re-evaluation; public notices by any local government of plans to increase total

tax revenues, along with a public hearing on the proposal; a prohibition against centralized property tax appraisals; a requirement that all future enforcement of uniform tax appraisal standards be originated in the individual counties; a prohibition against increased state spending above the estimated growth of the state's economy.

Provisions that are allowed by the amendment but which will still require legislative action include:

Additional homestead exemptions for the elderly or disabled up to \$10,000, and a prohibition against increasing taxes on such homesteads unless they change hands or are remodeled; an increase on household goods and personal effects exemptions from the current \$250 to an unlimited amount, as long as the property is not used to produce income or is otherwise exempt from forced sale for debt; valuation of agricultural and forest lands on productive, rather than speculative values.

The last provision has already been acted on by the legislature. The 1977 legislative session produced a bill calling for just such productive value taxation, but it cannot be put into force without a constitutional amendment such as the one we'll be voting on soon.

The tax relief amendment has been attacked by some as a "special interest" measure offering benefits for only a select few. It's hard to see much truth in that claim, because the "select few" include the elderly, the disabled, the rancher and farmer and the homeowner, just for starters.

Less obvious, perhaps, but just as valid, is the amendment's application to almost anyone else not fitting these categories. Everyone pays property taxes, whether he or she be a homeowner or a renter. Members of the latter group may not see the tax statement,

but they pay it with a portion of their monthly rent. If that's not near enough to home, the amendment's limitations on state spending should be. It is spending that determines taxing, and the more is spent, the more will be taxed.

Some continue to argue that agriculture and timber producers are getting the big break, but in reality it's not a break at all---it's simply an evening of the burden. At one time the term "property" was almost synonymous with real estate, and property taxation was accordingly based on the ownership of real estate.

The link between real estate and wealth had long since been broken, but the taxing philosophy is still the same. It's not secret that farmers and ranchers own the most land, and because they do, they carry a grossly unfair share of the burden. The

"big break" given producers is that their land will now be taxed according to what it can produce not what some developer might be willing to pay to turn it into a jungle of condominiums, tennis courts or high-priced shopping boutiques.

VEGETABLE Task Force

Lately we have been considering the advantages and cultural practices of planting a fall vegetable garden.

We hope by this time the garden has been prepared and planted; but many of us do not have the time to plant a large garden, or more than likely, do not have garden space available.

Others who are older or less accustomed to strenuous activity do not feel they are physically able to garden. For these potential green thumbs we recommend the growing of container vegetables.

Most gardeners enjoy having flowers in their garden for household use and garden decoration. These people, who as a matter of habit, have potted plants (sounds illegal, doesn't it) do not realize that certain vegetables can be successfully grown in containers.

Also, these container-grown, mobile vegetables can easily be protected from "blue Norther" cold snaps during the fall months. If you are a weather watcher, you probably realize that Texas has its cold weather in short intervals during the fall. If a gardener can protect plants during these short periods, then growth and vegetable production are possible until Christmas. The mobility of container-grown plants increases this possibility.

The culture of the container-grown vegetable is slightly different from the garden-grown plant. First of all, we must mix an artificial "soil" which will be free of insects and disease and will drain easily. A recommended synthetic "soil" mixture for container-grown vegetables is horticultural grade vermiculite, peat moss, limestone, superphosphate, and garden fertilizer.

To one bushel each of vermiculite and peat moss, add 10 talbespoons of limestone, 5 talbespoons of 0-20-0 (superphosphate) and one cup of gar-

den fertilizer such as 6-12-12 or 5-10-10. Mix the material thoroughly adding a little water to recude dust. Wet the mix thoroughly prior to seeding and/or transplanting.

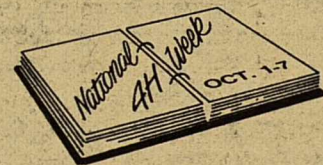
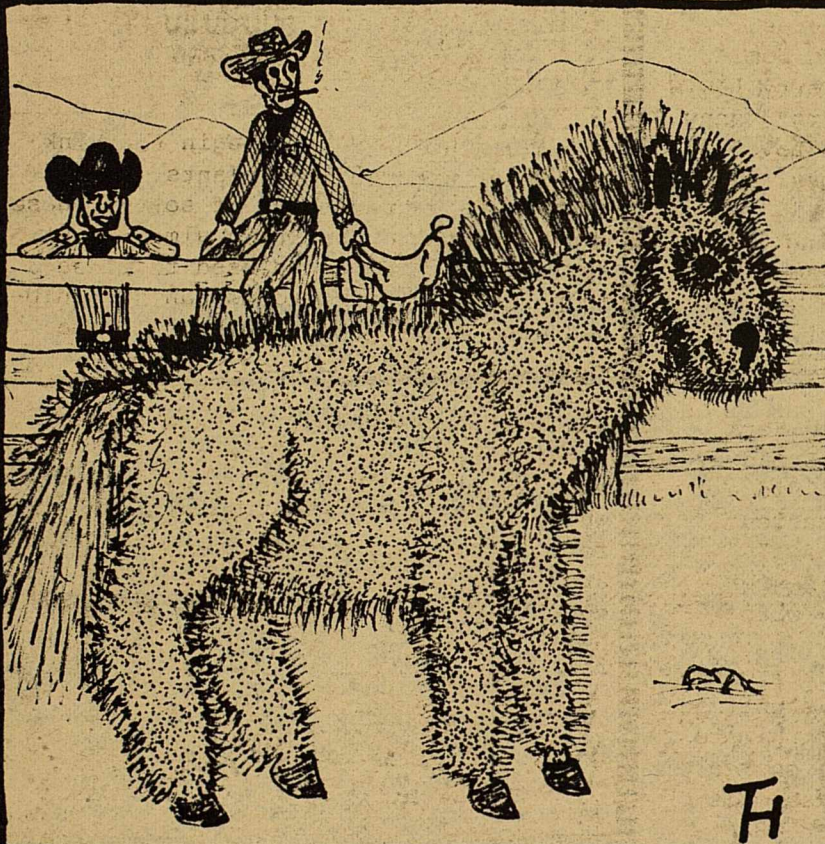
Remember that container-grown plants have the disadvantage of being completely dependent on the grower for correct amounts of water and nutrients. The garden plant can be neglected for several weeks, and "mother nature" water and nutrients will carry your plant through; but don't neglect the container plant for even one day or you will have a dead, dried up plant when harvest time comes.

Of course, the other aspect of this problem is that the gardener becomes more attached to that container plant since he most see and care for it daily. If is his decisions of when to fertilize and water that produce any vegetable harvested. The vegetable is a personalized product--sort of like seeing our kids grow up and do well!

Experiments with vegetables in hanging baskets this had success with small-fruited tomatoes, peppers of all kinds, lettuce, cabbage, beans, peas and eggplant. Squash vines and snap beans grew well, but the fluctuating water seemed to reduce fruit production. These hanging baskets has to be watered at least once a day or more as the plants grow larger. They were grown in partial sun and hung on the eves of a house. the 18-inch wire baskets were lined with one inch of spagnum mass, then filled with potting soil mix. Soluble nutrients were added as plant foliage color demanded; it.e., light green color indicated fertility deficiency. Then water, water, water!

You are encouraged to try container vegetable gardening. You will find it is a challenging as well as rewarding experience.

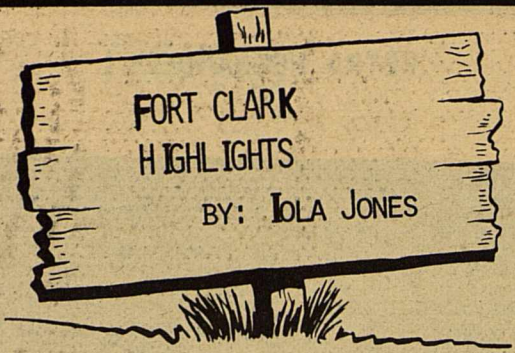

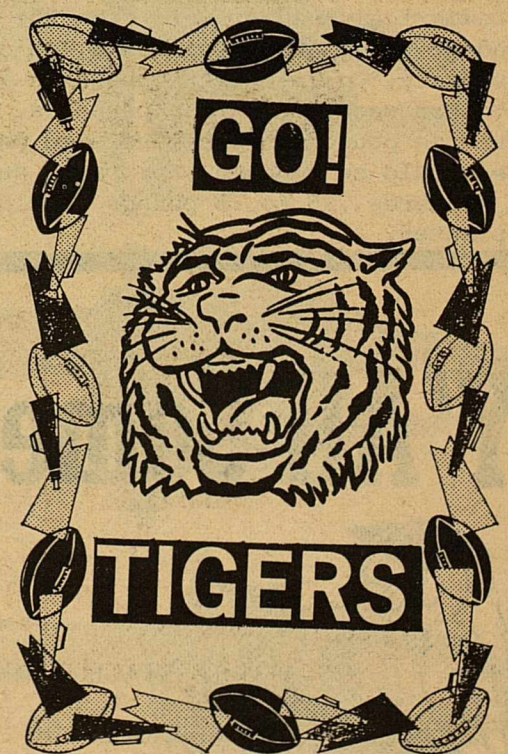

Soil Conservation

"Aztec" Maximilian sunflower a native forb relished by livestock and wildlife, has been released by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service. A forb is a herbaceous plant that is not a grass, sedge, or rush. The new variety was selected for use in range seeding.

A lot of livestock producers in Texas would like to include seed of a native plant used by livestock and wildlife—especially deer and game birds in range seeding mixtures. But seed for such plants simply are not available.

"Aztec" Maximilian sunflower will change that. We anticipate a heavy demand for the seed as soon as it is available.

Commercial seed growers will be planting "Aztec" in 1979. A small amount of seed should be available for use in range seeding mixtures in 1979 and 1980.

Maximilian sunflower is native to most of the grasslands of the Southwest, but the plant is so relished by livestock and wildlife that it has been killed out on most rangelands. Seed for the plant has never been grown commercially.

"Aztec" has undergone extensive field testing since 1969; plantings have been made a 55 location in Texas, 17 in Oklahoma, and at 11 locations in Kansas. The plant has proven to be adapted to most soil types for range seeding mixtures where average annual rainfall is 18 inches or more. The plant, however, does not appear to be adapted to wet or saline soils.

The high protein content of Maximilian sunflower makes it especially attractive to deer, cattle, sheep, goats and horses. The plant is so palatable that several test plantings have been killed by overgrazing from cattle and deer. Birds eat the seeds readily and the tall, dense growth provides cover for several species of wildlife.

"Aztec" is being released by SCS in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Foundation seed can be purchased by commercial seed growers from the Foundation Seed Service, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

For seed production purposes, about one pound of pure live seed per acre should be planted. For range seeding mixtures .25 to .5 pounds should be planted.

The curriculum for this seminar has been accredited by the Texas Judicial Council and covers the following specialized areas:

- *Municipal Court Organization and Administration
- *Municipal Court Judge as Magistrate
- *Citations, Complaints and Pre-Trial Procedure
- *Substantive Criminal Law and Procedure in Non-Jury Cases
- *Jury Trials and the Law of Evidence

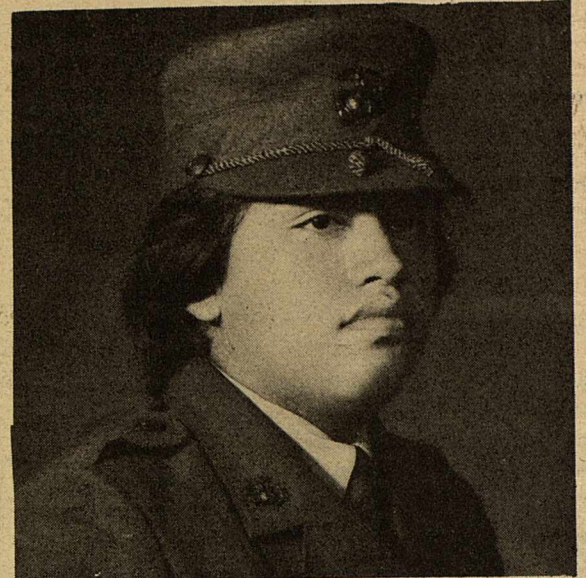
A mock trial was staged to familiarize non-attorney judges with jury trial procedures.

Approximately 30 judges from across the State of Texas attended the seminar.

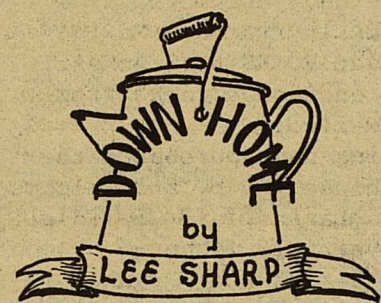
PETRA HERNANDEZ

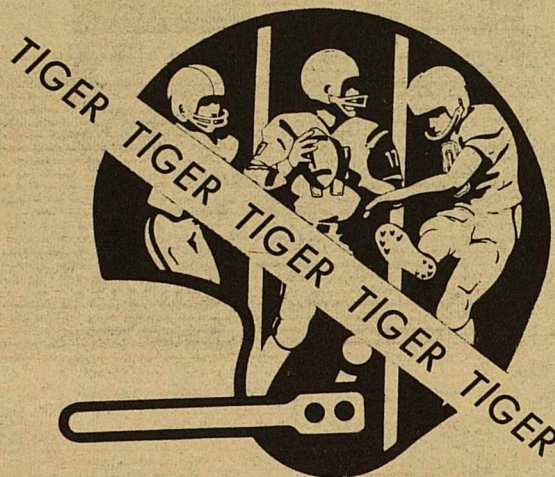

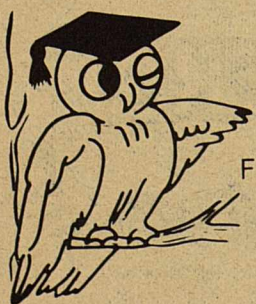


Your booklet "Down Home Recipes of James, Jellies and Preserves, one of the recipes called CACTUS JELLY, in it calls for 1 package of powdered Pectin, in parenthesis, says 1 tablespoon, should be 3 tablespoons--Sorry.

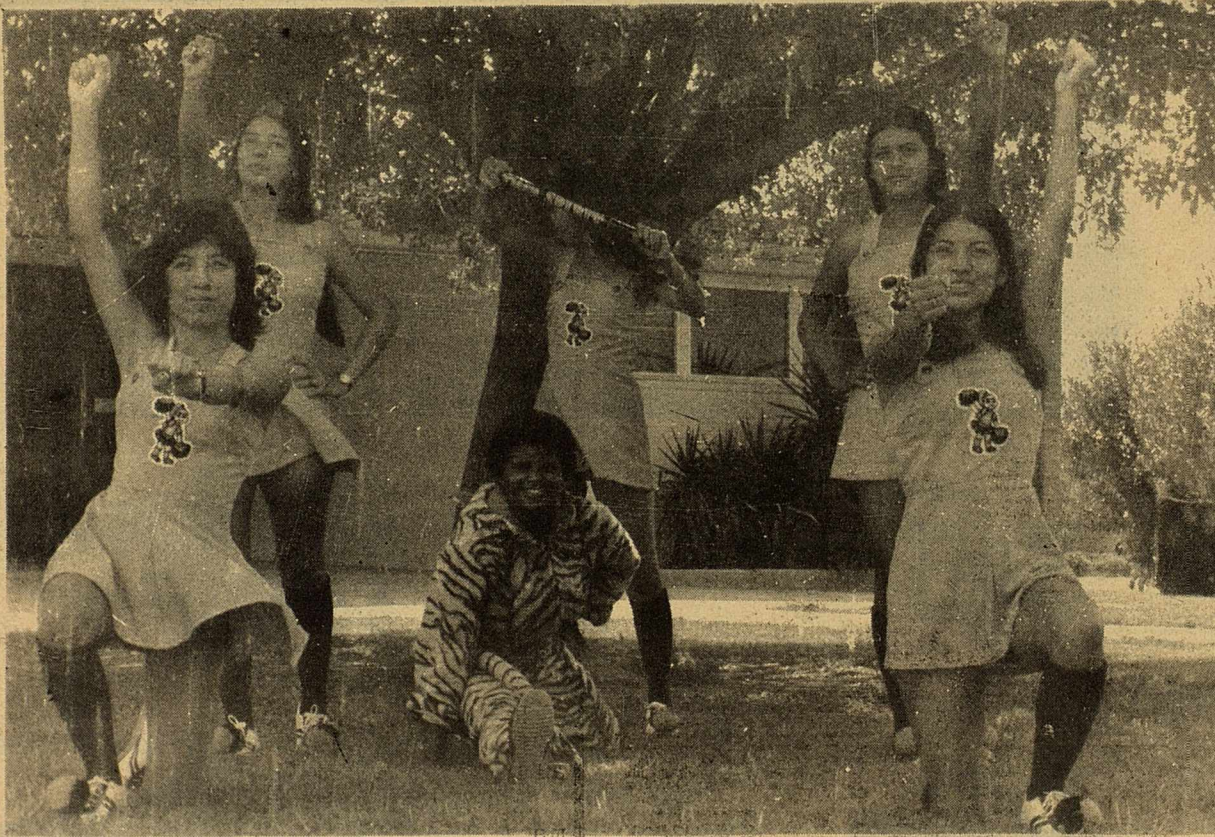
F.F.A. and 4-H members will be competing in the Brackettville, Kinney County Livestock Show and some will be competing in San Antonio Houston, and Odessa shows.

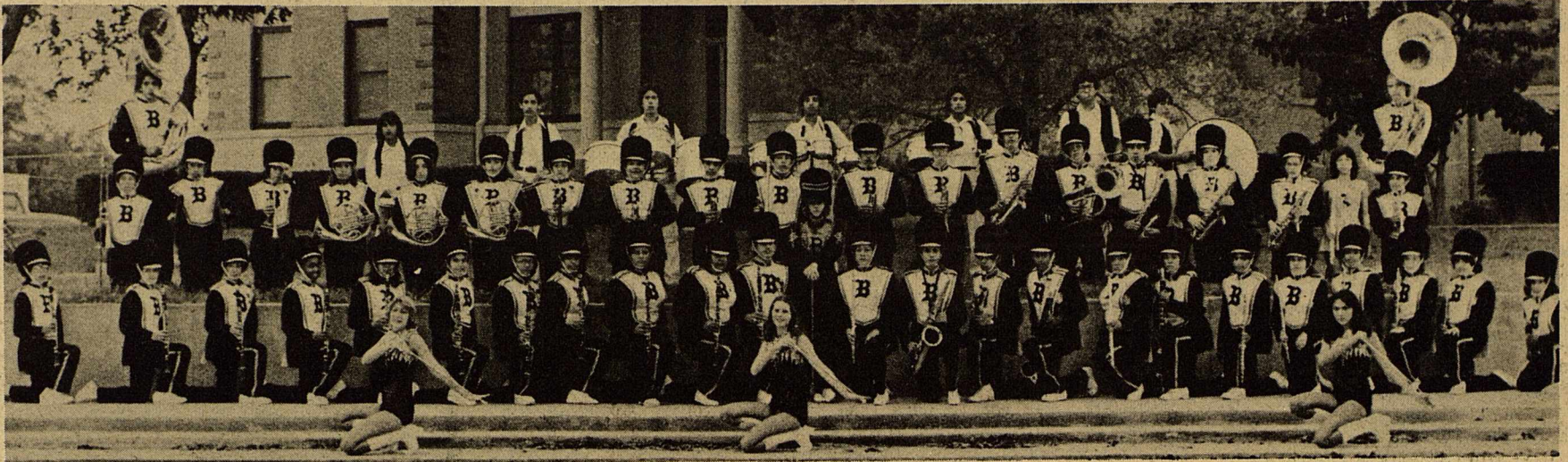

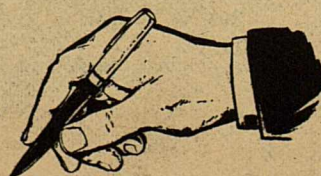

"The Tax Relief Amendment"

(H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

authority where the property tax is imposed.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration."

NUMBER ONE
(S.J.R. 50)

S.J.R. 50 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to delete an archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum." The amendment would allow the State of Texas to purchase products and services done by handicapped individuals in nonprofit rehabilitation facilities without complying with bid requirements applicable to other state contracts. The amendment also would eliminate the formality of the approval of certain state contracts by the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment deleting the archaic reference to the 'Deaf and Dumb Asylum,' allowing certain products and services of handicapped individuals to be used by agencies and departments of state government, requiring the procurement of other products and services required in the operation of state government to be made under bids awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, making all such procurement processes subject to laws enacted by the legislature, and eliminating the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller of Public Accounts of Texas be personally involved with such transactions."

NUMBER TWO
(S.J.R. 55)

S.J.R. 55 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit local governments to issue bonds for the reconstruction or acquisition of facilities (land, equipment and improvements) designed to develop employment opportunities. These

bonds would be payable solely from the revenue from the sale or lease of these facilities. The building or acquisition of such facilities must be determined by the local government to be necessary to develop employment opportunities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that the legislature may permit political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds to develop employment opportunities for its citizens."

NUMBER THREE
(S.J.R. 44)

S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. The bonds are to be paid solely from revenue from municipal tax increments. Payment cannot be made from the revenue of municipal taxes, utilities, or other services.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize cities and towns to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and prohibiting any city or town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes."

NUMBER FOUR
(S.J.R. 53)

S.J.R. 53 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to exempt from taxation solar or wind-powered energy devices.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from taxation solar and wind-powered energy devices."

NUMBER FIVE
(H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to grant exclusive jurisdiction to justices of the peace in civil cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$200, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court.

The amendment grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives the county court exclusive jurisdiction.

The amendment also grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdic-

tion with both county and district courts where the amount in controversy is between \$500 and \$1,000, except where the legislature gives the county or district court exclusive jurisdiction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."

NUMBER SIX
(S.J.R. 45)

S.J.R. 45 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals. Presently courts of civil appeals are limited to a chief justice and two associate justices. The amendment also would allow the courts to sit in sections, with the concurrence of a majority of the judges sitting in the section necessary to decide a case.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to increase the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, permitting a court of civil appeals to sit in sections, and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case."

NUMBER SEVEN
(S.J.R. 48)

S.J.R. 48 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution eliminating the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund. The authority of the State Building Commission has been transferred by law to the State Board of Control.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional authority for the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT
(H.J.R. 42)

H.J.R. 42 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing certain political subdivisions or districts in the state that can presently issue bonds or other indebtedness or otherwise lend its credit to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit to support such activities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendments authorizing certain districts to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or other indebtedness or to issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit for fire-fighting purposes."

H.J.R. 1 propone una enmienda a la constitución de Texas permitiendo a la legislatura que exente propiedad personal intangible; requiriendo que la legislatura exente ciertos artículos caseros y efectos particulares; y permitiendo a la legislatura que exente todo o parte de la propiedad personal del hogar seguro, de la imposición de impuestos estatales y locales sobre propiedad.

La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga la imposición de impuestos sobre tierras agrícolas y rancheras basada en su capacidad productiva en vez de su valor de mercado y permite a la legislatura que disponga la imposición de impuestos a bosques de madera basada en su capacidad productiva.

La enmienda permite a los gobiernos locales que extiendan la exención actual de no menos de \$3,000 del hogar seguro residencial para personas de 65 años o más de edad para incluir ciertas personas incapacitadas.

La enmienda concede una exención de \$5,000 en el valor de mercado del hogar seguro residencial en los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre propiedad. Autoriza a la legislatura que conceda una exención adicional de los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre propiedad de una cantidad que no exceda \$10,000 del valor de mercado de hogares seguros residenciales de personas 65 años o más de edad y ciertas personas incapacitadas. Si la persona de 65 años o más de edad es elegible para esta exención la cantidad total de los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre el hogar seguro de aquella persona no puede incrementarse.

La enmienda previene que gobiernos locales incrementen los impuestos sobre propiedad a menos que el cuerpo administrativo provea aviso público y lleve a cabo una audiencia pública. La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga por ley que cada propietario reciba aviso de la revaluación de su propiedad y la cantidad de incremento en sus impuestos.

La enmienda limita las apropiaciones de los ingresos de impuestos estatales en una cantidad que no exceda la tasa de crecimiento económico estatal que se anticipa, con la legislatura autorizada para conceder exenciones de emergencia.

La enmienda prohíbe la valuación de propiedad inmueble a través del estado para los fines de impuestos sobre propiedad. Se requiere que la ejecución de

normas y procedimientos uniformes para la valuación de propiedad con el propósito de impuestos sobre propiedad, se origine con la autoridad que impone los impuestos sobre propiedad.

"La enmienda constitucional disponiendo alivio de impuestos para hogares seguros residenciales, personas mayores de edad, personas incapacitadas, y tierras agrícolas; extensiones de bienes muebles; la verdad en procedimientos tocante a la imposición de impuestos, incluyendo participación de ciudadanos; de nuevo definiendo la base de impuestos; limitando los gastos del estado; y la administración de impuestos sobre propiedad."

**NO. 1
(S.J.R. 50)**

S.J.R. 50 propone una enmienda a la constitución de Texas para eliminar la referencia arcaica al "Instituto de Sordos y Mudos."
