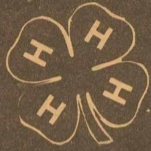

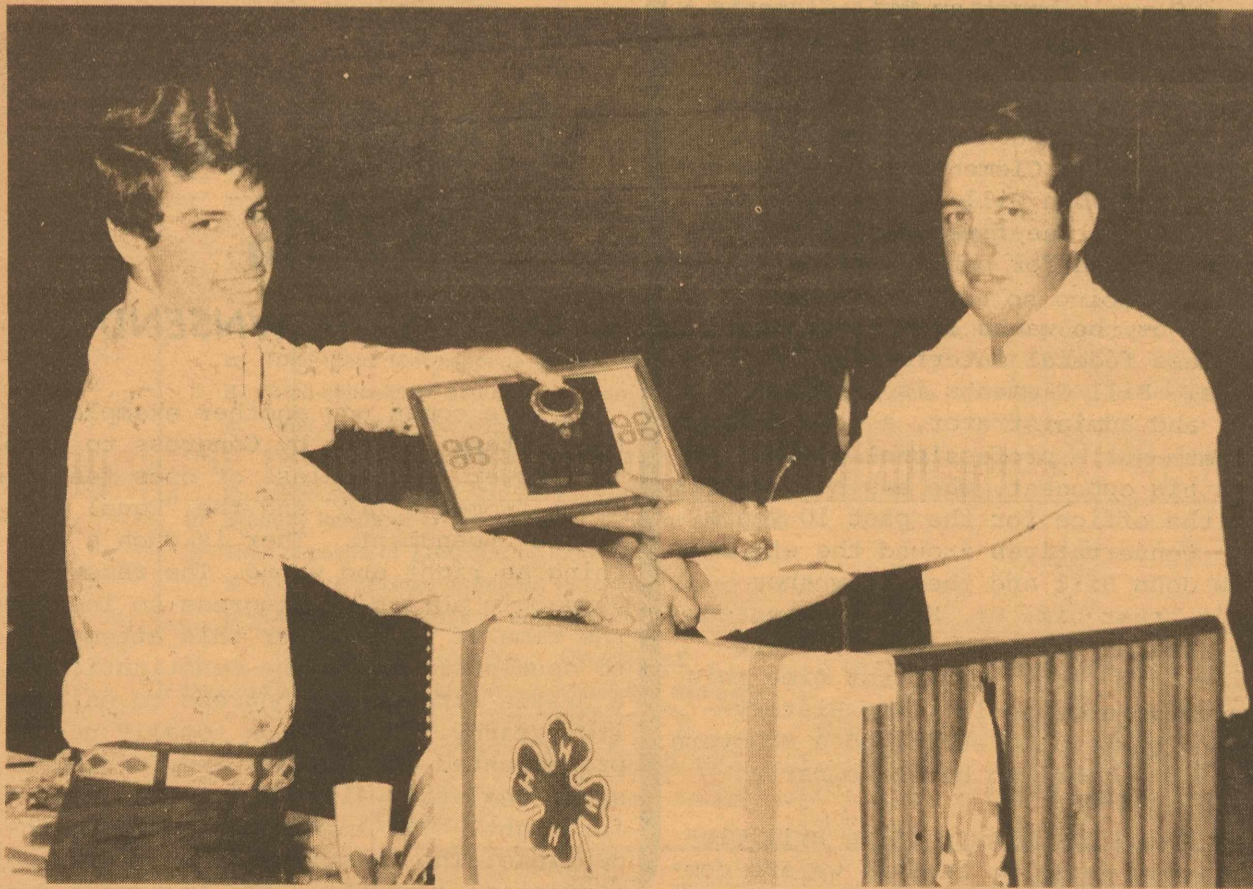

Dear Editor,

During the Democratic Primary this
spring, I strongly supported Governor
Briscoe because he best represented my

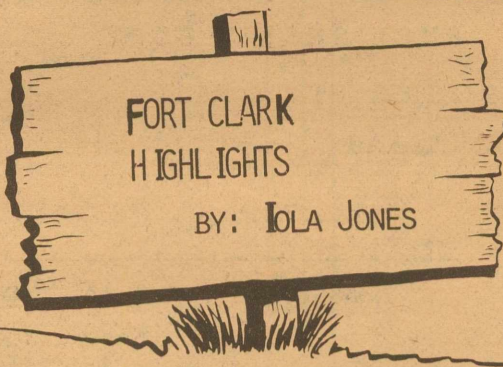

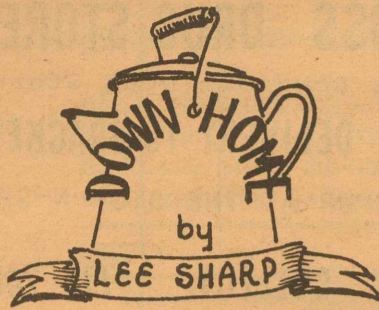

OLD FASHIONED FRESH PUMPKIN PIE

- 1 CUP SUGAR
1 TABLESPOON FLOUR
1/2 TEASPOON GROUND GINGER
1 TEASPOON GROUND CINNAMON
1/8 TEASPOON GROUND NUTMEG
1/8 TEASPOON GROUND CLOVES
3 EGGS
1 1/2 CUPS COOKED MASHED PUMPKIN
1 CUP MILK OR LIGHT CREAM

PASTRY FOR ONE-CRUST, 9-INCH PIE

Mix sugar with flour, salt ginger, cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves. Beat in eggs. Stir in pumpkin and milk or cream. Mix well. Pour mixture into a 9-inch pan lined with unbaked pastry. Bake in a preheated hot oven 400 degrees, 50 minutes or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean.

SUBCOMMITTEE ON THE POWER OF EMINENT DOMAIN

The Texas House subcommittee on the Power of Eminent Domain has completed its work and unanimously approved a final report to the 66th Legislature which expressed concern on the abuse and extent of the use of the power of eminent domain. The subcommittee, a part of the House Agriculture and Livestock Committee of the Texas Legislature, heard from numerous individuals and organizations who have experienced such abuses.

The subcommittee, chaired by St. Rep. Susan McBee of Del Rio, in its report stated that more than 170 types of entities, such as pipeline companies, railroads, river authorities, hospitals etc., have the power of eminent domain. "Eminent Domain" is the inherent power to condemn and take possession of property ostensibly for the general welfare of the public. Public entities and private companies are authorized to use the power of eminent domain when specifically allowed by the legislature to do so.

The report listed a number of areas of grievance vocalized by landowners over the past fifteen years. Summarizing the various problem areas, the report noted that the "underlying problem with the power of eminent domain appears to be the structural bias in favor of the condemning authorities, public and private, to the detriment of the landowners. The parties involved in a condemnation are not of equal power and influence. An individual is certainly no match for a mass of legal experts and corporate attorneys that a governmental agency or a multinational or national corporation can assemble in a condemnation hearing. This has led

to the landowner's feelings of frustration, if not outright contempt, for condemnors of every kind through the years."

The subcommittee report suggested ways to strike a better balance between the parties in condemnation suits-- a balance that provides more protection and rights for the landowner.

The subcommittee which includes Representatives Bill Keese of Somerville, Pete Patterson of Brookston, Betty Denton of Waco, Elmer Martin of Colorado City and Forrest Green of Corsicana "feels strongly that the Legislature in the future should look very closely at any legislation granting the use of eminent domain. We as legislators have been lax in the past and have delegated this awesome power almost as a matter of course, and almost without close scrutiny."

the event or activity they are always there to help.

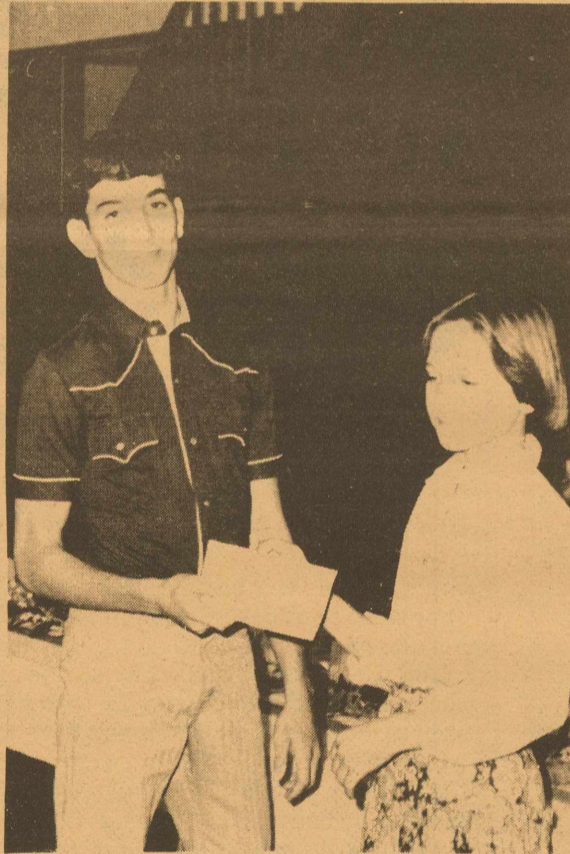

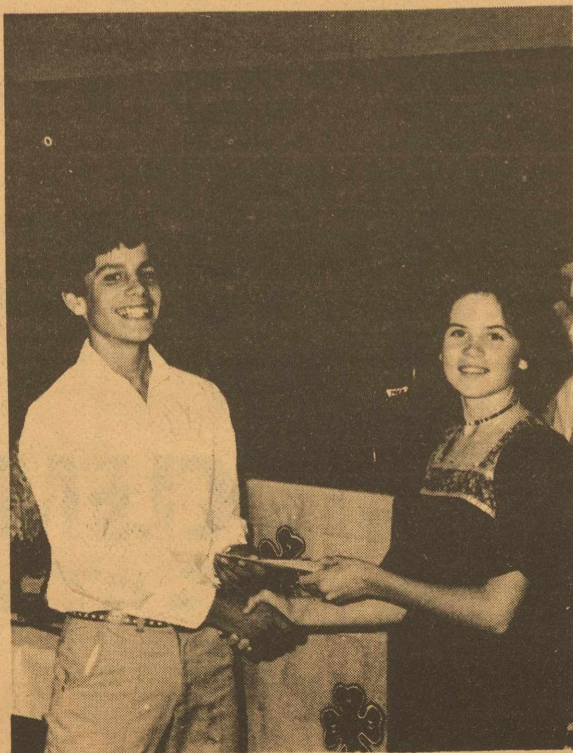

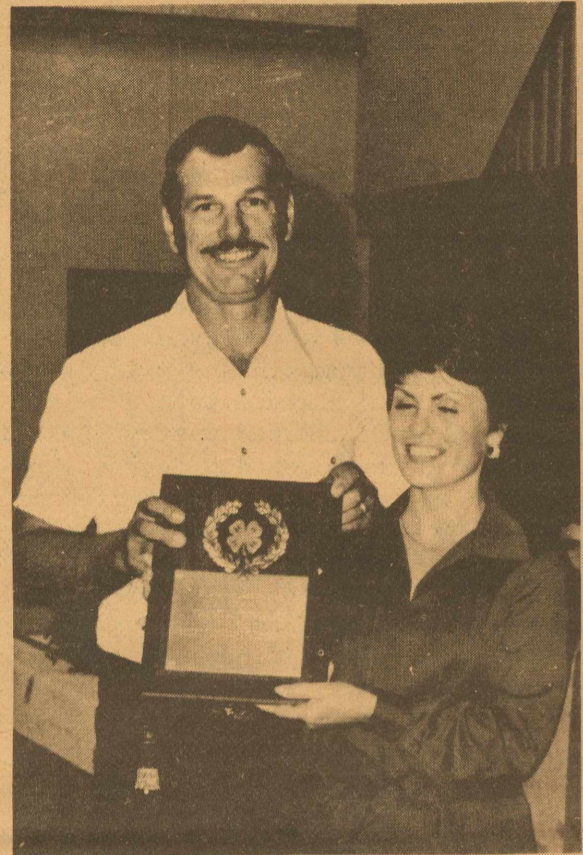

GREEN THUMBS

It's time to consider you pot plants. Winter is not far away and arrangements should be made for their protections from frost or/and freeze. One big thing to remember is that your plants will not grow much inside in the winter. Therefore, they need less water and feed. They need all the light they can get. Because they require less water it is easier to give them too much and kill them. Keep them slightly on the dry side. If you have a Norfolk Pine especially--keep it somewhat dry. overwatering will cause it to drop its limbs.
